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Watrous resident honoured as Citizen of the Year

In the nomination letter submitted by former Manitou Beach Mayor Eric Upshall, he noted the area is very fortunate to have a person like Ron Ediger as a member of the community. "Ron brings strong assets as a community-minded businessman in Watrous.

He dedicates himself to many causes in not only Watrous and area but also outside our trading area. Historically Ron has been recognized privately and publicly for dedicating himself to improving the cultural, physical and human aspects in our area."

Not only lending his support to a number of initiatives but also building pride in the community, Memory Trail was the latest project for Ediger. Collaborating with local governments, the Government of Saskatchewan, the Watrous Rotary, businesses and families, Ediger took care of the cost of the trail and used his own equipment and resour-

ces from Melron Services Ltd. Officially opened earlier this year and enjoyed by residents and visitors, the trail has also brought the two communities together. 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Open houses held as part of Aspen Supply Project

Proposing construction of a new natural gas transmission line between Prud'homme and a proposed meter station facility near Lanigan, SaskEnergy Incorporated's natural gas transmission subsidiary, TransGas Limited (TransGas), held three open houses where people were invited to share input and learn about the Aspen Supply Project and the Saskatoon East Expansion Project.

Aiming to enhance reliability for its customers and increase spare capacity for anticipated residential, commercial and industrial growth in the surrounding areas - including a proposed SaskPower Aspen power station near Lanigan, open houses took place in Lanigan (Nov. 21), Prud'homme (Nov. 22) and Clavet (Nov. 23).

Kim Elaschuk, Senior Communications Officer with SaskEnergy said the open houses were very well-attended by local residents, landowners, Town and RM representatives and Indigenous groups. In Lanigan, approximately 30 people took the opportunity to learn more about the Aspen Supply Project and provide input to the project team on local area and land uses. "Public and community engagement is an important part of project development. Open houses introduce the project to interested parties and groups, including local area residents, landowners, Town and RM representatives and Indigenous groups. Open houses also allow our representatives to gain valuable input through discussions with local landowners and organizations, provide informational material, and answer any questions about the project. SaskEnergy then utilizes the feedback received to help refine the project further."

As part of the event, SaskEnergy said discussions were focused on project elements like potential routing options, project timing details on the gas line being installed, impact and mitigations, maintenance and monitoring activities, easement information as well as information on reclamation of the easement after construction should the project proceed.

Elaschuk said, "Project members were also on hand to answer any questions and meet people from the community. Landowners also provided specific feedback regarding their land and how it may affect construction of the new gas line."

With the project currently in the pre-planning stage, right now that includes looking at possible gas line routing loca-

tions, engaging interested parties, and gathering information regarding land usage while providing project information to interested parties.

"This multi-year project involves many disciplines and will provide ongoing work for a variety of trades and contractors until its completion."

Once completed, Elaschuk indicated the Saskatoon East Expansion Project and the Aspen Supply Project will provide increased capacity for anticipated residential, commercial and industrial growth east of Saskatoon as well as power generation.

The Aspen Supply Project itself will include the installation of approximately 91 kilometres of 16-inch or 406.4 mm (NPS 16) high pressure natural gas line. The gas line will begin at the TransGas Prud'homme Compressor Station and end at the proposed SaskEnergy natural gas meter station near Lanigan. The SaskEnergy meter station will be installed at the east end of the gas line, to regulate, odorize and meter the gas.

The Saskatoon East Expansion Project will include the installation of approximately 42 kilometres of 20-inch or 508.0 mm (nominal pipe size [NPS] 20) high pressure natural gas line. The line will begin at Patience Lake, east of Saskatoon, and end at the existing TransGas compressor station near Prud'homme. This gas line will run adjacent to an existing TransGas gas line. The additional compression facility will be installed within the existing compressor station near Prud'homme.

If approved, SaskEnergy said the Saskatoon Supply Project from Patience Lake to the existing TransGas

Prud'homme Compressor Station will be constructed parallel to an existing TransGas line in the summer of 2025. Should the project proceed, the Aspen Supply Project construction will commence in 2026.

Not the only substantial project being looked at for the local area, in addition to the Aspen Supply Project, SaskPower is hoping to create a new 370-megawatt natural gas Aspen Power Station near Lanigan.

In 2020, SaskPower noted it started to look at potential sites for a new natural gas power station, including the Lanigan area. Following technical studies and consultations with stakeholders, rightsholders and Indigenous groups, SaskPower indicated it began the regulatory approval process.

"The Impact Assessment Agency of Canada (IAAC) has determined that our Detailed Project Description submitted on Aug. 31, 2023 aligns with all federal regulations and a further impact assessment is not required."

"We're in the process of selecting an engineer; procure, construct (EPC) partner to design and build the power station. We expect construction to begin in 2024 and for the power station to be fully constructed in 2027."

Outlining its 2023-'24 fiscal year capital spending in a May 11 release, the company indicated \$505 million has been set aside for growth projects like new natural gas plants such as the Aspen Power Station near Lanigan and the Great Plains Power Station.

With the new Aspen Power Station aimed at providing enough power for about 370,000 homes in Saskatchewan, the project is part of a staged approach to replace conventional coal generation that must be retired by 2030, and to transition the province's power system to net zero greenhouse gas emissions.

supported other worthy causes including a recent \$50,000 donation to the Jim Pattison Children's Hospital in Saskatoon. That comes after a \$100,000 donation a few years ago to the hospital. He cares about people."

This is not the first time Ediger has been recognized for his tremendous efforts within the community and beyond. In 2017, Ron along with his late wife Melissa received the prestigious honour of Watrous Citizens of the Year. During that time, and as is the case now for Ron, a major focus was placed on community through their generosity and efforts. "We try hard and we appreciate the community, the town and the support we receive and want to give back and show people the appreciation of what they have given us over the years," said Ron in 2017.

The pair not only began Melron Services Ltd. from the ground up but grew it to become well-known throughout the area. As part of that Ron and Melissa gave back through substantial donations towards many initiatives like the Watrous District Health Complex, a new Zamboni at the Watrous Centennial Arena, the Watrous Manitou Beach Heritage Centre, the Watrous

Kinsmen Bull-A-Rama and numerous clubs and organizations. In addition to their fundraising efforts, Ron and Melissa also contributed through supplying equipment, labour and prizes towards various events and organizations. "The community has been wonderful and a lot of our customers have also become friends."

After getting into the business world in 1972, in 1988 Ron decided to sell his place in Nokomis and moved to Watrous where he began selling vehicles with Watrous Mainline Motors GM. It was during that time where he made a lot of acquaintances and met numerous customers. After he left the world of selling cars and began Melron Services with Melissa, Ron remarked, "A lot of people followed us and stayed our customers. That is how it grew, by just playing in the dirt."

Looking back on those years and after receiving the honour in 2023, Ediger said he is humbled and looks forward to seeing the community continue to grow. "I saw a need for the trail and wanted to make it happen. That is something I have tried to do during my time here, is help the community. They have supported us and I wanted to give back and say thanks. I also wanted to say a big thank you to my past and present staff who have helped me over the years to see our company succeed and grow."

Warm weather provides early gift

When it comes to the temperature, the 2023 version of winter has so far been quite delightful and not too frightful. With the values remaining relatively above-normal heading into the middle portion of the month, as Dec. 25 nears, many are wondering if places in Saskatchewan will have a white Christmas or not.

Treated to temperatures rivalling those from fall, the final month of 2023 has been quite the reversal from the 2022 version. Environment and Climate Change Canada's David Phillips said for example, on Dec. 6, 2022 the high was -23.4°C while the low was -37.9°C with a -50°C wind-chill. Fast forward to Dec. 6, 2023 and it hit a high of 5.3°C and a low of -3.2°C. With a big swing in values, Phillips confirmed the past while has been quite mild. "Right now it is about seven degrees warmer than normal and November was about three or four degrees warmer than normal. September was similar while October was a tad cooler than normal."

While there has not been a lot of complaining in Saskatchewan when it comes

to the warmer weather, Phillips said people are wondering where winter is. Explaining the average temperature for the first half of December is around -6°C, when he accumulated the data of how many days the area should have experienced a -10°C day during fall and winter, normally by Dec. 6 there is 20 of them. "You would have had a few in October, 13 in November and five out of the first six days in December, but (as of Dec. 6) you had none."

Phillips shared the reason it has been so warm is due to El Niño, which has brought a lot of westerly and southerly air, keeping the arctic air away. "It was forecasted to make this winter a more balmy, soft winter and it often does on the Prairies but it is not a guarantee."

As of now though, that warm weather has arrived and elected to hang around for a while. Phillips said that has also been evident in the Arctic. Looking at the data for the three territories, in November and December, Phillips estimated there would be well over 150 records broken (and there is not a lot of weather stations up there). "When you add them all up

day after day after day, it has just been absolutely record setting warm. That is because the southerly air is flowing up there."

Looking ahead, Phillips noted the belief is the above-normal values will continue. Understanding Saskatchewan can have weather turn in an instant, as for when those moments of bone-chilling temperatures arrive, "they will be coming but not long drawn out week after week. They tend to be a melting/thawing then some cold weather then back into the melting/thawing. I find that makes winter go faster when you have that kind of a yo-yo back and forth and up and down. I think that is really the personality of the winter and we have already seen it."

While many have enjoyed the warmer temperatures thus far, the lack of snow means very dry conditions. "Precipitation is down around one-third of what you would normally get. You are almost into the decade of dry weather. You saw it this summer, you saw it last year and it is year after year. I looked at five years of Saskatchewan records and I found that every one of those last five years was a precipitation-less than what it normally would be. With El Niño you tend to find less precipitation . . . (but) you only get about 18 percent of your annual precipitation in October right through to March."

Needing moisture to arrive by spring to help the situation, in terms of

temperatures, with daytime highs above zero as opposed to -6°C (normal for this time of year) and single digit values overnight (instead of the normal -16°C), the question was posed whether or not some people will see a white Christmas in Saskatchewan. "I think it would be a shock to think that most of Saskatchewan would see a green or brown Christmas. It is almost like death, taxes and a white Christmas are guaranteed."

While this balmy winter may seem like a bit of a rarity, Phillips did point out that there was also an El Niño type year in 2015-'16. In that year, Saskatchewan had 20 days reaching below -20°C when normally there would have been 47 and just two days of -30°C when normally there would have been 14. "Snowfall was about half of what you normally would get and the average temperature for all of the months of winter were all warmer than normal right through from November to March. They averaged about three and a half to four degrees warmer than normal."

Comparing it to this year, Phillips said in 2015-'16 El Niño was fairly large like this one but it arrived later. "This one is earlier and is expected to last through winter and into spring."

In total, CTSS officers issued 1,347 traffic charges, 1,349 warnings, and 111 vehicle defect inspection notices to drivers on Saskatchewan's roadways. These included: 713 charges and 324 warnings for speeding; 97 charges and 22 warnings for cellphone use
