Hamilton rides wave of success at westerns and nationals

With a passion for the water and a love of water skiing, Lanigan's Ethan Hamilton not only made a splash during this year's Western and National Water Ski Championships in Predator Bay, Alta. but he found himself taking home a few medals in the process.

After breaking his leg in April, being in a cast for six weeks followed by six weeks of physiotherapy, Hamilton's perseverance and dedication paid off in a big way during the competitions held July 30 to Aug. 2. While the Western and National Water Ski Championships would normally be on two separate occasions, due to COVID and with the anticipation of fewer competitors, the pair of prestigious events were tossed into one jam-packed weekend.

With over 90 registered skiers, Hamilton along with his family headed west where he skied in the western championship July 30 and 31. In the Boys U14 slalom, Ethan took first place, making it around three buoys at 55 km/h and at 14.25 m rope length.

"It was a really great experience and everything about it was amazing," said Hamilton about the championships. "I was not

first place finish, this time in the Boys U14 trick with 1,250 points. Following that, Ethan was third in the Boys U14 jump with a distance of 15 m.

After a tremendous showing at the western championship, Hamilton had little time to prepare for the national event. Hitting the water Aug. 1 and 2, Ethan picked up right where he left off, taking first place in the U14 slalom with a personal best score of five buoys at 55 km/h at 14.25 m rope length. He was also joined on the podium by teammate Enzo Kristian who placed second. Hamilton said the pair who train together in Saskatoon were thrilled to be one and two on the podium while representing Saskatchewan.

With another top finish, Ethan once again tasted gold as he was first in the Boys U14 trick, attaining another personal best with a score of 1,600 points. While he ended up missing the podium in jump, Hamilton's distance was near his personal best of 19 m.

expecting to do as well as I did."

Excited to place well and hit personal bests during nationals, Hamilton explained it was a real thrill, especially because he came back from breaking his leg at a hockey practice in April. MP Report

Tom Lukiwski, MP

As most of you know, I announced my retirement from politics in June and, with speculation rampant of a federal election this fall, this may be the last MP Report I ever write.

I first want to say what a great pleasure and honour it has been for me to serve as your elected representative these past 17 years. Even though I have been interested in politics my whole life, I had never imagined myself running for office until that fateful day in 2004. While the intervening time has seen many challenges, it has on the whole been the most fulfilling experience I could have imagined.

Of course, I very nearly didn't get the job in the first place. In my first campaign, I won by only 122 votes – a margin so narrow it went to recount. That experience taught me the power of democracy and that I could never, ever take my constituents for granted.

There have been so many highlights during my career, both local and national, that I scarcely know where to start. First and foremost, I would have to note the people of this riding, whose hometown spirit represents the very best of the Saskatchewan way of life. It has been an honour to get to know each and every one of you. I am proud that my staff and I were able to assist so many of you with your dealings with the federal government, including helping so many thousands of new Canadians make a new home in this country.

I am also glad to have had the opportunity to have added to our local communities in so many ways – all the local rinks, parks and public works which I helped secure funding. Two very large ones to which I contributed (I certainly can't claim sole credit) were the Global Transportation Hub and the \$27 million in federal funding for the Cooperators' Centre at Evraz Place.

On the national scene, I am proud to have contributed to the historic battle to end the Canadian Wheat Board monopoly. There were so many positive policy changes during the Harper government, but that is one that I saw as most meaningful to my rural constituents at home.

I was also honoured to serve as Parliamentary Secretary to Government House Leaders over a nine-year period. This gave me a rare glimpse into the behind-the-scenes negotiations that allow our Parliament to function. I am also proud of the work that I did on a number of Parliamentary committees, including serving as chair of the Government Operations committee. Despite the public image of constant partisan antagonism, Parliamentary committees are small and all-party, requiring members from different parties to work cooperatively. This gave me a tremendous opportunity to get to know and, yes, in a few cases, even become friends with MPs from across the aisle.

If you are wondering what comes next for Tom Lukiwski, I can't say that I have that completely figured out. I think for most of us, when we face retirement, the prospect of having a wide-open schedule can be a bit intimidating. I expect there will be a bit of golf involved. There will certainly be as much time with the grandkids as I can manage, and their parents will tolerate. Perhaps some day I will get bored and think about doing some consulting. But, for now, I'm content to take life as it comes.

Once again, thank you very much to all the people of Moose Jaw-Lake Centre-Lanigan and to all the people of my former riding of Regina-Lumsden-Lake Centre for all the years of trust and support you invested in me. I will cherish it as long as I live.

RCMP Report

Fatal collision at Foam Lake

On Aug. 6 at approximately 3:45 p.m., Wynyard and Foam Lake RCMP were dispatched to a single vehicle collision on Hwy. 16 at Foam Lake.

Investigation determined that the vehicle was travelling westbound when it left the roadway and entered a nearby creek. Two adult males were in the vehicle. The driver, who was from Whitehorse, Yukon, passed away on scene. The passenger received minor injuries.

Hwy. 16 was reduced to one lane during the initial investigation. Wynyard RCMP and an RCMP traffic reconstructionist continue to investigate.

Man charged after stopping helicopter at ice cream shop

A LeRoy man took cravings for ice cream to a whole new level – and landed in the middle of a Tisdale RCMP investigation.

On July 31 at approximately 5 p.m., Tisdale RCMP received a call that a helicopter had landed in a high traffic parking lot on 101st Street in Tisdale. When it landed, the helicopter blew up dust and debris through the area, which includes schools, an aquatic centre and more.

Investigation determined the landing was not an emergency rather a passenger of the helicopter exited the aircraft and entered a nearby restaurant to buy an ice cream cake. Officers determined the pilot, a 34-year-old man from LeRoy, was licensed to fly the helicopter, but that it was illegal to land it where he did.

On Aug. 4 the pilot was charged with one count of dangerous operation of an aircraft, Section 320.13(1)(a), Criminal Code. He will appear in court in Melfort on Sept. 7, 2021.



report of a single vehicle rollover on a gravel road around five kilometres northwest of Muenster off Hwy. 368. Humboldt Ambulance and District and Fire Department were also on scene.

The lone driver, a 21-year-old male from Humboldt passed away at the scene.

The investigation is ongoing by RCMP Collision Reconstruction.

Theft of and from vehicles in Davidson

During the first weekend of August, Craik RCMP received complaints in Davidson of several stolen vehicles and many others that were gone through by thieves. Most of these vehicles had keys in them or were not locked. Some stolen vehicles and items were recovered at other locations and returned to their owners. Craik RCMP still has unclaimed property and are looking for anyone who may have had these items stolen during this time. Craik RCMP reminds people to remove their keys from their vehicles, take any valuable property with them and lock the vehicle when not being used overnight. Police continue to investigate these occurrences and are seeking public assistance to help solve and prevent these crimes.

Driver facing multiple charges

Charges have been laid after Warman RCMP responded to a report at approximately 2 p.m. July 26 of a red car on Hwy. 16, three kilometres east of Maymont, driving the wrong way through a construction zone at a high rate of speed, weaving in and out of traffic and almost hitting highway workers.

Preliminary results of the investigation indicate the red car struck a second red car and sideswiped a third black car before it entered the ditch and rolled. The second red car rolled into the ditch and was severely damaged.

The 21-year-old male driver of the first red car was transported to hospital. No life-threatening injuries were reported to anyone involved in the collision.

As a result of investigation, Rory Favel from North Battleford is charged with: Operate a conveyance while ability to operate is impaired - Section 320.14(1)(a) CC; Operate a conveyance having a blood alcohol concentration exceeding eighty milligrams of alcohol - Section 320.14(1)(b) CC; Dangerous operation of motor vehicle - Section 320.13(1) CC; Prohibited driving - Section 320.18(1)(b) CC; and Breach of Probation - Section 733.1(1) CC.

I am enjoying the lingering summer days and nights with my children home from Toronto. This mama's heart is full and happy. The chairs around our kitchen table are occupied, my family is home! Crop Report

■ media release

Warm weather has continued to help crops mature throughout the province according to Saskatchewan Agriculture's weekly Crop Report for Aug. 3 to 9. Producers have been able to make considerable headway with harvest; seven percent of the crop is now combined and six percent is ready to straight combine. The five-year average for this time of year is one percent combined and

two percent ready to straight combine. Scattered showers throughout the province have caused short delays to harvest but producers are happy to finally receive rain.

Fifty-four percent of winter wheat, 51 percent of fall rye, 37 percent of field peas and 29 percent of lentils are now in the bin.

Harvest is most advanced in the south and west-central regions, where 12 percent of crop in the southwest, eight percent of crop in the

southeast and seven percent of crop in the west-central is combined. Producers in the northern regions have a little more than one percent of crop combined.

Small showers during the week did little to offset the ongoing drought but there was a slight increase in topsoil moisture conditions. Cropland topsoil moisture is rated as six percent adequate, 32 percent short and 62 percent very short. Hay and pasture land topsoil moisture is rated as five percent adequate, 28 percent short and 67 percent very short.

"Look What's Cooking by Laura Novecosky"

Dill Pickles

Scrub small cucumbers. Cut a fine slice off both ends. Make sure you have scrubbed all the prickles off. I use a dishrag to get the cucumbers clean without damaging the skin. I find that cutting a small slice off each end makes sure that I have any bits of dirt out of both ends.

Directions:

In the bottom of a quart sealer, place any or all of the following: several sprigs of dill, one clove garlic, one small bay leaf, and about 1/4 tsp. dried crushed red pepper seeds. I also like to add about five whole peppercorns. If you have raspberry leaves or grape leaves, place one well washed leaf into the bottom of the jar as well, this helps keep the pickles crunchy.

Cover with the following boiling brine sealing each jar as you fill it. Place into a sink of hottest tap water as you fill finish sealing each jar. I usually leave in the sink for one to two hours or until the water is no longer hot, but just warm. Put on a towel on the counter and leave undisturbed for 24 hours, before placing into storage. When you put into storage, take the ring off the jar. Doing this will make sure that if for some reason the jar doesn't seal you will know as the lid will pop off easily. You can also add one slice of pepper, several green or yellow beans and a small carrot for colour and for added pickled vegetables.

Brine:

4 cups water
2 cups vinegar (pickling vinegar is best although regular vinegar works too)
5 tbsp. pickling salt

Bring to a boil and pour over vegetables to be pickled in the jar. This makes about two quarts of pickles. The brine recipe is easily halved for one jar or doubled or tripled for larger batches.

Walker had always had a passion for great pizza and was researching ways to develop greater flavour within the finished crust, which led him to learning about sourdough. As he experimented with incorporating his new sourdough culture into the perfect flavourful pizza dough recipe, Walker thought he might try his hand at a few sourdough loaves as well. They turned out pretty nicely and his first loaves were actually available each Sunday at the Manitou Beach Flea Market throughout the summer of 2017.

That same fall Walker travelled into Regina to sell some of his sourdough at a pop-up market being held by Body Fuel Organics, which is an organically focused,

independent grocery store. Body Fuel owner Lana Van Dijk was impressed with the quality of the bread and asked if Walker might like to wholesale his sourdough as a regular item she would carry for her customers. Walker agreed and began providing fresh sourdough there twice per week.

Additional Regina retailers began to hear about Lockwood through social media and were interested to carry Walker's sourdough as well. By July 2018, Walker was producing enough sourdough for the City of Regina, that it made sense to move there and begin producing his product in a commercial facility. The business has been growing steadily since and Lockwood Sourdough is currently

available through seven Regina retail partners, as well as additional outlets in Moose Jaw, Pilot Butte, Nokomis and Southey.

How unique is your business compared to others?

It is unique in the fact that it started and grew solely as a wholesale bakery with a small lineup of product and no retail space of its own. Walker was able to sub-lease time, space and equipment from the kitchens of established businesses in Regina in order to share costs and keep overhead low.

After four years in business, the time to set up our own facility seems right and instead of staying in the city, we decided upon Manitou as a central location in the province to continue growing our wholesale

volume but also have a small retail shop where we can share our product with the residents and visitors. This is now our sole year-round facility and all Lockwood product will be produced here and distributed to other centres in the province.

What's unique about our product is that it's traditional sourdough, leavened only using natural yeasts with no commercial additives. In our base dough we use a blend of primarily organic flours, mixed with water and salt. That's all that is required to make sourdough and it's not something that you'll find available in the bakery of a national grocery store, unless they are bringing it in from a local sourdough maker. Although our product isn't (see back page: **LOCKWOOD**)

gluten free (not safe for diagnosed celiacs), it is very low in gluten and very tolerable in moderation for those with gluten sensitivities. Our bread dough receives a cold fermentation of 24 to 48 hours before it is baked. During this time the wild yeasts and bacteria in our sourdough culture breaks down the gluten and releases the nutrition locked within the grain so that it can be better absorbed when the bread is ingested.

Why did you decide to come to Manitou Beach?

We both love spending time in Manitou and both have family support in the area. Walker's mother and

extended family lives in Lockwood, only about 30 minutes away. Alexis' parents also spend a great portion of the year at their family property in Manitou Beach.

Heck yes! What better place to live, work and contribute to a unique and developing business community. We love the eclectic nature and progressive attitude of the year-round and seasonal visitors.
