Grow Hope Saskatchewan provides emergency food assistance

Saskatchewan urban and rural communities come together to support people around the world who need emergency food assistance under one banner – Grow Hope Saskatchewan.

As Grow Hope Saskatchewan launches its sixth growing season, Rick Block, Regional Representative with Canadian Foodgrains Bank, says the initiative invites urban and rural dwellers to learn about farming and the collective responsibility to be good stewards of our resources – but there is a global impact too.

"Funds raised through the grain-growing project are used to support people around the world who need emergency food assistance, as well as improving long-term food security," Block said. "Grow Hope Saskatchewan is a tangible way for productive land in Saskatchewan to have a direct and positive impact for many around the world who do not have access to food, the 'bounty that comes from the land,' he said.

Michelle Hergott, a Grow Hope farmer near Bruno, Sask., says farmers have been gifted great abundance. Grow Hope Saskatchewan provides them an opportunity to share their passion.

"We are farmers and Grow Hope gives us the opportunity to help those in need while doing what we love to do," she said. "Do you also feel a call within your heart to help this great organization to feed the world?" she asked.

Like Hergott, Block invites urban and rural people in Saskatchewan to help feed the world. "Folks are invited to sponsor an acre for \$350, which can result in proceeds up to \$500 from the sale of that crop. This in turn may be matched

4:1 through the Canadian Foodgrains Bank's Partnership with Global Affairs Canada," said Block.

Throughout the year Grow Hope Saskatchewan offers multiple opportunities for community engagement including a field day, recipes connected to the grains grown and artwork inspired by the landscapes of Grow Hope fields.

About Grow Hope Saskatchewan

- Funds raised through Grow Hope Saskatchewan support people around the world with emergency food rations and long-term food security.

- In 2022, Grow Hope Saskatchewan had a record-breaking year, raising \$299,000 to end global hunger around the world.

- Grow Hope Saskatchewan has raised \$748,000 for the Canadian Foodgrains Bank since its inception in 2017 with the first crop planted in 2018. Leveraging matching grants from Global Affairs Canada received at the highest rate, the total contribution would be about \$3.74 million.

- At the launch of the 2023 growing season, there are 421 available donated acres to sponsor. Individual donations are welcome through the summer and there are several exciting

opportunities for corporate sponsorship.

- It costs as much as \$350 to sponsor an acre of land. This includes seed, fertilizer, fuel, and other inputs needed to grow a crop. Donors are able to sponsor partial acres, a full acre, or multiple acres.

- Grow Hope Saskatchewan started as a collaboration between Canadian Foodgrains Bank, MCC Saskatchewan, and the Roman Catholic Diocese of Saskatoon in the winter of 2017 to find creative ways to unite urban and rural communities in the effort to end global hunger.

RCMP Report

Stolen property

Saskatchewan RCMP received a report there was stolen property on a property in the Rural Municipality of Loon Lake Apr. 18. As a result of investigation, Saskatchewan RCMP's Meadow Lake Crime Reduction Team executed a search warrant at the property. Officers located and seized a green 2012 John Deere tractor, valued at an estimated \$120,000, that had been reported as stolen from Chauvin, Alta. in 2020.

Loon Lake RCMP continues to investigate and asks anyone with information to report it to their local police service. Information can also be submitted anonymously by contacting Saskatchewan Crime Stoppers at 1-800-222-TIPS (8477) or www.saskcrimestoppers.com.

Semi and bus collision

At approximately 7 p.m. Apr. 19, Indian Head RCMP received a report of a motor vehicle collision on Hwy. 1, near Sintaluta. Investigation determined a semi and a bus collided. The bus driver was taken to hospital with injuries described as serious. RCMP do not have an update on their condition.

Approximately 50 bus passengers, many of whom were teenagers, were taken to hospital for treatment of injuries described as non-life-threatening. The semi driver did not report any injuries to police.

Hwy. 1 was closed during initial investigation. Indian Head RCMP continue to investigate. No charges have been laid.

Officers respond to injured female

On Apr. 22 at approximately 4:30 a.m., Punnichy RCMP received a report of an injured female at a residence in Punnichy.

Officers immediately responded and located an injured female inside the residence. She later passed away. She has been identified as 31-year-old Kihaw Fox from Piapot First Nation. Her family has been notified and victim services offered to them.

Shortly after, Punnichy RCMP arrested an adult male on

George Gordon First Nation in connection to the female's death. No additional public safety risk was identified.

As a result of investigation by Punnichy RCMP and Saskatchewan RCMP Major Crimes, 28-year-old Ethan Sunshine from Regina is charged with: one count, second degree murder, Section 235, Criminal Code; one count, criminal negligence causing death, Section 220(a), Criminal Code; one count, reckless discharge of a firearm, Section 244.2(3), Criminal Code; one count, pointing a firearm, Section 87, Criminal Code; one count, unauthorized possession of firearm, Section 92, Criminal Code; and one count, unauthorized possession of a firearm in a motor vehicle, Section 94, Criminal Code.

Robbery and assault

At approximately 6:15 a.m. May 1, La Ronge Detachment RCMP received a report of a robbery and assault with a weapon in the La Ronge District area. Officers immediately responded. Investigation determined individuals approached a male, assaulted him and stole his vehicle. He reported minor injuries to police. La Ronge RCMP located four individuals in a vehicle outside of a nearby business. Three were arrested without incident. The fourth refused to exit the vehicle. A deployment of a police intervention tool, a conducted energy device, was required to bring him into custody without risk to himself, officers and the public.

Two additional individuals were taken into custody a short while later at a residence in the La Ronge District.

As a result of the investigation, La Ronge RCMP have charged 21-year-old Cordell McCallum of La Ronge District, 28-year-old Nap McCallum of Prince Albert and 24-year-old Dianne McCallum of Stanley Mission each with: one count, robbery, Section 344(1)(b) of the Criminal Code; one count,

assault with a weapon, Section 267(a) of the Criminal Code; one count, uttering threats, Section 264.1(1)(a) of the Criminal Code; two counts, possession of a weapon for a dangerous purpose, Section 88(1), Criminal Code; and one count, possession of property obtained by crime, Section 355(a) of the Criminal Code.

Cordell McCallum is also charged with one count, impaired operation of a motor vehicle, Section 320.14(1)(a), Criminal Code and one count, operation of a motor vehicle while over 80 mg, contrary to Section 320.14(1)(b), Criminal Code.

All three individuals have been remanded in custody and appeared in La Ronge Provincial Court on May 4, 2023.

The other three individuals that were taken into custody have been released without charge. The stolen vehicle was recovered.



Solutions and Substitutions



Dear Reena,

I collect coins and spoons and over the years they have tarnished. What is an easy way to clean them without damaging them? Maurice

Dear Maurice,

Just like the Statue of Liberty, pennies will turn green with too much exposure to oxygen. Here are a few techniques that will add shine to your coins. Into a cup or a bowl pour in half a cup lemon juice or white vinegar. Add two teaspoons salt. Drop the coins into the mixture. Wait five minutes and polish. The

drawback to this technique is that the coins may turn green if not dried well and the sparkle is short-lived. Brasso is a less risky option for cleaning coins. The least risky option is to use a rubber eraser to polish coins; however, this is quite a tedious process. After cleaning the coins, some people apply Turtle Wax to reduce tarnish, but take caution as this may look great, but lower the value of the coins. For silver spoons, place crumpled aluminum foil in a pan or plastic container. Dissolve one-quarter cup washing soda or salt in enough hot water to cover the spoons. Place spoons on foil and let stand for five minutes. Rinse and polish dry with a soft cloth.

Onion Roasted Potatoes

Ingredients:

- 1 pkg. onion soup mix
- 1/4 cup oil (canola or olive)
- 2 tbsp. melted butter
- 1 tsp. basil
- 1 tsp. oregano
- dash of pepper

About five to six medium potatoes, washed, peeled if you wish, and cubed (or about two to three cups of washed baby potatoes). In large bowl blend soup mix, oil, butter and herbs. Add dried potatoes and stir to coat. Pour in single layer in a greased baking pan. Bake at 400°F for about 45 minutes.

"I coach at a local club, as well as at the provincial level in Saskatchewan. And recently, Judo Canada generously offered me the chance to join the national team in a development capacity. I'm super motivated by each of these challenges," she said.

"I enjoy working with one athlete at a time and personalizing their development programs," she added. "I like to brainstorm with each athlete on how to best use their strengths, so that they can become the best judoka possible. I want to give them the opportunities they need to

I will always support women's judo in Canada. My mission won't change. I want [girls] to know that judo is a very realistic option for them," she concluded.


