Ju-No-Ri flips through season following pause

After a challenging few years due to the pandemic, judo athletes, coaches and volunteers in Watrous were able to return to the mats in September 2022. Comprised of practice sessions, tournaments, representing the area at the Saskatchewan Winter Games, enjoying a new dojo and hosting competitors from across the province, members of the Watrous Ju-No-Ri Club were able to take in a full year.

Watrous Ju-No-Ri Coach Glen Miller said it was great to be able to resume activities and see the athletes having fun after a nearly two year absence. Enjoying the new dojo (a place where judo is instructed) at 215 Main Street in Watrous,

38 members practiced Monday and Thursday evenings and are now winding down for the season.

During the year, Miller noted a few athletes from the local club were able to attend smaller tournaments in Regina, Swift Current, and Moose Jaw where they gained valuable skills competing. Then on Feb. 22 to 25, Miller along with Reilly Huisman were part of Team Prairie Central at this year's Saskatchewan Winter Games in Regina. Miller was the manager for judo while Huisman competed and earned a pair of bronze medals and a gold. Miller said three others representing Team Prairie Central also attended and Ryan Klenk-Potts and Kade Chabot were able to officiate at the Saskatchewan Winter Games.

Also in February, a fun bowling night took place for the athletes as the club prepared for its provincial tournament in Watrous Mar. 25 and 26. "This was the first full provincial tournament in Saskatchewan since the pandemic started," shared Miller. "It included all ages from seven years old to senior."

Pleased to

include the new version of Kodomo-no-kata (a form of judo that teaches the basics to young kids) at the tournament, Miller explained the category is done in pairs with a series of movements and techniques with different grading.

Hosted at the Watrous Civic Centre, local athletes were able to compete in the provincial judo tournament which included a number of events like the new Kodomo-no-kata where Alex McLean and Harley-Anne Allen placed fifth and Kylee Freeman and Brian Martens got silver.

In the U10 and U12 division, Ju-No-Ri Ne-waza competition members were Everleigh Dunne, Hunter Dunne,

Nicole Ierofieieva, Harley-Anne Allen, Alex McLean, Emilia Janzen, Bentley Roney, and Kylee Freeman, who all received participation medals.



SHA facilities returning to routine infection prevention protocols

The Saskatchewan Health Authority (SHA) has moved back to routine infection prevention and control protocols effective

Apr. 4 and masking will no longer be required for patients/residents, staff or visitors. Masking will be optional in all SHA facilities including administrative offices, hospitals, clinics and long-term care facilities. These changes are supported by Saskatchewan's Chief Medical Health Officer.

Personal protective equipment (PPE) that may include masks, gowns or gloves, will still be required for staff and visitors during outbreaks or in specific high-risk clinical areas as per SHA infection control policies.

Masks will continue to be made available to health care staff, patients/residents and visitors who wish to wear a mask.

Physical distancing measures will also end.

There will no longer be restrictions on food sharing and food donations.

Privately-run physician's offices, clinics and other non-SHA facilities set their own policies regarding infection prevention and control, including policies requiring masking on-site.

Public health orders requiring proof of vaccination or a negative test for access to businesses, workplaces and other venues ended on Feb. 14, 2022. Many jurisdictions around the world, including Canada, have ended proof of vaccination entry requirements for international travellers.

As the need for proof of vaccination has declined considerably, eHealth Saskatchewan is decommissioning the SK Vax Wallet mobile device

application. Beginning Apr. 17, 2023, the app will no longer accept updates. Effective Apr. 30, the app will no longer be available in app stores.

COVID-19 vaccination records are still available on your MySaskHealthRecord (MSHR) account and can be printed or saved and viewed on your mobile device. The QR code is also still available on vaccination records through MSHR.

COVID-19 vaccine continues to be available including a second bivalent booster for residents 18 years of age and older in long-term care facilities, personal care homes and assisted living facilities; persons over 80 years of age; persons 65-79 years of age who have not had COVID; and those who are 18 years of age and older who are immune suppressed.

Wintry blast creates collisions

much of southeast Saskatchewan experienced a wintry blast over the first weekend of the month. Road conditions, particularly on portions of Hwy. 1 were extremely icy.

Saskatchewan RCMP's Division Operational Communication Centre received 35 weather-related calls for service on Apr. 2.

This includes calls about a multi-vehicle collision on Hwy. 1 eastbound lanes between Chaplin and Morse. Investigation determined six vehicles were involved:

two semis collided, causing three passenger vehicles and a semi off the road and into the ditch. No serious injuries were reported to police. The eastbound lanes of Hwy. 1 were blocked while emergency services responded.

None of the collisions Saskatchewan RCMP investigated involved fatalities.

Armed male in North Battleford

At approximately noon Mar. 31, Battlefords RCMP received a report of an armed male at a business on Territorial Drive in

North Battleford. Officers immediately responded. The male was not located at the scene. No injuries were reported to police.

Officers began proactively patrolling the area and located the male walking on 101 Street shortly after. When officers told him he was under arrest, he ran away but was arrested after a brief foot chase. He assaulted an officer during the arrest. The officer was not seriously injured. A knife was located and seized during subsequent investigation.

As a result of investigation, 39-year-old Darwin Andrew from North Battleford is charged with: one count, possession of a weapon for a dangerous purpose, Section 88(2), Criminal Code; one count, carrying a concealed weapon, Section 90(2), Criminal Code; one count, resist/obstruct peace officer, Section 129(a), Criminal Code; one count, disturbing the peace, Section 175(1), Criminal Code; and one count, assault on police officer, Section 270(2), Criminal Code.

Fillies enjoy quite a ride claiming provincial titles

With a stable filled with local area talent to defend their provincial championship, it was a season to remember for the U18 East Central Fillies girls hockey team. Not only did they stampede out of the gates but after finishing first, the girls advanced to the provincial final where they collected a second straight title following a marathon in game two.

“There is a lot of pressure to repeat, a feat which is very rare,” shared Fillies Head Coach Murray Ehlert. “The whole coaching staff was very proud of the team and all that they accomplished.”

With the Fillies comprised of a number of local area players and players who have ties to the region, the quest for a second provincial title for the U18 girls team commenced with a solid 17 game winning streak. The group then lost to the Saskatoon Comet Destroyers in game 18 before tying the Saskatoon Comet Rush a contest later. Despite the loss and tie, the Fillies got back on track, collecting a 5-4 victory over the Rush to wrap up its regular season at 18-1-1. During the 20 game campaign in which the team collected top spot in the league, the Fillies tallied 104 goals while surrendering just 25. Aided by strong play in front of her, netminder Allie Edwards registered an amazing nine shutouts during that stretch including four in a row between Jan. 21 and Feb. 11.

Finishing 10 points ahead of the Saskatoon Comet Rush for first in the North Division, East Central advanced to the playoffs where it faced the Comet Destroyers. Not deterred from its lone loss against the Destroyers earlier in the year, the Fillies won 5-1 and 3-1 to move on to meet the Comet Sting in the North Division final. With a pair of 2-0 victories, the Fillies defeated the Sting and collected the North Division title. Punching its ticket to the U18 girls provincial A final, East Central matched up against a fam-

iliar opponent out of Milestone.

Facing the same team they defeated last year, this time around, it would be the South Division champion Flyers who held home ice advantage. Welcoming the Fillies to town Mar. 24 for game one of the best of three series, East Central got on the board first during the opening frame.

With the assist to Marissa Holcomb, Payton Crone made it 1-0 Fillies early on before Milestone replied in period two to tie things up. Deadlocked at one, both clubs were unable to register a goal through the remainder of regulation so overtime was needed. In the extra frame, with both netminders keeping shooters at bay, as time ticked down, Fillies captain Meikka Ehlert would find a way and scored with 1:37 left. Receiving a pass by teammate Tyler Wasylewski, Ehlert made no mistake and sent the team home with the series lead.

“Last year we had no luck in their rink, losing both games,” explained the head coach. “Going into game one this year, that was in the back of everyone’s mind. We came out decent to start the game but for two and a half periods after that, our goalie Allie Edwards had to keep us in it. To see her play that well in a game, a game where we were outshot for one of the first times ever, she did really well and stole us that one.”

With a huge win to open the U18 girls A provincial final, the focus shifted back to LeRoy for game two. Looking for a repeat performance, as the Mar. 26 home contest got

underway, teams traded markers in period one - assistant captain Jayda Braun for the Fillies with 11:08 remaining





Pizza Casserole

Ingredients:

1 pound ground beef
1 can tomato soup
1/2 tsp. garlic powder
1/2 tsp. onion powder
1/2 tsp. oregano
1/2 tsp. ground black pepper
1-340 gram bag of wide noodles
3/4 cup grated cheddar cheese
1/4 cup Parmesan cheese

Directions:

Brown ground beef, add tomato soup and seasonings. Simmer 15 minutes. I usually sauté a clove of garlic and about 1/4 cup onion with the ground beef instead of using garlic and onion powder. Cook the noodles according to the package instructions. Place half the noodles in a greased casserole, top with half the beef mixture, then the remaining noodles and last the meat sauce. Sprinkle the cheese on top. Bake at 400°F until the cheese is melted. Serve with garlic toast and salad.

Dear Reena,

I have always baked my own homemade buns. I would now like to make my own hamburger buns; how can I shape the dough to look like a hamburger bun? Nathalia

Form your dough into a ball, the same way you would when making regular buns. Next flatten the dough to a half-inch high disc, about three to four inches round in diameter. Let rise for one hour. Raspberries are one of life's special gifts to us! They

are high in Vitamin C and A, iron, potassium, calcium, folic acid and ellagic acid. They contain no fat, cholesterol or sodium and if that is not enough, they are high in fibre. While some people oppose the practice of washing raspberries because they are such delicate little creatures, the majority of experts agree that giving raspberries a water rinse just prior to consumption is a great idea.

Extra tip: If you are planning to freeze raspberries; rinse them with cold water and pat dry. Place them on a cookie sheet and put them in the freezer. Once frozen, transfer the berries to a freezable container and store them in the freezer. Great for ice cream toppings, jam, or smoothies.

The deaf can't hear and the blind can't see

My wife has not asked me lately if I am deaf. But she has asked a few times in our 55-year marriage if I have heard a word she said. Now that I have hearing aids, if I wear them, it does help

with my hearing deficit. However, I have it from good sources that both husbands and wives tend to hear only what they deem significant.

The prophet Isaiah accused the Israelites of being both deaf and blind. He states, "Your ears are open, but you hear nothing. You have seen many things but have paid no attention." (Isaiah 42:20). Sometimes, both seeing and hearing can be like we are in the dark where our seeing and hearing are limited.

Seeing and hearing need to result in our absorbing or understanding what we

see or hear. We may listen to a different language and not understand what is being said. Another example of seeing but not understanding would be, if I were to see a surgery occurring, I would not know what I am seeing. I do not want to see any exposed human internal organs. I do not want to see what a surgeon sees!

Isaiah found that God's people had trouble seeing all of God's good and miraculous blessings. They were also often deaf to God's word of promise and hope. They were in the dark and could not see or hear God.

Paul also found the

Christians at Ephesus sliding back into the darkness of sin. They were in darkness instead of living as the light of God in goodness, righteousness, and truth. Paul tells the Ephesians to wake up and live as the light of Christ and expose the deeds of darkness around them instead of being part of the darkness. (Eph. 5:8-14)

Jesus said, "While I am in the world, I am the light of the world." (John 9:5). Jesus brought the light of sight to a man blind from birth. Restoring sight to someone blind from infancy had never been heard of in Israel.

and Cara Faris for the Flyers with 7:44 left on the clock. Tied at one through one, it would be Milestone who took an early second period lead to put the pressure on the Fillies.

Unable to reply in the middle stanza and down one through 40 minutes, the East Central contingent continued to press, utilizing three solid lines. With that constant pressure, as the third period arrived, Ehlert felt the momentum shifted. "We took over the game but their goaltender was really good and kept them in it. We outshot and outchanced them and Allie made the saves when we needed them."

Looking to get the equalizer and force extra time, East Central remained patient and then with just over one minute left, Jayda Braun tallied her second of the contest to make it 2-2. That would be it for scoring in period three and as the buzzer sounded, overtime was once again needed.

Headed to the extra period, Ehlert felt good about his team's chances but did not expect to see them play out five periods later. Following the first overtime frame, then the second, third and fourth, Ehlert reminded his club to stick with it. Then once overtime period five arrived, the patience paid off.

"They kept us to the outside and limited quality opportunities during the overtime portion. Between periods I just said to the girls, "We are outplaying them and we will get our chances, I promise. They will come." I just didn't think it would take five periods of overtime but facing a hot goaltender at the other end, you never know how long it will go for."

Essentially playing two and a half games, as period eight began, the Fillies and Flyers were aiming for a conclusion. With players tired and the shots 58-40 in favour of the home team, the next opportunity would determine the victor. Gaining possession of the puck, the Fillies entered the Flyers' zone and Lanigan's Bryer Renwick received a pass, and in the slot, was able to notch the winner with 14:12 left on the clock. The goal gave the Fillies a 3-2 victory and the provincial championship.

Lasting over four and a half hours until the final goal was registered, while the game was not the longest ever in Saskatchewan Minor Hockey (Ehlert said in 2014 there was a game lasting eight overtime periods), the head coach was excited Bryer was finally able to end it. "She worked hard and was deserving of that goal. We were happy the puck went in and all of the sudden you realize that we just won back to back titles. It is really really awesome and words can't describe it because it is so rare to win two provincial titles in a row like that."

Grateful to everyone who stayed and cheered on the team through the eight periods of game two, Ehlert added the officials who came out from Saskatoon also did an admirable job. "They ended up essentially doing two and a half games. They were excited to be a part of it but they were tired too. They deserve credit for being there for the whole thing."

With a season plan of keeping the game simple, skating lots and staying in shape, reflecting on the year, Ehlert said the team remained dedicated and those results paid off. The head coach also noted a tournament in Calgary earlier in the season in which the games did not quite go the Fillies way was also a turning point. "I think that really helped set us up for the rest of the season as the girls came together and bonded. Then when the World Junior final game was on, we had practice that night and in between intermissions of that game we would skate. When the intermissions were over and the game was back on, the girls put on their skate guards to watch it on TV in the lobby. They got together to do things like that during the season and those off ice things really spoke about the group uniting together."






Another season of public skating wrapped up Mar. 31. Due to the cooler temperatures hanging on, skaters got to have fun at the rink for a few extra weeks.
