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## WHS teacher named Outstanding Coach of the Year

When it comes to making a tremendous impact as a coach both on and off the court, it should come as no surprise that Winston High School teacher Wendi Collins was named as this year's Saskatchewan High Schools Athletic Association (SHSAA) Horizon Central District Outstanding Female Coach of the Year.

SHSAA Executive Director Lyle McKellar said each of the 14 SHSAA Districts hand out an award annually to both a male and female coach who have made outstanding contributions within the coaching field and Collins was this year's Horizon Central female recipient. With a focus on team while having fun and striving for success, Collins not only fit the bill but has made an impact on her students and peers as well.

Honoured to be recognized as the SHSAA Outstanding Female Coach of the Year for Horizon Central District, Collins believes sport is one of the most important high school activities for both an educator and student. "Being involved in sport teaches life lessons about dedication and teamwork that are hard to learn elsewhere. It also provides an opportunity for a very unique relationship between the educator and student athlete which allows for further growth in the high school environment as well. There is a direct correlation between classroom success and student involvement in extracurricular activities."

After starting her coaching and teaching career in Rockglen in 2002, Collins has made stops at Lanigan Central High School (coaching from 2006-14) and Winston High School in Watrous (coaching from 2004-06 and 2014-present). During that time, Collins attended one boys volleyball provincials in 2002, four volleyball provincials with Watrous, and five volleyball provincial championships with Lanigan. During those appearances at provincials she earned a gold medal, two bronze medals and two fourth place finishes.

Winston High School teacher Lori Bart-

ko who nominated Collins for this year's SHSAA honour said there is no doubt Wendi has a passion for student involvement in athletics which has been demonstrated through her many coaching roles including senior boys volleyball, senior girls basketball, as well as badminton and track and field.

"Most of her time has been dedicated to senior girls volleyball. She has worked tirelessly building the volleyball program at Winston High School and contributed countless hours coaching while she was teaching at Lanigan Central High School."

With many of her weekends occupied with travelling to tournaments across Saskatchewan before the COVID-19 pandemic arrived, Collins said there have been some great memories including her run to a provincial championship with the Lazers in Lanigan. "That was pretty exciting. The girls worked really hard throughout their whole high school career. That group of girls, they were determined that was their goal so being able to watch them accomplish that was pretty amazing."

Collins also recalled another highlight from her coaching career. "One year when I was coaching in Lanigan the families of the athletes on my team organized to provide my family with supper each of the weekends I was away at a tournament. Every weekend a new family provided me with a meal to take home. It was a gesture that I will never forget!"

Now coaching at Winston High School and more recently dealing with the pandemic, like other coaches within the school division, Collins has had to try to navigate through it all. When it came to the teams she was coaching this past year, Wendi noted they had one month of volleyball (which included only two games) and a house league for girls basketball which only lasted three weeks.

"While everyone was disappointed in the length of the involvement of the sport this season I found it played a new appreciation in the eyes of the student athletes in the role sport plays in their lives. Once we were finally able to hit the court in Oc-

tober of 2020 I have never seen my players happier to be up at 6:30 a.m. Each practice and game they displayed a love of the game and it was heartwarming to say the least. It has really changed my perspective that it is not always the outcome of the competition that makes it a success!"

Understanding the many hours of work and dedication put into coaching, Winston High School Principal Terry Braman said Wendi was very deserving of the award. "Her commitment to our

student athletes is evident year after year and we are fortunate to have her at Winston. She will continue to make an impact on our kids with her love of sports and coaching."

Echoing similar sentiments as Braman, Bartko noted Wendi is the epitome of patience, kindness, and determination. "She has high expectations of her athletes and models the same behaviour both on

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# Budget approved for Watrous with some projects on docket for 2021

After more than a year of navigating through the COVID-19 pandemic, municipal elections taking place this past fall and with 2021 being a revaluation year, Watrous Town Council spent considerable time going through this year's budget. While there are a few items that will be undertaken and completed in 2021, there are not any substantial projects on the schedule as council elected to wait and see what happens as the province starts to fully reopen.

When it came time to look at this year's budget, Watrous Town Administrator Orrin Redden explained that 2021 also included assessment revaluations. Occurring every four years across Saskatchewan, the town administrator said the revaluations create shifts and changes that relate to different property classes like agriculture, residential and commercial. With residential property assessments usually making up approximately 80 percent of the Town of Watrous' total taxable assessment, commercial about 20 percent and agriculture land less than one percent, Redden said that meant the Town of Watrous tax policies will continue to draw similar amounts from the residential and commercial sectors. Redden did

indicate however, there may be significant tax shifts from property to property depending on what has happened with individual assessments.

Since 2021 is an assessment revaluation year, the Town of Watrous sent out tax prepayment estimates in January and February that were calculated at 90 percent of the actual 2020 levies. Redden said the reason that they used 90 percent is because of the potential assessment shifts and resulting changes in taxes in 2021. Then a few weeks ago the actual tax notices were mailed June 16th which provide for a one percent discount on the municipal portion for payments received by June 30th.

"The overall municipal levy will increase about one percent in 2021. The Education Property Tax Mill Rates set by the provincial government will result in an additional \$40,000 of school taxes levied in 2021. This is a 5.1 percent increase from last year's Education Tax levy."

As for what is in this year's budget which was approved by town council, Redden provided some items of note:

- There is no major paving projects slated for 2021. Crews will mostly be taking care of any work that was not completed last fall while doing some patching work.
- The Town of Watrous recently upgraded its backhoe.

• Along with its municipal health partners, the Town of Watrous is constructing a new garage to house the two mobility vans which are utilized in the community.

• When it comes to lot development, the Town of Watrous is continuing work on the East Industrial parcel behind Watrous Home Hardware.

• Work is being done on the 100 block of 12th Ave. E. with servicing and base work. That stretch of road will be prepared for curb and asphalt work to be completed in 2022.

• Along 8th Ave. E. within the residential area, lane work and developing Mandal Street adjacent to the berm is underway.

• At Watrous Centennial Arena, lobby renovations will be completed.

• Anticipating a swimming season at the Watrous Swimming Pool, the facility's tank was sandblasted and repainted.

• A phased project spanning over four years, Well #7 will be completed this year. In addition to that, as part of the phased project, the well and supply line connecting Well #7 with Well #6 was done in 2018-20 and this year the building and mechanical will be completed to allow the well to be fully in-service.

The motorcycle operator who was also the only rider was transported to hospital in Watrous and then taken by STARS to Saskatoon. Speed may have been a factor and the investigation is ongoing.

**Man passes away after collision**

Around 12:45 p.m. June 18 Wynyard RCMP responded to a call of a collision between an

eastbound semi and a westbound car on Hwy. 16.

The adult male semi driver was taken to hospital as a precaution. The lone driver of the car, an adult male, passed away at the scene.

Wynyard RCMP and an RCMP Collision Reconstructionist continue to investigate.

**Mischief and theft in RM of Wolverine**

Humboldt/Lanigan RCMP are seeking the public's assistance in locating individual(s) responsible for a theft and damage that occurred at farm yard located in the RM of Wolverine.

Between Apr. 27 and May 26 an Edge Agro fuel tank was stolen off an auger located at a farm approximately 22 kms south and 10 kms east of Humboldt in the RM of Wolverine. Hand tools and a catalytic converter were also stolen from a truck parked on the same property. Total theft and damage is estimated at \$3,000. No one was injured and police continue to investigate.

Investigation reveals that a motorcycle, driven by an 82-year-old male from Regina left the roadway. The male passed away on scene.

Hwy. 734 was closed for investigation and a detour was available.

Lumsden RCMP and an RCMP Collision Reconstructionist continue to investigate.

**Man passes away after canoes capsize**

On June 16, 2021 at approximately 7:10 p.m., Creighton RCMP received

a call of three canoes that had capsized on the south side of Amisk Lake. Six males were reported to be in the water.

Investigation revealed that the six males who were on a canoe trip were crossing Amisk Lake when a large storm moved through the area. Large waves caused all three canoes to capsize around 4:30 p.m. The occupants stayed with the capsized canoes and floated until they reached cell range. They then called 911 using a cellphone stored in a waterproof container.

The Creighton RCMP Detachment, Flin Flon RCMP Detachment, Ministry of Environment Conservation Officers and members of the public located the group at approximately 8:30 p.m. using the GPS coordinates from that 911 call.

One of the males was unconscious when they located him. He was later transported to hospital and passed away. The male was 48 years old and from Saskatoon.

The other five males were transported to hospital in Flin Flon for assessment.



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## Solutions and Substitutions



### Tips from Reena Nerbas

For a lot of us this past year has not been without its challenges and as we continue to navigate through the pandemic so many people have stepped up in a big way. From health care professionals to doctors, hospitals, clinics, first responders, pharmacists, coaches, organizations, churches, businesses and residents, so many have been doing their part to reduce the spread of COVID-19 and to make things as safe and as normal as possible. That list also includes schools and

the teachers and staff within them.

The easiest remedy is to turn the bedsheet inside out and position it onto the mattress. Pin the excess of each corner. Remove the sheet and sew a dart along each excess seam. Another option is to purchase bedsheet garters to hold the sheet in place. The downside to garters are that they are fiddly to attach.

**Hello Reena,**

I enjoy your column and have picked up some clever tips! Four years ago, I had my kitchen renovated (I am an old widower living alone and I needed to prepare the kitchen for the day I sell). Lately, I have noticed that sliding my kitchen chair in and out of position at the table has resulted in scratches from abrasion. The flooring is a nice chocolate brown and looks a lot like ceramic tile, but the scratches reveal the next layer is white! Is there anything that can be done to mask these scratches or do you think this tile can be lifted out and replaced? I watched them install it and it seems the different “planks” were interlocked. I could use your help with this! Sincerely, Bernie

**Dear Bernie,**

Thank you for your letter. If you have access to a matching tile you may choose to hire a professional to break the tile using a cold chisel and replace it with a new tile or you may wish to tackle the project if you

are confident in your DIY skills. A much simpler remedy is to make a paste using the grout that was originally used between the tiles and some water. Sprinkle about a tablespoon of grout onto the scratches. Add a little water to make a paste. Dampen a sponge and wipe the grout paste off the tile. The grout will fill the cracks and no longer be noticeable.

**Dear Reena,**

I make my own fresh buns every Sunday and then I put them in the freezer. To thaw them, I take them out of the freezer and place them in the oven at 350° for eight minutes. Sometimes they become hard and overbaked, but it seems that many experts advise this as the best way to thaw buns. Do you agree with the experts? Kimberley

**Dear Kimberley,**

Actually, I am with you on this one, the risk of over-baking the buns is too risky! When I remove frozen buns from the freezer, I take them out of the sealable bag. I then gently wrap them with a tea towel and place them on the counter at room temperature. The towel absorbs the moisture and the results are fresh tasting soft buns.

Re: changing the furnace filter

As a service tech for a natural gas utility, furnace filters should be changed once a month if there are smokers or pets in the house. There is a lot less stress on the furnace heat exchanger, as a clean filter prevents overheating. Filters also need to be changed in the summer if you have central air. Tim

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
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



## Easy Rhubarb Dessert

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experience the same shock and despair as the search for graves continues across the province.

"We are grateful for the work Indigenous leaders are undertaking and will continue to offer our unwavering support as we work together to help bring closure to survivors, families and communities in our province."

The announcement of the unmarked graves comes a few days after provincial Métis and Northern Affairs Minister Don McMorris announced on June 18 that \$2 million of provincial funding will be provided to the Federation of Sovereign Indigenous Nations (FSIN) to support research into undocumented deaths and burials on formerly federally operated residential school locations in the province.

Currently, the FSIN is putting together their approach to support First Nations and help carry out this research, as many Indigenous communities across the province have already announced their intention to carry out investigations into former school sites in their communities.

"The Province of Saskatchewan has committed \$2 million to begin the work and research necessary to bring these little lost souls some peace," FSIN Chief Bobby Cameron said. "It's a good start but much more will need to be done as Saskatchewan had one of the highest numbers of residential schools in the country. This work will take years to complete and proper ceremony and protocol must be followed at every site. Elders, knowledge keepers, survivors, their descendants, and First Nations communities must be a part of this process every step of the way. This work is vital for many of these survivors who have been sharing their stories for years. We must come together to help them heal."

According to the provincial government, the residential school system operated in Canada for more than a century. The federal government reports that 150,000 Indigenous children were removed and separated from their families and communities to attend these schools. The Truth and Reconciliation Commission estimates that approximately 20 federal residential schools operated in Saskatchewan from the 1880s to the 1990s.

## Unmarked graves found on Cowessess First Nation

Hundreds of unmarked graves have been found in southern Saskatchewan on the Cowessess First Nation as Cowessess First Nation Chief Cadmus Delorme shared the devastating news during a press conference June 24.

With Marieval Residential School opening its doors in 1898 before closing in 1996, Chief Delorme said radar penetrating research began June 2, 2021 and as of June 23, there were 751 hits of unmarked graves. "This is not a mass grave site. These are unmarked graves," said Chief Delorme who added, "We cannot affirm that they are all children but there are oral stories that there are adults in this grave site as well."

Speaking to news agencies from around the world during the press conference, Delorme said, "All we ask is all of you listening is that you stand by us as we heal and we get stronger and that we all must put down our ignorance and accidental racism of not addressing the truth that this country has with Indigenous people. We are not asking for pity but we are asking for understanding. We need time to heal and this country must stand by us."

After the announcement, Prime Minister, Justin Trudeau, issued the following statement: "I am terribly saddened to learn that the remains of children had been found in unmarked graves near the former Marieval (Cowessess) Residential School in Saskatchewan. My heart breaks for the Cowessess First Nation, and for all Indigenous communities across Canada."

"No child should have ever been taken away from their families and communities, and robbed of their language, culture, and identity. No child should have spent their precious youth subjected to terrible loneliness and abuse. No child should have spent their last moments in a place where they lived in fear, never to see their loved

ones again. And no families should have been robbed of the laughter and joy of their children playing, and the pride of watching them grow in their community.

"I recognize these findings only deepen the pain that families, survivors, and all Indigenous peoples and communities are already feeling, and that they reaffirm a truth that they have long known. The hurt and the trauma that you feel is Canada's responsibility to bear, and the government will continue to provide Indigenous communities across the country with the funding and resources they need to bring these terrible wrongs to light. While we cannot bring back those who were lost, we can – and we will – tell the truth of these injustices, and we will forever honour their memory."

"The findings in Marieval and Kamloops are part of a larger tragedy. They are a shameful reminder of the systemic racism, discrimination, and injustice that Indigenous peoples have faced – and continue to face – in this country. And together, we must acknowledge this truth, learn from our past, and walk the shared path of reconciliation, so we can build a better future."

Saskatchewan Premier Scott Moe also issued a statement on the discovery of the unmarked graves: "Today, all of Saskatchewan mourns for those who were discovered buried in unmarked graves near the former Marieval Indian Residential School site. I understand many were children, and it is heart breaking to think that so many children lost their lives after being separated from their families, and away from the love and solace only a family can provide."

"I have spoken with Chief Cameron of the Federation of Sovereign Indigenous Nations and Chief Cadmus Delorme to offer the full support of the provincial government as Cowessess deals with this tragic discovery. Sadly, other Saskatchewan First Nations will

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

## Re-opening Roadmap

With over 70 percent of Saskatchewan residents over the age of 18 having received their first dose, and 69 percent of all residents over the age of 12 having received their first dose as of June 20, Saskatchewan announced that the full implementation of Step 3 of the Re-Opening Roadmap will occur on Sunday, July 11.

That means that as of Sunday, July 11, all public health orders will be removed. This includes the removal of the province-wide mandatory masking order, and the removal of limits on events and gathering sizes.

On June 20, Saskatchewan entered Step Two of reopening, with in-person gathering limits increasing across a number of sectors and

for private gatherings. Private indoor gatherings increased from 10 to 15 people while the provincial masking mandate remains in place under Step Two.

Step Two of the Re-opening Roadmap commenced three weeks after 70 percent of residents age 30 and above received their first dose, with at least three weeks passing since the commencement of Step One.

Public health measures in Step Two that were eased included:

- No capacity thresholds on retail and personal care services, must maintain an occupancy that allows for physical distancing;

- Restaurants and bars will have no table capacity thresholds, must maintain two metres of physical distancing or structural barriers between tables, dance floors and buffets remain closed;

- 150 person maximum capacity at event facilities, casinos, bingo halls, theatres, art galleries, libraries and recreational facilities, must maintain an occupancy that allows for physical distancing, restaurant guidelines apply at venues that serve food;

- No change from Step One at gyms and fitness facilities, primary, secondary and post-secondary education and childcare;

- All remaining restrictions on youth and adult sports will be lifted;

- Limit of 15 people at private indoor gatherings, including household gatherings;


- Limit of 150 people at public indoor gatherings and private and public outdoor gatherings; and

- Current province-wide masking mandate remains in place.

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


## Golf Report


