Manitou Beach's Dr. Sussanna Czeranko named "Naturopathic Doctor of the Year"

At its 2021 Healing Skies Conference (June 3 to 6), the Saskatchewan Association of Naturopathic Doctors (SAND) named Dr. Sussanna Czeranko of Manitou Beach, Sask. as "Naturopathic Doctor of the Year". The SAND celebrated her many years of clinical practice and her ongoing, remarkable contributions to the development of naturopathic medicine.

A 1994 graduate of the Canadian College of Naturopathic Medicine (Toronto), she has practiced in Ontario, Quebec, Oregon and now, Saskatchewan. She founded the Manitou Waters Naturopathic Clinic in Manitou Beach. An accomplished essayist, she has published over 200 articles in medical journals and magazines, and authored the 12-volume Hevert Collection (National University of Natural Medicine Press). This 5,000 plus page work is a comprehensive overview of the history, philosophy and practice of naturopathic medicine, and a definitive review of the historical disciplines in the profession.


She co-founded the International Congress on Naturopathic Medicine (congress gatherings in Paris, London and

turned it around to show him the lake. I said this is not just any lake and it is the only one in Canada of its kind. People can forget how fortunate we are to be living here because we have the only saltwater mineral lake in Canada. It is pretty special."

Tourism Packages

Looking to promote a few new tourism packages, Clarke invited a travel writer and film crew out to the area. That travel writer was former Saskatchewaner Ashlyn George, who is the author of the Lost Girl's Guide to

Finding the World. George was able to not only experience some of the attractions like The Drive-In at Manitou Beach, the Little Manitou Art Gallery and Manitou Springs Mineral Spa but she also took part in a couple of the new tour packages that will be offered.

First George attended a farm tour southwest

of Watrous with Matt and Lesley Kelly and Derek Martin where she got to check out the farm equipment, took part in a crop tour, milled some lentil flour to take home and shared a big meal from Oda's Coffee + Wine Bar.

From there she headed to Manitou Beach where she embarked on a paddleboard adventure

across the lake. With a dock built and equipment purchased by Michael Byrne of Oasis Village Manitou Beach, George headed across the lake and had a picnic on the shoreline care of Oda's Coffee + Wine Bar, including a bottle of wine.

Self-isolation requirements changing

With a few exceptions, anyone who is 14 days past their second dose of the COVID-19 vaccine at time of exposure and is asymptomatic no longer has to isolate when named as a close contact of a COVID-19 positive person.

"More than 20 percent of those 12 and up in Saskatchewan are considered fully vaccinated," Health Minister Paul Merriman said. "The level of protection provided by two doses of the vaccine is enabling us to announce new guidelines around self-isolation. This is another important step in getting back to normal and enjoying the summer."

The release from self-isolation does not apply to anyone with symptoms. Even if someone has relatively mild symptoms they should immediately self-isolate and

be tested. Anyone who is unvaccinated or has received only one dose of the COVID-19 vaccine must still self-isolate as directed by Public Health if they are named as close contacts.

Public Health has the discretion to require fully vaccinated close contacts to isolate if they are considered at higher risk of serious illness or for increased transmission, or they live in settings at risk of outbreaks. Self-isolation of fully vaccinated close contacts may also be required in any health care setting, including long-term and personal care homes and congregate living settings like group homes and corrections facilities. There is still a requirement for health care workers and employees/residents at facilities including long-term and personal care homes, corrections facilities and other congregate living settings to be tested, if they are deemed

close contacts of someone who is COVID-19 positive.

The requirement to self-isolate for 14 days following international travel is currently a federal quarantine order that is subject to change.

"We know vaccines work and are helping to reduce disease and death," Merriman said. "Avoiding the disruption of having to isolate and missing out on work and the activities we enjoy is yet another reason to roll up your sleeve and Stick it to COVID if you have not yet received your vaccinations."

Fully vaccinated is someone who has passed the 14-day mark of receiving the second of a two-dose series such as Pfizer, Moderna or Astra Zeneca COVID-19 vaccines, or one dose of a single dose series such as Johnson and Johnson (Johnson and Johnson is not available in Canada).

PUBLIC NOTICE

SaskWater's District Operations will be treating the water in the Saskatoon Southeast Water Supply System (SSEWS) canal to control the growth of weeds and algae during the 2021 irrigation season.

These treatments will take place approximately every two weeks until September 18th, 2021.

The chemical used in these treatments is called Magnacide "H". It is a registered aquatic herbicide that has been approved by the Water Security Agency for use in the SSEWS canal system.

It will remain active in the water for approximately 24 hours after each treatment and will diminish to non-detectable levels prior to treated water entering the reservoirs. Treated water may also be harmful to the skin, causing irritation to exposed areas.

This water treatment helps to prevent irrigation intakes from clogging and ensures adequate flows are maintained in this multi-use system.

Dosages will be maintained at a level where the water can safely be used for irrigation with no damage to field crops.

Please ensure that people are reminded that swimming, canoeing and fishing in the canal at any time is STRICTLY PROHIBITED.



“RCMP Report”

Charges laid in death of RCMP officer

On June 12, 2021, an Indian Head RCMP officer died in the line of duty while following two suspects who were driving a stolen pickup truck from Manitoba.

Saskatchewan RCMP Major Crime Unit-North assumed responsibility of the investigation into the incident with the assistance of the Saskatchewan RCMP Major Crime Unit-South, Forensic Identification Section-Regina, Forensic Collision Reconstruction Unit, Police Dog Service, the Regina Police Service – Combined Traffic Services, the Saskatchewan Coroners Service and numerous other Saskatchewan RCMP Detachments.

Investigators have determined that on June 12, 2021, at 7:04 a.m., Indian Head RCMP received a complaint reporting that a stolen pickup truck from Manitoba was in the community of Wolseley, Sask. The complaint was dispatched to Constable Shelby Patton, who drove to the community to investigate the complaint.

At 7:50 a.m., Cst. Patton located the stolen pickup truck in the town of Wolseley and initiated a traffic stop on Sherbrooke Street, near the intersection of Front Street. During the course of the stop, while outside of his police vehicle, Cst. Patton was struck and killed by the truck.

At 7:56 a.m., Indian Head RCMP received an urgent dispatch mentioning an RCMP officer had been struck by a vehicle and was in cardiac arrest. Members of the public were on scene and performed first aid until the arrival of EMS and police, but Cst. Patton was declared deceased at the scene.

At 8:38 a.m., a farmer near Odessa, Sask. called 911 to report that occupants of a white pickup truck were on their property and stole one of their trucks. Police responded and searched the area for the two stolen vehicles.

Police located the white pickup truck stuck in the mud of a field near Francis, Sask. approximately one mile away from the abandoned farmer's truck. The suspects fled on foot and were arrested just before 10 a.m., without

incident, with the assistance of a police dog, police officers from different nearby RCMP detachments and the Saskatchewan RCMP Emergency Response Team.

The scenes in Wolseley and Francis were examined, processed and have now been released.

Ongoing support is also being provided to members of the Indian Head Detachment and the members of the community who assisted Cst. Patton.

As a result of the investigation, two individuals, an adult male and an adult female, have been arrested and charged. Forty-one-year-old Alphonse Stanley Traverse, from Winnipeg, Man. has been charged with: Manslaughter, Section 236(b) of the Criminal Code; Failure to stop after an accident resulting in death, Section 320.16(3) of the Criminal Code; Theft of a motor vehicle, Section 333.1(1) of the Criminal Code; Possession of stolen property over \$5,000, Section 354(1) of the Criminal Code; and Breach of undertaking – Leaving the Province of Manitoba, Section 145(4) of the Criminal Code.

Forty-two-year-old Marlene Velma Louise Pagee, from Winnipeg, Man. has been charged with: Manslaughter, Section 236(b) of the Criminal Code; Failure to stop after an accident resulting in death, Section 320.16(3) of the Criminal Code; Theft of a motor vehicle, Section 333.1(1) of the Criminal Code; Possession of stolen property over \$5,000, Section 354(1) of the Criminal Code; Possession of a controlled substance, Section 4(1) of the Controlled Drugs and Substances Act; and Breach of undertaking – Possession of controlled substance, Section 145(4) of the Criminal Code.

Both individuals were remanded in custody on the above charges and were scheduled to appear at the Regina Provincial Court June 14.

Constable Patton's family has informed Saskatchewan RCMP a fraudulent Go-Fund-Me page has been created in the name of Constable Patton. Please do not give money to this account in the name of Sam Joseph or promote this account's activities. RCMP have advised Go-Fund-Me the account is fraudulent.

Assistance from the public was critical to the RCMP's ability to arrest the suspects. Investigators would like to ask the assistance of the public to establish the whereabouts of the suspect vehicle in the community of Wolseley prior to Cst. Patton's arrival. Anyone in the community of Wolseley who may have observed, on the morning of June 12, a white Ford F-250 pickup truck is asked to call Indian Head RCMP at 306-695-5200. The vehicle is believed to have been in and around the community for a period of time prior to Cst. Patton's arrival. The investigation continues.

Break and enter

Battleford RCMP are investigating a break and enter to a business on the 1700 block of 100th Street in North Battleford reported shortly after 8 a.m. on the 12th of June. Sometime shortly after 6 a.m. on the same date, a male suspect forcibly gained entry to a business and made off with some cash and merchandise. Police were able to later positively identify a suspect who was arrested on the morning of June 13 while investigating an unrelated matter on the 900 block of 108th Street. The suspect was arrested without incident and some of the stolen property was recovered. Michael Rousseau of Delmas, Sask. has been charged with Break and Enter and Possession of Stolen Property. He remains in custody and his first appearance in North Battleford Provincial court was scheduled for June 14.

Break and enter in Humboldt

On Monday, Jan. 11, 2021, at approximately 2:20 a.m., the Humboldt RCMP responded to a break, enter and theft at a jewelry store located on 6th Avenue East in Humboldt.

Investigation revealed one lone suspect gained entry to the business between 2:08 and 2:10 a.m. and stole a number of jewelry items from display cases. No occupants were inside the store.

After further investigation, Humboldt RCMP believe a small, silver four-door car was involved in the break, enter and theft at a Humboldt business, in the early morning hours of Jan. 11, 2021.

Video surveillance shows this vehicle, possibly a Nissan Altima, driving around the 700 block of 6th Avenue in Humboldt before and after the break, enter and theft occurred.

Humboldt RCMP are continuing to investigate with assistance from the RCMP Forensic Identification Unit.






Golf Report

National Indigenous Day of Prayer

For the last 50 years, Canadian Anglicans have observed National Indigenous Day of Prayer (NIDP) on June 21. This year, Anglican congregations will honour this occasion on Sunday, June 20.

The idea for NIDP emerged from advocacy work by a Saskatchewan priest, Archdeacon Andrew Ahenakew. Nowadays, June 21 is marked by many religious groups. The process of truth and reconciliation is at the heart of all religious and spiritual traditions. It is a process of listening to the people we have hurt, acknowledging our sins, asking for forgiveness, and committing to live our lives differently so the sins we committed will not happen again. On this day, we thank God for the gifts, wisdom, and insight with which Indigenous peoples across Canada have blessed our country, our communities, and our churches. We also recommit ourselves to finding the truth about how our actions impact Indigenous peoples and to living differently so Indigenous and settler peoples can live as one.

Over the years, Anglicans have learned more of the truth about the residential schools we ran. According to Anglican Church records, the church operated around three dozen schools between 1820 and 1967. Before Confederation in 1867, Anglican missionaries ran the schools with the purpose of converting Indigenous peoples to Christianity. After Confederation, the Anglican Church operated these schools on behalf of the Canadian government. These schools were used by the church not only to convert students to Christianity, but to assimilate them into a British culture. There were 20 schools in Saskatchewan, eight of which were operated by the Anglican Church. Due to under-funding, many residential schools were ill-equipped to provide a quality education for children. Canada's Truth and Reconciliation Commission (TRC) identified 3,200 children (566 in Saskatchewan) who died while attending the schools as a result of poor care. Since the publication of the TRC Report more missing children have been identified and more pain and hurt is being felt. A few weeks ago, 215 remains of children buried in unmarked graves were found at the site of the residential school at Tk'umlups te Secwépemc First Nation. In a recent letter, Archbishop Don Bolen of the Roman Catholic Archdiocese of Regina wrote that "there are at least 35 unmarked graves on the site of the Muscowequan Residential School."

Injustices towards Indigenous peoples continue today. According to The Council of Canadians, "73 percent of First Nations' water systems are at high to medium risk of contamination." Racism and cultural insensitivity place barriers to accessing jobs. A study from Ryerson University found that employers were more likely to hire non-Indigenous people over Indigenous people more qualified for the position. According to the 2016 Census, 83 percent of children in Saskatchewan's foster care are Indigenous. Critics point out that the foster care system is the current method used to separate Indigenous families.

These are hard truths to hear. As a Christian, I must listen and acknowledge these sins are being committed against God's beloved children. Many groups have issued apologies for the wrongs they have committed towards Indigenous peoples. Without changing our ways, however, these apologies fall flat. Jesus shows us that each person is loved by God. To follow Christ means we must do the hard work to learn how to love, to accept the blessings of other people, and live our lives differently.

Premium cocoa is 22 to 24 percent fat compared with the regular cocoa that many people buy; it has twice the fat content. Even at twice the fat, it does not equate to much fat and is worth choosing for better quality. Compare the ingredient labels on different kinds of cocoa and purchase the product that has one gram of fat per five to six grams serving instead of .5 grams.

Dear Reena,
Can you please give me a few tips regarding the best way to clean the moss between the pavers on our driveway? Is there a solution I can use? Allan

Dear Allan,
Make your own weed killer by combining: four cups pickling vinegar, one-half cup salt and two tablespoons dish soap. Spray unwanted plants in driveway cracks. Be careful not to spray adjacent plants. Leftover boiled potato water also makes an excellent weed killer for patios, driveways and paths.

Dear Reena,
For 30 years I have always put a heavy protector on my oak table whenever I use it. However, a couple of weeks ago I just threw a tablecloth directly onto the table. Now I have a whitish mark several inches wide on the wood. I put a hot casserole on a potholder on the table. I am not sure if it was heat or moisture but I applied an oily polish which did not seem to change the mark. Do you have any suggestions for how to restore or disguise or cover up this mark? Thelma

Solutions and Substitutions

Smear the area with mayonnaise and wait for one hour. Wipe the area and observe if the stain is gone. If the stain remains, cover spot with a tea towel and press with a hot iron to draw out excess moisture in the wood. If neither solution is successful, then your best option is to refinish the table. Please note: the mark may disappear on its own after the moisture evaporates.

and visits by appointment are also welcome. For those visiting the centre, COVID-19 protocols will also remain in place."

While the facility was forced to close to the public in 2020 due to the pandemic, Bergen said it provided some time to create new displays and exhibits while doing some work on the former courtroom and Saskatchewan Agriculture offices. Summer shop local passport program

In the former courtroom area, not only did it receive a new look but Bergen said it will now be the site of visiting exhibits or special activities. "Those who are familiar with Orin McIntosh's historic building models, which are featured in the centre, may be interested in seeing all of the steam engine models he built from scratch. These range from trains to boats to tractors, and will be featured in this repurposed area."

Bergen said a great deal of work went into the research, assembling and finishing of the wall by volunteers. "As a result, there is now a comprehensive history of Manitou Beach on paper, and the highlights featured on the wall."

In addition to the work done to the centre itself, online a major upgrade is also being completed. "For the last several months work on our website (www.watrousheritage.ca) has also taken place. That included adding hundreds of pages of information and pictures containing old and new material as well as a redesign to be






Saskatchewan Tree for Life Program a success

With an opportunity to not only beautify the area but to absorb carbon dioxide for years to come, the Resort Village of Manitou Beach and a number of its residents were the benefactors of the Saskatchewan Tree for Life Program.

Partnering with Environment and Climate Change Canada to distribute 24,000 native trees across the province in 2021, Saskatchewan Association of Watersheds launched the program in an effort to minimize the impacts of climate change and reduce greenhouse gas emissions.

Programs Lead with the local watershed Wascana & Upper Qu'Appelle Watersheds Association Taking Responsibility (WUQWATR) Justine Melo said the trees that were delivered to the Resort Village of Manitou Beach were free of charge for residents and were distributed June 2 on a first come first served basis until the supply ran out.

"We handed out 268 trees at our Manitou Beach pick up although one person who came was from the Humboldt area and picked up 50 trees. One-hundred of those trees (White Spruce) were given to the local Communities in Bloom group who let anyone interested take up to five trees each! Overall, in the program we had Shrub Willow, Blue Spruce, White Spruce, Prairie Sky Poplar and Hill Poplar to give away."

According to Melo the young trees absorb carbon dioxide at a rate of 13 pounds per tree each year. The trees that were delivered to Manitou Beach will reach their most productive stages of carbon storage at about 10 years at which point they are estimated to absorb 48 pounds of carbon dioxide per year.

Melo noted being able to provide the trees to residents at Manitou Beach and throughout the province is vital because it not only helps educate and increase public

awareness of climate change through an interactive natural-based solution but it allows people to make a difference. "The public is able to get involved in reducing greenhouse gas emissions by planting 24,000 native trees across the province. Overall, the program builds climate change knowledge and capacity in the public, and

each watershed stewardship group in Saskatchewan eligible to receive trees through the program were offered up to 50 free trees per person, farm, business, or organization with tree distributions like the one at Manitou Beach taking place from mid-May to early June.

promotes a positive environmental impact!"

Heading into the first-ever day, Wagman said, "There's really something for everyone. Whether you're a gallery regular or a first-time art buyer, it's going to be a lot of fun. You might make a point of driving to a gallery you've never been to before, or just visit the one nearest you. There's no one way to celebrate."

While the First-ever Saskatchewan Art Gallery Day is over, people can view maps of where events were held at saskgalleries.ca.





Well, what a beautiful downpour we had. It was launched by a tremendous flash of lightning and a crashing thunderbolt that brought us to our knees. That was Thursday evening, June 10 but by Friday morning we could see water cascading down the road and the flooding on the tennis courts extended along MacLachlan and the flood water by the empty and unused Nu-Inn extended half way across MacLachlan Avenue. Thankfully guys were setting up a pump at that site by mid-morning. After elevenses on Friday the wind came up and debris flew off trees.

There was a boil water advisory in place as the power was off on Sunday. Rumour has it the cause was a burning tree in Watrous.

The community gardener plot holders will have been happy to see the rain but maybe not so happy about weed growth! I know my veggie garden will be in need of a major weeding when the soil dries up but the fresh veggies make the efforts all worthwhile.

I see that on July 1 the official opening of Uhmann Centennial Park, along with the unveiling of the reflections mural will happen as well as fireworks, fire bans permitting. Chris Moffatt has provided more information in his article following mine. The park is named for Gustav (1918-2013) and Gertrud (1914-2016) Uhmann (nee Sinek) who were longtime residents here. Arriving in Canada in 1939 they settled first at Loon Lake and then in 1942 Gus began working for Dr. Stipe in the Manitou Lake Health Clinic. Gus was actually the province's first registered physiotherapist and he received his physiotherapy training in Schoenau, Czechoslovakia (1936-39) and took a special course in Prague. In the course of time Gus took over the business and operated a physiotherapy clinic here for decades in the former Whitmore Hotel. Winter months he and Gertie ran a Turkish Baths establishment at the Royal Alex Hotel, Winnipeg and in the 1980s retired to Manitou Beach. Gus was also very involved in municipal affairs as he was on village council and served as overseer too during those critical years when the lake level was so very low. After Gertie passed away, their children, Eric and Dorothy donated the land in 2016 to the village for a park and the rest is history as we now enjoy Uhmann Centennial Park, the original site of the clinic that Gus worked in. The creation of the park has been a collaboration of rec board, Communities in Bloom and anyone else who wanted to lend a hand to a worthy community project which became our Centennial project. 2019 there was a communal sod laying bee and sorry but I do not have the names of all involved and thanks to COVID lockdown last year the opening was not able to happen.

Having just spent a weekend in Wakaw Regional Park I just could not help myself and had to compare ours with theirs. The first thing that struck me was the number of very permanent looking campsites as trailers of various kinds were embedded in patios, verandahs and had fences along with additional buildings – golf cart sheds and for visitors and storage (think glorified and attractive garden sheds). These sites apparently have long

term leases which could be sold. Over a million dollars was spent by the park to install 50 amp sites and these were not heavily treed so renters are using tarps against wind and for privacy. Access to the lake was scant, from the docks area, where some docks were private and some public, we could see the impressive cottages on the opposite shore and the similar view from the swim beach. A walk along the lakeshore to enjoy the lake, as we do here, was impossible because there was no path or road. For our daily walk we were roaming on the roads around the campsites! So we did appreciate the variety of campers and their outside décor. Golf cart sheds were abundant and the golf course looked stunning.

I am very happy that we can walk almost the length of the village along the lakeshore and enjoy the view. We just need, as I repeat what many say, better access into the lake and this leads me to something I saw. Manitoba parks have been installing Mobi mats of various types to enable an easier walk or haulage of canoes and kayaks across the ground and into the water. I suspect they are not cheap. Parks generally seem to have much better access to funds and grants than poor us.

Canada Day at the Beach is a little different this year due to COVID and rules. There will be a flotilla going by the main beach starting at 1 p.m. If you have a boat, kayak, or canoe please join in. You may contact Marleen at 306-917-7123 for further information as to when and where to meet. People can then wander and visit the many attractions that dot our wonderful community. We will not be having craft tables and beer garden in the afternoon - the main event is in the evening.

The Canada celebrations will start at 7 p.m. at Uhmann Centennial Park, on the north side of the road at the intersection of MacLachlan Avenue and Lake Avenue. Parking and numbers are restricted due to COVID but the event will be live streamed. Go to the village website manitoubeach.ca on July 1 for the video link. At 7 p.m. we will start celebrating Canada Day with the dedication of Uhmann Centennial Park and the dedication of the Manitou Reflections project. Dignitaries, as well as the artists who created the Manitou Reflections project, will speak for 30 to 45 minutes. This will be followed by live entertainment by Ukulele Friends who will entertain for 45 minutes. The event should wrap up around 9 p.m.

Fireworks (cannot forget the fireworks!) are planned to start between 10:30 and 11 p.m. depending on weather and darkness. The fireworks are planned to be set off from a platform in the lake in front of the Main Beach. The viewing area will be maximized so that good viewing will be from Camp Easter Seal in the west to Danceland in the east, keeping us safely distanced.

In the event of rain or strong winds, the dedication ceremonies will be moved to the community hall. This will restrict the number of individuals that will be able to attend in person, but you will still be able to view the evening as it will be live streamed as noted above.

In the event of strong winds the fireworks will be moved to July 2 at the same time in the evening.

Crop Report

Provincially, topsoil moisture conditions have increased compared to the previous week due to rainfall. That is according to the Ministry of Agriculture's weekly Crop Report for the period of June 8 to 14. Cropland topsoil moisture is rated as two percent surplus, 72 percent adequate, 23 percent short and three percent very short. Hay and pasture land topsoil moisture is rated as one percent surplus, 61 percent adequate, 30 percent short and eight percent very short.

Heavy localized rainfall resulted in occasions of flooding and water pooling in low areas of some fields across the province. With the rain came extremely strong winds in some regions as well, resulting in damage to or loss of bins, buildings and crops. Areas of the province that only saw wind and no rain are becoming concerned about dry conditions.

Northeast of Old Wives Lake saw the largest localized rain shower, resulting in approximately 208 mm over the course of a few hours, causing road wash outs, flooding, filling of sloughs and dugouts and some crop damage. Other areas that saw large amounts of rainfall included Big Beaver with 127 mm, Frobisher with 111 mm and Moosomin with 110 mm. The southeast received the most rainfall but rain was general throughout all regions of the province.

There were reports of localized flooding in areas that received a lot of rainfall in a short amount of time. Winds also delayed many producers from being able to spray, but they have been busy spraying for weeds and insects as wind conditions and crop stages allow.

Provincially, 78 percent of pulse crops, 76 percent of spring cereals, 70 percent of fall cereals and 66 percent of oilseed crops are at their normal stages of development for this time of year.

Crop conditions across the province mostly range from fair to good. With the recent rains, producers are hopeful that conditions will improve.

In general, emergence of earlier seeded crops is good, but the lack of moisture and wind in some fields has reduced germination of canola and has resulted in spotty emergence. Areas where germination was very poor might be reseeded if conditions allow, now that soil moisture is ample.

Certain parts of the province that did not see much rainfall saw damage from dry soil conditions. Other damage that was reported was from flea beetles, gophers and some first signs of seedling diseases.

Producers have been busy spraying for weed and insect control as wind conditions and crop stages allow. Reseeding from dry conditions and insect damage, specifically in canola fields, has also been reported and some producers are finishing up seeding green feed.
