Local food bank recipient of Kraft Heinz’s What’s For Dinner

The Lanigan and District Food Bank received a generous donation through a national program aimed at helping those in need. Through a partnership between Food Banks Canada and Kraft Heinz’s What’s For Dinner, from Oct. 2 to 29, for each participating product purchased, Kraft Heinz donated one meal to Food Banks Canada (up to a total of two million meals).

As part of that, food banks across the country benefitted from the program including the one in Lanigan. Kathy Williams with the Lanigan and District Food Bank said thanks to the program, a pallet of food products was delivered to the local centre at the beginning of November.

“We are extremely grateful to Kraft Heinz through this donation. We appreciate them helping us Kraft a better future! Their donation of two million meals for Food Banks Canada will go a long way towards helping food banks like the Lanigan and District Food Bank feed our neighbours in need.”

Food Banks Canada noted in March 2022 alone, there were almost 1.5 million visits made to food banks and in the past decade, Food Banks Canada has sourced and shared almost 1.4 billion pounds of food.

Pirates begin new season

With the start of November arriving and rinks ready to roll, the Lanigan Pirates visited the Wadena Wildcats to open the 2023-24 Long Lake Hockey League season before returning home for a couple of contests. With seven teams in the league this year, (Drake, Foam Lake, Lanigan, LeRoy, Wadena, Watrous and Wynyard) the Pirates took aim at a couple early season victories. While it would be Wadena scoring the lone goal in the opening period, in the middle stanza both clubs found the back of their respective nets. Following power play and even strength markers early in the second, Wadena built a 3-0 advantage before Lanigan replied even strength with 7:34 left. Scoring the club's first tally of the year, Josh Bly made it 3-1 with the assist going to Graham Gove. The Pirates were unable to collect another goal before the second period ended while the Wildcats netted one more to take a 4-1 lead into the third. In the final frame, Lanigan made it 4-2 as Levi Kleiboer beat netminder Carter Peterson less than two minutes into the third. However, that would be it for the Pirates while Wadena tallied three more times to skate away with a 7-2 victory. Lanigan returned home to host LeRoy Nov. 11 and while it was the Braves opening the scoring with a Jesse Shynkaruk marker, the Pirates collected the next three. Down 1-0 through one, in

the second, with 10:47 to play, Linden Schwab made it 1-1. Then just over two minutes later, Austin Calladine gave the home team its first lead of the night as Lanigan went up 2-1. Completing the scoring for the Pirates in period two was Nick Shumlanski as he pushed Lanigan ahead with 7:35 to go. Late in the frame, with 21 seconds to play, Tate Olson got LeRoy to within one and through 40 minutes it was 3-2 Lanigan. In the third period, LeRoy tallied less than two minutes into the stanza as Shynkaruk collected his second of the game. A goal by Neil Landry with 10:59 to go pushed the Braves ahead 4-3 and then the visitors added another before the midway mark of the period. Leading by two LeRoy tallied a fourth goal in the frame while Josh Bly countered with 2:39 to play for Lanigan but it would not be enough as the Braves defeated the Pirates 6-4. Shots were 36-30 in favour of the visitors. After the loss, Lanigan remained at home welcoming Foam Lake Nov. 15 and Wynyard Nov. 18 before heading back on the road to Watrous Nov. 21. Facing the Flyers Nov. 15, Lanigan looked to get on the board first but it would be the visitors tallying twice in period one as Foam Lake took a 2-0 advantage. In the second, Mitch Girolami scored from Jace Wildeman and Austin Calladine to cut the deficit in half. That would be it though as Lanigan was unable to tie the game while Foam Lake notched another in the third and skated away with a 3-1 victory. Shots through 60 minutes had the visitors with 38 and Lanigan with 36. Following a second consecutive Senior A provincial title, heading into a new season the Drake Canucks took aim at collecting a win as the club visited Watrous to take on the new look Winterhawks. With Watrous retooling its roster, adding speed, more skill and a bit of toughness, the Canucks looked to counter with some of the same. However, it would be Watrous that scored first with a short-handed marker. In the first period, captain of the Winterhawks, Woody Klassen was able to spot Gage Helm in front of the Drake net and the puck slid through netminder Calvin Bartel's legs with just enough momentum to cross the line. Up 1-0, Watrous continued to press but Bartel kept his team in the contest early on. At the other end, netminder Adam Dmyterko was also kept busy as he had to make a number of saves to keep the game at 1-0 through 20 minutes. In the second stanza, as teams began to get comfortable on the ice, the speed intensified and so did the scoring chances. With 13:25 on the scoreboard, Dylan Smith collected the home team's second marker of the contest as Andrew Johnston and Wyatt Johnson contributed with assists. While Drake tried to counter the attack with some scoring opportunities of its own, the Winterhawks made it a 3-0 lead as Austin Lamotte

Jansen Jets return to action

Following a pause from the Wheatland Hockey League, the Jansen Jets have fired back up in time for the 2023-'24 campaign. With a number of familiar faces returning from the previous roster, there are some new ones as well.

Playing out of the Nokomis Recreation Centre, the Jets opened the year Nov. 3 against St. Brieux/Lake Lenore Rivals. With Wade Morrow getting the nod in net, the team went to work. While the visitors nabbed the first marker less than five minutes into the opening period, the Jets replied with 13:26 on the clock as Zach Anderson tied things up at one. A few minutes later, Jansen took its first lead of the contest when Colton Blair tallied his first of the season giving the home crew a 2-1 lead.

Down 5-2 after 40 minutes, Jansen would surrender another tally with 4:59 to play before scoring a pair, one by Blair and another from Caleb Dolman. However that would not be enough as the Jets would lose 6-4. Blair finished the night with two goals and an assist while Anderson and Dolman each registered a goal and an assist.

Looking to hit the win column, Jansen headed to Hudson Bay Nov. 4 to meet the Hunters. Wanting to get off to a quick start, the Jets tallied four times in the first 20 minutes including a power play marker to kick things off. With goals from Zach Anderson (two), Colton Blair and Colby Muller, the team took a 4-0 advantage into the second. Picking up where they left off, the Jets added two more in period two, an even strength tally from Dallas Dufault and a power play marker by Colton Blair with 11:27 left.

Leading by six and keeping Hudson Bay off the score sheet, Jansen's Caleb Dolman opened the scoring in the third period with 19:27 remaining and then added another with 18:30 to go to make it 8-0. uncomplICAteD - A Cry for Help: The Silent Suffering of Felines in Crisis

In the quiet corners of the Canadian prairie, where winter's chill settles in and the landscape seems to hush, there is a growing crisis that demands our attention and compassion. It's a crisis that unfolds silently, yet its impact reverberates through the lives of countless feline souls — the lost, the abandoned, and the forgotten.

For over two decades, Randy and I have opened our hearts and our farm to cats in need. We have purchased sheds with windows and lined them with beds and wired them with electrical outlets for heaters and heat lamps during the freezing, stormy wintry days and nights. Anonymous drop-offs have become a heartbreaking routine, with these feline wanderers becoming our responsibility and financial burden. This year, the situation has reached an unprecedented level of urgency. Just recently we found ourselves face-to-face with three orange cats, left behind with no regard for their well-being.

The last of these feline refugees, a once-tame cat now confined indoors secluded in our spare bedroom due to skirmishes with others, stands as a symbol of the larger crisis at hand. All three cats require medical attention and neutering, expenses that we, and others like us, must shoulder. It's not just our farm that feels the strain; my recent visit to the local SPCA, managed by a friend, revealed a scene of overwhelming desperation.

Frustration lines the faces of those who dedicate their lives to caring for these voiceless creatures. The SPCA is bursting at the seams with cats and kittens, so very many in isolation until cleared of potential diseases. Every cage is a plea for attention, a silent cry for someone to see beyond the bars and offer a glimmer of love.

The dire situation extends far beyond our farm and local shelter. Friends who manage other shelters echo the same sentiment — this year is the worst they've seen. Cats roam the streets and tossed into countryside's searching for warmth, sustenance, and a flicker of human kindness in the unforgiving winter landscape.

As I write these words, tears blur my vision, for I have glimpsed into the eyes of these abandoned souls, reaching out for a touch, a connection, a chance at a better life. It's not just about the cats; it's about the caregivers — the individuals who, against the tide of indifference, dedicate their time, resources, and love to alleviate the suffering of these animals.

The statistics are alarming, not just for the cats but for those who care for them. Data verifies an increase in veterinarian suicides, a poignant reminder that the world can feel like an uncaring place. Yet, amid the shadows, there are those like Randy and me, and countless others, who stand as beacons of benevolence - offering shelter, striving with untold personal sacrifice to make a difference.

As we face a long winter ahead, the urgency of this situation cannot be overstated. I implore you to recognize the enormity of this crisis and to consider how each of us can contribute to its resolution. Whether through adoption, fostering, or supporting local shelters, every act of kindness has the power to change a life. I know many for varying reasons can't open your home to this plight, but perhaps, just maybe you know someone . . .

This is not just a call for empathy; it's a plea for collective action. Please don't turn away, saying, "Not my problem." Instead, listen with open hearts to the silent cries of these feline companions, for in doing so, we become a part of a compassionate solution to a crisis that affects us all.

Early and every wintry morning, Randy goes to these shelters with food and checks on our furry crew. They wait eagerly not just for food, but for gentle strokes and recognition. His footprints in the snow tell an amazing love story.

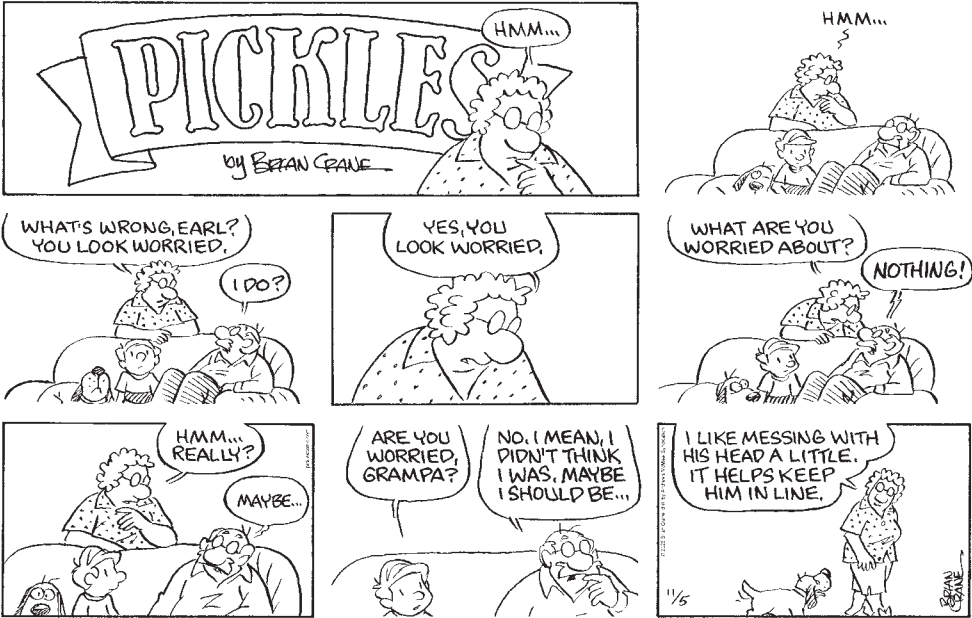
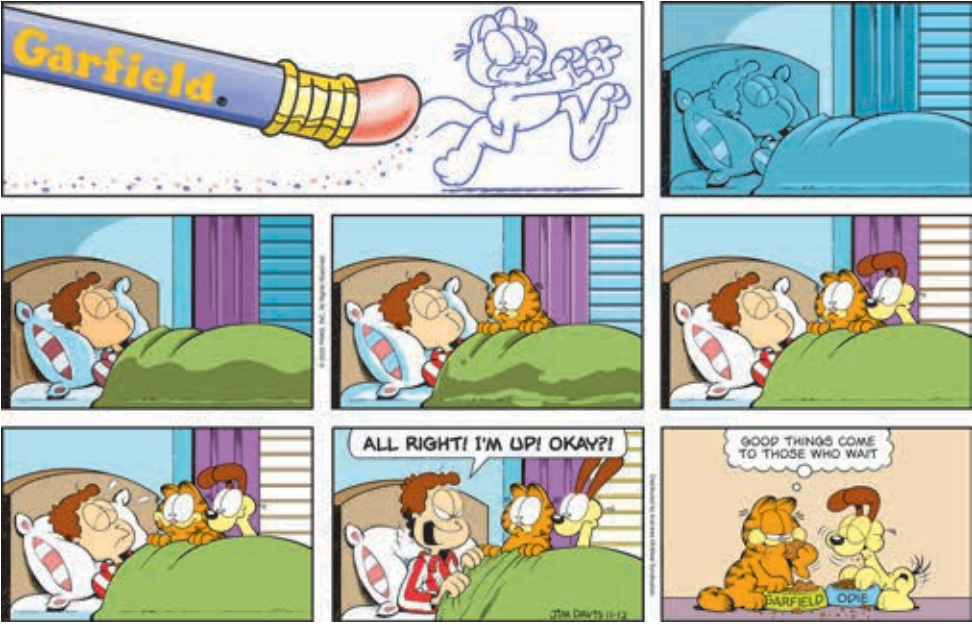

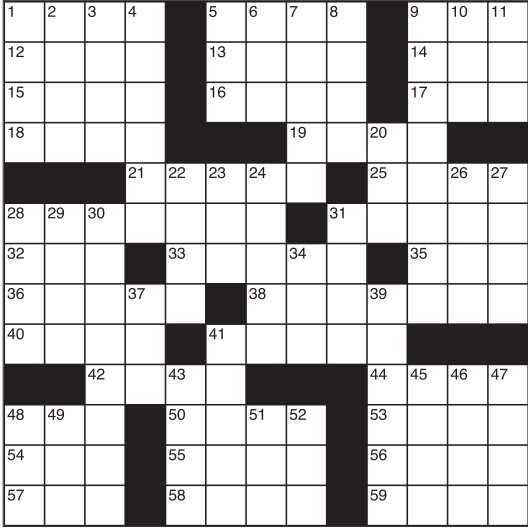
