Over four decades strong and still counting: Howard Lamont's journey at Lanigan

Howard Lamont, Mill Production General Foreman, has been an employee at our Lanigan, Saskatchewan potash mine for over forty years, but his family's connection to the mine started before he was even born.

The history of Nutrien's Lanigan mine is deeply rooted in community connections and strategic land acquisitions. Neil Lamont, Howard's grandfather, and owner of Lamont Agencies - involving real estate and insurance - played a crucial role in the mine's development in the late 50s and early 60s. Before the mine site was established, Neil engaged with local farmers, acquiring the necessary land and mineral rights needed for future development. He also fostered relationships by selling crop insurance to farmers in the area. This connection proved instrumental when Alwinspace Potash of Canada Ltd. reached out to him when they sought to purchase land for its potash mine, which now many years later is owned and operated by Nutrien.

Fast forward to 1980 when Howard started working at the mine just a short three weeks after he finished high school. Starting as a laborer, he progressed through the various mill operator levels with increased responsibility. He also worked in the load-out department

learning track, storage bin operation of heavy equipment and then scale operation. He accepted the role of Mill Production Supervisor in 2007 and became the Mill Production General Foreman in May 2023.

"We are extremely fortunate to have several long-term employees, like Howard, who dedicate themselves to emergency response, perform high-quality work and provide mentorship to new employees," says Rob Jackson, General Manager, Lanigan. "These individuals are a huge asset to the mine and community."

Howard has witnessed many milestones and advancements to the mill and mine during his forty-plus years at Lanigan.

- The site workforce has doubled to 600+ employees since Howard started his career.
- In the 1980s the site changed from car and loader operation for underground production to utilizing an extensible conveyor system allowing for longer rooms and major productivity improvements. They also built the Phase 2 mill which the site is currently operating now.

- In mid-2000 the site gutted the Phase 1 mill and rebuilt it with new equipment and technology.

- In 2007, the site completed a test room in the A zone using the chevron mining technique that led to a multi-year program to transition mining from long room and pillar

cue team. His son Carter who is a Mill Mechanical Supervisor at Nutrien is currently captain of the mine rescue team at Lanigan.

mining to A zone chevron mining for the site.

- In 2017, the Lanigan underground team started work to install tele-remote equipment on a chevron production mine and has since led the Nutrien potash network in this area with many machines completed at Lanigan and at other sites.

- The site has also successfully restarted the Phase 1 mill in September 2022 and as of September 2023 over 200 million tonnes of raw ore have been mined.

- Safety culture evolved, from inadequate PPE and casual attitudes in the 1980s to stringent safety measures today.


"Our safety culture today has changed for the better, 100 percent. The PPE that we wear is top quality and readily available to the employees. Our lockouts and confined space procedures are exceptionally prepared and planned for safe work to be accomplished every time," says Howard. "During toolbox and safety meetings, workers are very much involved in safety concerns and decisions of

safe work practices of all kinds. Nutrien focuses on Key Daily Safety Actions and the last action – Care and Look out for Each Other – is what we do every single day."

Howard was a proud member of the Lanigan Fire Department for 20 years and Lanigan's mine rescue team for 15 years before retiring from both. The same strong desire for safety in both the community and at his workplace runs in his family too. His son, Carter, Mill Mechanical Supervisor, is currently captain of the mine rescue team at Lanigan.

"Carter joined the mine rescue team following in my footsteps and he is better in mine rescue than I ever was," says Howard. "Carter's team placed first at this year's Firefighter's Rodeo in Lanigan and became the 2023 Provincial champions of the Mine Rescue Competition held in Saskatoon. It makes me very proud to see him compete and help others in their time of need here at work and at home in his community."

Lending support

The Lanigan and District Food Bank recently received a helping hand as support for an annual food drive and viewing the CPCK Holiday Train brought in significant donations. Kathy Williams with the Lanigan and District Food Bank said in memory of Kathy McDonald, who was a long term, dedicated advocate of the local food bank and employee of the Credit Union, a second annual food drive was held in her honour (pictured left). As part of the food drive, non-perishable items were accepted during the month of November at the Lanigan Credit Union Branch. People were also encouraged to purchase Co-op Hunger Bags or provide cash donations. From those,

at the end of November, Williams said the food drive collected over 344 pounds of food and over \$1,600 in cash donations. Then on Tuesday, Dec. 5 the CPCK Holiday Train rolled through Lanigan (above). From that, Williams indicated well over 65 pounds of food was received along with cash donations. Williams also said the Jansen Lutheran Church dropped off 37 pounds of food donations and the Lanigan Catholic Church provided the local food bank with 69 pounds of items.

Open houses held as part of Aspen Supply Project

Proposing construction of a new natural gas transmission line between Prud'homme and a proposed meter station facility near Lanigan, SaskEnergy Incorporated's natural gas trans-

mission subsidiary, TransGas Limited (TransGas), held three open houses where people were invited to share input and learn about the Aspen Supply Project and the Saskatoon East Expansion Project.

Aiming to enhance reli-

ability for its customers and increase spare capacity for anticipated residential, commercial and industrial growth in the surrounding areas - including a proposed SaskPower Aspen power station near Lanigan, open houses took place in Lanigan (Nov. 21),

Prud'homme (Nov. 22) and Clavet (Nov. 23).

Kim Elaschuk, Senior Communications Officer with SaskEnergy said the open houses were very well-attended by local residents, landowners, Town and RM representatives and Indigenous groups. In Lanigan, approximately 30 people took the opportunity to learn more about the Aspen Supply Project and provide input to the project team on local area and land uses. "Public and community engagement is an important part of project development. Open houses introduce the project to interested parties and groups, including local area residents, landowners, Town and RM representatives and Indigenous groups. Open houses also allow our representatives to gain valuable input through discussions with local landowners and organizations, provide informational material, and answer any questions about the project.

were focused on project elements like potential routing options, project timing details on the gas line being installed, impact and mitigations, maintenance and monitoring activities, easement information as well as information on reclamation of the easement after construction

should the project proceed.

Elaschuk said, "Project members were also on hand to answer any questions and meet people from the community. Landowners also provided specific feedback regarding their land and how it may affect construction of the new gas line."

With the project currently in the pre-planning stage, right now that includes looking at possible gas line routing locations, engaging interested parties, and gathering information regarding land usage while providing project information to interested parties.

"This multi-year project involves many disciplines and will provide ongoing work for a variety of trades and contractors until its completion."

As part of the event, SaskEnergy said discussions

Elaschuk indicated the Saskatoon East Expansion Project and the Aspen Supply Project will provide increased capacity for anticipated residential, commercial and industrial growth east of Saskatoon as well as power generation.

The Aspen Supply Project itself will include the installation of approximately 91 kilometres of 16-inch or 406.4 mm (NPS 16) high pressure natural gas line. The gas line will begin at the TransGas Prud'homme Compressor Station and end at the proposed SaskEnergy natural gas meter station near Lanigan. The SaskEnergy meter station will be installed at the east end of the gas line, to regulate, odorize and meter the gas.

The Saskatoon East Expansion Project will include the installation of approximately 42 kilometres of 20-inch or 508.0 mm (nominal pipe size [NPS] 20) high pressure natural gas line. The line will begin at Patience Lake, east of Saskatoon, and end at the existing TransGas compressor station near Prud'homme. This gas line

will run adjacent to an existing TransGas gas line. The additional compression facility will be installed within the existing compressor station near Prud'homme.

If approved, SaskEnergy said the Saskatoon Supply Project from Patience Lake to the existing TransGas Prud'homme Compressor Station will be constructed parallel to an existing TransGas line in the summer of 2025. Should the project proceed, the Aspen Supply Project construction will commence in 2026.

Not the only substantial project being looked at for the local area, in addition to the Aspen Supply Project, SaskPower is hoping to create a new 370-megawatt natural gas Aspen Power Station near Lanigan.

In 2020, SaskPower noted it started to look at potential sites for a new natural gas power station, including the Lanigan area. Following technical studies and consultations with stakeholders, rightsholders and Indigenous groups, SaskPower indicated it began the regulatory approval process.

"The Impact Assessment

Agency of Canada (IAAC) has determined that our Detailed Project Description submitted on Aug. 31, 2023 aligns with all federal regulations and a further impact assessment is not required.

"We're in the process of selecting an engineer, procure, construct (EPC) partner to design and build the power station. We expect construction to begin in 2024 and for the power station to be fully constructed in 2027."

Outlining its 2023-'24 fiscal year capital spending in a May 11 release, the company indicated \$505 million has been set aside for growth projects like new natural gas plants such as the Aspen Power Station near Lanigan and the Great Plains Power Station.

With the new Aspen Power Station aimed at providing enough power for about 370,000 homes in Saskatchewan, the project is part of a staged approach to replace conventional coal generation that must be retired by 2030, and to transition the province's power system to net zero greenhouse gas emissions.

Bake at 400°F for 6-8 minutes until edges are just golden coloured.



1/2 tsp. salt



2-3 tsp. ginger


