The following is the nomination letter received by the Village of Jansen from one of the residents in Jansen for the 2022 Jansen Volunteer of the Year:

For many years, the Jansen Community has been blessed with many dedicated volunteers, who have given selflessly to the community of Jansen.

This year, we would like to recognize a couple who work quietly, behind the scenes in most cases, but none the less, volunteer consistently and willingly to make our little community a great place to call home. This year we are recognizing Dwayne and Val Koshinsky.

Dwayne is a life long resident of Jansen. He grew up through local school, minor sports, and Lutheran Church organizations. To all of these, he still commits much of his time. He played minor hockey, ball, and curled, and as he grew older, played senior ball and hockey with Jansen teams. When his playing days ended, he became involved in the organization of these activities, serving on the boards that ran the teams and events. He is still on the Jansen Jets executive board, helps organize ball games for Canada Day and still curls in Lanigan.

He sold squares for the Jets game boards, and annually sells a Grey Cup fundraiser board for the library. If there are any sports in Jansen, Dwayne will be involved.

3. Produces, directs, or acts in performances herself.

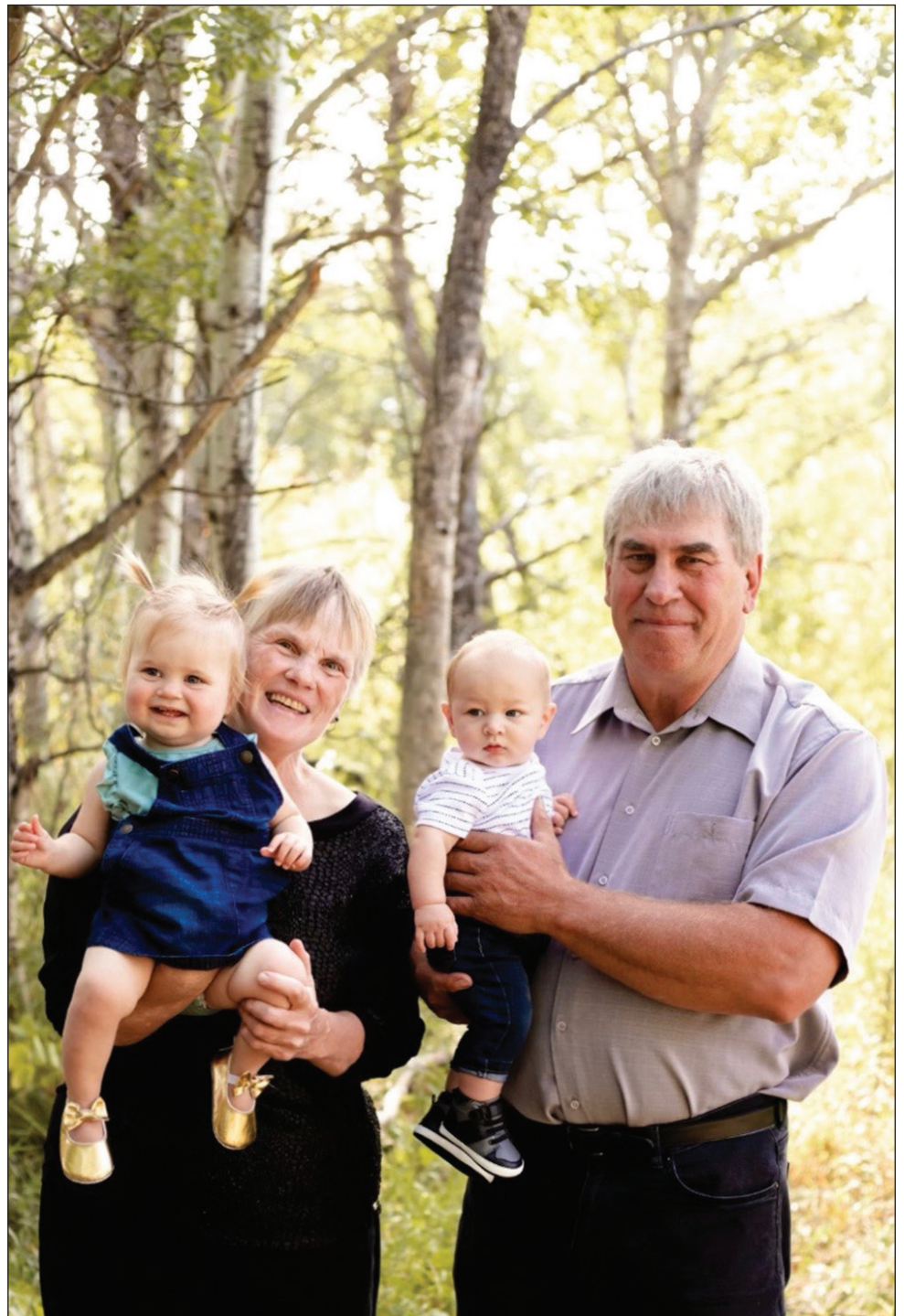
On top of that, Val facilitates the volunteers that are necessary to carry out the three days of performances! I believe she was working on a new Dinner Theatre production, when Covid struck!

Canucks find scoring touch as 2023 begins

With a trio of games to open the 2023 portion of the Long Lake Hockey League season, the Drake Canucks faced the Foam Lake Flyers before returning home to host Watrous and Wadena.

Looking to improve in the standings, Drake and Foam Lake wasted no time in finding the back of the net as the pair combined for five goals in the first three and a half minutes of play.

Just 10 seconds after the opening face off, Zach Zadorozniak tallied for the Flyers to make it 1-0. The lead lasted for just over a minute until Carter Coben scored with 18:29 remaining to tie things up. Foam Lake then countered with 17:34 to go as Travis Mayan gave his team the lead. With 16:31 to play, Cam Blair once again tied the game as Drake notched its second of the campaign.

Then nine seconds after that goal, Coben gave the visitors its first lead of the night as he tallied his second of the frame.

With goals coming in bunches, Drake added more, one with 9:41 left and another 11 seconds later as John Lawrence and Andrew Johnson combined to give the Canucks a 5-2 first period lead. However, Foam Lake was not quite done as Mayan scored his second with 7:41 to play followed by Kyle Jones collecting a goal of his own with 3:45 left on the clock. With a total of nine goals in period one and the Canucks leading 5-4, both clubs looked to settle things down in the second period.

In period two, Drake kept pushing as Lawrence picked up where he left off, scoring with 11:29 remaining. Then on the power play and with 9:30 to go, he notched a hat trick. The three goals helped to aid in a 7-4 lead as goalie

Calvin Bartel shut the door for Drake in the second period.

With a three goal advantage, Drake carried over its momentum into the final 20 minutes and as was the case earlier in the game, scored two back to back and in short order. With 15:57 left, Maguire Scheidt collected his first of the night from Dexter Gusikoski and Coben before adding another 15 seconds later. Foam Lake would respond over a minute later to make it 9-5 and then each team would score once more before the period ended giving the Canucks a 10-6 victory.

Returning to the familiar Drake Sportsplex Jan. 7, the Canucks looked to add another win to its total as it welcomed Watrous. In the Saturday contest Drake tallied first as Cam Blair scored with 9:41 remaining in the opening period followed by John Lawrence who made it 2-0 with 5:06 to go. On the power play, Watrous responded with 3:12 on the clock as Dylan Smith tallied from Gage Helm and Daniel Martin to see the score go to 2-1.

Up by one, the Canucks were able to nab another tally just before the period expired as Terrell Draude made it 3-1 with 25 seconds to play.

Pirates nab pair of wins to start 2023

They may have needed extra time but the Lanigan Pirates secured four out of a possible four points to begin the 2023 portion of the Long Lake Hockey League's regular season. Taking aim at moving up the standings, Lanigan headed to Wynyard Jan. 6 before returning home to welcome LeRoy Jan. 7.

Facing the first place Monarchs, it was the visitors who struck first as Colby Harmsworth tallied with 13:52 remaining in the first to give Lanigan a 1-0 advantage. Wynyard would reply later though as Drew Litwin and Alex Forsberg each notched a marker, one with 9:30 left and the other with 4:08 to play.

Down 2-1 through one, Lanigan replied early in the second as Josh Bly connected less than 50 seconds after the middle stanza began and it was all tied up at two. Just under 10 minutes later, Lanigan regained the lead as Hayden Francis tallied from Trey Daelick and Bly and it was 3-2. Then with 3:14 remaining, the Pirates pushed its lead to 4-2 as Bly notched his second of the game from Graham Gove.

Up by a pair, the Pirates looked to keep Wynyard at bay but the Monarchs had other ideas. With 19:41 left, Max Gudnason brought the score closer as the home team drew to within one. Then less than three minutes after the third started, Cody Crone tied things up at four. Just under a minute later, Lanigan responded and nabbed the advantage courtesy of a Dallas Dufault tally and went up 5-4. The seesaw battle continued though and just over a minute after that, Wynyard tied the game back up as Eric Popadyne struck to make it 5-5. Then with 1:31, the Monarchs took the lead.

Calling a time out with 1:24 to play, Lanigan looked to try and find the equalizer. With 43 seconds on the clock, Bly and Nick Shumlanski chipped in on a Harmsworth marker, his second of the game, and the goal sent the contest into overtime.

Tied at six, both teams looked for the game winner and with 3:23 left, Bly completed his

hat trick and the Pirates took a big 7-6 victory in Wynyard.

Looking to capitalize off its momentum from Friday's contest, Lanigan hosted the LeRoy Braves Jan. 7. As was the case against the Monarchs, the Pirates took a first period lead as Gabe Zerbin scored with 11:52 to go from Zach Garrett and Colby Harmsworth. LeRoy replied late in the period as Jesse Shynkaruk notched his first of the game with 6:56 but the tie was short-lived as Lanigan scored over a minute later courtesy of Josh Bly.

Leading 2-1 through one, the Pirates looked to add to its tally but it would be the Braves scoring first. With 17:04 to go, Evan Michel made it 2-2 as Rylan Korte added the helper. Then with 12:26 on the clock, LeRoy took its first lead of the game and Lanigan would find itself in penalty trouble. Despite heading to the penalty box, the Pirates were able to tie things up under a minute later when Bly scored short-handed for his second of the contest.

Tied at three, teams went back and forth with Mack Shields making key saves for Lanigan while Matt Richard stood tall for LeRoy.

In the third, the scoring continued as Bly connected on his third of the night and second short-handed goal of the evening to give Lanigan a 4-3 advantage. The Braves were also able to connect on a goal of their own as Shynkaruk notched his second of the game and as was the case the game prior, the Pirates headed to extra time.

With the overtime session underway, Bly, who had a terrific weekend in the goal department was not quite done. With 1:19 to go, Bly scored his fourth of the game and seventh in two nights to give Lanigan a 5-4 victory.

Collecting a pair of wins to begin 2023, the Pirates pushed past Foam Lake following the two games to sit sixth with 10 points, one behind Drake and three back of LeRoy for fourth.

Lanigan was scheduled to host Wynyard Jan. 13 and then headed to Drake Jan. 14. The team's next home game is Jan. 21 when it welcomes Davidson.

Pumpkin Pecan Muffins

Ingredients:

4 large eggs
2 cups white sugar
1 can of pumpkin puree (or 2 cups homemade pumpkin puree)
1 cup canola oil
3 cups flour
1 cup chopped pecans
1 tsp. baking powder
1 tsp. baking soda
1 tsp. cinnamon
1 tsp. nutmeg
1 tsp. salt
½ tsp. cloves

Directions:

Beat eggs in large bowl until well mixed. Add sugar, pumpkin and canola oil. Beat until smooth. Combine the remaining ingredients in another bowl, adding to pumpkin mixture 1/3 at a time. Stir, do not beat with mixer until smooth, continuing until all flour mixture is incorporated. Fill 24 lined muffin cups about ¾ full. I like to use parchment paper muffin liners for these muffins. Let stand in muffin pan about five minutes before removing to cool on racks.

RCMP Report

Traffic stop leads to charges

As part of an ongoing investigation into trafficking in the Swift Current area, Saskatchewan RCMP's Saskatchewan Trafficking Response Team (STRT) conducted a traffic stop in the City of Swift Current on Jan. 4, 2023.

An adult male fled from officers when the vehicle was stopped and officers located and arrested him shortly after. An adult female was also arrested during the investigation.

Officers searched the vehicle and located

approximately 16 grams of cocaine, 10 grams of fentanyl, one gram of methamphetamine and drug trafficking paraphernalia. The illicit substances were seized for further investigation.

As a result, 35-year-old Bailey Bolton from Pennant, and 36-year-old Scott Bolton from Swift Current are each charged with: two counts, possession for the purpose of trafficking, Section 5(2), Controlled Drugs and Substances Act; and one count, possession of the proceeds of crime, Section 354(1)(a), Criminal Code.

Scott Bolton is also charged with: one count, resist arrest, Section 129(a), Criminal Code; and one count, breach of undertaking, Section 145(5.1), Criminal Code.

Scott Bolton was scheduled to appear in Swift Current

Provincial Court on Jan. 11, 2023. Bailey Bolton is scheduled to appear in Swift Current Provincial Court on Feb. 1, 2023.

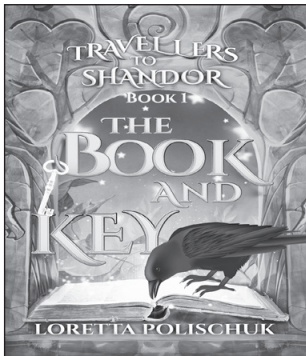

OBITUARY



STRONG, Edith Grace Nov. 14, 1922 - Dec. 29, 2022

Born 100 years ago, November 14, 1922, on her parent's homestead, NE of Lockwood, Sask. Grace was the 6th child of Robert and Kate (Waldron) Plaster, settlers from London and Birmingham, England. She was welcomed by older siblings Robert (Bert), Ida, Cyril, Ernest (Bun), Victoria and their Granddad Waldron, who lived with the family. Connie and Ella were born later. Connie (Plaster) Nelson (95 years), of London, Ont. is the only surviving member of that generation of Plasters. Grace died at home in Saskatoon, Sask. December 29, 2022.

Grace was nurtured by a strong sense of community among neighbours; trips by 'shanks mare' and horse and buggy in the early years; harnessing the 'school horse' to go to Kneller School; happy times with the many Waldron cousins; summer student ministers, leading lively Sunday Schools at Kneller; homemade family music; being taught to play cribbage, at an early age, by Grandad Waldron; the delight of her mother's home sewn dresses, just in time for the Christmas Concerts; and especially that her father was able to find 25 cents for each piano lesson Grace had from neighbour girl, Gwen Hurley.

Grace completed Grade 11, by correspondence, under the supervision of a Kneller teacher. Near the end of the Great Depression of the 1930s, after a summer job at Urquhart's General Store, in Lockwood, she and future sister-in-law, Lillian Sadler, went to Regina where they worked at Kresge's Department Store. Grace next found a job as a 'hired' girl for a family in Regina, doing day work.

Grace was a WW2 Veteran. She was a member of the Canadian Women's Army Corps-Signals Division. She became a Lance-Corporal and after Advanced Officer's Training at St Anne de Bellevue, Que., was posted for two and a half years at Canadian Military Head Quarters in London, England, as a wireless radio and teletype operator.

Following demobilization Grace worked in a similar capacity with the RCAF in Winnipeg, then was hired by TransCanada Airlines (now Air Canada) as a wireless and teletype operator, putting her Morse code skills to good use. While at TCA she flew to New York City and also to Bermuda for short vacations.

In June 1950, she married Hugh Strong Jr, a farmer at Drake, Sask. Hughie and Grace worked together on 'Aston Villa Farm', south of Drake on Highway 20, raising Shorthorn cattle, cereal crops and five children until Hughie's passing in 1993. Like the rural women of her generation Grace would garden, preserve fruit, make jam, knit and sew for her family and could as handily butcher chickens as bake a cake!

In the mid-1950s, on a dare from her sister, Ida, Grace applied for a job open to WW2 veterans, 'Postmaster'-Village of Drake. As Grace predicted, a man was hired, but he soon quit, not liking the six day week of indoor employment. Grace was offered the job and for 34 years, 1957-1991, 'Mrs. Strong', was the Drake Post Mistress. Over the years she hired many capable local women to be her assistants so she could have a day off each week to keep up with the unpaid chores at home! The farm being half a mile from Drake, Hughie always had lunch on the table for Grace when the post office

closed between 12:00 - 1:00 p.m. Grace was a committed church volunteer. A CGIT leader, for the teenage girls' youth group; organist at the Drake United Church in the 1950s and '60s. If an organist was needed, short term, at Lockwood or Guernsey United Churches she went. Drake UC amalgamated with Knox United Church in Lanigan, in the mid-1960s and she was organist there until 2009 when her eyesight deteriorated.

Happy to offer her time as an accompanist for weddings and funerals, and if no one stepped up, to lead a choir. She once quipped: "I guess my Dad got his money's worth when he found those quarters for piano lessons!"

An active community member, some volunteer roles were: Secretary-Treasurer of the Kansas Rural Telephone Company, a stint on the Drake School Board; Trustee of Carlton Trail Community College from 1973-1978; the Drake Community History Book Committee and the Figure Skating Club.

Happily, three of her siblings and their families, Bert, Ida and Cyril all lived in the vicinity. Grace enjoyed family reunions with the large extended Plaster clan and with Hughie, Grace enjoyed road trips to Manitoba, Alberta and B.C. where their adult children and their grandchildren lived. Close ties, and reunions continued with members of her CWAC Unit. A group of them enjoyed scenic fall colours on a trip to Ontario, Quebec and the Maritimes. With family she saw Switzerland, the British Isles, Hawaii, Arizona, and Costa Rica. In later years fishing at Missinippi, became an annual treat.

Grace loved the four seasons of Saskatchewan. She was content watching the broad expanse of sunrise and sunsets at the farm. Claiming to have heard 'the music of the spheres' as a child, watching the Northern Lights dance across the vast Prairie sky, she spoke often of the marvels of nature.

In her final four years Grace moved to Saskatoon to live with her daughter Melody. She appreciated visits, calls, emails, cards and letters from friends and neighbours in the communities of Lockwood, Drake and Lanigan. 'Auntie' Grace was especially delighted when extended family members came for a visit and stayed in touch through emails or phone calls. Grace was grateful that her home congregation, Knox United Church, Lanigan, adapted during the pandemic and beyond with Sunday services on Zoom. An early adopter of the computer Grace was fascinated by digital technology.

Predeceased by her parents, six of her Plaster siblings, her husband Hugh, infant daughter April, adult son Marshall Strong, adult grandson Wade Strong, son-in-law Dale Harris. Survived by Melody Harris; Marcia Grobety (Pierre); Malcolm Strong (Gill Newman-Strong); Morley Strong (Ellen Rucks). She was lovingly known to her grandchildren Heidi, Wade, Jehna, Chelsea, Ryan, Dave and Mike and 11 great-grandchildren as 'Grama Grace'.

Grace's last act of kindness was bequeathing her body for research to the Department of Anatomy and Cell Biology-University of Saskatchewan. Her cremains will eventually be returned to her family.

Progressive minded and straightforward in her views Grace was a role model for nieces and nephews as well as her children. Quietly she supported many women who needed a friend to walk beside them for awhile. Always fair-minded, formidable and fun, our mother, grandmother and great-grandmother, Grace, embodied the words of English children's author Roald Dahl: 'If you have good thoughts, they will shine out of your face like sunbeams and you will always look lovely.'

A memorial service for Grace will be held in July 2023. Notice to the community of the time and location will be posted well in advance.

difference through 20 minutes, Drake then scored 58 seconds after the start of the middle frame followed by four more markers including a power play tally. The Winterhawks countered with a Wyatt Johnson goal late in the period and as the buzzer sounded, Drake led 8-2 through two. Goal scorers in the second period for the Canucks were Draude, Cam Blair, David Stumborg, Emmett Scheidt, and Andrew Johnson.

In the last period, the Canucks scored three more times (Daigon Elmy, Lawrence, and Steven Toporowski) while Watrous added a pair, both from Gage Helm, and that made the final 11-6 for Drake.

Adding two wins to its total to kick off 2023 and looking to collect another, Drake then hosted Wadena Jan. 10.

Picking up where they left off in the game previous, the Canucks tallied less than four minutes into the opener as Terrell Draude gave the home team a 1-0 advantage. Then just over five minutes after that, Draude collected a second of the night to make it 2-0. Netminder Calvin Bartel kept shooters at bay for Drake in the first 20 minutes and the Canucks took a two goal advantage into the second.

In period two, Daigon Elmy made it 3-0 Drake as he notched a marker from Catlin Gusikoski and Nayte Zip with 17:55 left on the clock. Wadena would respond later in the frame but that would be quickly countered as the Canucks replied just over a minute later as Carter Coben pushed the home team up 4-1.

With a three goal advantage, Drake headed into the third connecting on two more markers, one from Eric Roy and another from Draude, who completed the hat trick, and the Canucks skated away with a 6-1 victory.

The three game winning streak to begin 2023 pushed Drake to 6-6-1 for 13 points. The team sat three back of Wadena for third and eight points behind first place Wynyard.
