







Saskatchewan potash producers ramp up production

In response to the growing demand and escalating concern around global food security, Saskatchewan's potash sector is ramping up production. Saskatchewan is positioning itself to fill the market gaps left as a result of the sanctions placed on Russia and Belarus.

"Global interest in Saskatchewan is at an all-time high as countries look to us as an ethical and reliable producer for their resource needs," Energy and Resources Minister Jim Reiter said. "We are proud of our world-class potash sector for stepping up to meet growing global demand for decades to come."

The Mosaic Company, K+S Potash Canada and Nutrien Ltd. have all announced planned potash production increases at their Saskatchewan facilities in response to global supply uncertainty.

Nutrien announced they will be ramping up annual potash production capability to 18 million tonnes by 2025. This represents an increase of more than 5.0 million

tonnes, or 40 percent, compared to 2020, and will lead to approximately 350 new jobs in the province.

"In addition to increasing potash production by more than 2.0 million tonnes since 2020, Nutrien will invest in the province of Saskatchewan to accelerate potash production capability to 18 million tonnes by 2025, and continue evaluating a pathway to 23 million tonnes," Nutrien CEO Ken Seitz said, "With decades of experience and technology leadership across our network of six low-cost mines in the province, Nutrien is ideally positioned to help sustainably feed a growing world."

K+S Potash recently announced plans to increase production to 4.0 million tonnes per year over the next few decades at their Bethune facility. K+S is looking to hire more than 70 new employees to carry out these operations.

Mosaic is also taking action to increase its annual potash operating capability by a further 1.5 million tonnes by the second half of 2023 at their new Esterhazy K3 operation and Colonsay mine. Since resuming production

at Colonsay in 2021, Mosaic has added 150 jobs at the site.

BHP is looking to accelerate the time frame for the construction of its \$12 billion Jansen project, and several other companies have new potash mine projects at varying stages of development.

Saskatchewan is the largest potash producer in the world and the sole producer in Canada, typically accounting for about 30 percent of global potash production. Over the last 15 years, the potash industry has committed approximately \$30 billion of investment for new mines and expansions.

Saskatchewan's potash sector accounts for approximately 11 percent of provincial GDP and supports roughly 6,000 direct and indirect jobs. Saskatchewan's potash production and the value of sales both set new records in 2021, reaching 14.2 million tonnes K2O and \$7.6 billion respectively.

Given the province's substantial potash reserves, the sector will continue to drive investment, create new jobs and bring opportunity to the people of Saskatchewan.

Intent


The proposed bylaw will rezone land described below from A - Agriculture District to AR - Agricultural Residential District.

Surgeon with local area roots shares about her experience with MSF

Working in the aftermath of war, trying to save the lives of her patients during the COVID-19 pandemic and knowing that some of the homes which have been bombed nearby are those of her friends and colleagues, despite all of the challenges, for orthopaedic surgeon Deirdre Nunan, the former Lanigan resident knows it is where she needs to be.

Involved with Doctors Without Borders (MSF), in the latter part of 2021 Nunan spent four months in Mosul in northern Iraq and then after a break, six months in the Gaza Strip before returning home to her roots in Lanigan in May. During her time abroad, the surgeon had her hands full taking care of patients who were either wounded during war and still had ongoing effects or patients who were injured but could not be managed by the health system.

"The damage from years of occupation and war were so severe that the medical system there is still getting back on its feet," explained Nunan of Mosul. "My work was to provide support for patients that were either affected by war or affected by the after effects of war."

Sharing her experiences with a group of people at the Knox United Church in Lanigan May 15, Nunan described that hospitals in Gaza are run very similar to those in Canada in the sense of being able to see, operate and visit with patients on the ward after surgery. Where one glaring difference between the health care systems lies is the limited supply of orthopedic surgeons and orthopaedic materials in places where MSF works. "Often patients have been waiting a very long time to get this treatment. That changes the nature of the work and there is a lot more infections and very severe infections that I deal with."

Born in Humboldt and raised in Lanigan after her parents came to Canada from Europe, Nunan's father would practice as a family doctor until retiring in 2000. Seeing her father volunteer and work in northern Canada and internationally, Deirdre elected to follow in her late father's footsteps by completing her own university and training in the medical field. After that, she began working with MSF, something she has enjoyed.

"It is almost a bit addictive in some ways. I think the intensity of it and the fact that I am in other places with a job for about six months, it concentrates the experience. You know that anything that you want to do has to be done in this small time frame, especially in Gaza where I am not working as a surgeon. It is not a matter of treating patients one by one, I am working in a more management

role. If I am trying to make a change in the way the hospital works or introduce a new system, I know I have a limited time to do it in. I think it is that pressure on myself that I enjoy but most of all it is really that human connection."

While the culture and environment is much different than the one experienced in Canada, Nunan has a special place in her heart for the Gaza Strip. Having worked there on and off since 2019, during that time, Deirdre has become close friends with hospital staff and some of the patients who have required treatment multiple times over the years. Seeing their results has become an encouragement for Nunan but what really brought the surgeon back in November 2021 was to make sure her colleagues and friends were okay.

For a period of 11 days in May, Israeli airstrikes and shelling on the Gaza Strip killed 256 people, including 66 children while injuring around 2,000 Palestinians. While Nunan was not in the country at that time, many of her friends and colleagues were. With huge damage to infrastructure, loss of homes and a lot of trauma to patients and staff, Deirdre was in constant communication with fellow staff and friends via text messaging.

After wars in 2014 and then in 2018, Nunan noted the trauma of fearing for your life, seeing your home in ruins and daily economic hardship was just compounded when the attacks occurred in May 2021. According to a recent article by MSF, of the two million Palestinians living in Gaza, over 40 percent are children aged 14 or under. "Those children have lived their lives under Israeli blockade, survived three major offensives and experience ongoing trauma."

Sharing his story of the airstrikes from May 2021, 30-year-old MSF staff member Ashraf (his name has

been changed to protect his identity) who is married with two children explained in a MSF article of the horrific experience. "May 2021 was the first time I witnessed an aggression while having a family of my own. The bombs had never been this close to us. My kids were scared and screaming. Nothing we said could calm them down."

With a fear of losing his family, Ashraf and his wife, who is also a health care worker, took turns going to the hospital and staying with the couple's kids. "While at the hospital, I was constantly worried that my phone was going to ring, and someone would tell me that my family was dead."

During the shelling, Ashraf said MSF ambulances couldn't move and riding with colleagues, he hoped to arrive at the hospital safely. "They were targeting everything. Not even the hospital was safe."

While in the operating theatre, bombs fell around the hospital with one targeting a building not more than 300 meters away and another hitting 100 meters south of the hospital. "The operating theatre was constantly shaking, as if there was an earthquake. We were scared that we might be the next target."

Back in Canada before her next assignment, all Nunan could do was hope everyone would be okay during the treacherous 11 days. As the bombings continued Ashraf



PUBLIC NOTICE

SaskWater's District Operations will be treating the water in the Saskatoon Southeast Water Supply System (SSEWS) canal to control the growth of weeds and algae during the 2022 irrigation season.

These treatments will take place approximately every two weeks until September 23rd, 2022.

The chemical used in these treatments is called Magnacide "H". It is a registered aquatic herbicide that has been approved by the Water Security Agency for use in the SSEWS canal system.

It will remain active in the water for approximately 24 hours after each treatment and will diminish to non-detectable levels prior to treated water entering the reservoirs. Treated water may also be harmful to the skin, causing irritation to exposed areas.

This water treatment helps to prevent irrigation intakes from clogging and ensures adequate flows are maintained in this multi-use system.

Dosages will be maintained at a level where the water can safely be used for irrigation with no damage to field crops.

Please ensure that people are reminded that swimming, canoeing and fishing in the canal at any time is STRICTLY PROHIBITED.

Dear Reena,

Why are English cucumbers shrink-wrapped? Evan

Dear Evan,

If you were to compare the appearance of a shrink-wrapped English cucumber over two weeks versus a non-wrapped English cucumber, you would notice that the shrink-wrapped cucumber lasts about three times longer. Shrink wrapping reduces dehydration, damage to cucumbers during transport and reduces the amount of moisture lost in the cucumber.

Extra tip: shrink-wrap takes a while to remove from English cucumbers. To quickly remove the plastic wrap, cut the cucumber in half so that it is easier to work with. Score the plastic along the seam being careful not to cut through the cucumber. Remove plastic and cut off both ends of the cucumber because the ends are a little bitter. If you are cutting plastic off several cucumbers, consider using an electric knife to cut the plastic off. Take extra care not to cut yourself when using an electric knife because the cucumber may roll while you are working with it.

My cottage aluminum window screens have old dried up paint on them. Can you recommend something I can buy or use to clean them up?

Dear Brenda,

In a ventilated area apply household ammonia, paint thinner or WD-40 to the paint stained areas. Use two old toothbrushes, one for the front of the screen and one for the back to gently scrub both sides of the screen. It will not take long and the paint will disappear.

Dear Rosita,

Imagine a person who ate three meals a day plus snacks without ever brushing their teeth. Rinsing with water would not remove the plaque and buildup. The same is true for a dishwasher, which requires regular checkups and cleaning appointments. Maintain the machine by carefully scrubbing the interior, especially where the base of the dishwasher door and floor meet.

As well, the filter needs to be taken apart and cleaned from time to time. It is amazing what gets caught in there: straws, cherry pits, tea bags, bones, pieces of glass, stickers, etc. Experiment with a few dishwasher detergents and increase the hot-water temperature according to your manual.

The next step is to purchase a product called Iron Out. When you run it through your empty dishwasher, it will clean the dishwasher basin, hoses, racks, etc. If you are not happy with the cleaning result over time, contact a professional because the dishwasher will need to be thoroughly examined for damaged parts or incorrect hook up.

Getting angry happens to everyone, but it can cause disastrous results. When we get angry, it can become a wildfire out of control. No matter what sparks our anger, it is wise to restrain it before it is too big to handle. James 1:19-20 says, "My dear brothers and sisters, take note of this: Everyone should be quick to listen, slow to speak, and slow to become angry, for our anger does not bring about the righteous lives that God desires of us." It is hard to keep a tight rein on our tongue and actions when angry.

Anger often results in aggressive behaviour. If you express your anger by throwing things, punching

walls, swearing, verbally abusing and screaming at others, and placing your hands on another, you may emotionally or physically harm them. Murder often begins in anger. Most of us do not want to endure others spewing their rage at us.

Some folks stuff their anger, refusing to let it go for days, weeks or years. When we stuff our anger, we give the devil a foothold. Ephesians 4:26-27 warns, "In your anger do not sin. Do not let the sun go down while you are still angry and give the devil a foothold." Stuffed anger invites the devil to grow unforgiveness and bitterness in us. We may feel we have the right to shut out others who have wronged us, but better to restrain our anger quickly and re-evaluate it.

Re-evaluating angry feelings helps us to release them. Angry someone cut you off in traffic? Why hang on to the offence? If there was no accident, trash, your anger.

Rosetown RCMP investigate after vehicles stolen from business

On June 21, 2022 at approximately 6:30 a.m., Rosetown RCMP received a report of a group of suspicious vehicles travelling close together on a local grid road at a high rate of speed. Shortly after, they received a second report of a break and enter at a business in Rosetown. Investigation determined six vehicles, all brand new, were stolen from a local dealership between 5 a.m. and 6 a.m. that morning. A van, reported as stolen in Three Hills, Alta. earlier on June 21, was located abandoned at the dealership. Officers immediately

began working to locate the vehicles. Two vehicles were located, abandoned, in the Rosetown RCMP Detachment area. Investigation determined the outstanding vehicles travelled northwest, sometimes at a high rate of speed, and that a Ford F350, reported as stolen in Rosetown on June 19, was travelling with them.

One vehicle was found abandoned near Luseland, Sask. With the assistance of Luseland Police Service, a second vehicle was located and stopped nearby.

The two occupants fled on foot but were located and arrested shortly after. Two

illegally-modified firearms, ammunition and a box of vehicle keys were located and seized from one of the vehicles.

Further investigation determined some of the outstanding vehicles may be in Alberta; one was later recovered in Red Deer by Red Deer RCMP.

“Early in this investigation, we alerted the public to report sightings and information through local media and a Saskatchewan Crime Watch Advisory. We'd like to thank members of the public who reported information about suspicious vehicles in their area – it helped





shared buildings in the middle of the city were completely destroyed and bodies were on the streets. At hospitals, people continuously arrived with many different wounds. "Once again, we were overwhelmed by the mass casualties Israel inflicted on Gaza. There was not enough blood for transfusions, we didn't have enough Intensive Care Unit capacity. We just could not treat that number of people at the same time. We were just aiming to save as many lives as we could on the spot. Sepsis was everywhere, potential COVID-19 transmissions and other communicable diseases."

With nowhere to run to and nowhere to be safe, Ashraf said everyone was just waiting for their turn to die. Fortunately he was one of the lucky ones but the impact will be lasting. "My daughter used to love to go to the beach. Before May 2021, she asked to go every day. In May 2021, however, we could see the shore being bombed from our window. It took her months to ask me again to take her to the beach."

Ashraf and his family are not the only ones with a traumatic experience. Nunan explained there were many more of her colleagues, some who lost their homes and loved ones who also went through awful moments. It was because of that, she needed to return to see them in person. "I wanted to offer my support and commiseration with the things they had lost and been through. It is so hard to do that from a distance, so being able to be there working together with my colleagues who I know had lost homes and had friends die and who had to work under these appalling circumstances was something I needed to do."

Sharing she has more personal fear when on a highway in Saskatchewan than when it comes to working at the Gaza Strip, Nunan knows she is protected because she works for a large international organization with people always looking out for her safety. "What really worries me is all my friends and their families who do not have the benefit of that protection. When they are at work at the hospital, then yes, that MSF identity gives them some degree of protection, but when they are back home, they are very much at risk."

While the situation has since settled following the deadly attacks, Nunan said as images flashed on television screens and on social media showing the invasion in Ukraine earlier this year, it triggered a lot of trauma and fear for those living in the Gaza Strip. "I know that people are feeling very acutely for the people of Ukraine. In Gaza I had so many colleagues who were so horrified to see what was happening in Ukraine because they knew exactly how this felt and recognized their own homes when

they were seeing photos and videos of the bombings. They recognized their own fears when they were hearing the stories of people in Ukraine. The war in Ukraine, just as the 11 days last May in Gaza, we know how long the after effects of these wars continue to go on for. So even though it is Ukraine that is in the news right now, there are many other lesser reported wars currently ongoing. Then there is the situation in Gaza where we know that some of our patients and some of our staff that still have these wounds will never heal."

Not only did the people of Gaza fear the bombings but Nunan also touched on the pandemic and how it reached that country as well. Spending 10 weeks of the year in quarantine in 2020 and 2021 because of flying into and out of Gaza Strip and Mosul, Deirdre said things in that area are stabilizing and running more normally.

"We faced quite a difficult period in February of this year when omicron reached Gaza. A lot of staff were off and a lot of patients could not have elective surgeries. That was quite a chaotic month."

Getting through the omicron spike in February, Nunan said people have since been able to adapt to the pandemic as the new normal and while it is not exactly like things used to be, the surgeon noted it is manageable.

Reflecting back on her time in Gaza as high-paced and stressful, Deirdre also shared it was enjoyable. Playing the violin and taking her instrument wherever she goes, Nunan connected with a surgeon who played piano and guitar. Getting together at a little coffee shop in Gaza City, Nunan described taking over the cafe and creating a mini concert with those in attendance.

"We ended up having a sing along of Palestinian and Arabic folk songs. It was really one of these experiences where it really hits home how there really is no difference between any of us, whatever language we speak or wherever we are."

Carrying moments like those with her as she ended her time in Gaza and returned to Lanigan, Nunan said as much as she enjoys her experiences with MSF, there is something to be said about being back on Canadian soil.

"Being at home I find it very relaxing because you don't have to think twice about anything. I can just be here. I don't have to think, 'Am I wearing the right thing? Am I behaving the right way? Am I using the right language and words that is appropriate for where I am?' Saskatchewan is my baseline so I can just go back to neutral without over-analyzing things. It is just good to have a bit of downtime and to be in nature because that is something that simply doesn't exist in Gaza and enjoy the quiet of rural Saskatchewan."
