Not only did people come together online to raise money for Telemiracle but despite navigating through the COVID-19 pandemic, the generosity from the local area has shone bright.

Since the Jansen and District Kin were unable to hold their many annual fundraisers for Telemiracle this year, the group thought they would give an online auction a try.

Co-organizer of the local Telemiracle online auction and Jansen and District Kinette Terri Hamilton was glad the Kin decided to go ahead with the auction because the results were astounding. “We have such an amazing community with incredible community spirit! But the other notable mention besides the cinnamon buns was the five hours of organization with your choice of a cheesecake or pie which went for a whopping \$2,500!! But not only that, what about a dozen cabbage rolls that went for \$50 or a dozen eggs for \$35. Just about everything that was donated did that well.”

Hamilton said after the online auction came to an end, her and other Kin members were blown away by the support, not only from the local area but even from a neighbouring province as well.

Sask. releases COVID-19 vaccination delivery plan

The Government of Saskatchewan released its COVID-19 Immunization Delivery Plan Feb. 9. Phase 2 of vaccination sequencing will focus on the general population in 10-year increments, starting with ages 60 to 69.

This phase will also include targeted vaccinations for adults and staff in group homes for persons with intellectual disabilities and shelters. Clinically extremely vulnerable adults will also be included as a priority in Phase 2. A complete list of the clinically vulnerable health conditions is available at www.saskatchewan.ca/covid19-vaccine.

“Saskatchewan is working to vaccinate as many people as quickly as possible,” Health Minister Paul Merriman said. “The commencement of mass vaccinations will depend on the number and consistency of vaccine deliveries

from the federal government. We are hopeful that mass vaccinations can start as soon as April, based on the current vaccine delivery schedule from the federal government.”

Phase 2 of Saskatchewan’s Immunization Delivery Plan is built on the foundation of age as the main risk factor. Age is the number one risk factor for severe outcomes, hospitalizations and deaths related to COVID-19. People of advanced age are also more likely to be clinically extremely vulnerable or living with other chronic conditions.

The goal of the immunization program is to: Protect the most high risk and vulnerable; Minimize serious illness and death; Protect the capacity of the health care system; and Minimize the spread of COVID-19.

Phase 1 is currently underway for high-risk populations, such as people of advanced age, residents and staff in long-term and personal care homes, health care workers in emergency departments, COVID-19 units, testing and assessment centres, intensive care units and other

high-risk settings. This phase also includes residents over 50 living in northern remote communities and those over 70 living in the community as vaccine is available.

Phase 2 could get underway as early as April, but will depend on vaccine supplies. Vaccinations will be available through a variety of options including, mass immunization clinics, walk-in and drive-thru clinics, public health clinics and community-based options such as pharmacies.

Information will be publicly shared to let you know when it is your turn to be vaccinated, how to register for an appointment, the different types of clinics available and how to find the closest clinics to you. Appointments will be able to be booked online at www.saskatchewan.ca or through HealthLine 811 when Phase 2 begins.

Every vaccination given will contribute to keeping us all safer.

Dellwood Reservoir experiencing winterkill of fish

While ice fishing can be tough to master for any angler, those hoping to catch something at Dellwood Reservoir this winter have found themselves leaving empty-handed on more than one occasion. While not catching fish from time to time can be nothing new for some anglers, reports began to surface that instead of fish biting lures, they were spotted by underwater cameras lying motionless on the bottom of the reservoir.

Reaching out to Saskatchewan's Ministry of Environment to learn more about reports of dead fish, it was confirmed that winterkill has taken place at Dellwood Reservoir. The Ministry of Environment stated the winterkill of fish began sometime during January 2021 and investigation with underwater cameras showed dead fish, predominantly walleye, on the lake bed. The strong smell of hydrogen sulfide (a rotten egg smell) was also evident, confirming oxygen levels in the water column at or close to minimum levels.

Unlike larger, deeper lakes where there is typically enough water volume to offset reduced flows and provide sufficient oxygen for fish and other organisms, Dellwood Reservoir experiences low oxygen levels in the water because of reduced flows from inlet streams and ice covering the water's surface. Using the oxygen up much more quickly due to the lower water levels and resulting in a winterkill, the Ministry of Environment noted that this is not the first time a winterkill of fish has occurred at the reservoir southwest of Guernsey.

"Dellwood Reservoir is subject to low oxygen conditions during the winter months, and winterkills have occurred there several times before."

Constructed to be used as a water supply for various industrial and municipal uses, the Ministry of Environment stated Dellwood Reservoir's use as a fishery is secondary to the water supply needs of the current users. "Dellwood Reservoir is quite shallow, even at full supply, and has always been prone to winter and summer kills because of its limited depth. The early snow cover also likely contributed to the recent winterkill at Dellwood. Because of these factors, Dellwood Reservoir, and other similar reservoirs across the province, will always be at risk of periodic winterkill events."

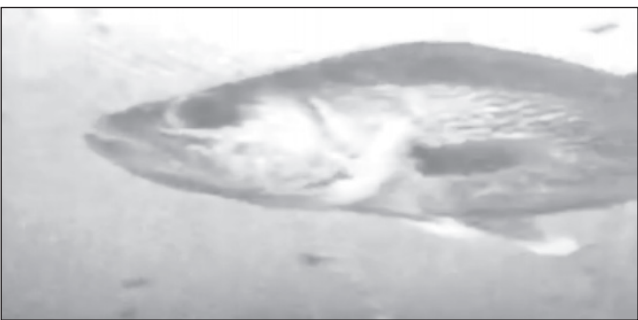
Because of that, the Ministry of Environment said there is little that can be done to prevent winterkill events from occurring; however, the ministry noted it will continue to manage many of the reservoirs as recreational fisheries when conditions are favourable.

Stocked regularly with walleye fry, up until the recent winterkill, angler reports also suggested a small population of good angling-sized perch had been established in the local area reservoir. Meanwhile, the Ministry of Environment indicated pike populations have been maintained by natural reproduction or by movement through the canal system; however, only small fish are able to move via the pump system and canal. The ministry said whitefish also became established via movement through the canal system, while white suckers make up a small percentage of the fish population in Dellwood Reservoir.

Now with the winterkill taking place and numbers appearing to be depleted, at least for walleye, the Ministry of Environment said the tentative plan is to re-establish a walleye population at the reservoir depending on future winter oxygen testing, set for March 2022, and tentatively March 2023. "If the tests show sufficient oxygen to overwinter fish, Dellwood Reservoir will be considered for walleye fry stocking in the late spring of 2022 or 2023. Based on the history of the reservoir, other fish species may become re-established through natural migration in the Dellwood Brook system, or by migration through the canal system."

Despite the lower levels of oxygen in the water and the winterkill of fish at Dellwood Reservoir, the Water Security Agency stated it does regulate local waterworks for drinking water quality to ensure that treatment from the local water plant meets the safety standards for drinking water. That means consumption of the water from the reservoir through water plants would be treated and deemed safe for consumption.

The most easterly of six reservoirs in the Saskatoon South East Water Supply System, Dellwood connects to a number of other water bodies in the area. The Ministry of Environment said the local reservoir was created by restricting the flow of Dellwood Brook, and it also receives water via a canal from Zelma Reservoir. The ministry said a pump station located near the west end of Little Manitou Lake is required to lift water into the inlet canal to reach Dellwood Reservoir.

Dear Reena,

Despite regularly washing my sheets, they have an odour that will not wash out. I have tried bleach and Borax (not at the same time), but nothing removes the smell. I cannot afford new sheets, so I am wondering if you have a solution for me. Thanks! Duncan

Dear Duncan,

This is a common occurrence and often cleaning results depend upon the chemicals used to manufacture the textile. Soak the sheets in one tablespoon dish soap and enough hot water to cover the sheets. Add at least four cups

white vinegar to the water. Leave for one hour and launder as normal.

Dear Reena,

I have four sons and an endless amount of laundry. The biggest challenge that I have right now is foot odour in my house. Since six people live in our home and three of them play sports, I am drowning in the smell of foot odour. Do you have any advice for reducing the smell of feet in my home? Thank you, Kelly

Dear Kelly,

The easiest remedy for foot odour is to stuff all footwear with crumpled newspaper whenever they are not in use or store some shoes outside. Another option is to purchase a few pairs of knee high nylons from a dollar store. Stuff the nylons with either fresh coffee grounds or baking soda sprinkled with essential oils. Close each nylon sock with an elastic band and place one inside of unoccupied footwear. Lastly, place a fabric softener sheet inside each shoe.

I spent a lot of money on steak to serve at my dinner party last week. I was horrified because after I plated the meat, each guest had a puddle of blood on their plate. I checked the temperature and it was medium according to the thermometer. Is this normal? Emily

As the proteins harden they draw to the centre of the meat. When meat has a chance to rest, the juices will redistribute and reabsorb into the meat.

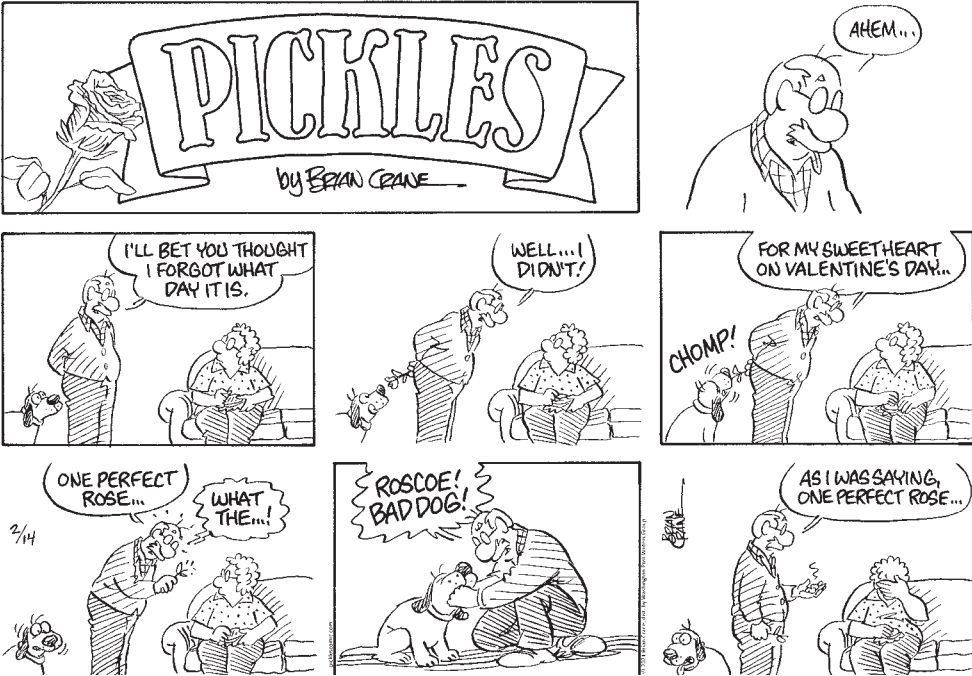

Cranberry Almond Bark

Ingredients:
8 squares white baking chocolate
3 squares semi-sweet baking chocolate
3/4 cup whole blanched almonds
3/4 cup dried cranberries

Directions:
Melt white chocolate over very low heat on the stove or in the microwave. If using microwave, melt at 50 percent power for one minute, stir, then microwave for 20 seconds, and stir. In a separate container do the same with the semi-sweet chocolate, starting with 30 seconds, then stir, and then 20 seconds. You may need to do several 20 second intervals. Do not microwave higher than 50 percent power or you will easily burn the chocolate. Stir the almonds and cranberries into the white chocolate. Spread thinly on parchment lined (or wax paper lined) cookie sheets. Drizzle the semi-sweet chocolate over the white chocolate. Swirl into the white chocolate with a knife. Chill until firm and then break into chunks. Store in the fridge.

Province providing \$275 million to support municipalities

Premier Scott Moe announced Saskatchewan municipalities will benefit from more than \$275 million in 2021-’22 under the Municipal Revenue Sharing Program – the second-highest overall

amount ever. “This unconditional provincial funding for municipalities provides local leaders the flexibility and adaptability to invest in their community’s current key priorities,” Moe said. “This stable and predictable source of revenue is

more important than ever for communities as they meet the challenges of COVID-19.” The annual provincial funding amount for this Government of Saskatchewan program is based on three quarters of one point of the provincial sales tax (PST) revenue collected from two years prior. Overall funding under the Municipal Revenue Sharing Program for 2021-’22 represents an approximately 117 percent increase from the 2007-’08 provincial fiscal year. From the total Municipal Revenue Sharing Program, \$1.5 million will be invested

in the Targeted Sector Support Initiative. The initiative supports municipal projects that advance priority areas, such as good governance, regional planning, and inter-community collaboration. The initiative is co-managed by the provincial government and municipal partners. With this announcement, more than \$3.4 billion in provincial funding has been allocated to support municipalities across Saskatchewan through this program from 2007-’08 to 2021-’22. More details will be available when the provincial budget is released.

Record Sask. agricultural exports in 2020

media release This past year was a record year for agricultural exports in Saskatchewan, helping the province lead the nation in growth of overall export sales over the previous year. Saskatchewan produced \$16.9 billion in agricultural exports last year, a 31 percent increase from 2019 and a new high for the province. This represents more than 55 percent of total provincial exports in 2020, which were valued at \$30.4 billion. This helps bring the province closer to meeting its Growth Plan goals, which include growing agri-food exports to \$20 billion and increasing agriculture value-added revenue to \$10 billion by 2030. These strong export numbers also reinforce Saskatchewan's global reputation as a dependable source of safe, high-quality resources, goods and products.

Overall merchandise export sales in 2020 were more than \$30 billion, up 2.5 percent over 2019, the highest percentage increase among the provinces. On a national basis, exports were down 12.2 percent over the same period.

Leading agriculture exports in 2020 continue to be canola seed, non-durum wheat, lentils, canola oil and durum wheat.

"The global COVID-19 pandemic has hit all economies hard worldwide, but these export numbers are strong signs our province is in a positive position for economic recovery in 2021," Trade and Export Development Minister Jeremy Harrison said. "With our world-class and growing export base, we have what the world wants and needs, and it will continue to drive investment and jobs for communities right across Saskatchewan."

In 2020, major increases in exports were seen in farm and intermediate food products; forestry products and building and packaging materials; and industrial machinery, equipment, and parts. Saskatchewan's top international markets for 2020 include the United States, China, Japan and India.

Saskatchewan agri-food export destinations are diverse in nature. Top markets for Saskatchewan agri-food exports in 2020 were United States, China, Japan, India and Mexico.

"Saskatchewan producers grow safe, high-quality food that the world needs and our agriculture exporters remain committed to providing the world with these products," Agriculture Minister David Marit said. "I want to commend our producers on their hard work and resilience, which led to a new record in agri-food exports for 2020."

Increases in primary production as well as a growing value-added sector have contributed to the record agri-food export growth in Saskatchewan. In 2020, value-added exports were \$3.2 billion. Canola oil, canola meal and processed oats were our top value-added products.

Currently, the Government of Saskatchewan is working to open three new trade offices in Singapore, Japan and India in 2021 to support increased export diversification. The new offices will complement the existing trade office in China, and continued access to Asian markets will benefit our key economic sectors.

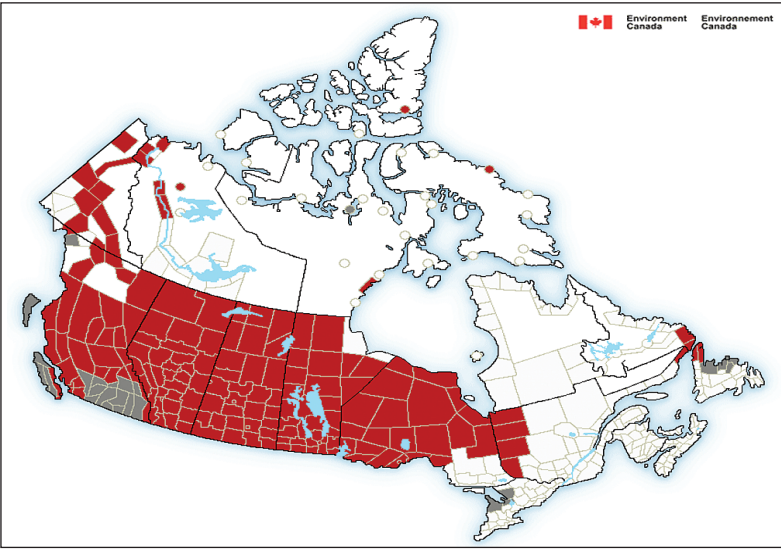
