U of C leader scholarship awarded to LCHS student

Demonstrating leadership, excelling academically at school and interested in entrepreneurship, Lanigan Central High School Gr. 12 student Caleb Melin has not only been recognized for his hard work and dedication but was named a recipient for the Schulich Leader Scholarship through the University of Calgary.

Offered annually to undergraduate students entering an eligible STEM program at the U of C in non-engineering science, technology or mathematics, when Melin heard that he had received the \$80,000 scholarship (\$20,000 each year for four years), he was elated. “I received the call from the Registrar at the University of Calgary and was so happy and relieved when he told me that I was chosen to receive the scholarship.”

Being a recipient of the prestigious honour, Melin said it means all of his university expenses including room and board, books and living expenses are all covered. “It’s basically a full ride. I will also be mentored by campus leaders and top faculty members, and be able to participate in meetings with other Schulich leaders across Canada and the world.”

Planning on majoring in computer science because of his interest in technology, Melin feels there is huge potential for technological advancement across the globe and because of that, he is hoping to eventually get into the development of artificial intelligence.

While Caleb has a passion for technology and its advancements, including creating a website for his dad’s Merino Revolution Premium Apparel, he noted learning online for school during the pandemic was not quite the same as being able to be in the classroom. So when the covid restrictions were eased for his Gr. 12 year, Melin, like many other students, were eager to return to a more normal at school.

“The sense of community and ability to collaborate with peers on projects make learning so much more enjoyable.

Going back to normal school made events and learning much more fun and helped me realize the huge value of in-person connection. Now that everything is opened up again, our SLC (student leadership council) is able to plan awesome events for the school to partake in, such as an end-of-year trip to LeRoy Leisureland to conclude the school year with a blast. I am very glad our graduation this year can occur without any roadblocks due to covid, and I am excited for the future.”

That future definitely looks bright for Melin and after many hours of hard work and learning throughout his high school years, the student from Lanigan was quick to point out a few instrumental people who have been with him along the way. “My parents have been monumental in the pursuit of my goals, with their encouragement and great advice, always pushing me to try my hardest. I am very thankful to my career counsellor, Mrs. Baumann, for providing information about scholarships and help with my university application; my principal, Mr. Stroeder, for nominating me from our school; and my teachers, Mrs. Chernishenko and Mr. Chester, who wrote amazing reference letters for me. Without all of them, I would have never received this prestigious scholarship.”

Speaking on behalf of Lanigan Central High School, Principal Jeffrey Stroeder said the school is very honoured to have a student receive the prestigious Schulich Leader Scholarship. “Caleb is a true leader on our student leadership council and ensures students and staff are welcomed and feel comfortable at school. He is highly regarded by both peers and staff and I cannot think of a better candidate. Caleb will put to use this scholarship and do great things.”

With the opportunity to graduate with his peers before embarking on his next chapter in life, Melin is looking forward to what is to come. “This scholarship will greatly help my journey through university and I am looking forward to an amazing

Drake Minor Hockey Association recipient of \$10,000

When the puck drops on the upcoming hockey season, the Drake Minor Hockey Association will be receiving a big assist from a program initiated by Kruger. Stick handling through hundreds of submitted written stories and short videos by hockey associations from across Canada, after the nominations were closed, Drake was selected as one of 15 to receive a \$10,000 Kruger Big Assist.

League representative for the Drake Minor Hockey Association, Brittany Smith, who submitted the nomination on behalf of Drake, was thrilled that the community was chosen. “I was so surprised to get the phone call! I was at a friend’s house and almost didn’t answer because I didn’t recognize the number and thought it was a spam call. But when I picked up and the lady asked me if I remembered applying for the Kruger Big Assist grant, it started to sink in that we were going to be a recipient of the grant money!”

Aiming to help families who need financial assistance with hockey registration fees and/or equipment, through its funding, Kruger stated it is committed to helping support Canadian hockey families and to keep kids on the ice, playing the game that they love.

After being informed Drake would be getting \$10,000, Smith hopes to use the grant money to try and encourage families who have never had the opportunity to have their kids participate within the sport to sign up. “Our plan is to cover the costs of registration, and hopefully get them set up with some equipment as well.”

Stumbling upon the application through social media, Smith read the criteria and thought Drake would be a great fit to receive the funding. “As a teacher at the school, and a community member active on many committees, I see firsthand how our population is changing and our enrolments in minor hockey are declining. After reading how one of the goals of the grant is to increase diversity in hockey, I thought this could be a great opportunity for us to help support families in getting their kids started up with registration fees and equipment.”

Compiling her submission on behalf of the Drake Minor Hockey Association and detailing why the community should be a recipient, once nominations closed, a judging process

took place and from all of the nominations received, Brittany’s was the only one from Saskatchewan selected for the \$10,000 Kruger Big Assist.

With the added funds for the minor hockey association in Drake and its families, Smith said the initiative from Kruger will be huge for the community. “Hockey is an expensive sport, especially when you factor in the registration, equipment, and gas to travel to games. If we can alleviate some of the cost, we are hoping that will encourage some new members to try it out without the stress of the cost. Drake is a small community, and hockey is the only team sport that we still have enough players for. Our rink is the hub of the community in the winter time, and members of the community come for a burger, piece of pie, some socializing and to watch a hockey game. It’s what we do! I just want to see more members of our community

coming out to the rink and enjoying the sense of community that happens there.”

While the next hockey season is not for a little while yet, Brittany encourages individuals who would be interested in applying for the grant funding to email: drakeminorhockey@gmail.com.

Investigative Recap

May 25: Prince Albert RCMP received several reports of a firearm discharge at a mobile home court just south of Prince Albert during the early evening. Investigation determined vehicles drove past a residence and an occupant or occupants discharged a firearm. A bullet went

through the residence’s wall. No one was injured. Officers continue to investigate.

May 26: At approximately 9:30 a.m., officers from Saskatchewan RCMP’s Roving Traffic Unit stopped a vehicle on Hwy. 7 near Kindersley. During a subsequent search, officers located and seized 36 grams of cocaine, 19 grams of ketamine, 13 grams of MDMA, three ounces of psilocybin, 50 tabs of LSD, 250 millilitres of GHB and 16

grams of methamphetamine.

Neil Perry and Haseeb Rizvi, both from Saskatoon, have both been charged with seven counts of possession of a controlled substance for the purpose of trafficking, Section 5(2), Controlled Drugs and Substances Act. They will make their first court appearances on July 19 in Kindersley Provincial Court at 10 a.m.

May 26: At approximately 6:05 p.m., Prince Albert RCMP received a report

of a robbery at a business just south of Prince Albert. Investigation determined a male armed with a knife approached two individuals and stole a sum of cash, then drove away. The individuals did not report any injuries. Officers located the vehicle near Red Wing a short time after and arrested two occupants. Franklin Mercredi from Prince Albert was arrested and charged

media release

Producers in the west are nearly wrapped up with seeding while many in the east are still behind due to rain delays and extremely wet fields. That is according to the Ministry of Agriculture’s weekly Crop Report for May 24 to 30. Currently, 76 percent of the crop acres in the province have been seeded, up from 52 percent but still well behind the five-year average of 93 percent. Producers in the southeast and east central regions have reported that many low laying areas will go unseeded this year due to standing water.

Ninety-seven percent of the crop is seeded in the southwest, 95 percent in the west-central, 93 percent in the northwest, 64 percent in the southeast, 60 percent in the northeast and 50 percent in the east-central region.

Provincially, 96 percent of lentils and chickpeas,

93 percent of field peas, 91 percent of durum, 79 percent of canary seed, 75 percent of spring wheat, 69 percent of barley, 66 percent of canola, 65 percent of flax and 51 percent of oats have been seeded to date.

A large weather system covered much of the eastern part of the province, resulting in significant amounts of rain for those regions. The Moosomin area received 92 mm, the Stoughton area 89 mm, the Bienfait area 65 mm and the Esterhazy area 42 mm. The west received some rain, but amounts were small, ranging from three mm to 12 mm.

Cropland topsoil moisture is rated as 16 percent surplus, 56 percent adequate, 19 percent short and nine percent very short. Hay and pasture land topsoil moisture is rated as seven percent surplus, 60 percent adequate, 19 percent short and 14 percent very short. Western regions are least favourable for moisture

Crop Report

while more favourable conditions are reported in the east.

Crop conditions range from good to fair across the province. Emergence has been reported to be slow in areas of the southwest and west-central where moisture is lacking. In the southeast and east-central; however, emergence has been slow due to cool weather and an overabundance of moisture. Most crop damage was from flooding, drought, flea beetles and gophers.

Now that seeding has wrapped up for many producers, they are busying spraying in-crop herbicides, assessing germination and emergence, scouting for early season pests and moving cattle to pasture.

Rhubarb Pudding

Ingredients:
¾ cup white sugar
½ cup milk
1 cup flour
2 tsp. baking powder
2 cups finely chopped fresh rhubarb

Directions:
Mix the above ingredients well and add the rhubarb. Pour into a greased baking dish, an 8 x 8 pan works well. I prefer a glass pan for this recipe. Mix the following topping and pour gently over the rhubarb cake mixture in the pan.
¾ cup brown sugar
1 tbsp. butter
1 cup boiling water

Greenwater RCMP seek public assistance locating a stolen vehicle. Unity RCMP investigating thefts of GPS and auto-steer equipment from tractors. On May 18, Unity RCMP received two reports of theft from motor vehicles – tractors that were temporarily parked in fields adjacent to Hwy. 14 in the RM of Buffalo. The tractors were broken into and the GPS and auto-steer mechanisms were reported stolen. As seeding is in full swing across the province, the RCMP is encouraging the public to report if they are a victim of similar crimes. Reporting crimes allows RCMP detachments to identify and monitor crime thefts and trends occurring in their area.

Thefts of campers reported to Saskatchewan RCMP. In Saskatchewan RCMP jurisdiction between January and May 25, 2022 eight campers were reported stolen to police. The campers were reported stolen from across the province. In May, two fifth wheel camper thefts were reported stolen to Watrous RCMP. This theft investigation is ongoing. Given the springtime weather, many people will be getting their campers out of storage. If your camper, utility trailer, flat deck trailer, snowmobile or ATV trailer is stolen, report it to police. Reporting crimes allows RCMP detachments to identify and monitor crime thefts and trends occurring in their area.

Take the keys or potentially lose the vehicle. With spring seeding underway, the Saskatchewan RCMP is reminding farmers about the potential for vehicle theft. Even on a rural road far from town, the potential still exists for a vehicle to be stolen. If you leave a personal vehicle (pick-up, SUV, car, etc.) on an approach or in a field while you're on the tractor, make sure you lock your doors and remove all keys. While it might be handy to leave a set "just in case" someone you know needs to move the vehicle, it also can be handy for others passing by. Remember: thieves know where to look for "hidden" keys. The same principle applies to your tractor and other machinery – never leave keys nearby if you are not physically with the vehicle. Last year in Saskatchewan, at least 29 percent of stolen vehicles had keys inside. You can help prevent theft by taking all keys with you.

As of 2021, the plan has helped reduce emissions from venting and flaring by 60% compared to 2015 levels, an achievement well ahead of most other jurisdictions in North America.

After two decades of leadership in carbon dioxide capture, utilization, and storage (CCUS), Saskatchewan remains the best place in Canada to invest in CCUS technology and infrastructure.

In fact, Whitecap Resources Inc. expects to expand its Weyburn CO2 facility, already the largest of its kind in the world which uses CO2 captured from industrial facilities for enhanced oil recovery. CO2 capture significantly lowers GHG emissions from industrial facilities and when coupled with enhanced oil recovery, reduces emissions when compared to traditional oil production.



This year, the province is partnering with the Saskatchewan Research Council and the private sector to research the development of a hydrogen hub using CCUS.

Interest in extracting lithium from subsurface brine water continues to grow, and inroads are being made by companies into geothermal energy.

The future is bright for Saskatchewan as industry, supported by the provincial government, continues to make strategic investments into sustainable energy technologies.
