April weather packs an unexpected punch

Ever since spring arrived, the weather has been anything but predictable. Labelled as a strange spring so far by Services Meteorologist for Environment and Climate Change Canada Terri Lang, doses of snow, ample wind, sunshine and the occasional rain shower have all been included thus far.

Perhaps the largest surprise has not been within the local area but in the southeast corner of Saskatchewan where a pair of Colorado lows arrived consecutively before the end of April.

“We have had three big storms hitting southern Saskatchewan, the first in the southwest and two in the southeast. They certainly seem to be taking the lion’s share of the weather. We don’t often see the Colorado lows in succession. Those were the two that hit the southeast corner. Usually we have one good Colorado low every spring but two in a week is a bit much, especially when it hits the same area.”

Anticipating the first

Colorado low storm by closing highways around the Saskatchewan and Manitoba border and encouraging people to stock up on supplies, it was the second bout that really packed a punch. According to SaskPower, heading into the second last weekend of the month, high winds and heavy precipitation caused significant damage to its infrastructure. The damage impacted customers from as far as the southeast to the US-Manitoba border including as far north as Broadview. As of 7:30 a.m. Apr. 24, about 24,000 customers were without power.

Road conditions and high wind gusts slowed restoration efforts and additional SaskPower staff were brought in to assist with power restoration. “We’re also using helicopter patrols to assess the damage and required repairs.”

As of 9:30 p.m., Apr. 24 SaskPower noted crews made significant gains to restore power with about 12,000 customers seeing it return.

“We’ve brought in crews and workers from all around the southern part of the province, including from Regina, Saskatoon, Weyburn, North Battleford, Yorkton, Melville, and Swift Current.

In total, 35 crews made up of 182 technicians will be dispatched tomorrow (Apr. 25) to continue the repairs.”

Images on social media from the southeast part of the province showed snapped power poles and a lengthy line of vehicles waiting to proceed along Hwy. 1 near the Saskatchewan and Manitoba border.

The following day, SaskPower crews were able to restore power to a number of communities having nearly 4,000 customers restored with the remaining receiving their power by the evening Apr. 26.

“It has been a strange spring so far,” explained Lang. “We know it can snow even into May. We don’t like to see it but it is certainly not unusual. In the southeast corner, that is unusual.”

Lang added April has been colder than average across Saskatchewan while precipitation has been running relatively dry for much of the province with exception to the southeast. “It would be nice if it was distributed for everybody else because there are so many places crying for moisture.”

Closer to the local area, Lang noted a dry trend is forecast to continue adding for April, the region had 11.7

mm as of Apr. 25 with the average being 28.8 mm. “It has been running on the dry side for a while and you need moisture.”

While the area will take what it can get when it comes to moisture, Crops Extension Specialist Regional Services Branch, Ministry of Agriculture in Humboldt, Michael Brown said the

crazy weather has delayed seeding operations for a lot of producers. “Normally we’d see things starting to get going in that first week of May with some of the early pulses and cereals but as we move further to the northeast I could see it being pushed back to a mid-May start. This still gives producers time to get the crop in the ground

before the SCIC insurance deadlines.”

As for topsoil moisture levels, Brown figured there was enough over winter that it should be okay for seeding. “With the snowpack we had this winter and some of the recent heavy, wet snow there should be good moisture in the seedbed for germination. (see back page: **WEATHER**)

Sask. expands COVID-19 booster eligibility

Saskatchewan has expanded the eligibility for fourth doses (second booster) of COVID-19 vaccinations to all residents aged 50 and older effective immediately. The fourth dose is recommended four months or longer after having received the third dose.

Previously, the fourth dose was limited to individuals over 70 or those 50 years and older living in First Nations and Métis communities or in the Northern Saskatchewan

Administration District.

This is in addition to all residents of long-term and personal care homes and those with designated health conditions who have been eligible for fourth doses since February.

Immunity is shown to wane over time and the provision of booster doses is demonstrated to provide significantly increased protection against serious illness, hospitalization and death.

COVID-19 vaccination appointments are available through the Saskatchewan Health Authority (SHA),

Indigenous Services Canada, the Northern Inter-tribal Health Authority and at participating pharmacies throughout the province.

To book a COVID-19 immunization, visit [Saskatchewan.ca/covid-19](https://saskatchewan.ca/covid-19) or by telephone at 1-833-SaskVax (727-5829).

All Saskatchewan residents age five and older are eligible to be fully vaccinated and residents age 12 and older are eligible for a third dose (first booster) four months following their second dose. Drugs seized in Yorkton

Yorkton Municipal General Investigation Services (GIS) together with Yorkton RCMP Detachment and Yorkton Provincial GIS, executed a search warrant on the 200 block of Dracup Avenue in Yorkton on Apr. 20 in relation to an ongoing investigation.

Almost 200 pieces of a substance believed to be cocaine and a quantity of cash were seized from the residence. Three adults were arrested at the residence.

Hi Reena,

Do you have any suggestions for removing water stains on a stipple ceiling without making it too noticeable? With all the snow this year, melting and freezing it has found a weak spot and moisture is coming into the ceiling. Any suggestions would be greatly appreciated. Many thanks, Evangeline

Dear Evangeline,

Begin by determining if the stipple has previously been painted. If the stipple was painted with an oil-based paint, paint over the oil with latex or oil. If the ceiling was never painted, spray it with the following all-purpose cleaner recipe: two cups rubbing alcohol, half a cup household ammonia, one teaspoon Dawn dish soap and enough water to fill the bottle. Spray, wipe and rinse (taken from Household Solutions 2 with Kitchen Secrets). If the stain remains, hide it by using shellac before painting. The shellac will seal the stain and prevent the stain from bleeding through or paint with an oil-based stipple paint, to harden the surface making it easy to wipe. Keep in mind that once stipple is painted, it is extremely difficult to remove if you ever do decide to scrape it. Touching up stipple on ceilings can be difficult to colour match, often the entire surface must be repainted. Other options in touching up stipple are to sponge on colour-matched grout or Stipple Fix, which comes in a small container and is available at hardware stores.

A neglected spot while vacuuming is behind the door of the room you have just walked into! Irene

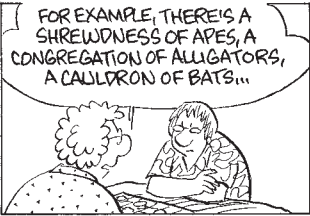
Re: vacuuming

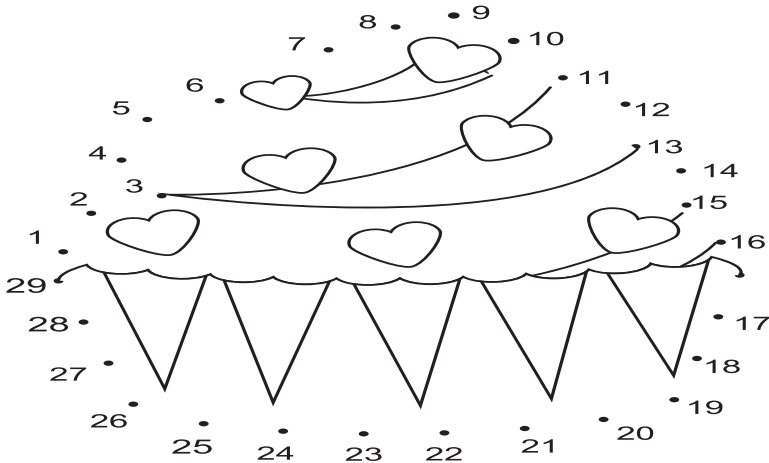

Cabbage Roll Soup

Ingredients:
1 tbsp. olive oil
1 pound ground beef
1 large onion, chopped (about 1 cup)
2 large carrots chopped (about 1 1/2 cups)
4 cups chopped cabbage
2 minced garlic cloves
4 cups beef broth
2 cans tomato sauce (8 oz. each)
2 cans diced tomatoes (about 3 to 4 cups)
1 tbsp. Worcestershire sauce
1 1/2 tsp. paprika (smoked tastes fabulous)
3/4 tsp. thyme
1 tsp. oregano
2 bay leaves
1 tbsp. parsley (or about 1/4 cup fresh parsley)
3/4 cup long grain white or brown rice
1 tbsp. lemon juice

Directions:
Scramble fry beef in olive oil until browned, adding salt and pepper to taste. Remove from pot, you may need to add a little more fat if you used lean beef. Add the onion and carrots to the pot, cook about three minutes, then add the garlic and cabbage and sauté for another three minutes. Pour in the remaining ingredients except rice and lemon juice and put the ground beef back in. Bring to a boil, then add the rice. Reduce heat and simmer until rice is done (25 minutes for white rice and about 35 minutes for brown). You will likely need to add another one to two cups of beef broth to thin the mixture to soup texture. Add the lemon juice and simmer a bit longer. I sometimes add about 1 tbsp. brown sugar at the end to mellow out the flavours.

U of S track and field athlete races to successful season

It has been quite the sprint to the finish for fourth year University of Saskatchewan track and field star Kendra Farmer. With local ties to the area, the granddaughter of Hope and John Skorlatowski of Lanigan has not only had a successful season but she helped her team win a fourth-straight Canada West Track and Field Championship and earned silver at nationals.

Right from the start of the year in January, Farmer has been on a mission. With a first place finish for the Huskie women's track and field team at Golden Bear Open in Edmonton, on an individual level, the sprinter finished first in the 300 m (moving to number eight Huskie all-time), 4 x 200 m, and 4 x 400 m, all with USPORTS standard.

Following the January event, in February, the Huskies men's and women's track and field teams including Farmer headed to the Panda Open in Edmonton where the women's 4 x 200 m team set a Panda Open meet record. Farmer also secured a gold medal in the 300 m.

After the Panda Open, Kendra and the team continued to build momentum through

February and into March as the Huskies women's track and field squad took aim at another podium finish, this time at the Canada West Championships.

In Winnipeg to compete at the Canada West Championship Mar. 18 and 19, there was no contest as the Huskies women's team continued its dynasty by running away with a banner with 178 points, 51.5 points more than second place Alberta.

As part of the meet, the Saskatchewan team of Kendra Farmer, Gracie Anderson, Ashlyn Mooney, and Paige Willems raced in 1:37.80, beating a Canada West record set by the Huskies in 2019-'20. The Huskies women's 4 x 400 m relay team also collected first place with a time of 3:45.31.

In addition to her success on the track, off of it, Farmer was named as the female Student-Athlete Community Service Award recipient for volunteering, coaching and organizing track clinics for non-profit organizations like the Saskatchewan Aboriginal Track & Field (SaskATF) and Running Wild Athletics Club in Saskatoon.

Following the Canada West Championships, the track and field Huskies women's team headed east

again, this time to Saint John, N.B. Mar. 31 to Apr. 2 where they captured a national silver medal at the 2022 USPORTS Track and Field Championships. Finishing in second with a score of 68, the team trailed only Guelph (112) and were ahead of Laval (61). In addition to capturing a silver, Farmer was also recognized with the national Student-Athlete Community Service Award.

The accolades and awards in 2022 were not the first of her track and field career as Farmer was previously named the Joanne McTaggart Huskies Track and Field Female Rookie of the Year and the Pat Lawson Huskies Female Rookie of the Year in 2017-'18. Prior to that she was named the Saskatchewan High Schools Athletic Association's Senior Girls Aggregate Point Champion in 2017 and the Centennial Collegiate Female Track MVP in 2015, 2016, and 2017.

Calling Saskatoon home, before the pandemic hit, Farmer also found success on the track in both 2018-'19 and in 2019-'20. In 2018-'19 Kendra was a Canada West Gold Medalist in the 4 x 200 m Relay, a Canada West Silver Medalist in the 4 x 400 m Relay, USPORTS Silver

Medalist in the 4 x 200 m Relay and USPORTS Silver Medalist in the 4 x 400 m Relay. In 2019-'20, Farmer continued to build on her success at the U of S which included being a Sanderson Classic Gold Medalist in the 4 x 200 m Relay, a Sanderson Classic Bronze Medalist in the 300

m, a Golden Bear Open Gold Medalist in the 4 x 400 m Relay, a Golden Bear Open Silver Medalist in the 300 m, and a Golden Bear Open Bronze Medalist in the 5.60 m.

Fast forward to 2022 and with first place at the Canada West Track and Field Championships, a

silver medal at nationals and being named the national USPORTS Student-Athlete Community Service Award recipient, Kendra remains focused on completing her degree in Chemical Engineering at the U of S and will be graduating with Great Distinction this spring.

New legislation to protect victims of human trafficking in effect

The Protection from Human Trafficking Act came into force on Apr. 20 to provide further safeguards for victims and survivors of human trafficking.

“Human trafficking is on the rise and continues to be under-reported in most jurisdictions,” Justice Minister and Attorney General Gordon Wyant said. “This legislation is intended to improve safety for survivors, while holding traffickers accountable for this horrific crime.”

The Act streamlines the process for victims to seek a protection order. It also adds new provisions for protection orders, including a provision that prohibits traffickers from contacting their victims in any way, directly or indirectly.

Victims can apply for a protection order on their own or be assisted by a shelter employee, a medical professional or another prescribed individual as defined in the Act.

Significant penalties are built into the legislation to discourage violations of these protection orders, including fines, driver's licence suspensions and jail time.

“This is a complex issue that requires interventions on many levels,” Wyant said. “While criminal charges will continue to be the first response to these terrible crimes, this offers community-based organizations and law enforcement another tool to assist victims of human trafficking in Saskatchewan.”

The legislation also enables victims to initiate a lawsuit against their traffickers and to seek financial compensation for harm suffered. Other measures include new provisions for law enforcement to seek search warrants for residences or vehicles to locate a victim and remove them from the premises for safety reasons.

This Act responds to the growing incidence of human trafficking throughout Canada and aligns with legislation implemented in Ontario, Manitoba and Alberta.

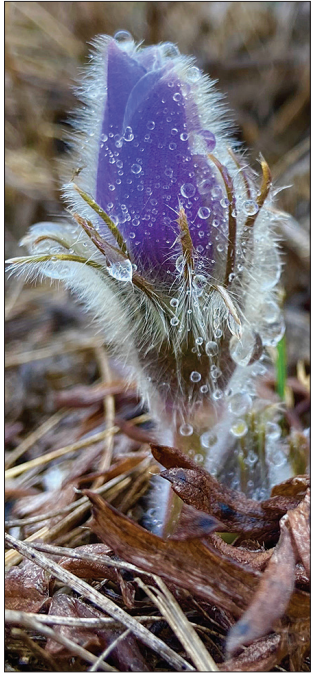

It can be tricky to gauge how much of that snowmelt actually makes it into the soil though. Unless your field is perfectly flat and soaks up the melt water evenly you're going to see runoff of some of that water to depressional areas and ditches, especially if the soil is still frozen." Despite recent weather containing heavy, wet snow, Brown said the subsoil moisture levels will still remain low but the extra snow will aid in delaying seeding for some producers. Banking on warmer

weather moving into May, as producers aim toward seeding, Brown encourages them to check soil temperatures and seeding depths for the crop they decide to go with. "Check out the article 'Soil Temperature and Seeding Depths' on our website under 'Sask Ag Now crops blog posts' for all the information on seeding depths and minimum soil temperatures for your crops." In addition to gearing up for the seeding season, Brown wanted to remind producers to keep farm safety at the forefront this spring. "We always think of physical health and wellbeing on the farm: watching out for power lines, climbing bins safely, PTO/ auger/heavy equipment safety etc. but be sure to be aware of your mental health safety as well. Don't hesitate to call the Farm Stress Line if you need to this spring. They are available 24/7, seven days a week and can be reached toll free at 1-800-667-4442." Trying to come to grips with a rather crazy April, as for what people throughout the province can expect weather wise for May, Lang said, expect the unexpected. "It was a relatively quiet



winter. We had a few blizzards here and there and then all of the sudden, boom! April hit and we got storms all over the place. If people think it has been on the cool side and a very temperamental spring, they are not wrong."



Snow storms and powerful winds mixed with a bit of sunshine and rain were all found during April. While temperatures were a little more like normal this past week, perhaps a sure sign that a change in the seasons arrived, or is at least near, is seeing crocuses. These resilient flowers (pictured) endured all of the elements this past month but despite it all, continued to push ahead.
