Record turnout for Fun Run

Not only did the annual Watrous and Manitou Beach Auto Show 'N' Shine Fun Run reach 300 entries for the second time in its 32 year history, but it surpassed the previous milestone to set a new record in 2023.

During the event's 30th season, a total of 300 vehicles lined Main Street in Watrous, the first time the show hit that mark. This past year a total of 275 vehicles were registered, but in 2023, organizer Al Madland said they reached a record 340 paid entries.

"Everything went according to plan and went really well," shared Madland about the July 29 event. "We blew the old record out of the water by 40 vehicles so that was awesome. The turnout was super and totally incredible. It was great for the town."

Estimating there were around 700 people between vehicle owners and vendors, add in spectators and Madland thought between 1,500 to 2,000 people showed up along Main Street in Watrous for Saturday's Fun Run. "My understanding is all of the vendors did really well. They sold out of pie and coffee, they sold out of pancakes for breakfast, Mini Mart did well and I heard 28 cases of hamburgers were sold. Everybody did really good surprisingly with our Main Street tore up."

With the Main Street Revitalization Project fully underway in Watrous, the #100, #200 and #300 blocks were unusable for vehicles so the show was moved further down and started at the #400 block. Pushing north, Madland said as the remainder of Main Street became occupied, the show spilled over to the side streets with eight to a dozen vehicles on each side.

"We had room for a bit more entries on 8th Avenue but we were shocked at how many there ended up being in the end. We were not sure how things would go with part of Main Street closed but it worked out really well in the end. The car owners were pleased because they had more room to operate behind their vehicles. Everybody was really happy with the way things went."

Checking out all makes and models along the street, Madland shared vehicles came from B.C., Alta., Sask., and Man. The organizer also heard a car from Ontario was part of the show.

Just like last year, Madland explained there were some difficult choices when it came to selecting the winners for the 32nd annual event.

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Under construction

► It has been a busy few weeks along Main Street in Watrous as the Main Street Revitalization Project is underway. Closing down portions of the #100, #200, and #300 blocks, crews have been busy ripping up sidewalks and curbs and replacing the aging portions. Posting daily updates on its Facebook page Monday to Friday, the Town of Watrous indicated as of Aug. 2 that work continued to progress on each block. On the west side of the #100 and #200 blocks, removal of the sidewalk and curb had been completed and sidewalk pouring was being done Aug. 3. Curb pouring is slated for early this week. On the east side of the #100 and #200 blocks, concrete sidewalk and curb were completed. On the west side of the #300 block, removal of the sidewalk and curb was completed along with the granular base. Pouring was slated for Aug. 3 while on the east side, concrete sidewalk and curb were completed.

In addition to the vehicles, some of the Fun Run's other events included the Sask. Agility Dogs, Beeper the Clown, face painting, live entertainment, beer gardens, a monster truck giving rides, trade show, and rummage sale.

"The weather was perfect and we could not have asked for a nicer day. I went to Bruno's car show the following day and people there said what an awesome job we did. There was something for everybody and I think that explains the great turnout. We have become very well-known over the years and we try and treat everybody as good as we can."

Hoping to see the show continue next year, Madland stated it cannot move forward without the continued support of businesses and volunteers. "The biggest thing was our sponsors and our volunteers. If you don't have them you can't have a successful car show. That also includes those running the pancake breakfast, cooking burgers and hot dogs, selling ice cream, and the seniors selling pie and coffee. We just really appreciate all the people who helped make this year's show a huge success."

Manitou Beach Chainsaw Carving Festival a cut above

With tremendous talent from all over Canada carving incredible pieces, the Manitou Beach Chainsaw Carving Festival has not only provided a rather unique opportunity to spectators over the years but for the competitors as well.

Held at the Resort Village of Manitou Beach

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Aug. 10 to 13, this year's event is attracting world-class carvers who will utilize inspiration to create their masterpieces. With quick carves, the main carving event, a vendors market, 50/50, raffle, and beer gardens, Fawne Inkster, who is one of the organizers, said there is a lot going on for people to check out.

Anticipating another successful chainsaw carving festival, Inkster took some time out of her busy schedule to share about the 2023 event and what people can expect. **Are you looking forward to this year's chainsaw carving festival?**

Definitely looking forward to it. This is our fifth event, with the first one being held in 2015. The festival is held every second year and even though lots of time is put into this event by

our committee, it is very much worth it in the end. Seeing all the carvers in action and the spectators who come out, it is so rewarding meeting so many new people.

How many carvers are attending this year's festival?

This year we have 10 carvers coming from British Columbia, Alberta, Manitoba, Ontario and Saskatchewan. Two of the carvers, Jim Niedermayer and Mike Winia have been at every festival since it started in 2015. The other carvers, Kevin Bendig, Darcy Birnie, Patricia Dippolito, Marty Duerinckx, Kamron Garbe, De-Ann Holmes, and Gary Natomagan have all attended at least one event in the past and will be back this year. Tyler Welfing is the other carver attending and is new to the Manitou Beach Chainsaw

Carving Festival.

Will the event be similar to previous years?

This year's event is very similar with the carvers being the main highlight. There will be silent auctions each day for the quick carve carvings and a weekend long silent auction for three of our "retired" large carvings. There will also be a vendors market with about 30 or so vendors in attendance. We will have a daily 50/50, raffle draws and beer gardens.

How unique is an event like this?

This event is very unique to Saskatchewan. Our festival is the only festival of its kind held right here at Manitou Beach. British Columbia has two or three festivals that are similar to ours as does Alberta, Manitoba and Ontario but as far as Saskatchewan goes, we

are the only ones to hold something like this.

How has the support been from the area?

The local interest seems to be growing every year. The donations and sponsorships from local and area businesses are fantastic. We sure hope the community takes the opportunity to come check out the event.

What can people expect while at the event this year?

Amazing talent with a chainsaw, fun, laughs, food, vendors, and meeting new people from all over. **When does the festival get underway?**

It starts Aug. 10 and goes right through to Aug. 13 at 3 p.m. The gates open 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. Thursday to Saturday and then Sunday it is from 8 a.m. to 3 p.m.

Are you still looking for volunteers?

Volunteers are always welcome. A criminal

record and vulnerable persons check are required to volunteer at the event. Getting a check seems to be a common theme for events and it is quite simple. A letter can be obtained from the Manitou Beach Village Office for the festival. That letter then needs to be taken to the Watrous RCMP office along with two pieces of identification. After filling out the form, two minutes later you have your check. That document then needs to be taken to the Resort Village of Manitou Beach Office and is kept on file. **Is there anything else you would like to add?**

RCMP Report

Airplane crash north of LeRoy

On Aug. 2, 2023 at approximately 4 p.m., Humboldt and Lanigan RCMP, Humboldt Fire Department, Humboldt Emergency Medical Services, and LeRoy Fire and Ambulance Services responded to an airplane crash north of the community of LeRoy.

The lone operator of the light aircraft and his small dog were located trapped upside down in the cockpit of the plane. Within a short period of time and team work of all Emergency Services the occupants were freed from the aircraft. The operator and dog were not injured and were reunited with family a short time later.

RCMP conduct traffic initiative

From Tuesday July 11 to Thursday July 13, 2023, the Saskatchewan RCMP checked approximately 4,500 vehicles on Hwy. 11 by Chamberlain, Sask.

Saskatchewan RCMP Combined Traffic Services Saskatchewan (CTSS) partnered with officers from Saskatchewan Highway Patrol of the Provincial Protective Services (PPS) Branch to conduct the traffic initiative. The focus for police officers was removing impaired drivers, unsafe vehicles and vehicles towing recreational items (ex. campers, trailers and boats) improperly from Saskatchewan roads.

Here is what was located: 40 driver's licence suspensions for being impaired by cannabis; one driver's licence suspension for being impaired by

cocaine; one driver's licence suspension for being impaired by alcohol; seven tickets for cellphone use while driving; 17 tickets for seatbelt offences (ex. not wearing seatbelt, child not in an approved car seat); nine tickets for driving an unregistered vehicle; four tickets for possessing or consuming cannabis in a vehicle; 189 tickets were issued for various other offences (ex. speeding, vehicle equipment violations); 13 vehicle inspections were issued; four drivers located with current licence suspensions; 31 vehicles taken out of service for various infractions (ex. no trailer brakes/signal lights, no safety chains on a trailer); two drivers were arrested in relation to outstanding warrants; three drivers were driving without a valid licence; three people charged under the Tobacco Act - one driver had over 10,000 cigarettes in the vehicle; and 898 warnings were issued.

*These violations and tickets were identified/issued between 1:30 p.m. to 4 p.m. Tuesday and 11 a.m. to 7 p.m. Wednesday/Thursday.

A total of 42 vehicles were impounded for impaired driving at the dedicated traffic stop on Hwy. 11 during the week. The Saskatchewan RCMP has seen an increasing number of licence suspensions, specifically for cannabis use.

"Saskatchewan RCMP officers have advanced training in using specialized tools to detect drug impairment, which has ultimately resulted in a rise in cannabis-related licence suspensions since 2019," said Superintendent Grant St. Germaine, officer in charge of Saskatchewan RCMP's Traffic Services. "Perhaps surprisingly, the individuals facing licence suspensions as a result of our proactive traffic initiative this week were everyday commuters – some even going to work or travelling with young children. Our RCMP officers on duty in Chamberlain, in conjunction with Saskatchewan Highway Patrol, helped make our roads safer this week – and for that I am grateful."

RCMP respond to calls at Country Thunder

Saskatchewan RCMP police officers responded to 105 calls for service related to the Country Thunder music festival between Wednesday, July 12 and 7 a.m. Monday, July 17, which resulted in 26 in custody. For comparison purposes, last year Saskatchewan RCMP received 126 calls for services, which resulted in 32 in custody.

Below is a summary of the calls for service and results of proactive patrols by the Saskatchewan RCMP over the Country Thunder festival. Officers were dedicated to road safety for the duration of the festival and responding to any calls for service in the area.

Generally, the calls for service included: 27 calls for disturbing the peace/causing a disturbance (Section 175(1) of the Criminal Code); 24 liquor act offences (ex. AGRA tickets issued, public intoxication); 14 roadside suspension for alcohol impairment – three

day and 60 day suspensions; seven calls to assist the general public (ex. assisting until EMS arrives on scene); four operating motor vehicle while impaired, over .08mg% limit (Section 320(1)(a),(1)(b) of the Criminal Code); three reports of items lost/found (ex. driver's licences, wallet); three mischiefs, damage to or obstruct enjoyment of property (Section 430(3) and (4) of the Criminal Code); two reports of an assault (Section 266 of the Criminal Code); two calls to report impaired drivers; two calls to assist non-RCMP agency (ex. executing warrants); two motor vehicle insurance coverage violations (ex. driving without registration); one report of an assault with weapon or causing bodily harm (Section 267 of the Criminal Code); one roadside suspension for drug impairment – 60 day suspension; one mental health act (ex. assisting Regina Police Service with locating an individual); one obstructing justice (Section 139(2) of the Criminal Code); one report of a family dispute; one report of a theft under \$5,000 (ex. a generator); one person in possession of cocaine; one cannabis act offence (ex. consuming cannabis in public place); one report of a suspicious person/vehicle; one report of credit card being stolen; and one call to complete a wellbeing check.

Of these calls for service, 15 individuals received suspended driver's licences due to alcohol or drug impairment, four of which are also facing criminal charges. On Saturday and Sunday, the Saskatchewan RCMP conducted a proactive traffic initiative in partnership with Saskatchewan Government Insurance (SGI) to ensure impaired drivers were taken off Saskatchewan roadways.

"I am proud of the collaboration amongst all officers and representatives present during the event," said S/ Sgt. Tim Sartison from the South District Management Team. "Our officers ensured they were accessible to respond to calls for services and maintained traffic safety. We assisted and worked closely with our partners, some of which include, Saskatchewan Public Safety Agency, Saskatchewan Highway Patrol, Saskatchewan Government Insurance, Saskatchewan Liquor and Gaming Authority, event organizers, and on-site festival security to ensure a safe weekend."

Advanced and proactive planning is a crucial part of the Saskatchewan RCMP's operational plans to identify potential risks and reduce concerns for public safety, specifically for busy weekends and larger events, such as Country Thunder. The Saskatchewan RCMP would like to thank the public for following police direction over the weekend and for helping to keep Saskatchewan roadways safe.

Psalm 63:3 Your love is better than life... or ice cream. Mixing Sarah McLachlan lyrics and the Psalms might seem out of place, yet the idea is the same, the quest

is the same.

Tips from Reena Nerbas

Dear Reena,

Can I dye my faded black jeans with black dye for a like new colour? Would you have any cautions? Rachel

Dear Rachel,

What a wonderful question! So often we toss items that we no longer want instead of reusing them and figuring out creative solutions. Purchase RIT dye and use it according to the instructions. While wearing rubber gloves, dissolve the dye in boiling water in an old

pot on the stove. Add the mixture to a bucket of water. After allowing the jeans to soak, wash them in the washing machine, separately, according to the instructions.

How can I keep ants off my hummingbird feeder? I have cut up sticky mouse traps and taped them onto the feeder; I am hoping that will stop the ants. Justin

Dear Justin,

Remove the sticky mouse traps and instead purchase a hummingbird feeder with an ant moat. Fill the moat with water so that the ants cannot reach the hummingbird food. Even though hummingbirds eat bugs, ants will deter hummingbirds from visiting your feeder. An even easier solution is use fishing line to suspend the feeder so that ants cannot get to the sweet, sugary food.

Double Chocolate Pie

Ingredients:

1 1/2 cups skim milk (divided)

1 pkg. sugar free instant chocolate pudding mix

1 large container of Cool Whip, thawed

1 graham cracker pie crust

1 pkg. sugar free instant vanilla or white chocolate pudding mix

Directions:

In a bowl, mix 3/4 cup milk with the chocolate pudding and mix for about two minutes. Fold in 1 3/4 cups Cool Whip topping. Spread on the graham wafer pie crust. 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



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

The event started off with a two day light horse show. Six of our members were in attendance and came home with many ribbons. Jasper Edwards was fifth in Junior Western Pleasure. Katie Edwards placed fifth in both Junior Keyhole and Poles. Naomi Schmidt placed first in Senior Stake Race, second in Keyhole and Command, third in Poles and Showmanship, and fifth in Pairs. Abbie Schindle placed second in Junior Keyhole, third in Stake Race and Command, fourth in Turn and Burn and Quadrangle and fifth in Pairs. Mesa Bartel placed third in Junior Horsemanship and fourth in Pole Bending. Kaylin Bartel placed second in Intermediate Turn and Burn and Stake Race, third in Quadrangle, Western Pleasure and Barrels, fourth in Pole Bending and fifth in Trail. A very strong

showing from the Carlton Trail Light Horse Club at the 2023 regional show.

The dairy show was on Saturday morning. Four members were in attendance. Seth Friesen placed second in Junior Showmanship and fourth in Intermediate Calf. Corbin Friesen placed fourth in Intermediate Showmanship, third in Intermediate Calf and second in Summer Yearling. Gabrielle Knause placed third in Intermediate Showmanship and first in Summer Yearling Class. Gabrielle also had the Reserve Champion Female of the show. Faith Friesen placed first in Intermediate Showmanship and won overall Champion Showman. Faith had a first place finish in Senior Calf, which was also named the Champion Female. This is the first year for dairy within the Carlton Trail Club.

All the members in attendance were involved in a judging competition on Saturday. Members judged alpacas, beef, dairy, sheep and a mystery class, which was water quality. In judging alpacas, Tristan Lehr placed 10th and Adelita Nordick was

fourth in juniors, with Sophie Bernauer ninth and Chaz Dumanski second in the intermediate group. In beef, Chaz Dumanski placed eighth in the intermediate group with Cade Bartel being ninth and Austin Krieger being fourth in the senior group. In dairy, Kate Edwards was eighth, Tristan Lear was fifth, Mesa Bartel was third, and Seth Friesen was first in the junior category. Chaz Dumanski was fourth and Corbin Friesen was second in the intermediate category. Faith Friesen was ninth, Cade Bartel was fourth, Austin Krieger was third, and Chloe Mills was second in the senior division judging dairy. In sheep, Claire Bergermann was sixth and Seth Friesen was fourth in the junior group. Corbin Friesen was 10th, Kaylin Bartel was eighth and Sophie Bernauer was fourth in the intermediate group judging sheep. Faith Friesen was 10th and Teresa Friesen was second in the seniors. In the mystery class Adelita Nordick was seventh in the junior group, and Corbin Friesen was ninth with Sophie Bernauer being sixth in the intermediate group. Cade Bartel placed third in beef oral

reasonings. Determined by their placings in each of the items or animals judged, the top 12 overall members are selected for each age category. Jasper Edwards was 10th in the overall junior category, Sophie Bernauer was eighth in the intermediate overall category, and Teresa Friesen was 12th in the senior overall category.

The sheep show was Sunday morning with nine members in attendance. This was also the first time our sheep members have attended the regional show. Kash Nordick placed second in Cloverbud Showmanship and fifth in Costume Class. Hailey Bernauer placed fourth in Cloverbud Showmanship, first in Current Year Ewe Lamb, and fourth in Market Lamb over 100 pounds. Lacey Grant placed third in Cloverbud Showmanship, third in Costume Class and seventh in Market Lamb over 100 pounds. Lane Nordick placed first in Junior Showmanship, seventh in Costume Class and first in Market Lamb over 100 pounds. His market lamb was also the show's Grand Champion Market Lamb. Tristan Lehr placed fifth in Junior Showmanship and first in Yearling Ewe.

Kate Edwards was 10th in Junior Showmanship and sixth in Current Year Ewe Lamb. Mesa Bartel was seventh in Junior Showmanship, second in Costume Class, sixth in Yearling Ewe Class and third in Market Lamb less than 100 pounds. Adelita Nordick was fourth in Junior Showmanship, fifth in Current Year Ewe Lamb, eighth in Ewe With Lamb At Foot and first in Market Lamb less than 100 pounds. Adelita's market lamb was the overall Reserve Champion Market Lamb. Jasper Edwards was sixth in Junior Showmanship, ninth in Costume Class, fifth in Yearling Ewe Class, seventh in Ewe With Lamb At Foot and fourth in Market Lamb less than 100 pounds. Sophie Bernauer was first in Intermediate Showmanship, second in Current Year Ewe Lamb and fifth in Market Lamb over 100 pounds.

The event concluded with the beef show. There was a female show July 9 and a steer show and sale July 10. Members competed by breed in the heifer show. Teresa Friesen was sixth in the Angus Yearling Heifer class, Ethan Snider was fifth in the Other Breeds Yearling class, Cade Bartel was fourth in the Red Angus Heifer class, Kaylin Bartel was second in the Red Angus Heifer class, Austin Krieger placed first in Other Breeds Yearling Heifer class, and Chaz Dumanski also placed first in the Red Angus Heifer class. Chaz's heifer was selected as the Grand Champion yearling heifer. Two members exhibited a cow/calf pair: Cade Bartel and Austin Krieger both

placed second in their classes. Austin's cow/calf pair was the Reserve Champion Cow/Calf Pair overall and was also named the Reserve Female. In showmanship, Kaylin Bartel placed fourth in intermediate, and Austin Krieger was Senior Champion and overall Supreme Showmanship Champion. The members were put into teams for the team grooming event. Our senior team of Chloe Mills and Austin Krieger won their age category with Cade Bartel and Teresa Friesen placing third in the senior division. Our intermediate group consisting of Kaylin Bartel, Chaz Dumanski and Ethan Snider who also won their age category. Those competing in the steer show were placed in classes determined by the steers weight on arrival Friday. Claire Bergermann was sixth in her light weight class. Chaz Dumanski was fifth in his medium weight class and Austin Krieger was first in his medium weight class. Chloe Mills placed first in her heavy weight class, winning the Heavy Weight Champion distinction as well. Kaylin Bartel was first in her light weight class, being also awarded the Lightweight Champion. Kaylin's steer was selected as the Grand Champion Steer of the 2023 Junior Ag showcase.

This year, the Carlton Trail 4-H Club had the most members present at the regional show in many years. This is attributed to the support and encouragement of our

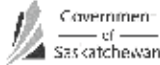

Congratulations to Debbie Farago. She was

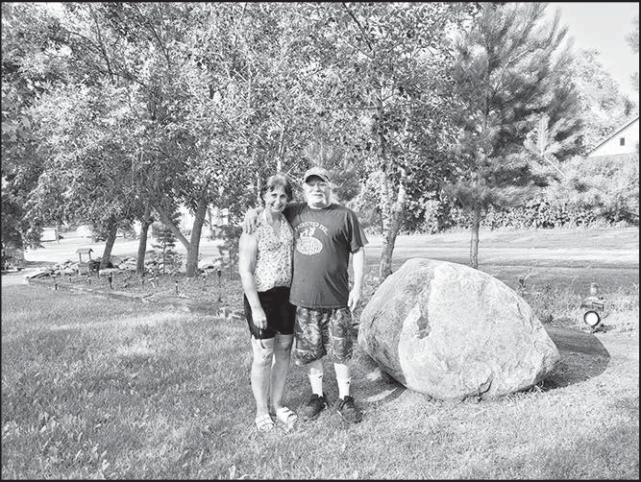
recently honoured with the Queen Elizabeth II Platinum Jubilee Medal at a ceremony in Regina.

PUBLIC NOTICE

SaskWater's District Operations will be treating the water in the Saskatoon Southeast Water Supply System (SSEWS) canal to control the growth of weeds and algae during the 2023 irrigation season.

These treatments will take place approximately every two weeks from May to September, 2023.

The chemical used in these treatments is called Magnacide "H". It is a registered aquatic herbicide that has been approved by the Water Security Agency for use in the SSEWS canal system.

It will remain active in the water for approximately 24 hours after each treatment and will diminish to non-detectable levels prior to treated water entering the reservoirs. Treated water may also be harmful to the skin, causing irritation to exposed areas.

This water treatment helps to prevent irrigation intakes from clogging and ensures adequate flows are maintained in this multi-use system.

Dosages will be maintained at a level where the water can safely be used for irrigation with no damage to field crops.

Please ensure that people are reminded that swimming, canoeing and fishing in the canal at any time is STRICTLY PROHIBITED.

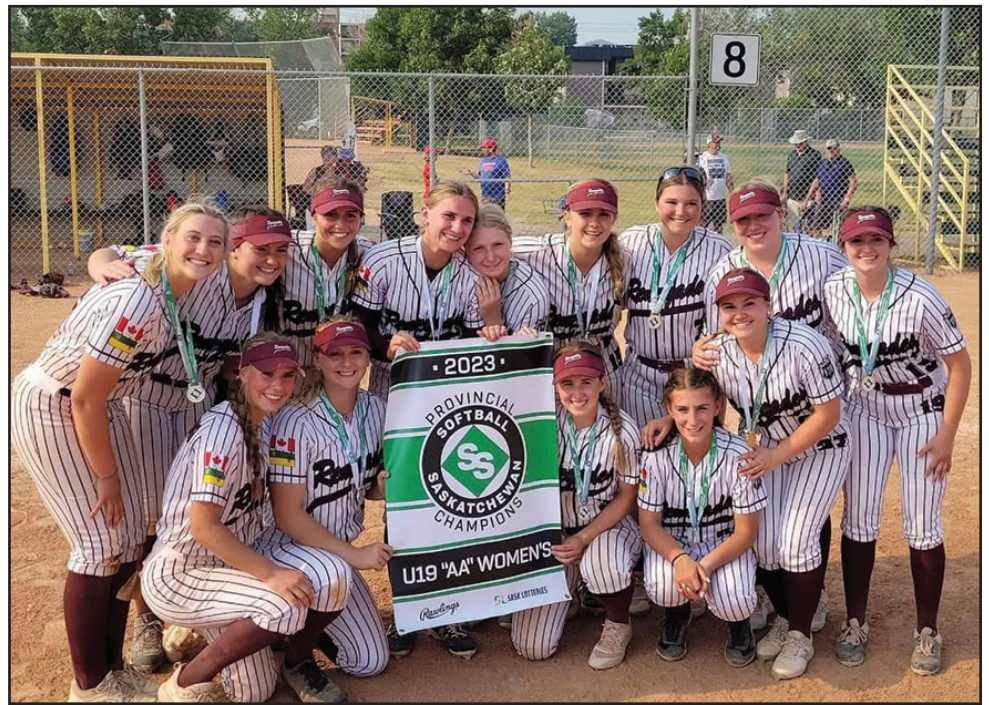

Funeral service was held at Christ Lutheran - Young United Church, Young, Sask. on July 14.

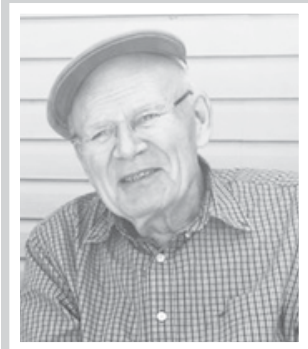

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Crop Report

media release

Harvest is beginning with combines becoming a frequent site in the west-central and southwest regions of Saskatchewan. That is according to the Ministry of Agriculture’s weekly Crop Report for July 24 to 31. Many other areas of the province are preparing for harvest operations as the hot and dry conditions continue and the crops ripen. Producers are hoping for rain once the crops are off to help replenish soil moisture for next year.
Rain was received in the north as pockets of moisture moved through the region. Reports of hail were also received in some areas. The most rain recorded was in

the Prince Albert area with 53 mm and the Shellbrook region also recorded significant moisture with 47 mm reported this week. Other areas of the province received some precipitation, with many reporting only trace amounts.
Hot temperatures persisted which, coupled with the lack of rain, caused a decrease in soil moisture. Provincially, cropland topsoil moisture is rated as 13 percent adequate, 49 percent short and 38 percent very short. Hay and pasture land is very similar, where 11 percent has adequate moisture, 42 percent is short and 47 percent is very short.
Pastures have also been impacted by the lack of rainfall. Currently, five percent of pastures are in good

condition, 28 percent are fair, 42 percent are poor and 25 percent are in very poor condition.
Drought stress, heat, grasshoppers and gophers took their toll on some crops this past week. Many producers have stopped applying pest control products. Producers should always read the label and follow pre-harvest intervals when applying pest control products.
Dry conditions can be stressful for producers and they are reminded to take safety precautions in all the work they do. The Farm Stress Line is available to provide support to producers toll free at 1-800-667-4442. For producers dealing with dry conditions, additional resources are available through the ministry website or by contacting their regional office.

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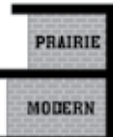

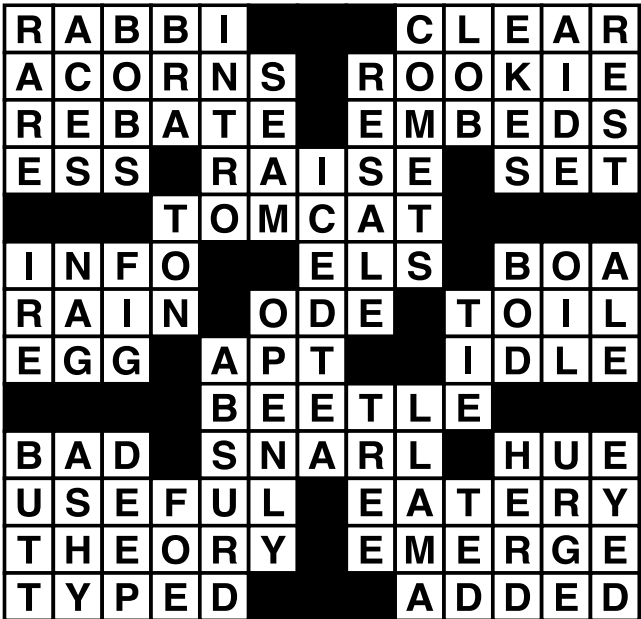
