Pair of local residents win Holiday Giveaway's big prizes

With a strong emphasis on shopping local this holiday season, as part of the annual Holiday Giveaway campaign, thousands of entries were submitted by people utilizing businesses within Watrous and Manitou Beach. With a \$5,000 grand prize to be spent locally and a \$500 gift card from Saskatoon Co-op in Watrous as the secondary prize, a pair of local residents were this year's winners.

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the draw took place in the home of Vickie Clarke, Community Development Officer with the Watrous Manitou Marketing Group. Streaming live online, Clarke used her niece's playpen as a draw drum because of the substantial amount of entries received for this year's giveaway.

Stirring the entries Dec. 21, Clarke pulled out the winning names of Georgina Cotts and Susan Hawkes, both of Watrous. Cotts received the grand prize of \$5,000 which she can spend at any of the participating businesses while Hawkes took home the \$500 gift card from the Saskatoon Co-op in Watrous.

Clarke presented both women with their winnings during the morning of Dec. 23 and each were thrilled to have won.

"When I got the call that I had won, I was surprised," said an excited Cotts who entered her name at a number of local businesses during the Holiday Giveaway. "I have always shopped locally, especially this year."

Cotts who has resided in Watrous for a number of years noted she is not one to really win anything. So when she got the call from Clarke, at first Georgina was a little unsure and thought maybe it was a scam but then when she realized she had indeed won, she was elated. "Now I just have to decide what I would like to spend the money on."

When Clarke called Hawkes, like Georgina, Susan was in disbelief but was thrilled to learn she had won the gift card to the local Co-op. "I always shop local and I was overwhelmed when I found out I had won."

Born and raised in Watrous and raising her own family in the community, Hawkes recalled winning a large prize from the Watrous Chamber many years ago and also a draw from the Shop Easy grocery store when it was still in operation. Then with the pandemic and the way 2020 had gone, winning the gift card was a real highlight for Hawkes. "I've been pretty lucky in the past with a few draws and I am just so thankful to have won this \$500 gift card. It will be put to good use, that's for sure!"

With the Holiday Giveaway being another big success, Clarke was pleased that 2020's shop local campaign provided a few smiles as well.

"My understanding is that we have averaged well over 20,000 entries each year since the giveaway was first started and with the pandemic forcing people to stay closer to home, I would imagine we more than surpassed that

“RCMP Report”

Counterfeit \$100 bills

On Dec. 20, 2020 at around 4:30 p.m. Craik rural RCMP received two calls of people trying to pass counterfeit Canadian \$100 bills. Both incidents occurred at businesses in Chamberlain. The male suspect purchased or attempted to purchase cigarettes from the businesses by paying with the counterfeit \$100 and also providing extra coins so the return change would be in large bills. The female who was with the male suspect never asked

for anything nor handled the counterfeit money. Both were wearing masks and were observed driving away in an older but good condition red sports car. Police continue to investigate these occurrences and are seeking public assistance.

Collision west of Prince Albert

On Dec. 21, 2020, at ap-

proximately 5:30 p.m., Prince Albert RCMP received a report of a head-on collision on Hwy. 3, approximately 5 km west of Prince Albert. RCMP officers, including an RCMP Traffic Reconstructionist, Parkland Ambulance, and Prince Albert and Buckland Fire Departments attended to the location of the collision. Road conditions at the time of the collision were extremely icy.

Preliminary investigation indicates an east-bound car collided head-on with a westbound truck after the eastbound car pulled into the westbound lane.

The eastbound car had two occupants, a 30-year-old male from Prince Albert and a four-year-old boy from Parkside, who both passed away. The RCMP will not be releasing their names.

The westbound truck had two occupants, a 34-year-old female, and a three-year-old girl, both from the Shellbrook area, who were both taken to hospital with what were reported to be non-life-threatening injuries.

Hwy. 3 between Cedar Avenue and 15th Street Northwest was shutdown and traffic was re-routed for several hours as the investigation was conducted and the scene cleared.

Alcohol is not considered a factor. The investigation is ongoing.

Police issue tickets for unregistered vehicles

In November, police in Saskatchewan caught 341 people driving while suspended and issued 558 tickets for driving an unregistered vehicle or a trailer.

That is according to SGI as the company stated police also issued tickets for the following offences: 221 drivers driving without a valid licence; 102 learner drivers driving without a supervising driver; and 37 drivers who were not complying with a licence endorsement or restriction.

Police in Saskatchewan spent November focusing on suspended drivers and unregistered vehicles as part of SGI's Traffic Safety Spotlight. Driving without a licence, while suspended or when your vehicle is not registered voids your insurance if you cause a collision. If you are caught, penalties include fines, court summons and vehicle impoundments.

Driving while suspended is a safety concern. There are many reasons why someone's licence may be suspended but they are all a result of an authority determining that the driver is not allowed to operate a vehicle.

Police also reported: 3,867 tickets issued for speeding and aggressive driving; 226 tickets for improper seatbelt or child restraint use; 447 distracted driving tickets (including 384 for using a cellphone while driving); and 357 impaired driving offences (including 294 Criminal Code charges).

"This increase in church break-ins is concerning enough that it creates a pattern. Even though the break-ins mostly happened in the Central District and during the summer, this new criminal trend is noticeable because these break-ins happened all year and across Saskatchewan. It is imperative that we all get involved to better secure these buildings."

Saskatchewan RCMP is asking Saskatchewanians to help make church buildings more secure. Stay alert, especially at night, and report any suspicious activity around churches to your local RCMP detachment or police service.

If you are a resident, keep an eye on your community's churches and ensure your religious representatives know about this new increase of break-ins into churches.

If you are a community representative, find ways to discuss the possibility of repurposing and managing abandoned churches in your community.

If you are a church caretaker, lock the doors when the church is empty, secure the objects of value of the church in a locked space, note the identifying features and serial numbers of the electronics and household items of the church and install motion-detector lights, alarms and/or security cameras around the church.

Breaking and entering occurs when someone enters a building without permission with the intent of committing a crime, generally to steal or damage property. It is a Criminal Code offence.

Health facility renewal projects include local area

Local health renewal improvements to facilities in Watrous, Imperial and Lanigan along with others in Saskatchewan will be taking place through a \$100 million investment. As part of the Government of Saskatchewan's two-year \$7.5 billion capital plan, more than 1,000 projects have been prioritized for completion at Saskatchewan Health Authority facilities.

While some have been completed or are currently underway, others have not quite started or remain in the planning stages. Through a detailed list of projects provided by SHA, here is what the local facilities in Lanigan, Watrous and Imperial will be seeing as far as maintenance and projects go:

Lanigan Hospital: replace deteriorated flooring (completed); fire suppression (execution phase); replace roofing (not started); renovate supply room (not started); and shower room (not started).

Watrous District Health Complex: upgrade HVAC Controls as BAS no longer repairable (planning); and hospital shower room floor replacement (planning).

Long Lake Valley Integrated Facility: replace

heating lines (not started); crawlspace ventilation (not started); flooring replacement (not started); roof shingle replacement (not started); parking lot upgrade (not started); and underground fuel tank replacement (not started).

Provincially, for all sites: perform load testing on all emergency generators up to 100Kwt. with in-house staff (not started); development of provincial security operations centre (protective services operations centre) (planning); provincial infrastructure renewal program development - 20/21 (planning); provincial nurse call program 20/21 - Sask Builds (execution); provincial signage (planning); CMMS (not started); PMO - 20/21 (planning); FCI renewal (planning); provincial infrastructure renewal program development 21/22 (not started); continuation of provincial nurse call program (planning); PMO - 21/22 (planning); and nurse call provincial program for nurse call reserve (execution).

"We know how important it is to have well-maintained, efficient health care facilities to serve our residents," Mental Health and Addictions, Seniors and Rural and Remote Health Minister Everett Hindley said. "These investments help to ensure a safe environment while

providing quality care in many communities. They will also help us continue to build a strong Saskatchewan by stimulating the province's economic recovery."

"The SHA is pleased to be able to proceed with priority maintenance projects and upgrades at our facilities," SHA Vice-President of Infrastructure, Information and Support Andrew Will said. "This will mean safer, more comfortable experiences for our patients and visitors, and better work environments for our staff."

SHA indicated there were a number of projects that already started in summer and fall including in Regina and Saskatoon with others on the docket like installation of oxygen concentrators in rural hospitals to ensure a ready supply of self-generated oxygen for patients, and reduce the risks and challenges associated with delivery-dependent supplies in rural and remote areas.

In addition, the provincial government noted the replacement of roofing and windows is planned at health facilities in a number of smaller communities and about 60 long-term care facilities across the province will receive funding for maintenance and upgrades.

Projects receiving funding are expected to be completed over this fiscal year and next.

VIDO's COVID-19 vaccine receives clinical trial approval

The Vaccine and Infectious Disease Organization (VIDO) at the University of Saskatchewan (USask) has received a notice of authorization from Health Canada to initiate a Phase 1 clinical vaccine trial.

"The approval to initiate a human clinical trial is a milestone for VIDO," said VIDO Director and CEO Dr. Volker Gerdts. "This is the first of our two COVID-19 subunit vaccines in development and demonstrates the quality of our research, development and partnerships."

with an excellent safety profile. These well-established vaccines are relatively stable and have not required ultra cold storage temperatures.

The authorization from Health Canada enables the Canadian Center for Vaccinology (CCfV) in Halifax to begin recruiting volunteers for the first Phase 1 clinical trial. CCfV anticipates that the volunteers will be vaccinated in January.

"This is the first university-based COVID-19 vaccine to begin Phase 1 testing at CCfV. The purpose of this trial is to demonstrate the safety of the vaccine in humans," said CCfV Director Dr. Scott Halperin.

Assuming all goes well with the trials and in obtaining regulatory approvals, VIDO expects to have at least one of its vaccines ready for use by late 2021, Gerdts said.

Subunit-based vaccines are a proven technology that has been used in many commercially available vaccines—including for hepatitis, diphtheria, and whooping cough—

"To have sustainable long-term vaccine access, I think it's important for Canada to continue on with its own vaccines," he said. "COVID-19 is not going to go away."

VIDO's vaccine development leveraged the expertise of several international and national partners. The adjuvant (Sepivac SWE™) was developed by Seppic in collaboration with the Vaccine Formulation Institute (VFI) and is based on technology recognized for its efficacy and safety in influenza vaccines. The vaccine antigen developed by VIDO was produced under good manufacturing practices

(GMP) at Biocodex using a cell line from the National Research Council of Canada.

The clinical trial application for the second vaccine candidate, which uses an adjuvant developed by VIDO and collaborators, will be submitted when GMP manufacturing of the adjuvant is completed by Dalton Pharma Services.

Development of the vaccines is financially supported by the Government of Canada through Western Economic Diversification, and the Government of Saskatchewan through Innovation Saskatchewan.



With the advancement of modern technology, help is on the way. While sitting at a computer, take some time to scan photographs onto your computer or take photos with a cell phone. There are several wonderful companies who can help you create photo albums and they will mail them to your home i.e. blurb.com and shutterfly.com are two examples. Online courses are available to teach you how to make albums that will last for years and will not take up much room. It is easier and more affordable than you might expect.

Dear Reena,

I have had a smell coming from the furnace vent in the bathroom ever since the heat came on and it smells like cat urine. Just wanting to know if you have any suggestions besides getting the ducts cleaned; we do not have the money right now. Thank you very much. Angie Dear Angie,

Is the smell the result of a cat or could it be something else? Wet insulation (caused by high humidity) sometimes smells similar when wet. A dehumidifier might help the smell. If the smell is caused by a cat, the easiest temporary solution is to spray white vinegar or Pet Odor Out products around the areas that smell to neutralize the odour but chances are you will not be happy with the results of air fresheners and surface cover-ups. Investing money into having the ducts cleaned properly or contacting a plumber are your best bets. Extra tip:

without spending much money, it is important to change furnace filters on a regular basis.

Dear Reena,

Without the help of a dry cleaner, can you please tell me how to clean my large area rug? It smells and needs some TLC. Thanks, Rose

Dear Rose,

If possible rent a steam cleaner and clean the carpet just as you would a regular carpet. If the carpet label specifies dry clean only, take it to a dry cleaner. For fibres that specify no water, you can clean the carpet using shaving cream. Spray onto carpet and gently scrub with a soft brush and remove with a soft damp cloth until carpet looks clean and smells fresh.

Dear Reena,

I have a tall clear, single stem glass vase and I have been unable to remove etched cloudy water marks on the inside. I have tried everything from baking soda, salt, vinegar, denture tablets, with no success. Any ideas? Eunice

Dear Eunice,

Soaking the vase with hot vinegar and then gently rubbing the surface with fine 000 sandpaper is a good solution for slightly etched glass. You can also soak the vase in hot water and citric acid (available at your local pharmacy, you may need to order it). If the etching remains, the condition is permanent. If you want to 'refresh' seldom used glassware or crystal which has developed a slight film while sitting in the cupboard, but is not dirty, just hold the piece over the mouth of a steaming kettle and polish quickly and easily with a paper coffee filter. Your glassware will sparkle again!

I think that most of us will admit to a little lapse of attention now and again when driving but falling asleep at the wheel can be fatal for oneself and others. If distracted driving causes accidents, falling asleep at the wheel causes disaster. Long distant truck drivers recognize the danger of tiredness and will pull over and

nap in their trucks. It is for their safety and that of others.

Ed and I were talking about the things that are too dangerous to ignore. I wanted some sympathy from Ed as my wife is on my case because my blood pressure is too high. Just because my doctor said it was too high, my wife expects me to get it lowered like I can change it immediately to please her and my doctor. Ed reminded me that my wife told me for years to do something about my snoring. He said that the way I do things, it will take me 25 years to deal with my high blood pressure. So much for any sympathy for me from Ed.

I told Ed that it is easy to expect others to deal with their danger and eliminate it. For ourselves, by the time we become aware that we have a problem, we are often beyond a

simple or quick fix. This is especially true in the case of God's people in the Old Testament. As God's people when we sin, they may not result instantly in disastrous consequences. Individually or together, we can be distracted, not paying attention to God and what we need to do. We may become blind to our sins and our neglect of our obedience to God.

Isaiah speaks of this danger confessing to God: "We have all become like one who is unclean, and all our righteous deeds are like a polluted garment. We all fade like a leaf, and our iniquities, like the wind, take us away." (Isaiah 64:6)

In the New Testament, Paul warns that it is our time to wake up from our sleep. We can and do become distracted in our faith and can be asleep to our faith's responsibilities. Paul reminds us that we need to become awake in

our faith before it is too late. We tend to live like we have no time limit on earth.

Paul warns: "The night is far gone; the day is at hand. (the return of Jesus or our death) So then let us cast off the works of darkness and put on the armor of light. Let us walk properly as in the daytime, not in orgies and drunkenness, not in sexual immorality and sensuality, not in quarreling and jealousy. But put on the Lord Jesus Christ, and make no provision for the flesh, to gratify its desires." (Romans 13:12-14)

Jesus also calls us to stay awake in our faith, for we do not know when He will return from heaven. Concerning His coming, he says that no one knows, only the Father concerning that day or hour. He warns all, "Stay awake. Keep awake." Mark 13:33,37 I say do not be asleep at the wheel of Jesus.



in order to follow the COVID-19 rules while keeping students and staff safe. Because of that, we wanted to give the kids an opportunity to take part in something fun and unique.






