## A Q and A with BHP and its Jansen Project

With significant amount of work and a tremendous amount of investment not only made to its Jansen project but to within Saskatchewan as well, a decision as to whether or not BHP's potential potash mine will move forward is expected to be announced soon.

Reaching out to BHP to see how things have been going so far in 2021, the importance of the project and the optimism moving forward, spokesperson Bronwyn Wilkinson graciously provided some of her time to answer a few questions.

The following are the questions and answers relating to BHP and its Jansen project near LeRoy:

### How are things currently going at the BHP Jansen project?

Work is continuing well at Jansen – we continue to install the final waterproof steel and concrete liners in the production and service shafts. The past 15 months have been a challenge operating with strict COVID-19

protocols in place and we are thankful to our employees and contractors for the excellent job they have done in implementing and adhering to these controls. The safety and well-being of our employees and contractors is a top priority for us.


### Are you optimistic about being able to move forward on the project?

This is a very large investment in a new commodity in BHP and so it is a very big decision for the company. We believe we have positioned Jansen well, but we are aware that it must compete for capital against other opportunities in our global organization.



### When do you anticipate you would know when you would receive the go ahead or not?

# RCMP Report

## Vandalism to building at Lanigan Sports Grounds

Humboldt/Lanigan RCMP are seeking the public's assistance in identifying individual(s) responsible for spray painting graffiti on a building at the Lanigan Sports Grounds.

On July 13, the Humboldt/Lanigan RCMP received a call that a building located at the Lanigan Sports Grounds was spray painted with graffiti between July 12 at 2 p.m. and July 13 at 11:30 a.m. Police continue to investigate.

## Charges for impaired driving laid in Simpson

On Sunday, June 20 RCMP responded to a call of a possible impaired driver in Simpson. An officer attended to Simpson and located the 21-year-old male suspect and his vehicle as it was parking at a residence. After conversing with the driver, the officer arrested the suspect and charged him with impaired driving. Two samples of breath were also obtained resulting in the additional charge of driving with a blood alcohol level greater than .08 when the samples taken showed blood alcohol levels of 240 mg and 230 mg.

## Motorcycle driver passes away after collision

A driver of a motorcycle that crashed south of Watrous on Hwy. 2 passed away from injuries received from the incident. On June 22 at 2:40 p.m., Watrous RCMP received a call of a crash near town. The motorcycle and rider were located in the east ditch just south of the Manitou Mainline Chrysler dealership. The motorcycle operator

who was also the only rider was transported to Watrous hospital and then taken by STARS to Saskatoon.

## Multiple vehicle accident at Manitou Beach

On July 8, RCMP responded to a three vehicle accident on Hwy. 365, just south of The Drive-In at Manitou Beach. The investigation and witness statements showed that a van was travelling through a construction zone after being flagged in and was following a Department of Highways road sweeper. The van entered a cloud of dust kicked up by the sweeper which resulted in zero visibility for the driver. The van struck the back of the Department of Highways tractor and in turn, the van was struck by a SUV that had been following along when the driver of the SUV lost sight of the van. The driver of the van was taken to hospital with minor injuries.

## Break, enter and theft in Watrous

On July 9, Watrous RCMP received a call of a break, enter and theft at a residence on the 300 block of 2nd Ave. E. in Watrous. The home owner reported they were out of the house between 11 a.m. and 12 p.m. the day before. When they arrived home they noticed that a bedroom window was open and a drawer in the house was left open. A screen was also removed from the back door.

In speaking with a neighbour, they were told the neighbour had witnessed a 12 to 13-year-old Caucasian male with mid-length brown hair wearing flip flops, a T-shirt and shorts exit the house carrying a grocery bag and running away down the avenue. The neighbour reported that the youth had previously come to their house knocking and saying he was looking for his dog.

Watrous RCMP are asking that if anyone saw this individual, know who they are or also had someone matching this description come to their house looking for a lost dog, they can contact the Watrous RCMP Detachment or Crime Stoppers.

## Fentanyl seized, officers assaulted

On July 5, 2021 at approximately 11 a.m., Saskatchewan RCMP Roving Traffic Unit officers stopped a vehicle on Hwy. 1 near Swift Current. Two occupants were in the vehicle.

During the traffic stop, the male driver refused to comply with the officers' demands. After a struggle, he was arrested. Two officers and the male were injured during this struggle. All received medical assessment.

The female passenger fled from the scene in the vehicle. Swift Current Police Dog Services and Saskatchewan Highway Patrol officers later located the vehicle near the City of Swift Current and arrested her. The female was then assessed by a drug recognition expert, as officers noted signs of potential impairment.

Swift Current Rural and Swift Current City RCMP officers also assisted with these incidents.

As a result of the investigation, 742 grams of fentanyl, a quantity of illicit tobacco products, as well as a small amount of cocaine were seized in relation to this incident.

The male driver, Riley Lepine from Calgary, Alta. has been charged with: one count, possession of Schedule I drug, Section 4(1), Controlled Drugs and Substances Act; one count, trafficking of Schedule I drug, Section 5(1), Controlled Drugs and Substances Act; one count, possession for the purpose of trafficking, Section 5(2), Controlled Drugs and Substances Act; two counts, assault police officer causing bodily harm, Section 270.01(2), Criminal Code; two counts, resist/obstruct peace officer, Section 129(a), Criminal Code; one count, possess unstamped tobacco, Section 32(1), Excise Act; one count, possess unmarked tobacco, Section 11(2), Tobacco Tax Act; and one count, import tobacco without paying deposit, Section 8(1), Tobacco Tax Act.

The female, Marian Sierra from Calgary, Alta. has been charged with: one count, possession of Schedule I drug, Section 4(1), Controlled Drugs and Substances Act; one count, trafficking of Schedule I drug, Section 5(1), Controlled Drugs and Substances Act; one count, possession for the purpose of trafficking, Section 5(2), Controlled Drugs and Substances Act; one count, resist/obstruct peace officer, Section 129(a), Criminal Code; one count, impaired operation of a motor vehicle, Section 320.14(1)(a), Criminal Code; one count, possess unstamped tobacco, Section 32(1), Excise Act; one count, possess unmarked tobacco, Section 11(2), Tobacco Tax Act; and one count, import tobacco without paying deposit, Section 8(1), Tobacco Tax Act.

They appeared in court on July 7, 2021.

## RCMP investigating suspicious fire

On July 8, 2021 at approximately 12:55 p.m. Blaine Lake RCMP was called to a structure fire at a church on Petrofka Road.

It is believed the fire had been burning for some time before police were called. Upon arrival, the church had already been destroyed by fire. Officers confirmed the church was no longer in use prior to the fire and no one was injured by the fire.

Blaine Lake RCMP and Saskatchewan Public Safety Agency fire investigators are investigating. The cause of the fire has not yet been determined, but initial investigation has determined that it is suspicious in nature.

## Vehicle seized after speeding ticket issued

Saskatoon Police have charged a 16-year-old male for driving in excess of 100 km/h over the posted speed limit.

At approximately 10:30 p.m. July 9, 2021, an SPS traffic unit clocked a vehicle at a speed of 192 km/h in a 90 km/h speed zone on Hwy. 16 just west of Zimmerman Road. The driver was issued a \$1,380 ticket and his vehicle was impounded for seven days.

# Fun Run ready to roll for 30th year

Marking three decades of vintage vehicles, unique cars and custom trucks, organizers of this year's Watrous and Manitou Beach Fun Run Auto Show 'N' Shine are excited to see vehicles return to Watrous after not being able to line them up along Main Street in 2020.

While the Fun Run was able to have vehicles drive along Main Street in Watrous before heading off to other communities this past year, with COVID restrictions being lifted earlier this month in the province, vehicles will now be able to park along Main Street July 24 and people can check them out.

Watrous and Manitou Beach Fun Run Chairperson Al Madland said since this is a big anniversary for the event and with its return to Main Street in Watrous, he is hoping for a really big show. "We are pretty excited this year for the 30th anniversary. We are trying to make it as large as ever. There will be lots of new entries this year because people stayed home over the winter and built up some vehicles that we haven't seen before. We are looking forward to having a bunch of people and vehicles back on Main Street again."

For vehicle enthusiasts wanting to participate in this year's show, Madland said whatever people think they would like to bring, he said they will be letting pretty much everything in the gate. "We already have had quite a few pre-register and the more we get, the merrier. If you pre-register then it gets you in the gate quicker because we can have your package ready to go and get you parked into position."


"With it being the 30th anniversary, we would love to get 300 vehicles here. Between motorcycles, cars, trucks, whatever people have to show, bring it and we will get it in."

As for the show itself, it fires up Saturday morning and Madland noted a group will be doing a pancake breakfast, another cooking burgers later in the day and an ice cream shop will be set up. There will also be some cotton candy for the kids and Beeper the Clown is coming as well.

"We are trying our best to make it work on short notice. This will be like a normal car show that we have conducted in previous years with no restrictions and it is looking like it is coming together really well. We are looking forward to seeing everyone again and want to make it fun for the family."

As people spend the day enjoying being outside and checking out some spectacular entries, as the show nears an end around 3 p.m., Madland said vehicles will form a line and drive past Manitou Lodge to show residents all of the vehicles. They will then venture to Manitou Beach to do a loop and that will wrap up the Fun Run.

"There is tons of interesting vehicles coming this year and in order to see them you have to be here. This will be one of the first large events in town since the pandemic started and restrictions lifted. In previous years it has been noted as the





## Solutions and Substitutions



— tips from Reena Nerbas

Dear Reena,

Can you please tell me the difference between sea and kosher salt? Several recipes call for kosher salt, but I never have any on hand. Thanks, Beth

Dear Beth,

The greatest difference is that kosher salt has larger crystals that take longer to dissolve. However, there is not much difference between kosher salt and rough sea salt, except that sea salt undergoes the least amount of processing. Substituting one for the other is no problem, the only difference is the measurement. Use one and a quarter teaspoons kosher salt

for every teaspoon of sea salt. Kosher salt is great for seasoning meat. Sea salt is very versatile and often the most expensive of the three types of salt. Another common salt is table salt which is finely and evenly shaped; it may contain anti-clumping agents such as calcium silicate. As the name implies, it is commonly placed on tables as a common seasoning for meals.

Hi Reena,

I have several gold picture frames in my living room that I would like to change to silver. They are not a solid gold colour and I would like the same effect in silver. Any help you can offer would be very much appreciated. Thanks in advance, Janice

Dear Janice,

The easiest and fastest options for painting frames is to spray paint them with a hammer finish. Read product labels to learn which paint works best for the frame material. It is important to hold the spray can 12 inches away from the frame while spraying, wisp the paint back and forth as you paint. Holding the paint to close will result in an uneven, drippy finish.

Dear Reena,

We recently moved into a new home. When I unpacked my silk flower collection, I was horrified to see that they are completely squished and wrinkled. How can I remove the wrinkles?

Dear Tracy,

Soak the flowers upside down in a bucket of warm sudsy wa-

ter for 15 minutes. Allow them to dry and reshape them when damp. Another option is to let the steam from a hot shower draw out the wrinkles or use a heat gun. However, a heat gun is less effective and more time consuming.

Dear Reena,

We have tried to clean stains from our ivory coloured carpet. It has left gray stains. They were feces and urine stains from a senior who was ill. Is there anything we can do other than replacing the bedroom carpet? Thanks, Helga

Dear Helga,

You may want to test a small area of carpet before applying the following recipe; however, I have had great results with this formula for removing stains as well as odours.

Step one: mix together half a teaspoon of clear dish soap and one cup of warm water. Blot (do not scrub) onto the stain and leave for five minutes. Pat area dry using a white towel. Step two: mix together one-half cup three percent hydrogen peroxide

and two tablespoons of household ammonia. Dip a white towel in solution and blot onto the stain. Cover the stain with clear plastic wrap and weigh down with heavy books. Make sure the books are not touching the carpet because if the book gets wet, the dye from the paper can seep onto the carpet. Leave for 12 hours. Step three: blot dry. Step four: blot with warm water and dry two to three times. Step five: air dry. Step six: when dry, blot with white vinegar and leave. The area should be a little wetter than damp, which means you may need to double the recipe if the stain is large.





You can pick up a soil testing bag by visiting your Ministry of Agriculture regional office, or sign up to receive your test by:

- Following the QR code at right;
- Calling SaskCanola at 306-975-0262;
- Contacting your local Saskatchewan Association of Rural Municipalities Plant Health Officer or RM office;
- Calling the Agriculture Knowledge Centre at 1-866-457-2377.



Soil testing is easy. Once you have the bag, collect soil from your field and submit it for testing. SaskCanola will cover the \$100 cost of this test.

(from front page: **BHP**)**If the project does receive the green light, what is next for BHP Jansen?**

We expect the shafts to be completed next year. While we continue that work, we are focused on taking the project to the Board of BHP for a sanction decision. Should the project be approved, it would move into

construction of the surface and other facilities. We would expect construction to take five to six years.

**There has been some speculation mentioned that Nutrien and BHP could be looking at a potential partnership. Is that something that could take place?**

As a rule we don't comment on speculation, so there's really nothing for

us to say on that. We have previously said we are open to considering partnerships, but that Jansen does not need a partnership to go ahead.

**Over the years BHP has invested significantly in the Jansen project and in surrounding communities. How much has been invested in the project and in communities both near and far from the project?**

We've invested just over \$4.5 billion (USD) in Jansen. If the project is approved, we expect the go-forward capital to be between \$5.3 and \$5.7 billion (USD).

Since we established our

office in Saskatoon, we have spent approximately \$25 million (CAD) on community investments. That's before we have produced any potash or earned any revenues. Wherever we are, we believe we are successful when we work in partnership with local communities and Indigenous Peoples, and we want them to feel they are better off with our presence.

**How important do you believe the Jansen project is for the company and the area?**

Major projects like Jansen can significantly support the province's Growth Plan. They

are the fuel that can help get the engine of the economy running again following COVID-19. Should Jansen go ahead, it favourably impacts most of the elements of the province's Growth Plan targets, including increasing the province's competitiveness, drawing and keeping talent, and Indigenous participation in the economy.

Our local procurement strategy and Indigenous Agreements with six First Nations around the Jansen project prioritize training, small business development, local hire and local

procurement.

**Inclusion and Diversity** - BHP has committed to gender balance at all levels of the organization, but also works actively to foster all levels of inclusion and diversity.

For BHP, Jansen is an opportunity to enter future facing commodity which has supply-demand characteristics linked to global trends of population growth and changing diets, as well as pressure on land use.

Jansen would also be a mine of the future with enhanced energy efficiency, innovation and technology.

The other day, Justin Trudeau was talking about the "toxic," "partisan" and "unproductive" nature of politics. I'm not sure how he would know, since he spent little time in Parliament during the pandemic, but his comments don't line up with what I saw in the most recent session of Parliament. Although I'm sure the Liberals didn't like it, there were numerous examples in this minority Parliament of the opposition parties passing legislation for the benefit of Canada.

Conservative MP Phillip Lawrence introduced a bill to remove the carbon tax from farm fuel purchases, which was passed with cooperation from other opposition parties.

All parties in Parliament, except the Liberal cabinet, passed a Conservative motion to condemn the Chinese genocide of the Uyghur people.

The Conservatives and NDP cooperated to pass a bill banning the export of non-recyclable plastic waste to Third World countries.

Conservative MP Matt Jeneroux introduced a bill to double compassionate bereavement leave for workers in federally regulated sectors who have lost a loved one. It passed unanimously.

The House also passed unanimously Conservative MP Len Webber's bill to allow people to register as organ donors on their tax returns.

Finally, Conservative MP Larry Maguire introduced a bill that would reduce financial burdens of farm families to transfer their business to a family member. It would amend the Income Tax Act to make the tax charged on the sale of one of those businesses to a family member equal to what it would be charged if sold to a non-family member, which has a lower tax rate. In this case, we not only got all the other Opposition members to vote for it, but we even got a few Liberals to break ranks.

Far from being "toxic" and "unproductive," this session of Parliament saw MPs from different parties working cooperatively together with the Conservatives taking the lead. We almost had a better track record at getting bills passed this session than the Liberals!

And that's likely what lies at the heart of Trudeau's insults. Parliament didn't always do what he wanted. Parliament didn't always jump when he snapped his fingers. No doubt this was frustrating for him, so while he found the environment toxic, many other Canadians did not.

At the bottom of it all, Trudeau's words are just propaganda. He's trying to set up an excuse to call an election. He's trying to make it sound as though Parliament is hopelessly unproductive and needs a reset. But, as usual with Justin Trudeau, facts and reality don't match his words.

## Crops rapidly advancing

The extremely hot and dry weather and minimal rainfall continues to cause crops to rapidly advance through their developmental stages. That is according to the Ministry of Agriculture's weekly Crop Report for the period of July 6 to 12.

Currently, 36 percent of fall cereals, 29 percent of spring cereals, 25 percent of oilseed crops and 30 percent of pulse crops are ahead of their normal stages of development for this time of year. The majority of crops are in poor to good condition.

The prolonged period of heat, coupled with the extremely dry conditions of the topsoil, has caused crops to be short, thin and rapidly advancing in many regions of the province due to the stress. Without a significant rainfall, many crops throughout the province will have their yields and quality severely impacted.

The topsoil moisture levels across the province also continue to decrease. Cropland topsoil moisture is rated as 14 percent adequate, 41 percent short and 45 percent very poor. Hay and pasture land is rated as nine percent adequate, 36 percent short and 55 percent very short.

Rainfall ranged from nil to 64 mm in the Foam Lake area. Scattered thunderstorms across the province provided a range of precipitation with some areas receiving more than others. The Odessa, Mossbank and Humboldt areas received 32 mm,

the Radville and Rockglen areas 29 mm and the Avonlea area received 22 mm.

The rainfall did little to delay producers from their haying operations. Livestock producers now have 26 percent of the hay crop cut while 39 percent has been baled or put into silage. Hay quality is rated as four percent excellent, 48 percent good, 33 percent fair and 15 percent poor.

In response to the feed shortage this year, Saskatchewan Crop Insurance Corporation is doubling the Low Yield Appraisal threshold values for customers who salvage their cereal or pulse crops as feed, without negatively impacting future individual coverage. Customers are asked to contact their local SCIC office before they graze, bale or silage any damaged crops to discuss their options.

Additionally, the Government of Saskatchewan is making changes to temporarily increase the maximum funding a livestock producer can receive from the Farm and Ranch Water Infrastructure Program (FRWIP) for dugouts, wells and pipelines for agricultural use. This change will be in effect for the Apr. 1, 2021 to Mar. 31, 2022 time period. The maximum rebate for livestock producers during this time period will increase from \$50,000 to \$150,000. The first \$50,000 will be based on a 50-50 cost-share and the remaining \$100,000 will be on a 70-30 government-producer cost-share. Producers can contact the Agriculture Knowledge Centre at 1-866-457-2377 for more information.

The Ministry of Highways would like to remind producers that grass is available, at no cost, for haying in highway ditches and rights of way. Since July 8, producers have been able to harvest any unclaimed hay without seeking permission of the adjacent landowner.

In the southern and central regions, hay in the ditches along secondary and rural highways is available on a first-come basis. Bales must be removed before Aug. 15.

In the northern grain belt, contractors started mowing ditches and rights of way on July 15. For more details, check out [saskatchewan.ca](http://saskatchewan.ca) or contact the Ministry of Highways district office in your area.

Crop and hay land damage was caused by the extremely dry soil conditions, hot temperatures, hot dry winds, grasshoppers and severe hail storms that swept through many parts of the province.

The Ministry of Agriculture would like to remind producers the Farm Stress Line is available for support if you need it. The Farm Stress Line is a confidential service, available 24-hours-a-day, seven-days-a-week, toll-free at 1-800-667-4442. Calls are answered by Mobile Crisis Services Regina, a non-profit, community-based agency and there is no call display.
