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## A Q and A with the previous and current mayor of Lanigan

As 2020 came to a close, this past year also saw a chapter end and a new one begin in Lanigan. As municipal elections were held in the latter part of 2020, now former mayor of Lanigan, Andrew Cebryk elected to step away from his position after serving for a number of years both on council and as mayor. That role was filled by former councillor Tony Mycock after he was elected as mayor.

The Lanigan Advisor reached out to both who graciously shared a bit about themselves, some highlights of being a part of council, what is ahead for 2021 and a few other things. The following are the responses from both Cebryk and Mycock.

**Former Mayor of Lanigan Andrew Cebryk**

*For those who may not know you, tell me a bit about yourself and how you arrived in Lanigan.*

I was raised in Alvena and went to school there. After my Gr. 12 year, I studied at the University of Saskatchewan in natural sciences and took classes in Ukrainian literature. Then I went to the University of Ottawa where I studied philosophy, psychology and metaphysics and some English literature.

When I returned to Saskatchewan, I worked at Alwings Potash from 1969 to 1972 and became the administrator at the Lanigan Union Hospital in 1972 while taking my hospital administration at the U of S. For a short period, I was also the administrator for Central Parkland Lodge and then was part of the Lanigan and Nokomis health centres. Then about 25 years ago I was the CEO of the Living Sky Health District and after that, I did some contract work up at Uranium City Hospital. I also served on the Drake Credit Union Board and Heartland Credit Union.

*When were you first elected to council?*

I have been on council since 2006 and was elected by acclamation in 2012 as mayor.

*What were a few highlights during your time as part of council?*

One of the things I thought Lanigan needed was a flag. (see page seven: **Q AND A**)

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# COVID-19 vaccines arrive; some politicians relinquish roles

More COVID-19 vaccines were provided to health care workers in Regina and Saskatoon as the new year arrived while a number of politicians saw their roles relinquished across the country after travelling abroad during the holidays.

As Canadians start to receive the vaccine from Pfizer and Moderna, some of those recipients grew up within the local area and are now working in the health care field in larger centres like Saskatoon and Regina.

While vaccines first started to be administered before the end of 2020, as of Jan. 4, a total of 4,013 doses of the Pfizer vaccine had been provided as part of the initial pilot and Phase 1. This past week, other areas in Saskatchewan also began receiving the COVID-19 vaccines. According to the COVID-19 immunization prioritization, the provincial government indicated Pfizer vaccinations were to commence in Prince Albert and Moderna vaccinations were to begin in the Far North West and Far North Central zones for eligible health care staff as well as long-term and personal care home residents.

The news of the expanded vaccinations came the same day that the province reported 286 new cases of COVID-19 which brought the total in Saskatchewan to 16,367. Of the new 286 cases, the Central East zone had eight of those. Zooming into the 32 mini zones, locally, the Central East 1 region had 16 active cases as of Jan. 4, with three of those being new cases. Next door in Central East 2, there was 57 active cases with one new one as of Jan. 4. Along with the active cases reported Jan. 4, a total of 96 recoveries occurred and overall, a total of 13,180 individuals have recovered in Saskatchewan while 3,027 cases were still considered active.

One hundred and eighty people were reported to be in hospital as of Jan. 4 and 145 people were receiving inpatient care including six in the Central East. Thirty-five people were in intensive care as of Jan. 4 including one in the Cen-

tral East zone.

In total, there have been 160 deaths in Saskatchewan due to COVID-19 with three of those in the Central East zone.

As the province continues to try and curb the spread of COVID-19 through public health measures and orders which will be revisited Jan. 15, it was widely reported that a number of politicians from across the country had travelled abroad during the holidays. After provincial governments strongly discouraged international travel during the COVID-19 pandemic, a number of those politicians who decided to fly elsewhere have since apologized and in many cases, have either resigned or stepped down from their roles in cabinet.

That included one MLA from Saskatchewan who had travelled to Palm Springs for reportedly necessary personal business of finalizing a home sale and moving his belongings back to Saskatchewan. Following an apology from Joe Hargrave, on Jan. 4 Saskatchewan Premier Scott Moe accepted Hargrave's resignation from cabinet. Hargrave will remain a member of the government caucus and MLA for Prince Albert Carlton. Moe then appointed Carrot River Valley MLA Fred Bradshaw as the Minister of Highways and Minister responsible for the Water Security Agency.

A few provinces over in Ontario, Rod Phillips resigned as the finance minister after returning from a Caribbean vacation. Also offering an apology, Phillips lost his role as finance minister while in Alberta a number of people had to give up their titles. Alberta Premier Jason Kenney issued a statement noting he had accepted the resignation of Municipal Affairs Minister Tracy Allard and asked his Chief of Staff Jamie Huckabay to step down, which he had done. Kenney also accepted the resignation of MLA Jeremy Nixon of Parliamentary Secretary for Civil Society and MLA Jason Stephan from Treasury Board. They along with MLAs Tanya Fir, Pat Rehn, and Tany Yao lost their Legislature committee responsibilities. "By travelling abroad over the holidays, these individuals demonstrated extremely poor judgement."

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# RCMP Report

**Sentence handed down for youth involved in break and enters and thefts**

A youth from North Battleford was sentenced in December in relation to break and enters and thefts that occurred at a farm just off road #668 near Little Manitou Lake and in Lanigan.

The youth involved in the incidents which occurred Jan. 11, 2020 was 17 at the time and was recently sentenced on Dec. 16 in Saskatoon Youth Court. In addition to the break and enter at the farm, the youth also was sentenced for a break and enter and two theft charges from Lanigan. The youth received four months in custody and following that, two months of supervision in the community.

On Jan. 11, 2020, Watrous RCMP were called to the farm in the RM of Usborne. The homeowner reported that sometime overnight his three vehicles that were parked inside outbuildings were entered and rummaged through. A wallet and chain saw were stolen. A credit card that was in the wallet was subsequently used in Saskatoon, Langham and North Battleford during the following day.

That same morning an abandoned truck was reported in the ditch of Hwy. 15 six miles west of the Hwy. 2 junction. Upon checking the truck it was found to be stolen out of Lanigan earlier that morning. A nearby farmyard reported that a vehicle on their property had been gone through.

**Break and enter at unoccupied farm house**

On Dec. 31, 2020, at 10:33 a.m., culprit(s) broke into an unoccupied farm house, approximately 20 miles southwest of Watrous, on the Renown grid, and stole a tool box with tools.

The culprit(s) also broke into the shop and stole a Honda weed wacker.

**Quiet start to 2021 for Watrous RCMP**

The New Year's period was a quiet one for the Watrous RCMP office. As COVID-19 protocols continue in the province, the local

detachment has found its call volume lower than previous years. During the period of Dec. 30 to Jan. 2, the detachment responded to one Mental Health Act call, two requests for well-being checks, a break and enter to a rural property, an assault and one traffic complaint. On New Year's Eve a dozen vehicles were randomly stopped for driver's licence, registration and sobriety checks with one suspended driver ticket being issued.

**RCMP release top 10 list of 9-1-1 calls that 'missed the mark'**

RCMP could not leave 2020 behind without naming their ten 9-1-1 calls that "missed the mark" this year.

Here are the top ten #ReasonsNotToCall911 of 2020:

1. Suspicious activity – A 9-1-1 caller advised he'd seen the same moose standing in the same spot in a field for two days straight. The caller thought this was a little suspicious and RCMP officers should check it out.

2. Locked up – One concerned animal parent was

wondering if her cat was in custody with the local RCMP as the cat went out two days prior and had not returned home.

3. Better programming – A concerned parent called 9-1-1 requesting RCMP officers speak to a popular video streaming service to request they provide better programming for their kids to watch.

4. Directions? – 9-1-1 dispatchers received a call asking for directions to travel from Yorkton, Saskatchewan, to Winnipeg, Manitoba.

5. No where to park – This driver called to let police know they did not know where to park as someone was parked in their assigned stall when they got home.

6. Where's good to eat – A hungry caller, who was not from the area, called 9-1-1 wanting to know what restaurants were open so they could get a bite to eat.

7. Don't stop the music – Saskatchewan RCMP 9-1-1 dispatchers received a call from an upset individual

who could not find their music playlist on their cellphone.

8. Cold brew – A call was received from a thirsty traveller who had purchased a cup of coffee and was upset it was cold.

9. Pay at the pump – A dispute at a gas station resulted in a call to 9-1-1 dispatchers. A customer was upset with the gas station attendant when they refused to remove the customer's debit card from the debit machine for the customer.

10. Isn't it ironic – An individual called 9-1-1 to complain they'd received a ticket under the Emergency 911 System Act for calling 9-1-1 with non-emergency calls. They then called 9-1-1 again to dispute the ticket.

RCMP want everyone to remember that calling the police should be reserved for police-related matters

only.

If you have a complaint or have information to report, please contact your local RCMP detachment or

police service or call 310-RCMP from anywhere in the province. As always, call 911 if you have a life-threatening emergency.

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After months of forensic investigation, eHS has advised that it cannot assure that a breach of personal health information did not occur as a result of this attack. eHS continues to monitor the internet for any signs that Saskatchewan information may have been compromised. 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Solutions and Substitutions



— tips from Reena Nerbas

Dear Reena,

My goal for the new year is to purchase less store-bought products and make my own stain removers. Can you give me a few hints as to which everyday products clean different kinds of stains? Mel

Dear Mel,

Whether you are dealing with protein, tannin, dye, oil or a combination of the two, you are right, different stains require a variety of treatments and the faster you attend to a mess, the better the results. Protein stains are those which come from the body such as: eggs, blood, yogurt, ice cream, and milk. Never use hot water to treat a protein stain. Blot the area with cold water and dish soap, continue this treatment and notice if the stain is disappearing. If it remains, pour three percent hydrogen peroxide and salt onto the stain until the area is damp, leave for two to three hours and wash or blot with water. Repeat until the stain is gone. If you spill a combination stain such as; ketchup, spaghetti sauce or any other tomato based food, treat the area by scooping up as much of the sauce as possible. Do not scrub or you may push the stain further into the carpet. Onto a washcloth put a few drops of dish soap and very hot water. Blot the stain. Follow that with dish soap on a washcloth and cold water. Continue this treatment until the stain is gone. The goal is to make the stain colourless even if you cannot remove it entirely. If the stain remains, pour household ammonia onto the area, leave for a few hours and wash or blot with water.

Another stain classification is tannin. I like to think of these as ‘from the ground’ i.e. wine, coffee, tea, fruit juice, etc. If someone happens to spill red wine onto your carpet, immediately react by pouring white wine over the area. If you do not have white wine, pour a liberal amount of salt over the wine. You will immediately notice the salt turn pink. Allow the area to dry and brush the salt away. Next, sprinkle the area with Borax and water, leave for 30 minutes. Wipe and blot with white vinegar. White vinegar is important as a last step because it prevents stained areas from turning brown. Test all treatments on an inconspicuous area. For a more complete list of stain removal treatments visit my website reena.ca

A verb is about action! “Care” is also an interesting word. It can be a verb or a noun, but in this sense it is a noun. I like nouns, they are descriptive and as a writer and a person with a very illuminated imagination, nouns come to life for me. Care means to feel interest or concern; it’s painstaking or watchful attention and even maintenance. Great advice and compliment to give to others especially NOW.

So I say to this beast lurking inside of me that so easily condemns, criticizes, complains and creates cynicism and negativity: reach for interest and concern about myself and hang on with both hands. I strive to nurture who I am and not let circumstances change the person I was born to be. So when you tell me to take care, I take a second glance and appreciate you.

Our latest addition to our household is a five month old kitten our Toronto son named “Windy.” He is sitting beside me on the windowsill watching the chickadees, a couple magpies and the reflective lights from a prism catcher dancing on our walls and ceiling. He was the size of a sparrow when we found him, cold and crying abandoned by his mother for reasons unknown. He couldn’t take care of himself and would have died that day. He has been a firecracker in our home. Randy calls him a flying squirrel in a cat suit. He is busy. He is life.

As you read these words, know that someone does care. I do. Windy cares too for he knows how cold and frightening a world can be when nobody sees or hears you. Check-in with yourself each morning and night. Compliment yourself. Include small things in your daily life that bring you joy, such as having a hot cup of coffee or doing something that makes you up. Once in a while, turn off the news channel because today’s grim news is never permanent. Nor is this pandemic.

The flames of hope are essential to make it through the onslaught of a long winter and a dreary world. It can honestly be said also about life. When frustrations swell into problems and the stress, like the cold, gets into the cracks and chinks of my character - I find balance by doing something nice, something I enjoy and it’s not out of selfishness - but out of survival. UncomplIcATe your life!

For Pete’s sake, for Heaven’s sake, and for YOUR sake, this is meant to be a kind word: please take care of yourself. Windy and yours truly really want you to!

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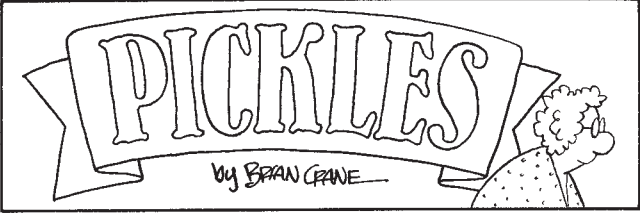

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## Look What's Cooking by Laura Novecosky

### Spaghetti Chili Casserole

#### Ingredients:

- 1 pound ground beef
- 1/2 cup chopped onion
- 1 garlic clove, finely chopped
- 3 cups tomato juice (or canned tomatoes)
- 1 can kidney beans, drained and rinsed well
- 250 grams spaghetti, broken into short pieces
- 1 tbsp. Worcestershire sauce
- 2-3 tsp. chili powder
- 1 tsp. salt
- 1/2 tsp. pepper
- 1 cup shredded cheese. Optional: to sprinkle on top of casserole just before serving

#### Directions:

Cook beef, onion and garlic until meat is no longer pink. Place in a greased three quart baking dish. Add the remaining ingredients and stir well. Bake covered at 350°F for about one hour. Let stand, covered for about 10 minutes. If using the cheese, sprinkle over casserole just prior to serving. Serves about six people.

I hope everyone has a good year.

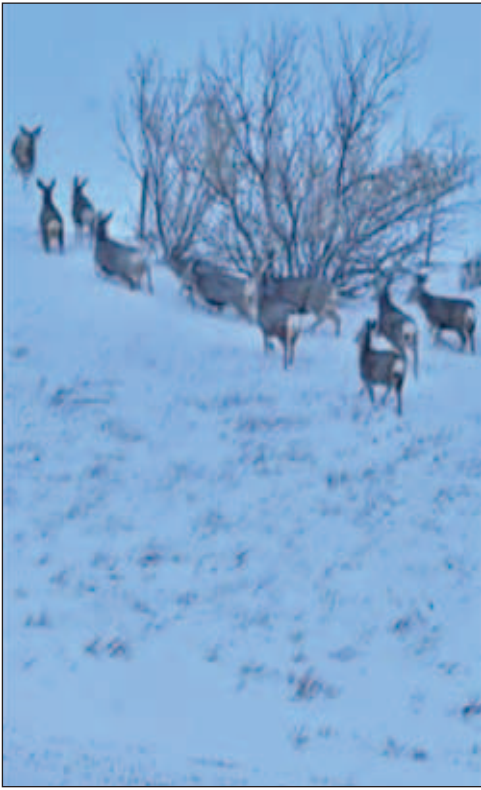

Most communities had a flag of their own so we ended up having a competition for a flag to be designed by a community member in Lanigan.

We had two big funding projects that stick out for me during my time on council and as mayor. One was we built the medical clinic in Lanigan in cooperation with the surrounding towns and municipalities. The town did most of the work on garnering the funding. The late Jack Dvernichuk did a lot of work for the project while he was the town's CAO. While we were still short on funding, PotashCorp. (now Nutrien Lanigan) said they would help us reach \$1 million if we could come up with \$200,000 of it. We ended up falling short in the end but we went back to them and instead of giving us a cheque for \$800,000, they turned around and gave us the \$1 million. We really appreciated the support and felt good that we could see the project completed.

The other big project was getting the RO water system for Lanigan. It took a lot of work and letter writing. Previous CAO Jennifer Thompson did a lot of work to get the many applications for grants approved. One of the highlights was going to Regina to accept a cheque from both the provincial and federal governments for the RO water system.

Everything that has happened in this town since I have been mayor or on council was through the co-operation of our hardworking administrators. If it wasn't for them there wouldn't be any successes. They were the ones doing the heavy lifting.

**Was being the mayor of Lanigan a rewarding experience for you?**

Yes it was. I enjoyed it and I enjoyed working with council and administrators and the community. I enjoyed being there when I did but I felt it came time to step back. **What perhaps was one of the bigger challenges you faced as mayor during your time in office?**

One of the bigger challenges we had was when we needed to fill the role of CAO after the late Jack Dvernichuk passed. He did such a tremendous job for the town as our CAO and put in everything he could even while he was ill. After his passing, there was a challenge to keep everything going while we looked for a new administrator. Our administration staff Karen Greve and Vikki Brookbank did everything they could to keep things going.

**How did you feel 2020 went for the community?**

We had a budget that was going to work for us but when COVID started, we then set a budget we could work with. I think we accomplished it quite well.

The only other thing that happened during that time was the application for funding for the new waterpark was not approved by the federal government. That was a let down. The provincial government had given us a promise of funding but the federal government did not come through. Hopefully they will be able to approve that funding in the future so that the community can still get its waterpark built.

The new school will be a great addition to the community. We also received funding for repairs to our underground water and sewer services prior to repaving

our streets.

**What is next for you now that you are no longer mayor?**

I haven't really decided yet. I am still catching up with some of my personal stuff that I hadn't done when I was doing my civic duties. Eventually I want to go back to my studies of what I did previously.

**Is there anything else you would like to add or say to the community?**

I think some of my accomplishments whether they were with the hospital or town, I always made sure that I was always non-partisan. I was always working for the betterment of the community. I think that is what we have had successes with.

I truly wish the community continues to support the elected council and mayor. Without working together, the community will never grow. We want to make this a pleasant and safe community for everybody to live in.

I wish everybody all the best in the future.

**Current Mayor of Lanigan Tony Mycock**

**For those who may not know you, tell me a bit about yourself and how you arrived in Lanigan.**

My family and I actually emigrated to Canada in 1975 from England to Lanigan and my dad worked at the pig barn behind Pound Maker. We stayed in Lanigan for two years and then moved to a farm north of Regina where I grew up.

Yvonne and I and our two girls moved back to Lanigan in 1998. Our girls, Sarah and Rebecca, grew up here and it is a great place to raise a family. Yvonne and I became grandparents in 2015 and for a second time in 2020. Being a grandpa is amazing!

I currently work for Sinnett Pork Farms as the Operations Manager. I have been there for going on 12 years. Yvonne, as most people know, is the Postmaster at Canada Post in Lanigan.

**When were you first elected to council?**

I was on council for four years before running for mayor in 2020.

**Have there been a few highlights during your time as part of council?**

I have learned a lot about the inner workings of the town and have a good understanding of the cost of things and why we have to have a long-term plan for the town.

Seeing Lanigan finally get RO water has been a highlight as well as being involved with the waterpark committee. It has been very rewarding to work with a great group of hard-working people and to see our grants come through was awesome! We still have some work to do with grants but hopefully we can get started on the new pool in 2021.

**What does being elected as mayor of Lanigan mean to you?**

I consider it a great responsibility as well as an honour

to represent the Town of Lanigan. I will work hard along with the town council to do everything we can for the betterment of Lanigan and its residents.

**Are you looking forward to 2021?**

Well first and foremost, I feel the same as everyone else, hopefully we can get back to normal and move on from COVID.

I am also looking forward to working with the new council and our new CAO to continue to improve and make Lanigan a great place to live.

At the end of December, we hired a new CAO and her name is Kelli Timmeran from LeRoy. Her official start date will be Jan. 18, 2021. She is very excited for the opportunity to work for the Town of Lanigan.

**Are there some exciting things on the horizon for the community in 2021?**

We do have some very exciting things happening in the new year. We, along with Horizon School Division, are just in the process of finalizing a site for the new school. The tentative completion date is September 2023.

I am also hopeful we can finalize the government grants for the new pool and get started with the construction.

I also want to see our hospital reopen. With the vaccine coming online, hopefully this means COVID is coming to an end and that the Saskatchewan Health Authority and the provincial government will honour their word and reopen the emergency and ALC beds at the Lanigan hospital.

**What would you like to say to the community and the residents heading into 2021?**

On behalf of myself and my wife Yvonne, I would like to wish everyone a safe and Happy New Year. My wish for 2021 is to be a much better year as we put 2020 behind us. I also want to say thank you to our residents for following and being understanding of the ever-changing COVID restrictions the government has put in place for our province. None of this has been easy on any of us, not seeing our family and friends as we normally would has just plain sucked! We have had to navigate through rules that were not always consistent and sometimes unclear but ultimately the majority of people have done the right things and have chosen to think of others through all of this and not just thought of themselves.

**Is there anything else you would like to add?**

I would like to take this opportunity on behalf of myself and council to say a big thank you to Karen Greve who has been our acting administrator for the past four and a half months. Without Karen as acting administrator, it would have been really tough to keep the town running. Karen has done such a great job and has been a big help to me in my role as the new mayor. I also want to thank Vikki Brookbank as well, I know she has been right alongside there to help Karen with whatever she needed.

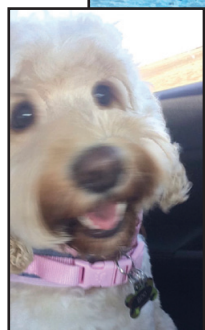
