Lanigan connections competing at national curling event

Featuring the best senior curling teams from across Canada, a few familiar faces will be competing in Vernon, B.C. at this year's Everest Senior Curling Championships. Held Dec. 3 to 9, a handful of athletes with local roots will be representing Saskatchewan and Alberta during the week's competition.

On the men's side, third Darrell McKee and alternate Arlen Hall who have ties to the local area are part of Team Saskatchewan along with skip Bruce Korte, second Kory Kuch and lead Rory Golanowski.

On the women's side, skip Nancy Martin who grew up in Lanigan will be representing Team Saskatchewan along with third Deanna Doig, second Nancy Inglis and lead Cathy Inglis. Representing Team Alberta, Cori Morris, who

won Olympic silver in Vancouver and now resides in Calgary is the lead. Morris, who grew up on a farm near Lanigan is joined by skip Atina Ford-Johnston, third Shannon Morris, and second Sheri Pickering.

Speaking before the senior championships, Morris, who played with McKee and Hall at the Lanigan Boxing Day Spiel last year said, "It is a great feeling to be back competing again, and even more so to have this opportunity to play for a national title. That never gets old!"

Sharing her favourite part of curling has been the friendships made over the years with teams from across the country, Morris said, "It is going to be extra wonderful to see Lanigan connections on the ice."

Pirates sink Winterhawks to collect second win

Following a 7-4 victory over the Wynyard Monarchs Nov. 18, the Lanigan Pirates took aim at securing a second straight win, this time against the Watrous Winterhawks.

Heading to Watrous Nov. 21, the Pirates went right to work as the team carried most of the play in the opening 20 minutes. Pressing late in the frame, with 4:26 remaining, Jace Wildeman and Mitch Girolami set up Austin Calladine for his first of the evening and the visitors went up 1-0.

That lead did not last long though as Watrous replied on the power play as George King tallied less than a minute later from Andrew Johnston and Wyatt Johnson to make it a 1-1 game. Then with time ticking off the clock, the Pirates gained the Watrous zone and Josh Bly beat netminder Evan Reifferscheid with 25 seconds to go. That would be all the scoring in the first as Reifferscheid was kept busy as Lanigan outshot Watrous 19-9.

With the score 2-1 through 20 minutes in favour of the Pirates, in the middle stanza, Watrous collected the equalizer 39 seconds after the puck was dropped as Andrew Johnston notched his first from Dylan Smith and Sam Klassen. Tied at two, both teams sought the next marker and just like the first period, Lanigan scored late as Calladine tallied his second of the night with 1:29 left. With a one

goal lead, shots through 40 minutes favoured Lanigan 27-21, although the visitors registered eight in period two to Watrous' 12.

In the third, Lanigan extended its lead as Bly scored his second of the game with 13:27 left and the Pirates went up 4-2. Looking to make a late comeback, Watrous received a two minute five-on-three advantage and while the Pirates and netminder Sharrod Failler were able to keep shooters at bay for the most part, a slapshot by Andrew Johnston was able to get past Failler on the power play to make it 4-3.

Trying to get another marker past its opponents, with time running out, Watrous called a time out around the two minute mark and pulled Reifferscheid for the extra attacker. However, the Pirates nabbed the puck and with 1:12 left, Calladine scored his third of the game into the empty net. Down by two, Watrous pulled the goalie again but were unable to find the back of the net while Lanigan's Linden Schwab wrapped up the scoring with an empty net tally with 30 seconds to play.

Despite Watrous outshooting Lanigan 16-5 in the final frame they were unable to complete the comeback, falling 6-3. Shots through 60 minutes had the Winterhawks with 37 and Lanigan with 32.

Lanigan was scheduled to remain on the road with a game in Wadena Dec. 2 and then in LeRoy Dec. 6.

The Lanigan Lazers football season came to an end Oct. 20 in the final game of the regular season. The Lazers were defeated in Wynyard by a score of 42-10 in a game that did not affect the conference standings.

Lanigan finished third in Conference 3 of the 2A six-a-side league, having been eliminated from provincial

contention in week four, following a 41-22 loss to the Kamsack Spartans. The loss ended the Lazers' playoff hopes with a record of zero wins and three losses, after having lost the first two games of the season by a combined three points (34-35 for Kamsack and 20-22 for Wynyard).

The Lazers only victory of the season was over the Ituna Trojans by a score of 48-42, finishing the season with one

win and four losses. Ituna finished fourth in the conference. The Wynyard Bears (4-1) finished first, and Kamsack (4-1) finished second.

Despite missing playoffs this season, the Lanigan Lazers were very successful as a club, with players consistently demonstrating commitment to building a strong team-first atmosphere. Our graduating players showed excellent leadership, and our returning players and families

met the challenge of ensuring that football could continue to be offered as a school sport in Lanigan. Their fundraising efforts included a bottle drive (\$4,348.65), raffle ticket sales for Football Saskatchewan (\$2,845) and successful canteen and 50/50 sales at home games and our junior jamboree.

As the senior team's white uniforms are nearly a decade old, and our blue uniforms are still the originals from 16

years ago, the senior team will be sporting a new look next year, thanks to the hard work of our players and athletes.

The coaches for the Lanigan Lazers appreciate everyone who supported our team this season, from parents and family members, to community members and fans, to the officials, scorekeepers, timekeepers and other volunteers who make sure our athletes have the opportunity to play high-quality football.

Acknowledgement goes to Chelsea Boyko for coordinating our canteens with the help of Cheryl Bryksa and Patricia Rosenberger, Patricia and Bob Balion for driving our buses and Jay Fitzsimmons for being the voice of the Lazers at our home games.

We look forward to a strong season of flag football in the spring, and to another great season of tackle football next fall!

Charges laid

Just after midnight Nov. 15, Yorkton RCMP conducted a traffic stop on Smith Street East in Yorkton as part of a drug trafficking investigation. Officers located and seized approximately 15 individually-wrapped grams of suspected cocaine, unstamped tobacco and a sum of cash.

The driver was arrested. As a result of subsequent investigation, 25-year-old Hunter Seguin from Nanaimo, B.C. is charged with: one count, possession for the purpose of trafficking cocaine, Section 5(2), Controlled Drugs and Substances Act; one count, trafficking cocaine, Section 5(1), Controlled Drugs and Substances Act; and one count, possession of property obtained by crime over \$5,000, Section 354(1)(a), Criminal Code.

He was also charged under the Excise Act for possessing the unstamped tobacco.



uncompliCATED - Five Things

Everyone who is reading this today can draw on memories from "once-upon-a-time-when-I-was-young moments!" Eras and ages have not stood still and in reflection, there must have been so many changes in your life on this pretty blue planet. However, this I know with all certainty: ONCE UPON A TIME happens in collective moments called NOW.

When I reflect back, I was too young to even consider that my parents lived through a recent WW2 and how perilous that would have been. Knowing personally so many families with loved ones who never returned fresh on their hearts and minds. One of the hardships mother mentioned during the war years was the lack of chocolate. My dad had a sweet tooth and a special affinity for chocolate fudge, cake and cookies. She said she tried everything to appease his craving, baking with dates, brown sugar, maple syrup and anything that might somehow resemble chocolate. She never could 'come close' for chocolate, was rationed and reserved that the Canadian military, fighting so bravely overseas could at least enjoy and get a quick candy bar energy boost.

I grew up in a world that is totally unrecognizable in light of today. A glaring comparison of the times we live in now is taking note at a high school parking lot. Many of the students drive vehicles that cost more than those of their teachers. Sports events today are passionately attended by cheerleader parents, grandparents, aunts and uncles. Although my folks wanted to hear all about my basketball and volleyball games that I played in nearby towns, they, like my grandparents were just too busy keeping the cows and chickens fed and the home-fires burning. It was too frivolous and a waste

of resources to be audience to our games because it meant leaving the farm.

My parents were grain farmers and worked hard. We had coops and pens and a barn with pigs, cows, horses, chickens and roosters. Keeping the animals fed-up, warm, healthy, stalls and coops clean, was arduous and infinite. In reflection, throughout all my years at home, I never heard my dad complain. In fact, cold wintry mornings as I lay in bed I would awaken to the sound of him whistling as he walked with a milk pail in each hand, towards the barn.

That music might resound within the walls of our very small home, father traded grain for a used piano and the meager income mother received from selling eggs and cream paid for piano lessons. So that being said, yes – I do think of it often. Especially lately my memory goes back to that little house and the busy days there with my family.

I found myself trying to name FIVE things that were particularly taxing and difficult in that time – and living in such a little house my dad built on the Canadian prairie. In order of magnitude this is my list: 1.) No indoor plumbing. 2.) No central heating, just a Siegler Oil Burning stove in the living room and a woodstove in the kitchen. 3.) A kitchen sink without taps or running water and only a pail under that sink for drainage. 4.) A tiny bedroom with a curtain door, small closet and bed I shared with two older sisters. Though there were many other things that made life rather a hardship. 5.) I am remembering Mother did laundry on a wringer-wash-machine filled with cold water and the dryer consisted of a short walk outdoors to the clothes line beside her big vegetable garden. In the winter, sheets and towels were 'freeze dried' then brought into the house where they were strewn across make-shift lines forming a humid maze inside our tiny house.

Five things came to mind, with several more calculating their relevance – a telephone and television. Both acquired by my parents when I was older. Luxury items, the telephone was a party-line telephone, and a black and white Marconi

television with one channel that often was fuzzy, or 'snowy' in our disappointed protests.

For old times' sake and I know this dates me, if you wish, name FIVE things that comprised struggles and stresses that your parents endured. Five things if you could – have changed to better and brighten life as you and your family knew it.

I am not suggesting these things diminished or dulled my childhood because love consistently permeated the air and walls in that small house echoed with music and laughter.

Today small children own cellphones and sleep in large bedrooms with attached ensuite and generous closet, so by hardship I am not referring to not having 'things' like laptops and designer shoes, a refrigerator without an ice maker.

In the alleyways of time, my children step into a future vastly different from my own, armed not with the relics of my past, but with the essence, faith and tenacity of my odyssey. As they navigate the uncharted waters of tomorrow, they carry in their hearts my stories and awareness of grandparents known and unknown. Also grasping the echoes of a simpler era, where resilience was born from necessity, joy sprang from simplicity, and the warmth of human connection transcended ambiguity. The world may evolve, but the timeless lessons etched in the chapters of my yesteryears will be their compass, guiding them with wisdom that even in the face of change, the core of humanity remains constant.

FIVE THINGS. Replace them instead, if you wish, with thankfulness.

One very brief and long ago once-upon-a-time, with two small boys resting in my arms, I read to them, fairy tales. Today my grown children can comprise their own 'five things' and more that will define them. Neil Postman, American author, educator, media theorist and cultural critic, 1931 – 2003, wisely said: "Children are the living messages we send to a time we will not see."

Something tells me that many lists will be compelling. And beautiful.





robbery at a business on 9th Street in Humboldt. Officers immediately responded. Investigation determined an individual entered the business, threatened an occupant and attempted to rob them. The individual fled without stealing anything. No physical injuries were reported.

Through continued investigation, Humboldt RCMP identified a suspect vehicle and located it parked

outside a residence in Humboldt. An adult male was arrested without incident at the residence. A second adult male was later arrested without incident in Middle Lake.

Thirty-seven-year-old Kriston Lins of Middle Lake and 40-year-old Ryan Dempster from Humboldt are each charged with: one count, robbery, Section 344, Criminal Code; one count uttering threats, Section 264.1(1)(a), Criminal Code; and one count, wear disguise with intent

to commit offence, Section 351(2), Criminal Code. **Charges laid after armed individual in residence**

At approximately 4:12 a.m. Nov. 26, La Loche RCMP received a report of an armed individual at a residence in La Loche.

Officers immediately responded. Investigation determined an armed male was holding two females against their will in the residence. One of them was able to flee.

While officers were setting

up a containment area around the house, the male exited the residence. Officers arrested him and seized a handgun.

Officers located the other female inside the residence. Investigation determined she had been assaulted and she was taken to hospital with injuries described as serious in nature.

As a result of further investigation, 28-year-old Tremaine Dacres is charged with 19 offences including aggravated assault and forcible confinement.
