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Local area comes together to support family after house fire

Residents of Zelma and the surrounding area have banded together to support a family after their house and all of their possessions were destroyed during a fire.

Asleep at their home in Zelma, during the early morning hours of Apr. 2, Blair Elderkin awoke to find his house fully engulfed in flames. Able to alert his partner Chris Lougheed and her son Neil, they were all able to escape with Blair and Chris suffering burns and smoke inhalation while Neil received minor injuries.

Niece of Blair Elderkin and organizer of a GoFundMe page, Mindy Elderkin said, "All three were taken to RUH, with Chris needing to be airlifted out. The house was completely consumed within minutes. We currently do not have information about how the fire started but the Young Fire Department, Watrous Ambulance, STARS, and the

Watrous RCMP all attended and provided much needed assistance. All were well choreographed and offered unyielding support to Blair, Chris and Neil and their property. A heartfelt thank you is directed to them all."

Since the fire on Apr. 2, Mindy, who is also the family's next door neighbour said Neil was released from hospital during the afternoon after the blaze with minimal physical trauma. Blair was able to leave Royal University Hospital three days later and is healing with family in Watrous. Chris remained in hospital this past week after sustaining significant burns. "All are hoped to make a full recovery."

With the family's home and all of their possessions destroyed, Mindy set up a GoFundMe page in an effort to raise money and help the family get back on their feet. "No one is ever fully prepared to lose everything in a situation like that. We wanted to make sure they did not have any more to

worry about than they already do, and to show that there are people who care."

As of last week, the support had been tremendous from people within the local area and beyond. With a fundraising goal of \$5,000, that mark was surpassed as over \$14,000 had been raised for the Elderkin Lougheed family.

"The outpouring of support is truly touching," said a grateful Mindy. "It is times like these where you feel the full impact of what a community can really accomplish by coming together. So many have given clothing, toiletries, etc., which will assist in the near future while plans are being made. Thank you to everyone for all of the generous donations and well wishes. The family thanks you from the bottom of their hearts and will forever be grateful."

Budget touted as protecting, building, growing province; deficit projected

Aiming to protect, build and grow Saskatchewan while operating with a projected \$2.6 billion deficit, Deputy Premier, Finance Minister, and Humboldt-Watrous MLA Donna Harpauer tabled the 2021-'22 provincial budget Apr. 6.

"This budget will protect Saskatchewan people through the pandemic, as more vaccines are received and life begins to return to normal," Harpauer said, noting the COVID-19 pandemic is the biggest shock to Saskatchewan, Canadian

and world economies since WWII.

"This is a significant challenge that requires a significant response," she added. "As a result, this year's deficit will be larger and it will take longer to return to balance than we had anticipated. But we are going to make the investments needed now to protect Saskatchewan people through the end of the pandemic and to drive a strong economic recovery as we emerge from the pandemic."

With a projected deficit of \$2.6 billion, the provincial government hopes the fiscal path will steadily improve over the next three years with smaller deficits of \$1.7 bil-

lion, \$1.2 billion, and \$770 million in 2024-'25. A return to balance is expected in 2026-'27.

"As much as we have a huge deficit I am very optimistic that we are going to recover relatively quickly and then turn our eyes to what we need to do to stimulate growth which is critical," said Harpauer who noted she has complete faith in the people of Saskatchewan. "And the fact that we have what the world needs which is food, fuel and fertilizer."

Harpauer stated while every province is in a similar situation when it comes to a deficit and borrowing, Saskatchewan fared better than most and will now have the lowest debt to GDP ratio in the country; with real GDP forecast to grow

3.4 percent in 2021 following a projected 4.2 percent contraction in 2020.

When asked how creating the budget went, Harpauer said the disheartening thing about building this year's budget was that in previous years a goal was always set whether it was attaining a surplus or building towards one. "In

this one, the goal was to ensure that we were covering the additional costs of COVID to keep our citizens safe which meant for \$19 million of additional money that we put into health care, specific to COVID. It also lends on what we are going to need to do to recover and stimulate growth going forward as well. Basically we didn't set an end goal and just hoped that the ditch wasn't too deep. That is not where I'd like to be but we are all there. Now we have set forward a path to recover and build and I am confident in our path and I am optimistic it won't take us as long as we are projecting in this budget."

Indicated within the budget, revenue is forecast at \$14.5 billion with expenses of \$17.1 billion projected,

an increase of \$1 billion compared to last year. The total public debt, including Crown corporation debt, is projected to be \$27.8 billion at Mar. 31, 2022 - up \$4.2 billion compared to last year.

At a glance, the budget includes \$1.5 billion to help protect Saskatchewan lives and livelihoods in the fight against COVID-19, following a \$2 billion investment last year. A further \$1.3 billion of support is in place for the next two years, for a multi-year commitment of \$4.8 billion.

The budget provides \$3.1 billion of planned capital spending to stimulate the economy and create jobs. It also invests \$162 million in health care capital including a planning stage investment of \$550,000 for new Watson and Estevan long-term care facilities.

There is \$830 million going into operating, maintaining, building and improving Saskatchewan's

roads and highways including multiple passing-lane projects on Highways 2, 3, 12, 14 and 16.

The budget provides nearly \$190 million for education capital including nearly \$102 million to support 21 ongoing capital projects which will build 16 new schools and renovate five more.

Also within the budget, more than \$324 million will be invested in government services infrastructure, \$70.1 million for maintenance and upgrades to dams and canals, and nearly \$245 million for municipal infrastructure. Saskatchewan's Crown corporations will spend \$1.6 billion on major capital projects this year, including nearly \$938 million by SaskPower to improve the province's electricity system to meet demand and maintain reliability.

The 2021-'22 Budget includes record funding for workforce development of

more than \$39 million to strengthen Saskatchewan's recovery from the pandemic. Nearly \$18 million is being provided for Employment Assistance for Persons with Disabilities.

The 2021-'22 Budget also includes nearly \$175 million to provide all SaskPower customers with a 10 percent rebate on their power bills this year. Meanwhile, in May, every Saskatchewan driver will receive a rebate on their vehicle registrations from the Auto Fund.

This year's budget reinstated the Community Rink Affordability Grant, providing communities with \$2,500 per ice surface.

Total funding through the Saskatchewan Veteran Service Club Support Program will grow from \$100,000 to \$1.5 million this year. And the budget also restarts the Active Families Benefit, providing \$150 per child enrolled in sport, recreation and cultural activities.

"In the election campaign last fall, we made 14 specific campaign commitments to make life more affordable for Saskatchewan people," Harpauer said. "This budget fulfills all 14 of these commitments. We did what we said we would do."





MP Report

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Moose Jaw-Lake Centre-Lanigan constituency is home to, two armed forces bases, as well as a large number of veterans and a great many civilians who have a higher-than-average respect for our country's armed forces, so military issues are often top-of-mind in our area. While there is so much that Canada's military does to make us proud, one area where our armed forces needs improvement is its treatment of female troops. These sorts of situations discourage women from military service, create general demoralization of the rank-and-file service members, and create loss of respect for our military on the world stage.

It was, therefore, a very serious situation when former defence chief Gen. Vance, one of the country's top soldiers, was accused of sexual misconduct against former employees. The problem is that these allegations were also embarrassing for the Liberal government, who like to portray themselves as advocates of feminism but behind the scenes act otherwise (remember Jody Wilson-Raybould and sexual misconduct allegations against Trudeau himself).

The allegations against Vance were first brought forward by former military ombudsman Gary Walbourne, to whom the alleged victims had brought their complaints in confidence. In 2018, Walbourne took the allegations to Defence Minister Harjit Sajjan to ask him what the next steps should be for an investigation. Sajjan refused to listen and dismissed Walbourne from the room without explanation.

In testimony before the House of Commons Defence Committee, Sajjan first tried to assert that he had only heard about the allegations a few weeks ago. He also tried to avoid admitting that he had met with Walbourne on the topic. This whopper went all the way up the food chain, as Justin Trudeau himself in Question Period tried to assert that he had only heard about the allegations recently through "news reports" but that his office had also heard about them in 2018.

When the Liberals were finally caught in this web, Sajjan then claimed he shut down the discussion because he thought it would have been "inappropriate" for him to interfere in an investigation. But interfere is exactly what he did. Rather than establishing an independent investigation, he turned Walbourne's allegations over to the Privy Council Office (PCO), the branch of the civil service responsible for providing political and policy support for the Prime Minister and Cabinet.

Because it is tied directly to the government, the PCO is not qualified to conduct an independent, confidential investigation. Lacking confidence in the PCO's independence, Walbourne felt it would be a breach of privacy to reveal the alleged victims to them.

The web surrounding the Vance investigation becomes more and more tangled. In February, Canada's new top military commander, Admiral Art McDonald suddenly stepped down after only two months on the job – a further sign of chaos in the armed forces under the Liberals' watch. Minister Sajjan continues to try to muddy the waters with convoluted, hypocritical responses. Where there's smoke there's fire: it's clear there's something about this case that has the Liberal government very worried.

In the meantime, three years after having had the courage to come forward, the alleged victims continue to wait for justice. The current military ombudsman, Gregory Lick summed the situation up best in his testimony to the Defence Committee: "I say enough. Enough of the self-protectionism and deflecting. Enough political foot-dragging."

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Tips from Reena Nerbas

Dear Reena, I recently purchased a stainless steel thermos with foil wrapped around the exterior. Although the instructions say dishwasher safe, the foil peeled after four washes. Now, the foil is half gone and looks unappealing (pardon the pun). Should I toss the thermos or is there a remedy to fix it? Len

Dear Len,

Since the foil on the thermos peeled due to the heat of the dishwasher water. You have two options: either contact the manufacturer and inquire about a refund or continue similar steps to peel the remaining foil. Put the thermos into a stainless steel pot and fill it with enough water to cover the thermos. Bring the water to a boil for at least five minutes. Use tongs to remove the thermos and gently scrub the remaining foil off with a non-scratch abrasive pad. Your thermos will be stainless steel in colour and ready to use.

Dear Reena,

We bought a newer house and found that upon washing the kitchen floor the linoleum has a yellow stain/tinge to it mainly around the sink area. The colour is supposed to be white. I tried a couple of cleaners, but have not had success in brightening the colour. Is there something I can use to help this issue? Thank you, Janette

Dear Janette,

It sounds as though the previous owner kept a mat at the sink area. The sulfur used in manufacturing the mat has left you with a yellow stain which is often permanent. With so many vinyl and linoleum products on the market, what works on one does not necessarily work on another. If your floor were over 50 years old it would most likely be linoleum. Since your home is newer, the floor is probably vinyl. Many people have found pouring three percent hydrogen peroxide onto the floor every day for three days is helpful. Other people have great

success by combining one-quarter cup OxiClean with one gallon hot water and pouring the solution onto the area. Another solution is bleach, but most people suggest that this application removes the floor's finish and shine. Lastly, mineral spirits are another treatment that people have told me worked for them. It is a shame that so many floors tend to yellow and discolour most often from a rubber backed rug or some other weight being left on one specific area.

Frozen peach hint

Dear Reena,

I just discovered a method for freezing peaches and it is a wonderful time and mess saver. This works the same way as freezing whole tomatoes and it is so easy! Just freeze the whole peach, with skin and all, and when it is time to use it, run it under hot water and the skin slips off. You are left with a beautiful ripe peach with no discoloration. I am doing all 25 pounds this way. Val

Let the flowers bloom into spring!

Before purchasing flowers for someone special, keep in mind that typically the more fragrant a flower is, the shorter it will live.

If you ever decide to make yourself a necklace using fresh flowers, be sure not to wear the flowers directly against your skin. Hang them slightly off your shoulders because your neck sweats and will decrease the life of a flower necklace.

Did you know? In Hawaii, a woman wearing a flower on the left side of her head signifies that she is unavailable (much like the North American wedding ring). A flower on the right signifies that she is single and a flower on the top centre of her head means she is taken but still looking.

Ed, my old neighbour, in Saskatchewan favours black for the colour of his truck. He likes to quote Henry Ford and his Model T cars coming off the assembly line in 1908. Ford said, "You can have any colour as long as it's black." The first mass-produced Model Ts in their black colour were mysterious, a drastic change from travel by horses. Many could not wait to see one, a Tin Lizzie, or Leaping Lena as the Model T was called. People would wait and watch if they saw

a Model T coming down the street. It was worth a good gaze or gasp, a flinch at its speed and sound.

The colour black has been a sign of modest dress in clothing or clothing that denotes power or authority as in a business suit. Black is often associated with death, sin, evil, suffering, and sorrow. If someone is beaten, they are described as having bruises of black and blue. A black eye results in everyone asking what or who caused it. People will wait, gaze, gasp, perhaps flinch at a black eye because it calls for attention.

Black is the colour associated with Good Friday, which is the remembrance of the death of Jesus by crucifixion. After his arrest, Jesus received black treatment, beginning with the Sanhedrin. The high priest asked Jesus if He was the Christ, the Son of God. When Jesus answered, "Yes, it is as you say." (Matt. 26:4) The high

priest proclaimed that Jesus had spoken blasphemy and the council agreed that Jesus should die for His offense. They spat in Jesus' face and struck him with their fists and slapped him.

In the morning, Jesus was taken to the Roman Governor, Pilate so that the Romans would put Jesus to death by crucifixion. Not convinced that Jesus deserved the death penalty, Pilate tried to suggest Jesus could be set free at the Feast by himself as the governor. The crowd demanded Barabbas, another prisoner, be pardoned instead of Jesus. Pilate released Barabbas and had Jesus flogged, that is whipped 39 times. The whipping was intended to weaken a criminal and hasten death during the agonizing torture of crucifixion. After 39 lashes of the whip, Pilate handed a bruised and bleeding Jesus over to his soldiers to be crucified.

The soldiers decided to

humiliate and abuse Jesus as one unworthy of any respect. The soldiers gathered around Jesus, mocking him by dressing him in a scarlet robe and placing a crown of thorns on his head. They ridiculed him, saying, "Hail, king of the Jews!" They spat on Jesus and struck him on his head again and again with his staff. After they grew tired of their cruelty, they led Jesus away to crucify him.

On Good Friday, Christians remember Jesus at the cross. Spectators waited to see him nailed hands and feet to a cross. They gazed at the soldiers executing their torturous tasks. Lifted up before them, many mocked the black and blue Jesus lingering in pain's torment between two other men on crosses. Not all the spectators there had hardened unbelieving hearts. Like Mary, his mother, we come to his cross to gasp, flinch and weep at the mystery of God's love for us there.

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

Best Low Carb Buns

Ingredients:

- 1 1/4 cups almond flour
- 5 tbsp. ground psyllium husks
- 3 tsp. baking powder
- 1/2 tsp. xanthan gum
- 1 tsp. sea salt
- 1 tbsp. ground flax seed
- 2 tsp. apple cider vinegar
- 1 cup boiling water
- 3 egg whites

Directions:

Mix the flour, psyllium, baking powder, xanthan gum, sea salt and flax seed in a bowl. Add the boiling water, egg whites and apple cider vinegar, mixing well on low speed of a mixer. Don't over mix the dough, about 25 to 30 seconds is enough. It should look like play dough. Moisten hands and form the dough into buns on a parchment lined cookie sheet. Smooth the tops with wet hands. I like to sprinkle some sesame seeds on top prior to baking. Bake at 350°F for about 55 minutes. These can be made in a bread shape, shaped into buns or hot dog buns. Cool on wire racks. Store in fridge or freezer. These are my favourite low carb buns (about three to four net carbs, depending on the size). I usually make six buns from this recipe.

In addition, the budget contains a number of changes to taxes including the taxation of vapour products and heat-not-burn tobacco products, as well as a road use fee for electric vehicles at the time of registration to ensure that all road users contribute to road maintenance and replacement.

Diving in a little deeper, here are a few more specifics within a handful of areas:

Health
This year's record health budget of \$6.54 billion - up \$359 million or 5.8 percent from last year - includes a \$90 million increase to support Saskatchewan's comprehensive COVID response. This includes: the

mass vaccination rollout; purchase of more personal protective equipment; supporting contact tracing measures; expansion of testing and assessment sites; additional provincial laboratory capacity; supports for long-term care; and coverage of added physician costs.

The budget provides Saskatchewan Health Authority with a \$3.96 billion grant this year, up more than \$221 million, or nearly six percent, compared to last year. The budget invests a record \$458 million for mental health and addictions programs and services, up \$23.4 million or 5.4 percent from last year. This includes \$7.2 million for

targeted mental health and addictions services including specific youth-focused initiatives, investments in suicide prevention, and expansion of harm reduction and addictions treatment.

A total of \$6 million will be used to hire approximately 100 continuing care aides who will help long-term care clients with personal care, meals and medication.

"It's the first year of our three-year, \$18.4 million campaign commitment to hire 300 continuing care aides to work in long-term care and in existing and expanded home-care services in rural and remote areas," Harpauer said. "This budget also keeps our election commitment to support children with Autism and their families, with \$6 million to expand the Autism Spectrum Disorder program to provide individualized funding for children ages six to 11. We are fulfilling another platform commitment through a \$5 million increase to expand eligibility under the Sas-

katchewan Insulin Pump Program - which means the cost of an insulin pump will now be covered for everyone in Saskatchewan who needs one."

The funding will also cover continuous glucose monitoring for children and youth under age 18.

A \$6.7 million increase will reduce ambulance fees for seniors to \$135 per trip, down from \$275 and \$1.4 million is being invested to add a new STARS helicopter to deliver emergency care faster to rural and remote areas and save lives.

Education
Education spending across government is \$3.75 billion, up more than \$391 million, or 11.6 percent compared to last year. This includes spending on pre-K to Gr. 12 education, post-secondary education, and career training programs and commissions.

Saskatchewan's 27 school divisions will receive \$1.96 billion in operating funding for the 2021-'22 school year, a \$19.2 million increase. This includes

fully funding the two percent salary increase in the teachers' collective bargaining agreement.

Specifically for the local area, Harpauer noted Horizon School Division will receive \$77.079 million, a 2.5 percent increase. Project wise, work continues on seeing a new school in Lanigan built while \$2.3 million has been allocated for structural repairs for the school in Allan.

Harpauer also noted Horizon School Division will receive \$1.8 million for additional repairs over and above the maintenance budget that they have been allocated. That stimulus funding is able to be utilized for additional repairs and work.

Federal-provincial Safe Schools funding of \$155 million has been provided over the last year to help school divisions and independent schools during the pandemic. More than \$20 million of this funding will carry over into the 2021-'22 school year.

An increase of \$2 million in this budget brings child care funding up to \$75.5 million and will create 176 additional licensed home-based spaces and 51 new licensed centre spaces.

This year's budget will invest a total of \$735 million in the post-secondary sector. Beyond the typical base budget, government will invest an additional \$60 million over two years to be utilized for COVID recovery, revenue generation, and achieving priorities set out in the Growth Plan.

The budget includes \$678.5 million for post-secondary institutions, up 4.4 percent compared to the previous year, as well as \$39.8 million for student supports, a 10 percent increase. This includes an increase in the Saskatchewan Advantage Scholarship from \$500 to \$750 annually per eligible student to help with tuition costs.

Social Services
The budget provides social services and assistance with \$1.56 billion, up more than \$66 million, or 4.5 percent, compared to last year.

"This budget meets our election commitment to increase benefits to seniors with \$3.5 million in additional funding for the Seniors Income Plan," Harpauer said. "The investment will help low-income seniors enjoy a better quality of life with maximum payments increasing by \$30 a month, effective July 1."

Protection of Persons and Property

The budget provides more than \$845 million for the protection of Saskatchewan persons and property, up \$38.6 million, or 4.8 percent, compared to last year.

Agriculture
The budget includes a \$23.1 million increase to the Ministry of Agriculture budget which totals \$386.9 million, a six percent increase from the 2020-'21 budget.

Agriculture Minister David Marit said, "The 2021-'22 Agriculture budget will once again fully fund business risk management programs, provide a record level of per-acre coverage under the Crop Insurance Program, continue last year's record investment in agriculture research, and make important investments in irrigation expansion."

The Agriculture budget includes a \$20.6 million increase to business risk management funding and the \$150.1 million 2021 Crop Insurance Program includes coverage of \$273 an acre.

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Proposed Humboldt Broncos Tribute Centre and Roadside Memorial announced

On Apr. 6, 2018, the world stopped for 29 families and the city of Humboldt, Sask. The world grieved and the loss has been profound, yet there is common sentiment among the Broncos families that something positive must come from this tragedy. On Apr. 5, 2021, the Humboldt Broncos Memorial Committee, comprised of members of the 2017-18 Broncos families, Humboldt Broncos Board members, Humboldt Public Art committee members, together with the City of Humboldt, unveiled an extraordinary vision for a Humboldt Broncos Tribute Centre and Roadside Memorial.

Christina Haugan, wife of former Broncos Coach Darcy Haugan said, "If we don't find a way to inspire others and create something positive for the community, the families and the nation, then that would be a tragedy."

Inspiration

In late 2018, the Broncos Memorial Committee set out on a mission to honour the lives lost and forever changed, and make a generational impact on junior hockey and community sports in Humboldt, towns across Canada and beyond. Through this process themes of perseverance, resiliency, inspiration, community spirit and national unity emerged. The ambition for the proposed Broncos Tribute Centre is to symbolize these qualities, celebrate the lives lost and changed, and highlight the role that hockey and other team sports play in developing character and integrity, while creating a sense of belonging and community values.

Roadside Memorial

North of Humboldt, a permanent Roadside Memorial will be constructed at the site of the tragedy, providing a quiet place to reflect on the lives of the 16 angels that have been lost, the 13 players whose lives have been forever changed, and the heroic efforts of so many who answered the call to help in the chaotic days that followed.

Tribute Centre Gallery

Located adjacent to the Elgar Peterson Arena, the

proposed facility will be a forward-looking tribute with a dedicated exhibit gallery that hopes to inspire the many visitors who make the trip to Humboldt to watch a Broncos game or visit the arena to feel the emotion and unique sense of community. Visitors will gain a greater appreciation for the team, their special bond, unique team culture and commitment to selfless community service and selfless play on the ice – the guiding principles spelled out in former coach Darcy Haugan's Core Covenant. Images, video and a selection of the many thousands of thoughtful items that were received from around the world will remind visitors of the unprecedented international outpouring of support. Themes of teamwork, community spirit, character, integrity, grit and resiliency will be embedded throughout the facility. Leading artists, exhibit and design firms will be engaged as part of the design process.

Arena and Fitness Facilities

Beyond the exhibit gallery, the proposed Tribute Centre will include a new ice arena to support local hockey, the Humboldt Broncos, and other local skating sports. A proposed fitness facility will be used by the whole community and options for a therapy centre are being evaluated to support those in surrounding communities who are recovering from injuries and are now driving hours for treatment. All of these facilities are needed in this physically active community that has limited options for fitness and rehab facilities.

Michael Biehl, Mayor of Humboldt said, "Today we begin to turn the page. The Memorial Committee's vision is to do something extraordinary and make a positive impact, local and nationally. We have a vision, however there is a long way to go, a lot of details to iron out and significant funds to raise, but we're confident we can pull people together to make this a reality. We welcome others to be a part of this effort and support this vision."

National Impact

As a symbol of Canadian Junior Hockey, the Broncos Tribute Centre will seek to recognize other junior programs from across the country and highlight acts of

local community service, perseverance and resiliency. Plans for a revolving display of messaging tied to team leadership, team culture and sportsmanship from Canadian and International leaders will complement proposed workshops and clinics on these topics.

The Centre will aspire to make an impression and inspire visitors, sports teams, coaches, athletes and parents from across the country by promoting the values spelled out in former coach Darcy Haugan's Core Covenant, which continues to influence sports leaders across North America.

Carol Brons, mother to Dayna Brons said, "Our hope is that the values that guided the 2017-18 Broncos will continue to inspire our kids to become better teammates and future leaders, regardless of their sport, academic or professional pursuit."

This year's budget also contains an additional \$2 million for the Wildlife Damage Compensation Program, which compensates Saskatchewan producers for crop damage and predation caused by wildlife, to address stronger commodity prices.

The budget will also once again include \$32.9 million in funding for agriculture research, which matches last year's record level of funding for research.

Additional investments will also be made to expand irrigation in Saskatchewan, with an increased \$2.5 million for irrigation development projects. Once again, the Agriculture budget includes \$71.2 million for strategic programs under the CAP agreement.

Budget reaction

With the budget tabled, Harpauer said, "Throughout this pandemic, we have witnessed Saskatchewan's resolve, as our people made the sacrifices required to protect not only themselves, but also their families, friends, neighbours and co-workers. When this

pandemic is over we will witness Saskatchewan's resilience, as our economy recovers and grows, as businesses reopen and more people return to work, and as Saskatchewan recovers to be even stronger than before."

As the provincial government tabled the budget Apr. 6, Saskatchewan New Democratic Party Leader Ryan Meili said it was out of touch and broke key campaign commitments.

"Scott Moe has failed Saskatchewan. This budget shows that the premier is in over his head and he hasn't been honest with the people of this province about the realities we're all facing," said Meili. "People were having a tough time before COVID-19 hit and the Sask. Party's failure to show leadership in containing the pandemic means those families are even further behind. This budget takes the same approach as the government's pandemic response: weak half measures that don't get the job done for Saskatchewan people."

"The government said during the election they would balance the budget

by 2024, knowing full well that they would not. That lie was confirmed today. They said there would be no tax increases for families. Instead, property taxes for families are going up. And now we see the government lied to families in the last election about their plans to increase staffing in our hard-hit long-term care facilities," said Meili.

Along with reaction from the NDP, others also weighed in on the budget.

The Saskatchewan Teachers' Federation was encouraged stating the budget signals public education is a priority. "There are always resource challenges in schools and we always hope for funding increases beyond inflation and enrolment increases. However, these are difficult times for citizens and for government. A budget always requires tough choices to be made and the pandemic has increased financial pressure on the provincial government," said STF President Patrick Maze. "This budget essentially holds the line for education. Given the circumstances, this is a realistic approach."

However, Maze cautioned there will still be resource challenges in schools. "The challenges we had pre-pandemic haven't gone away and now there are new ones. Students have all had very different experiences over the last year that will need to be addressed. School divisions will still have to make difficult decisions."

According to the Saskatchewan Chamber, the budget contains several important new items for Saskatchewan businesses. "While the pandemic has impacted every household and business differently, we will collectively recover by focusing on health and safety protocols, and by vaccinating our residents as soon as possible. Once the pandemic is less of a concern, we expect the province to renew and increase its focus on the transition to economic recovery and building resilience into all we do in Saskatchewan," said Saskatchewan Chamber of Commerce CEO, Steve McLellan.

McLellan noted the budget also contains important elements crucial to

Saskatchewan businesses including continued financial supports for members of the business community negatively impacted by COVID-19, \$3.1 billion of Capital Investments, and an investment of \$3.2 million to improve the cyber security of Saskatchewan's public service systems.

The Saskatchewan Federation of Labour (SFL) felt the budget missed a crucial opportunity to invest in working people at a time when workers are struggling due to unemployment, illness, and uncertainty caused by the COVID-19 pandemic.

"Today was an opportunity for the government to put workers first, and make meaningful investments that would create jobs and get people back to work, make workplaces safer, and ensure that workers have the supports they need to be able to get through the rest of the pandemic," said SFL President Lori Johb. "Unfortunately, this budget offers very little for the working people who have been on the front lines of this crisis since day one."

The Canadian Taxpay-

ers Federation called on the government to strengthen its plan to tackle the deficit. "It's true the pandemic is creating costs for government, but every family and business has found ways to save money and the province needs to do that as well," said Todd MacKay, the CTF's Prairie Director. "Spending is going up in 10 out of the 11 major budget categories. It's good to see the Saskatchewan government set a target to balance the budget, but it needs to work harder to hit that target earlier."

The Agriculture Producers Association of Saskatchewan (APAS) was pleased the government is investing in agricultural programming and in improving rural telecommunications stating the government's priorities for Agri-stability, irrigation development and research funding maintenance are positive impacts for the agriculture industry.

"COVID really has been a shock to the economy, and agriculture is well poised to lead the recovery, and we will," APAS President Todd Lewis said.

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
