being cancelled due to the pandemic, the Watrous and Area Art Council's Juried Art Show returns in 2022. With a number of talented artists showcasing their work, the Watrous Civic Centre will be home to the Juried Art Show Apr. 28, 29 and 30.

Visual Coordinator and Co-chair for the Visual Arts with the Watrous and Area Arts Council Toni Ambrose said the group is looking forward to once again being able to host the show. "It has been over four years since we last held a juried art show

because we had to cancel the previous one in 2020 and then again in 2021 due to the pandemic. We are really excited to see it take place in 2022."

He specializes in acrylic painting and sculpture in traditional materials and teaches Saskatchewan art history."

RCMP Report

Two charged after search warrant executed

On Apr. 17, Cut Knife RCMP executed a search warrant on Little Pine First Nation as part of an ongoing investigation. Officers located and seized an illegally-modified firearm from the residence. Two occupants of the residence were arrested and charged.

John Sokwaypnace of Little Pine First Nation is charged with single counts of: unsafe storage of a firearm, Section 86(2), Criminal Code; possession of a prohibited weapon with ammunition, Section 95(2), Criminal Code; possession of a weapon with a tampered serial number, Section 108(2), Criminal Code; possession of a weapon for a dangerous purpose, Section 88(2), Criminal Code; and possession of a firearm knowing possession is unauthorized, Section 92(3)(a), Criminal Code.

A male youth, who cannot be identified as per the Youth Criminal Justice Act, is charged with single counts of: unsafe storage of a firearm, Section 86(2), Criminal Code; possession of a prohibited weapon with ammunition, Section 95(2), Criminal Code; possession of a weapon with a tampered serial number, Section 108(2), Criminal Code; possession of a weapon for a dangerous

purpose, Section 88(2), Criminal Code; and possession of a firearm knowing possession is unauthorized, Section 92(3)(a), Criminal Code; and two counts, possession of weapon contrary to order and fail to surrender authorization, Section 117.01(3), Criminal Code.

Pair face multiple charges

An adult male and adult female are facing multiple weapons and drug charges after an incident in Regina Thursday, Apr. 7.

Shortly after 9:30 p.m. members of the Street Gangs Unit were conducting a drug and firearms investigation which led to a traffic stop in the 2000 Block of McTavish Street. Members of the SWAT and Canine Unit were called in to assist, as investigators had reason to believe there were firearms in the vehicle.

Initial attempts to get all suspects to exit the vehicle were not successful and, as a result, officers determined that a tool used to break windows from a distance was necessary.

Following the deployment, all suspects exited the vehicle and were arrested without further incident. A search of the vehicle and the suspects turned up methamphetamine, fentanyl, Canadian currency and other items that are consistent with drug trafficking. A loaded firearm and ammunition were also recovered from the vehicle.

As a result of this investigation an adult male and adult female are facing charges.

Twenty-eight-year-old Cain Lindahl is charged with: Possession of a Scheduled Substance for the Purpose of Trafficking [5(2) CDSA]; Possession of Proceeds of Crime Under \$5,000 [355(b) CC]; Possession of a Weapon [88 CC]; Careless Use of a Firearm, Weapon, Prohibited Device

or Ammunition [86(1) CC]; Unauthorized Possession of a Firearm [91(1) CC]; 3 x Possession of a Firearm or Ammunition Contrary to Prohibition Order [117.01(1) CC]; and Fail to Comply with Probation Order [733.1(1) CC].

Thirty-six-year-old Clara Rainville is charged with: Possession of a Scheduled Substance for the Purpose of Trafficking [5(2) CDSA]; Possession of Proceeds of Crime Under \$5,000 [355(b) CC]; Possession of a Weapon [88 CC]; Careless Use of a Firearm, Weapon, Prohibited Device or Ammunition [86(1) CC]; and Unauthorized Possession of a Firearm [91(1) CC].

Pair charged with second degree murder

A 33-year-old woman and a 27-year-old man, both from Saskatoon, have been charged with Second Degree Murder after RCMP received a report of an injured person.

At approximately 1:15 p.m., Apr. 15, 2022, Warman RCMP responded to a report of an injured person on Hodgson Road near Hwy. 7, about five kilometres southwest of Saskatoon. The 22-year-old man passed away on the scene.

RCMP Investigators determined the man had been at a Saskatoon residence in the 600 block of Wardlow Road. RCMP Major Crime investigators contacted Saskatoon Police Service Major Crime Section for assistance and both agencies continued the investigation.

At approximately 11 p.m., Apr. 16, 2022, Saskatoon Police arrested two suspects from the address on Wardlow Road.

This incident is not believed to be random.

The accused are both charged with Second Degree Murder.

REACT partnering with SARCAN to collect glass for recycling

The REACT Waste Management District, your local municipal owned regional waste and recycling authority, is pleased to announce that residents can now take their clear and coloured glass to SARCAN depots within the district for recycling free of charge effective Apr. 18, 2022.

REACT has partnered with SARCAN to allow residents to take their household glass containers to depots located at seven locations within the district. This includes SARCAN depots at Humboldt, Watson, Lanigan, Naicam, Wakaw, Cudworth and Watrous. REACT will pay SARCAN a fee per tonne to accept the glass at the SARCAN depots.

Wendy Yaworski, CEO for REACT explained, “It is a win-win situation. Our residents will now be able to recycle household glass and we know it is being collected clean because unacceptable waste is sorted

out at the source. This is a wonderful opportunity to help keep glass out of the landfills. The clear glass is made into reflective beads that are put into highway paint and the coloured glass is made into insulation.”

Glass items accepted are food jars, baby juice bottles, home canning jars and glass storage containers. Please make sure the item is clean and the lid is removed before taking it to your local SARCAN depot.

Residents are encouraged to visit the SARCAN Facebook page or their website at www.sarcan.ca to get a list of acceptable glass products that can be taken to SARCAN depots within the district.

Several years ago, I purchased a lovely silver earring and necklace set in Asia. Both have now become quite tarnished. The person at the jewelry store said I would have to have them re-plated at a cost that was considerably more than what I paid for them. Is there any other way that I can get rid of the tarnish? Dear Ruth,

Lay crumpled aluminum foil in a baking pan. Place the jewelry onto the foil. Pour hot water into the pan and add one tablespoon salt. Soak silver for five minutes and polish.

I am sure that I read something in a past column of yours regarding painting basement floors. Ours is cement and the finish used was recommended by our local building supply dealer and applied according to directions. It does not seem to be working and the paint is coming off in patches. I believe the problem is dampness coming from underneath. Any help you can give me would be appreciated. Holly

Dear Holly,

This is a common problem in basements that were not sealed before painting. Consider sanding off the peeling paint and then apply a sealing product such as Aqua Seal before applying the proper paint. Following that, talk to your local hardware store about the best epoxy paint to use on the

After an entry of triumph into the city, Jesus went to the temple courts and there he overturned the tables of the money changers. He told the people, "My house will be called a house of prayer," "but you are making it a den of robbers." (Matthew 21:13)

The Pharisees demanded of Jesus, "By what authority

are you doing these things?" Jesus told them the parable of the Tenants. In the story, a landowner leased out his vineyard to tenants expecting them to pay him rent at harvest time. When he sent several servants to collect the rent for each harvest, the tenants maltreated them and refused to pay what was owed to the owner.

The owner was impatient with his tenants' response to his servants. So he sent his son, thinking they would honour him and pay up. Unfortunately, they killed the owner's son, thinking that the vineyard will be ours when the owner is dead without an heir. At the death of his son, the owner came and killed the evil tenants and leased his vineyard to trustworthy renters ready to pay their rent.

The Pharisees understood Jesus was saying they were the evil tenants unwilling to honour God or His Son. Jesus, as the

Son of God, made it clear that he knew they were set on killing him as they had rejected and killed other prophets before Jesus. The Pharisees were unwilling to consider that all the signs and wonders that Jesus had accomplished before them were so they could see that God's leadership of His people was changing and they needed to accept it.

Some need to stop ignoring and rejecting God and His Son. Some need to stop being as self-assured as the Pharisees. In the parable, the landowner (God) was extremely patient, giving the tenants many chances to honour him and share with him what was rightfully his. The tenants did not own the vineyard, but they could have enjoyed it and paid the owner what was due. Instead, they brought about their own destruction. May we turn to God in humility and openness to learn from Him before his patience is ended.

Crustless Blueberry Pie

Ingredients:

1 cup granulated sugar

1 cup flour

1 tsp. cinnamon

1/4 tsp. salt

1/2 cup melted butter or hard margarine

2 large eggs

1 tsp. vanilla

1/2 tsp. almond extract

2 cups fresh or frozen blueberries (if frozen do not thaw)

Directions:

Preheat oven to 350°F. Spray a nine inch pie plate with cooking spray. Set this aside. I use a glass pie plate so check your baking times if you use a metal one as the cooking time is likely shorter by a few minutes.

Mix together the sugar, flour, salt, cinnamon in a bowl. In a microwave safe bowl melt the butter for about 40 seconds. If the butter is already at room temperature, check after 25 to 30 seconds. You want it melted but not extremely hot. Let the butter cool for about a minute, then add the eggs. You don't want to cook the eggs in the hot butter. Add the eggs to the butter along with the almond, vanilla and combine. Pour the wet mixture over the flour mixture and stir to combine. Don't over mix. Add the two cups of blueberries and stir gently to combine. This batter is very thick. Pour into the pie plate, smoothing the top gently. Sprinkle the top with another 1/4 cup blueberries and two tbsp. sugar. Bake for about 35 minutes or until a toothpick inserted in centre comes out dry. Allow pie to cool on wire rack and slice and serve with frozen whipped topping or ice cream.

Watrous Fire Department taking part in grain rescue training

In an effort to prevent grain entrapment situations while becoming familiar with the conditions and equipment used in grain handling and storage, a BeGrainSafe training course is taking place in Watrous involving members of the local fire department and area producers.

With McArthur Ag Ventures and Amanda McArthur with Farmers Business Network sponsoring the rescue equipment and training, Watrous Fire Department Chief Jory Vanthuyne said the grain rescue training program is being brought to Watrous in an effort to learn about grain safety measures.

"In response to increased grain entrapment fatalities, the program has worked to save lives since 2017 and we felt it would be important to bring the program to Watrous."

Setting up at the Watrous Centennial Arena on Saturday, Apr. 30 from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m., the public is invited to attend and watch the demonstrations. A free barbecue is also taking place from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. and Vanthuyne said members of the Watrous Fire Department will be on hand

to interact with those in attendance.

With awareness-raising displays and demonstrations, Vanthuyne noted the Canadian Agricultural Safety Association's (CASA) program aims at reaching all ages with its grain safety message.

"For our fire department and our local producers taking CASA's training, the program will help us become familiar with the conditions and equipment used in grain handling and storage, which may contribute to grain entrapment situations or result in injury to individuals working in an on-farm grain handling and storage facility."

A mobile training BeGrainSafe trailer and demonstration unit will be at the Watrous Centennial Arena parking lot providing those taking the program an opportunity to learn the dangers of grain entrapment and rescue training procedures.

"This is going to be a very informative and worthwhile opportunity for producers and our local fire department to take advantage of. We really appreciate Amanda McArthur of Farmers Business Network and McArthur Ag Ventures for sponsoring the rescue equipment and training."

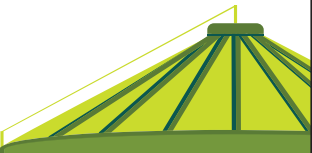

Nutrien Lanigan hosts annual emergency response competition

Nutrien Lanigan will be holding its annual Emergency Response Competition on Thursday, Apr. 28, 2022 at the Lanigan Recreation Complex.

An established and well-rehearsed emergency protocol allows for fast and efficient response to emergencies. The Lanigan Division emergency response plan includes teams comprised of employees from various departments who volunteer for the emergency response program. Many of these employees are also members of their local volunteer fire departments and this training benefits their local communities as well. The emergency response teams receive extensive

training throughout the year and this competition gives them the opportunity to showcase and enhance their skills.

At the Emergency Response Competition, four teams will compete in a variety of events. In the Mine Problem, teams work against the clock to rescue casualties in a mine “emergency”, while ensuring the safety of the team. An indoor “mock” mine, built to scale, is constructed especially for this event. The First Aid competition presents another challenging simulation for competitors and a fascinating experience for spectators. Responding to an “accident”, competitors are judged on proper identification and treatment of injuries. Expertly applied makeup makes the simulation seem very real.

Fire Fighting is a timed event where three types of fires must be extinguished. Teams are judged on how quickly and accurately they can check, test and assemble their emergency response gear in the Proficiency Bench Test.

Everyone is welcome to attend this one-day event, which provides a glimpse into the world of an emergency response team member at Nutrien Lanigan. The activities begin at 8:15 a.m. at the Lanigan Recreation Complex (detailed event brochures will be available). There is no admission charge.

The winner of this competition will represent Nutrien Lanigan at the Provincial Mine Rescue Competition to be held Saturday, June 4, 2022, at the Exhibition Grounds in Saskatoon.

Avian influenza confirmed in Saskatchewan poultry flocks

Highly pathogenic avian influenza (HPAI) has recently been confirmed in a Saskatchewan backyard flock and a commercial poultry flock.

The Government of Saskatchewan continues to work with the poultry industry and the Canadian Food Inspection Agency

(CFIA), which is leading the disease response in Saskatchewan as well as in other provinces experiencing outbreaks in farmed birds. CFIA-confirmed findings of HPAI in domestic poultry are posted on the CFIA website. Biosecurity remains the best tool for poultry producers and small flock owners to protect their

birds from avian influenza. Biosecurity protocols include keeping wild birds away from poultry flocks and their food and water supply, limiting visitors and monitoring bird health. Small flock owners are encouraged to confine their birds indoors, if possible, during wild bird migration. Producers should contact their

veterinarian immediately if they have concerns about the health status of their flocks. If avian influenza is suspected, producers should also contact their local CFIA office.

On Apr. 14, 2022, Saskatchewan’s Chief Veterinary Officer put in place an animal health control area order to limit the co-mingling of poultry

due to the risk of HPAI. The order, in place until May 14, 2022, prohibits the movement to and participation of birds in shows, auctions and agricultural fairs, as well as any other events where birds would be brought together from multiple locations.

There is no risk to food safety. The risk of

transmission of avian influenza to humans is low. However, people working with poultry suspected of being infected with avian influenza should use protective clothing.

Saskatchewan producers and farm families are reminded the provincial Farm Stress Line can be contacted 24-hours-a-day at 1-800-667-4442.

SGI providing funding to volunteer firefighter departments

SGI is investing \$5.6 million to train and equip volunteer firefighters who respond to vehicle collisions on Saskatchewan roads.

The money will be used for a program that will be the first of its kind in Canada. The program’s objectives are:

- To fund the delivery of training courses that allow volunteer firefighters to meet minimum standards for auto extrication; and
- Purchasing tools and equipment that support that training.

“Advancements in vehicle technology have led to

new materials and designs in modern automobiles,” Minister Responsible for SGI Don Morgan said. “Volunteer firefighters are often the first to respond to collisions on highways and rural roads, and it is essential that volunteer fire departments are kept up-to-date with evolving tool developments and adaptations around new car designs.”

“This is excellent news for the nearly 300 volunteer firefighting agencies in Saskatchewan,” Saskatchewan Volunteer Firefighters Association President Doug Lapchuk said. “This program will greatly enhance our abilities to safely and adequately respond to motor vehicle collisions involving entrapment, in far more areas of our province that

currently may not have extrication services available in a timely manner.”

The fund will be managed and distributed by the Saskatchewan Public Safety Agency (SPSA), who will consult with SGI, the Provincial Standards Training Committee, fire service stakeholders and other Government of Saskatchewan ministries during program development.

The SPSA will work with the Saskatchewan Volunteer Fire Fighters Association, the Saskatchewan Association of Fire Chiefs and other stakeholders to develop auto extrication training standards and establish a fair and equitable process for purchasing tools and equipment.
