Budget approved for Lanigan with notable projects slated for 2022

Aiming to navigate through the pandemic and hoping to see things return to a more normal in 2022, with a few larger items including planning access roads to the new school, a residential development incentive program and an update regarding the water park, Lanigan Town Council approved its budget.

When it came time to compile this year's budget, Lanigan CAO Kelli Timmerman explained that the base tax increased by \$25 for each property in the community, as well as an increase of 1.25 to the mill rate, which will together generate an additional \$120,000 in funding for the Town of Lanigan to utilize. "Overall our taxes generate approximately \$1.1 million and with the increase, it will help cover expenses."

Budget operations

With about 40 percent of the budget allocated to operations, Timmerman shared a large portion of those funds are spent on repairs, road maintenance, infrastructure and equipment, administration, planning and development, bylaws, waste collection, emergency services, and general upkeep and upgrades.

As for the water/sewer rates in Lanigan, Timmerman said billing generates about \$800,000 which goes toward the operations of water/sewer to run efficiently and effectively.

Expenditure projects of note

On the expenditure side for 2022, Timmerman shared a few noteworthy items:

- Planning of two access roads for the new school is contained in the 2022 budget and both have received names as part of that project. "We are planning in preparation of seeing the two access roads built. One will be called Lazer Way which will be the west access road to the new facility and the other will be called Dvernichuk Road which will be the south access. We are looking forward to planning the work with construction likely to come next year when the school construction is scheduled to start. We felt Lazer Way and Dvernichuk Road were perfectly suited as the names for those access roads."

- While there is no paving projects slated for 2022, more funds will be used for road damage prevention with crack sealing and micro sealing. A sidewalk/paving condition assessment will also be undertaken this year to allow for

proper planning in the future.

- A new subdivision lot promotion has been created where the Town of Lanigan is marketing any lot in the new subdivision for \$30,000. “It will be on a first come, first choice basis and we will be offering the opportunity for a limited time.”
- A residential development incentive program is also being launched which will involve multi-year tax concessions. “We want to attract new residents to our community and felt that by offering a new subdivision lot promotion and a residential development incentive program, that those initiatives could generate some interest to move to our beautiful town.”
- With work already started, a festive street lighting program will be completed and solar LED lights are being placed along a pathway between the Lanigan Hospital and the Lanigan Golf and Country Club.
- Equipment upgrades have been added to the budget which will see a mini loader and mower with attachments purchased while other equipment will be traded in.

- Office computers, equipment and network/Internet upgrades will be done at the Town of Lanigan office. “We are hoping to introduce online payment options and offer credit card payments at the office to make it easier for our residents to pay their bills.”
 - At the Lanigan Arena, the rink score clock will be replaced and a new one installed.
- Lanigan and District Water Park project**
- While not part of the budget, the Town of Lanigan has been heavily involved with the Lanigan and District Water Park which is moving closer to completion. On behalf of the committee involved with the water park, Timmerman said the tendering process has been completed and Western Recreation & Development Inc. has been awarded the pool scope while Miners Construction Company Ltd. has been awarded the facility/site scope.
- “Both contractors will work closely with BCL Engineering Ltd. who is leading the project. Construction is set to begin this month and will commence with a ground-breaking ceremony at the water park site on June 23 at 5 p.m.”

Due to a sharp increase in construction costs over this past year, Timmerman explained the project has now surpassed the funds budgeted and amount of money already raised. “The Lanigan & District Water Park Committee understands that the financial need seems unending, but we must continue fundraising to accomplish our objective.”

Some initiatives to save on costs have already been implemented according to Timmerman, which means the goal of seeing the local water park open for use next summer remains; however, the installation of the waterslide will be postponed until funds for that part of the park have been raised.

“The committee has an action plan and will be holding events, raffles and other opportunities to donate generously. RCMP Report

Saskatchewan RCMP – Your Provincial Police Service - Weekly Report from May 30 to June 5 Investigative Recap

Saskatchewan RCMP officers issued over 2,000 roadside charges during Canada Road Safety Week May 17 to 23. Saskatchewan RCMP officers worked alongside municipal police partners and agencies as increased patrols and check stops were set up across the province, with enforcement focusing on impaired driving, distracted

driving, aggressive driving, and seat belt enforcement just to name a few. During the week, Saskatchewan RCMP officers made contact with 3,889 drivers and over 2,000 charges were laid, some of which included: 37 charges laid in respect to alcohol impairment; one charge laid in respect to drug impairment; 1,225 charges laid in respect to speeding/aggressive driving; 94 charges laid in respect to distracted driving, including use of electronic devices; and 64 charges laid for seatbelt

violations. In addition to the above charges, 2,500 warnings were issued.

May 30: At approximately 3 p.m., Broadview RCMP located a male wanted on warrant in relation to a May 22, 2022 firearms discharge incident on Cowessess First Nation. No injuries were reported during the incident. The male ran from officers into the bush. RCMP officers from the Broadview, Melville, Esterhazy areas, as well as Yorkton Police Dog Services searched for the male, who was later located hiding in a clothes dryer in the basement of a residence on Cowessess

First Nation. Andy Tanner of Cowessess First Nation was arrested on the warrant and also charged with two counts, possession of a weapon for a dangerous purpose, Section 88(2), Criminal Code.

May 31: Dillon RCMP received a report of shots fired at a residence on Buffalo River Dene Nation. Officers attended and located evidence of the residence being shot at. It was determined one bullet entered the residence. No injuries were reported.

Two vehicles – a black SUV and a gold car – were determined to be associated in the incident. RCMP officers conducted patrols in St. Georges Hill, Michel Village and Buffalo River Dene Nation. The SUV was located stuck and abandoned on a rural road in the Buffalo River Dene Nation area. The car was located unoccupied at a residence in the same community. A female was arrested outside this residence without incident. Two males exited a shed on the property and were arrested without

incident. One of the males, Ashton Piche from Dillon was determined to have an outstanding warrant out of Dillon for aggravated assault.

As a result of continued investigation, Rory Bhyette from Dillon and Jim Lakato from Saskatoon are charged with: one count, discharge firearm with intent, Section 244, Criminal Code; one count, unauthorized possession of a firearm/restricted weapon, Section 91(3), Criminal Code; and one count, mischief under \$5,000 Section 430(4) of the Criminal Code.

June 2: Around 6:20 a.m., La Ronge RCMP responded to a report of a vehicle driving erratically on the Far Reserve of the Lac La Ronge Indian Band. Officers located the vehicle and activated their emergency equipment and attempted a traffic stop. The vehicle did not stop. Officers then located it and attempted another traffic stop, but the vehicle backed up and collided with a police vehicle before driving away.

The vehicle was later stopped on Hwy. 2, after colliding with two additional police vehicles. The female youth driver, who can't be named as per the Youth Criminal Justice Act, was arrested and charged with: three counts, assaulting a police officer with a weapon, Sec 270.01(1), Criminal Code; one count, dangerous operation of a motor vehicle, Sec. 320.13(1), Criminal Code; one count, flight from a police officer, Section 320.17, Criminal Code; and one count, fail to stop after accident, Section 320.16(1), Criminal Code.

June 2: shortly before 2 p.m. Pinehouse RCMP received a report of a single motorcycle collision approximately 20 minutes south of Pinehouse on Hwy. 914. The lone, adult male driver of the motorcycle, from Ontario, was transported to hospital where he passed away. Investigation into the incident is ongoing. Alcohol is not considered a factor.

June 5: At approximately 2:50 p.m., Prince Albert RCMP received a report of a collision on Hwy. 2, just south of Prince Albert. Investigation has determined a pick-up truck and a motorcycle collided. The motorcycle driver was taken to hospital with serious injuries. The pick-up driver was not injured. The investigation continues.

Solutions and Substitutions



— tips from Reena Nerbas

Dear Reena,

Love your solutions as so many work so well and are easy to put together. Do you have a wonder solution to control spiders and hence webs on the exterior of a house or cottage? Thanks, George

Dear George,

Spiders are a huge gift to our world, as they eat bugs and reduce the population of insects. If you choose the option of reducing spiders around your home, there are several powerful commercial spider repellents available at Home Hardware stores and online. Pest control companies also offer a service to spray the outside of homes to repel spiders. Often only one application is needed per year. Without resorting to commercial products or changing the material on the exterior of your home, it is impossible to prevent spiders from forming webs on house exteriors.

On another note you can reduce the spider population inside your home with the following homemade spider repellent. Into a spray bottle, pour four cups water, one tea-spoon dish soap and eight drops of peppermint essential oil. Spray wherever spiders appear. Repeat as needed. Substitutes for peppermint essential oil include: lavender, tea tree oil, cinnamon, orange and lemon essential oil. To keep big hairy spiders out of your house, take horse chestnuts, pierce them with a needle or awl and put them in the corners and under the furniture in each room. They do not deter little spiders, just the large ones!

Dear Reena,

I own a wheat-filled heating pad which was scorched in a new microwave (obviously quicker heating time). It now smells just when sitting and more so when reheated. The fabric (material unknown) is also discoloured. My questions are: if I handwash this small item (approx. 2”x 7” for wrist and ankles), will it remove the smell from the mate-

rial/seed and clean the brown spot on the cloth? How will I know when it is thoroughly dry; just wait for three days or something? Will the wheat mold even if it has been thoroughly dried? If I reheat before completely dry, will the wheat be compromised? Looking forward to your reply!

Dear Marie,

Use caution when resorting to wheat bags. There have been numerous recorded incidents of bags becoming too hot, smouldering and starting on fire after microwave heating. If the bag is damaged in any way, your safest bet is to toss it out.

Feedback from readers

Re: butter stored in fridge is too hard for spreading onto grilled cheese sandwiches.

Hi Reena,

If you own a microwave, you can soften a bit of butter with intermittent short “zaps”. Otherwise, put a bit of butter on the pan/grill, melt and spread to evenly coat surface of pan, then put down one slice of bread. Put cheese on top of bread. When cheese starts to melt and/or when bread starts to toast on bottom, remove bread and set aside. Melt another bit of butter in pan/grill and place second slice of bread in the melted butter. Assemble sandwich and continue grilling. This method is a bit more fiddly but perfect for someone who really wants to use butter and does not have a microwave. Linda

Dear Reena,

Here is what I do to “nutritionize” grilled cheese: in the summer especially, take a lot of lettuce from the garden and stuff it into the sandwich as soon as it is off the griddle. The lettuce stays surprisingly crunchy. Take a handful of kale, chop it coarsely and place it on one buttered slice of bread and top it with the cheese. Then add the other slice. Melt a bit of butter on the griddle to cook one side, flip the sandwich and add a bit more butter if necessary. Very chewy and delicious. Maureen

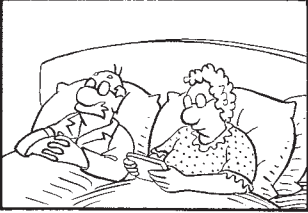
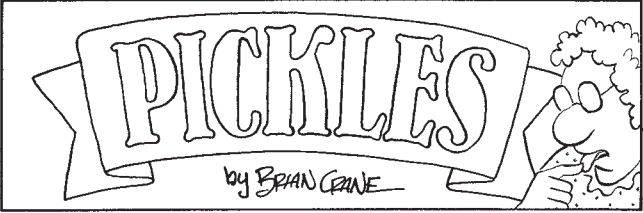

Noodles with Cottage Cheese

Local athletes reach podium at provincial track and field championships

It was a tremendous weekend for a number of local high school athletes including five competitors who placed in the top three as they competed at the SHSAA Provincial Track Championships in Regina.

Not only did 15 Horizon Central Athletic Association (HCAA) athletes win individual medals with three of those gold, but HCAA finished fifth out of 14 districts.

Horizon School Division Administrator of Student Activities Brian Grest said the most impressive part about the fifth place finish is that HCAA scored the most points per 1,000 students, “a very strong showing for a collective of mostly small schools.”

Two HCAA relay teams also captured medals while four others placed in the top eight.

As for the local individual performances from Horizon School Division and Prairie Spirit School Division that found the podium, Jemar Brockman representing Watrous was

named provincial champion in junior boys triple jump. In a field with 26 other competitors, Brockman had a leap of 12.91 m, beating the second place jump of 12.29 m.

Joining Brockman with a gold medal was Dayton Bunyan of LeRoy who was first in junior boys shot put. Also up against 26 others, Bunyan had a throw of 12.21 m which edged second place who had a toss of 12.02 m.

Allan’s Jackson Greenwald was named provincial champion in the intermediate boys discus throw for a toss of 38.00 m, beating second place who had a toss of 36.04 m.

Also reaching the podium was Imperial’s Jody Williams who collected a bronze medal for his effort in the junior boys discus. With 26 other athletes, Williams had a throw of 31.52 m. Second place had a toss of 32.75 m while first place registered a throw of 35.16 m.

And in intermediate boys, Will Breckner of Colonsay competed against 26 others in javelin and placed third with a throw of 42.23 m. Second place tossed 43.30 m

and first had a throw of 43.64 m.

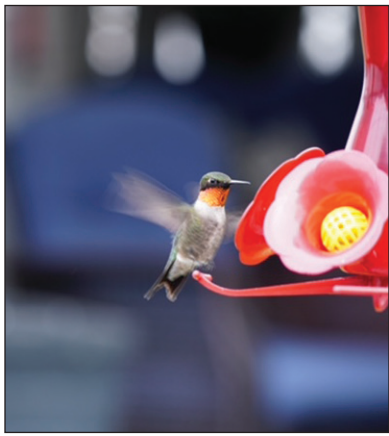

SHA approves budget

The Saskatchewan Health Authority’s (SHA) Board of Directors approved a \$4.6 billion operating budget for the 2022-’23 fiscal year on May 27 as well as a capital expenditure plan of more than \$138.7 million for 2022-’23.

“The SHA is committed to recovery from the COVID-19 pandemic. For the 2022-’23 fiscal year our focus will be to resume project work and re-establish the overall momentum on strategic initiatives,” said Arlene Wiks, Chairperson of the SHA Board. “It is critical our budget invests in key priorities that strengthen services for Saskatchewan residents and guide the advancement of essential health system priorities.”

The SHA and the Government of Saskatchewan stated they are committed to funding necessary health care services while expanding on key service areas impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic, to help get the health system back on track. Additionally, as part of the SHA budget plan, multi-year planning and budgeting

has been re-established to create opportunities for 2023-’24 projects and equipment acquisition which will enable efficiencies in delivery for the next fiscal year.

“Given the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic, we are eager to enhance accessibility and timeliness of key services for the residents of Saskatchewan through our Connected Care strategy and targeted initiatives,” said CEO Andrew Will. “These include enhanced access to vital core services like mental health and addictions supports, reducing surgical wait times and stabilizing rural and remote services, strengthening our ability to provide timely high quality care as close to home as possible.”

The SHA budget plan is prepared on a consolidated basis and consists of both the SHA operating budget and capital budget, as well as the 3sHealth operating budget and capital budget.

Funding highlights from the SHA’s operating budget include: \$21.6 million: increase surgical volumes; \$12.5 million: expand provincial intensive care unit (ICU) beds; \$10.8 million: stabilize Emergency Medical Services (EMS); \$7.2 million: stabilize rural emergency hubs

and physician coverage; \$7.0 million: enhance mental health and addictions programming; \$6.5 million: hire additional Continuing Care Aides in long-term care (LTC) and home care; \$4.8 million: enhance home care; \$4.5 million: address diagnostic imaging wait times; and \$3.0 million: increase high acuity unit positions in Regina.

Capital expenditures within the SHA 2022-’23 plan continue to target infrastructure, equipment and information technology investments from the previous year. These also include allocation of funding towards redeveloping Victoria Hospital in Prince Albert and building the new hospital in Weyburn, along with pre-construction planning for new and replacement long-term care facilities in Estevan, Grenfell, Regina, Watson and the Regional Health Centre in Yorkton.

“These strategic infrastructure investments, combined with targeted investments in key services, will allow us to address some of the local pressures on our health system and strengthen our overall ability to provide seamless care to Saskatchewan residents as close to home as possible,” Will said.

New provincial cabinet sworn in

Premier Scott Moe announced changes to the provincial cabinet May 31 with the new cabinet sworn in by Lieutenant Governor of Saskatchewan Russ Mirasty.

“Never before has Saskatchewan had such an opportunity at a global level to grow our exports, our industries and our economy,” Moe said. “Saskatchewan has among the most sustainable resources in the world, and this growth results in better services, programs and opportunities for Saskatchewan people.”

The size of cabinet remains

unchanged at 18, including the Premier.

Five MLAs remain in cabinet with new cabinet portfolios: Jim Reiter becomes Minister of Energy and Resources; Bronwyn Eyre becomes Saskatchewan’s first-ever female Minister of Justice and Attorney General; Gordon Wyant becomes Minister of Advanced Education; Gene Makowsky becomes Minister of Social Services; and Lori Carr becomes Minister of SaskBuilds and Procurement, Minister Responsible for the Public Service Commission, and Minister Responsible for Saskatchewan Liquor and Gaming Authority.

A new Sustainable Growth Secretariat will be established in Executive Council within the Premier’s oversight under his existing responsibility for Intergovernmental Affairs.

“Not only does Saskatchewan have the food, fuel and fertilizer the world needs but our province is also home to the helium, lithium, copper, zinc, and rare earth minerals that will only be in increasing global demand into the future,” Moe said.

Two MLAs are entering cabinet: Jeremy Cockrill becomes Minister of Highways, with responsibility for the Water Security Agency and Dana Skoropad becomes Minister of Environment.

In addition, Tim McLeod is appointed as the Provincial Secretary.

Ten other MLAs retain their current cabinet portfolios: Donna Harpauer remains Deputy Premier and Minister of Finance; Don Morgan

remains Minister of Crown Investments Corporation and becomes Minister responsible for all major crown corporations, including SaskEnergy, SGI, SaskPower, SaskTel, SaskGaming and SaskWater. Morgan remains Minister of Labour Relations and Workplace Safety and Minister Responsible for the Saskatchewan Workers’ Compensation Board; Dustin Duncan remains Minister of Education; Christine Tell remains Minister of Corrections, Policing and Public Safety; Jeremy Harrison remains Minister of Trade and Export Development and Minister of Immigration and Career Training, Minister Responsible for Innovation Saskatchewan and Minister Responsible for Tourism Saskatchewan; David Marit remains Minister of Agriculture and Minister Responsible for Saskatchewan Crop Insurance Corporation; Paul Merriman remains Minister of Health; Don

McMorris remains Minister of Government Relations, Minister Responsible for First Nations, Métis and Northern Affairs, and Minister Responsible for the Provincial Capital Commission; Laura Ross remains Minister of Parks, Culture and Sport, and Minister Responsible for the Status of Women; and Everett Hindley remains Minister of Mental Health and Addictions, Seniors and Rural and Remote Health.

The Premier also announced Legislative Secretary Appointments and Government House Leadership:

House Leadership: Jeremy Harrison will continue to serve as Government House Leader; Lori Carr will serve as Deputy Government House Leader; Greg Ottenbreit will continue to serve as Government Whip; and Alana Ross will serve as Government Deputy Whip.

Legislative Secretaries: MLA Lyle Stewart continues to serve as Legislative Secretary to the Premier Responsible for Provincial Autonomy; MLA David Buckingham continues to serve as Legislative Secretary to the Minister Responsible for SaskTel and SGI; MLA Doug Steele continues to serve as Legislative Secretary to the Minister Responsible for SaskPower and SaskEnergy; MLA Todd Goudy will serve as Legislative Secretary to the

Minister of Education; MLA Ken Francis will serve as Legislative Secretary to the Minister of Trade and Export Development; MLA Terry Dennis will serve as Legislative Secretary Responsible for Saskatchewan - Ukraine Relations; MLA Alana Ross will serve as Legislative Secretary Responsible for forestry to the Minister of Energy and Resources; MLA Daryl Harrison will serve as Legislative Secretary Responsible for value-added agriculture and livestock engagement to the Minister of Agriculture; MLA Jim Lemaigre will serve as Legislative Secretary Responsible for Mental Health and Addictions to the Minister of Mental Health and Addictions, Seniors and Rural and Remote Health; MLA Terry Jenson will serve as Legislative Secretary to the Minister of Social Services; and MLA Marvin Friesen will serve as Legislative Secretary to the Minister of Parks, Culture and Sport.

All legislative secretaries will receive \$3,000 in remuneration for their additional responsibilities, below the full remuneration amount designated for legislative secretaries.

As the Premier made the cabinet shuffle the NDP released a statement regarding the shuffle: “On the issues that matter most to the people of Saskatchewan – the affordability and cost-of-living crisis, health care capacity, cuts to education, investments in mental health – this cabinet shuffle indicates a status quo approach to addressing these very challenging issues. The Sask. Party had the opportunity to show that they have been listening to the concerns raised by families across this province and put in place ministers ready to do the work. Instead, they’ve maintained the very ministers who take their marching orders and continue to sit on their hands.”

Crop Report

Producers across the Saskatchewan grain belt took advantage of dry weather that allowed for substantial progress with their seeding operations. That is according to the Ministry of Agriculture's weekly Crop Report for May 31 to June 6 where 91 percent of the 2022 crop has been seeded to date across all regions of the province, up from 76 percent and just behind the five-year average of 97 percent. While seeding is being reported as 91 percent complete across the province, it is important to note that there are many acres in east Saskatchewan that may not be seeded this year due to excess moisture and standing

water. Some fields in the southwest and west central are being reseeded due to poor emergence and heavy insect damage. The southwest and west-central are virtually complete with 99 percent of their crop now seeded, 97 percent in the northwest, 92 percent in the northeast, 86 percent in the southeast and 77 percent in the east-central. It was a relatively dry week for most of the province; however, the southwest finally received some rain showers that were greatly appreciated and will hopefully improve their crop and pasture conditions. The Consul area received the most rain with 58 mm, the Maple Creek area 20 mm and the Shaunavon and Admiral areas 16 mm. More rain is desperately needed in the west-central and southwest regions. Cropland topsoil moisture is rated as six percent surplus, 56 percent adequate, 24 percent short and 14 percent very short. Hay and pasture land topsoil moisture is rated as three percent

surplus, 57 percent adequate, 27 percent short and 13 percent very short. Dry conditions in the west are severely deteriorating crops in those regions and moisture is needed soon for both crop and pasture land. Forty-five percent of the fall cereal crops are reported as being in the jointing stage and 19 percent are in the short blade stage, while 49 percent of the spring cereals are emerging and 20 percent are tillering. Thirty-eight percent of the canola is emerging and 15 percent is in the seedling stage, along with nine percent of flax being in the seedling stage. Forty-nine percent of pulse crops are emerging and 29 percent are in the vegetative stage. The majority of crop damage was due to strong winds, frost, drought, insects (including flea beetles, grasshoppers and cutworms); some farmers are reseeded due to flea beetle and cutworm damage.
