Accessible playground in Drake ready to be used

With a number of volunteers willing to lend a hand and following tremendous work through fundraising efforts, a brand new accessible playground was installed in the Village of Drake as part of the Drake Park Revitalization Project.

Spokesperson with the project, Erin Richard said installation on the playground began June 29 with the help of volunteers. Able to get the structures put together, concrete was then added to set. Following that, remaining surfacing for the space near Drake School was done and by the end of June, the playground was ready to be used.

"We are sincerely grateful to the relentless group of volunteers who came out and to those in the kitchen who provided lunch, supper, and snacks," said Richard. "It was a long and hot day but fun was had by most."

With wood chips spread out around the area and plans to plant grass adjacent to the playground structures over the summer, kids have been able to enjoy the area between Drake School and the Drake Sportsplex. Richard noted North Star Mennonite Church in Drake also provided picnic tables which were placed in the shade for people to utilize.

"This is why Drake is a wonderful community to live and grow in. We are so appreciative of the hard work by countless volunteers and are proud to share that the accessible playground is open for use."

Started by a group of volunteers within Drake and the surrounding area, the Drake



Park Revitalization Project moved from an idea to a reality after the committee secured land space and received a Western Revitalization Grant during the summer of 2022. With the grant helping cover some of the costs associated with the \$250,000 playground project, Richard shared local citizens and organizations stepped up through fundraising and events to promote the vision of establishing a gathering place for everyone

in Drake and surrounding communities.

"Drake prides itself on being a community that is inclusive and supportive for the success for all. We saw a need as the local school was fundraising for new playground equipment and we wanted to ensure that this project could support their needs and also the needs of the community of an outdoor play structure for families to gather."

Hoping to add more to the remaining space

adjacent to the Drake Sportsplex where the baseball diamonds are situated, Richard said along with the community, further priorities will be determined. "In the fall we will be part of a village-wide meeting to get direction from the community about the next priority in the community. Crops advancing throughout the province

Crops continued to progress with the warm temperatures across the province. That is according to the Ministry of Agriculture's weekly Crop Report for July 4 to 10.

Canola is beginning to pod and wheat is beginning to flower in many areas. Dry conditions are impacting parts of the province and many producers are hoping for rain immediately.

Very little rain was received this past week. The most rain was in the Dinsmore area, with 14 mm. A large decrease in soil moisture accompanied the warm weather this past week. Crop land topsoil moisture is currently 21 percent adequate, 55 percent short and 24 percent very short. Hay and pastureland topsoil moisture is currently 17 percent adequate, 55 percent short and 28 percent very short.

Crops are either ahead or at normal stages of development for this time of year. Fall cereals are 31 percent ahead and 66 percent at normal stages of development. Spring cereals are 33 percent ahead and 60 percent at normal stages of development. Oilseeds are also 33 percent ahead and 58 percent at normal

stages of development. Pulse crops are 28 percent ahead and 67 percent at normal stages of development.

Crops are generally in good to fair condition. Provincially, winter wheat and soybean crops are in the best condition, with 60 percent of winter wheat in good condition and 67 percent of soybean in good condition. Mustard and canary seed are the crops in the poorest condition. Thirty-five percent of mustard and 21 percent of canary seed is in very poor condition.

Producers have made swift and steady progress with haying this past week. Fifty-one percent of the first cut of hay has been baled or silaged, while 26 percent is cut and 23 percent is still standing. The quality of hay ranges from excellent to fair, with 59 percent in good quality.

Crop damage comes from heat and moisture stress and grasshoppers. Producers are reminded to keep in mind economic thresholds when scouting for grasshoppers and to reach out to their local regional office if they have any questions.

Many producers are haying and monitoring their pastures now. With the heat, water quality is at the top of mind for many. If producers are concerned about the quality of their

water source for livestock, they can bring in samples to their local regional office for testing.

Annual Fun Run revving up for 2023

For over three decades the annual Watrous and Manitou Beach Fun Run Auto Show 'N' Shine has taken place along Main Street in Watrous. Despite substantial road work being done to the street during the summer, the Fun Run still remains a go.

Commemorating 32 years of vintage vehicles, unique cars and custom trucks, chairperson of the Fun Run, Al Madland said the vehicles will just move a little further north from where they normally are located. "We will start parking them in front of the post office and Heritage Centre on the #400 block of Main Street as opposed to lining them up on the #200 and #300 blocks. Normally they would occupy those blocks as well but due to the Main Street Revitalization project we are just starting a few blocks over."

Expecting anywhere from 250 to 300 entries this year, Madland shared the Fun Run, which attracts hundreds of people to Watrous annually, should be another exciting one. "We were able to get enough volunteers to have the July 29 Fun Run move forward. Like previous years, we will have a lot of events being held during the day that people have come to know and appreciate."

Along with vehicles of all makes and models lining Main Street, a pancake breakfast, pie and coffee, burgers, ice cream, a trade show, agility dogs, Beeper the Clown, a professional face-painter, live entertainment, beer gardens, Kinsmen selling 50/50 tickets and a monster truck will all be part of the festivities.

"We rented out the Watrous Civic Centre and Heritage Room so a number of those things will be located there this

year. Nearby at Centennial Park, the agility dogs, face-painting, and live entertainment and beer gardens will be situated there while the monster truck will be in the parking lot at Watrous Centennial Arena. We understand this year is not ideal for a lot of the Main Street businesses as many of our guests stop by those places during the day but despite the road work, we encourage those taking in the show to walk downtown and support them."

For vehicle enthusiasts wanting to participate, Madland said, "We already have had quite a few pre-register and the more we get, the merrier. If you pre-register then it gets you in the gate quicker because we can have your package ready to go and get you parked into position."

For those planning to come as a group, Madland hopes they (see page three: **FUN RUN**)

BHP Jansen creating multiple opportunities as project progresses

The future looks bright and excitement continues to build at BHP's Jansen site as the company works towards reaching its goal of starting production in late 2026.

Speaking to the great performance of the Jansen team, President Potash of BHP, Simon Thomas said, "Progress over last summer and in particular last winter was really positive – and we exceeded our expectations."

As BHP advances their plans, they have focused on securing labour, contractors and employees from the local area. Additionally, in March, they announced three new contracts totalling \$260 million that have gone to

local Indigenous businesses.

On site, the current focus of the work is completing the civil program, and underground development work. This includes excavations for the surface mill, storage facilities and work on the rail formation. Placement of piles and pouring of concrete foundations are taking place on the surface while underground, completion of services, installing electricity, accessing water, and creating ventilation are underway. Commencement of lateral developments underground are also being addressed this year which will be the future underground operation.

Along with work at the Jansen site, at Westshore, the

location of the port facilities for BHP potash, the schedule for completion remains on track.

To keep pace and see its first production commence late 2026, BHP stated it will need a large workforce, Thomas shared BHP will see over 3,500 people during its peak construction period. "At the moment there is a lot of earthworks and civil contract work being done, but soon we will need to call on carpenters, ironworkers and other trades to move to the structural and mechanical aspects."

With all of the current and future work being planned, Thomas explained BHP will be seeking operational personnel like underground

mining teams, integrated operations, surface operations, maintenance planners, technicians, and supervisors. "We put a lot of effort into programs and structures that make us an attractive employer and seek to provide a rewarding career for those wanting to come into the mining industry in Saskatchewan."

Thomas also stressed the importance of diversity and inclusion. He shared that BHP wants to have a strong representation of Saskatchewan employees. "We see our site as an attractive place to come and work. You can work on a major project within a good distance to local towns and good access if you are coming

inter-provincially."

In addition to the structural and mechanical work and recruitment efforts, the company is accelerating its studies for a stage two of Jansen, with studies expected to be completed in their 2024 financial year. Thomas said, "While we are excited about the study, any decision or next steps still requires BHP board approval."

Environmentally speaking, BHP Jansen continues to conduct studies in clean energy while working on programs to reduce operational emissions. Longer term, Thomas said they are working towards achieving the company's ambition of net zero operational emissions by 2050.

BHP has now been in the region for well over a decade, and Thomas shared the local support from the company and local Indigenous groups has been fantastic. "One of the really exciting things for me personally, is the relationships, the engagements, and the communication we are having with the local towns in the area. We have felt very welcome, and it is important to us that we make a positive contribution to the community."

Wanting to give back and being able to contribute to the region in a number of different ways, BHP has committed \$45 million to date through donations, sponsorships and programs. "The relationship is really strong and it is a great place to come and develop and invest. We are really enjoying that relationship," continued Thomas.

Looking at the big picture and the years ahead, Thomas said once work is completed and production underway, the mine will provide a rather unique opportunity spanning generations. "With the potential for over a century of operations at Jansen, we are a part of building a future here which includes inter-generational employment.

Many people who are joining us live in the local area. Jansen provides opportunity for their children, bringing good jobs and educational opportunities to the region. I also think the opportunity for us to work closely with local and Indigenous communities, provincial government and local businesses to grow and develop the local area is important. We call this area our home and want to be a part of developing its future prosperity."

are able to get in touch before the July 29 event so organizers can ensure they have ample space. People who would still like to register can go to the Fun Run's website: www.watrousfunrun.com. "Between motorcycles, cars and trucks, whatever people have to show, bring it and we will get it in."

With vehicles arriving for the Fun Run Saturday morning and trophies, awards and a cruise to the beach wrapping up the day, Madland said, "The Fun Run

is the largest one day event in Watrous and we try and do our best to make those who attend feel welcome. The planning is all coming together and we are looking forward to seeing everyone again this year."

Once the car show wraps up Saturday afternoon, Madland shared vehicles will rev up for the annual drive to Manitou Beach. "With work being done on Main Street, we will start the cruise on 5th Ave. E. and turn and go to 4th Ave. E. RCMP Report

RCMP arrest three males related to human trafficking

Earlier this year, Saskatchewan RCMP's Swift Current Saskatchewan Trafficking Response Team (STRT) began an investigation into a human trafficking operation.

Investigation determined an adult female from Bangladesh was staying in Canada on a visitor's permit when she answered an advertisement on a popular job bank for work at a restaurant. The woman relocated to Saskatchewan from out of province, and was provided a working permit.

The woman allegedly was forced to work 10 to 12 hours a day, seven days a week, for several months at restaurants in Gull Lake, Elrose and Tisdale. When she was not working, the woman was allegedly forced to stay in an unfinished, concrete basement, which was dimly lit and heavily water damaged. The woman was allegedly threatened by her employers that her working permit would be taken away or police would be called if she did not comply with the demanding work schedule and restrictions to her freedoms.

As a result of investigation and consultation with Crown Prosecution, on June 29, Saskatchewan RCMP's STRT arrested two adult males in Tisdale. A third adult male was arrested in Elrose on July 5.

Forty-one-year-old Mohammad Masum from Tisdale and 52-year-old Sohel Haider from Elrose are each charged with one count, trafficking a person, Section 279.01, Criminal Code. Masum is also charged with three counts, sexual assault, Section 271, Criminal Code. The third male was released without charge.

They were scheduled to appear in Rosetown Provincial Court on July 13, 2023.

The victim has been provided with supports, including advising her of protections available to her under Saskatchewan's Protection from Human Trafficking Act.

"This investigation illustrates human trafficking can take many forms, including forced labour. This isn't just a big city issue – human trafficking is present in communities both big and small, including in Saskatchewan. It's important that residents recognize the signs of trafficking and report these occurrences to police immediately," said Supt. Glenn Church, officer in charge of Saskatchewan RCMP's Saskatchewan Enforcement Response Team (SERT). "We have dedicated resources like STRT working to dismantle trafficking rings, and helping to connect victims with the assistance and resources they need."

Investigators believe there may be more victims of this human trafficking operation and the investigation continues.

It is confidential, available 24/7 and offers services in more than 200 languages. RCMP investigating two fatalities

On July 6, 2023 at approximately 9:30 p.m., Warman RCMP received a report of a single vehicle rollover on Hwy. 16 near Maymont.

The driver and sole occupant of the vehicle passed away at the scene. He has been identified as a 59-year-old male from Edmonton.

On July 7, 2023 at approximately 10:20 p.m., Warman RCMP received a report of a motorcycle rollover on Auction Mart Road, northwest of Saskatoon.

The adult male driver and sole rider on the motorcycle passed away at the scene. He has been identified as a 38-year-old from Martensville.

Warman RCMP continue to investigate both incidents with the assistance of a Saskatchewan RCMP collision reconstructionist.

Charges laid

On July 6, 2023 at approximately 1 a.m., Battlefords RCMP received a report of an assault at a residence in Meota.

Officers immediately responded. Investigation determined an altercation allegedly occurred between two adult males. One of them was taken to hospital with injuries described as serious.

As a result of investigation, 29-year-old Clarence Buck from North Battleford is charged with one count, aggravated assault, Section 268, Criminal Code.

On July 8, 2023, Saskatchewan RCMP Major Crimes was advised that the victim passed away from his injuries.

As a result, Clarence Buck has been charged with one count of manslaughter, Section 236, Criminal Code, in relation to the death of 56-year-old Richard Buck. The accused and victim are related and known to one another.

RCMP make arrest

At approximately 4:15 p.m. July 6, Saskatoon Police Service advised Warman RCMP a truck involved in a theft in the city of Saskatoon was travelling into their jurisdiction. Investigation determined the truck had been reported as stolen in the city of Prince Albert on July 4.

Officers from the Martensville and Warman RCMP and Corman Park Police Service responded immediately and

conducted proactive patrols along Hwy. 11 and 12, where the truck was last seen.

At approximately 4:20 p.m. officers received multiple reports of a vehicle driving dangerously between Martensville and Warman. Shortly after, officers received and responded to a separate report of a two-vehicle collision at the intersection of Central Street and 4th Ave. in Warman.

Upon arrival, officers positively identified one of the vehicles involved in the collision as the suspect truck. Further investigation determined the adult male driver of the truck also allegedly assaulted the driver of another vehicle, in an attempt to gain access to it. Officers intervened and the suspect was arrested without incident.

The driver of the other vehicle involved in the collision reported minor injuries, which were treated at the scene.

During the arrest of the male and a subsequent search of the truck, officers located and seized 45 grams of crystal methamphetamine and 20 grams of cocaine.

Twenty-nine-year-old Theron Owens from Prince Albert has been charged with the following: one count, possession for the purpose of trafficking (cocaine), Section 5(2), Controlled Drugs and Substances Act; one count, trafficking (crystal methamphetamine), Section 5(1), Controlled Drugs and Substances Act; two counts, assault, Section 266, Criminal Code; one count, possession of property obtained by crime over \$5,000, Section 354(1)(a), Criminal Code; one count, dangerous operation of a motor vehicle causing bodily harm, Section 344, Criminal Code; one count, robbery, Section 344, Criminal Code; one count, fail to comply with probation order, Section 733.1(1); and two counts, weapon possession contrary to order, Section 117.01(3).

Rhubarb Juice Concentrate

Ingredients:

10-12 cups chopped rhubarb
4 cups water
2 cups sugar
1 cup lemon juice

and bring to a boil for 2-3 minutes.

This can be cooled and frozen in ice cube trays then packaged in freezer bags.

If you wish to can this in pint jars, follow the canning instructions for either boiling water bath or pressure canning. Fill jars with hot juice. Wipe rims, place lids on and bands fingertip tight.

Boiling bath for 10 minutes after water comes back to boil, pressure canner is 5 minutes at 5 pounds pressure. Makes 4 pints.

Reconstitute 1 pint juice adding 2 pints water. Store in fridge. Or, 2 ice cubes of frozen juice in 8 oz. glass of water.

Directions:

Cook the rhubarb in the water for about 15 minutes after it comes to a boil. Place in cloth lined strainer and let drip for about 20 minutes. Squeeze the bag to get most of the juice. If you are not using red rhubarb, you can add about a cup of raspberries to the rhubarb when cooking it to give a pink colour.

Return the strained juice to a clean pot. Add the sugar and lemon juice
