## New walking trail stepping closer to completion

After a soggy start to spring delaying progress on a new walking trail that will link Watrous and Manitou Beach, with some nicer weather, work is feverishly underway to see it completed. Aiming to have the substantial project finished by sometime in July, local resident Ron Ediger along with his company Melron Services Ltd. are hard at work to ensure everything comes together.

Seeing a need to create a trail that would essentially join Watrous and Manitou Beach, Ediger wanted to help make it happen after the Watrous Rotary along with generous sponsors and volunteers created a pair of trails for residents and visitors to use near Watrous. The new trail, which crews from Melron Services Ltd. have been busy working on will extend approximately three kilometres between Watrous and Manitou Beach.

After receiving all of the necessary approvals and covering the cost of the project, Ediger started work this past fall before winter arrived. Building up lower spots and clearing a path in 2021, this past week graders were out levelling portions of the trail while other parts were being built up.

"There is still quite a bit of work to do but once we get rolling here it should go pretty quickly," said Ediger.

With packing, adding a base top and seal coat left to be done, once finished, the pad for people to walk or bike on will span 10 feet wide with about a two foot slope on either side. "There should be lots of room so people can enjoy using the trail once it is done."

Extending northeast from the first trail originally completed by the Watrous Rotary, the third trail will continue past a gazebo toward the Watrous Cemetery. Walkers can veer off the gravel road as the new trail will take them along a corner of the cemetery to the main gates. From there proper signage will be installed to allow walkers to cross Hwy. 365 to the other side of the trail. Once across the highway, the trail will run alongside Hwy. 365 toward Manitou Beach. Reaching the turnoff to Murray Disc Golf, Ediger has extended a portion of that gravel road which now wraps around a slough and into a field. "We have received permission from the owners to use part of their land which was really generous so we have the trail running right next to the slough and then toward the farmyard."

At the farmyard, a path has been cut near the hedges adjacent to the highway and Ediger will also be installing a six foot barrier on the other side to allow privacy from the yard site. The trail then continues alongside the highway running between a pasture and signs at the entrance to the Resort Village of Manitou Beach. Creating walking space near another home, the trail will go through a treed area before reaching the Manitou and District Regional Park campground. With room around some




hedges, the trail will lead walkers by the entrance of the park and then out in front of The Drive-In at Manitou Beach where a path is currently being used. Redoing that path, Ediger explained the trail will come to a conclusion at Lakeview Avenue, near the Resort Village of Manitou Beach's office and the Manitou Mini Golf.

"Having the trail end there will allow people to take in the nearby attractions

# Local authors receive international honour

What started out as a fun idea to create something for readers to enjoy has turned into huge recognition for a couple of self-published independent authors. Writing and illustrating, Flowman and the Magic Mullet, Konn and Emily Hawkes recently received a finalist award as part of the Next Generation Indie Book Awards.

With thousands of book submissions for the prestigious awards every year, when the local couple who farm near Watrous heard their book

was named a finalist in the Children's Juvenile/Fiction category, Emily said it was an absolute honour.

"My goodness, it was so exciting and so surprising. I first received the news by email and I had to read it three times to make sure I was reading it correctly. My first thought was, 'Did they get the right book? Or did they mean to email someone else?'"

Finding out about the largest international book awards program for independent publishers and self-published authors through SaskBooks, Hawkes figured she would submit Flowman and the Magic Mullet. "Never in a million years did I think we'd hear anything back."

Not only did Emily and Konn hear back but they received honours for their work. "When I realized that Flowman was named a finalist, I was like, 'Huh ... we won an award?! For a book about a kid with a mullet?!"

The rhyming picture book about a young hockey player whose superstitions get the best of him before overcoming his fears and self-doubt on the ice, Emily said it originally was written as a bit of a prank for Konn's friend in Washington, D.C. who had an amazing flowing head of hair.

After the book was released during the summer of 2021, like Flowman's hair, Emily



do not ever allow yourself to be tempted into using normal household cleansers on your marble floor. Not even in a pinch. If visitors are coming just when you happen to be out of marble and stone cleaner, mop with warm, clean water only.

Marble is a soft material made from calcium carbonate that is very sensitive to any acid or high alkaline chemicals. Do not use any tile cleaners: vinegar, ammonia, alcohol (Windex), Ajax, etc. on your marble floor. Use only liquid stone soap or neutral cleaners that have pH 7.00 and were made specifically for cleaning stone. In this way you prolong the stone life. Skilled natural stone floor experts can turn your dull and stained marble floor into a new one, their work is very specialized, and with the explosion in stone floor installations that are being done in new construction, the number of restoration contractors to choose from is growing fast. You should be able to get several quotes and evaluations.

Keep a spray bottle of marble and stone cleaner handy to clean spills and marks as they happen. If you make a practice of doing this, stains will be kept to a minimum and all you will need to do on floor washing days is pass a cotton mop dampened with warm water over the floor. For the stains and dullness that you are encountering, pour some of your marble and stone cleaner from your spray bottle into the warm wash water and mop as usual.

## Solutions and Substitutions

Dear Reena,

I have a problem with stains on marble flooring. Most stains are water and the tiles are also dulling with no shine, is there a cure? Many thanks in advance. Marge

Dear Marge,

Regardless of anything else you may have heard, do not ever allow yourself to be tempted into using normal household cleansers on your marble floor. Not even in a pinch. If visitors are coming just when you happen to be out of marble and stone cleaner, mop with warm, clean water only.

If you do not want to consult a professional and you do not want to use commercial cleaners, you can wipe the marble with three percent hydrogen peroxide and buff with a soft cloth, some people advise to use acetone on marble, but this sounds too risky to me. Another option to give marble a quick shine is to crush a stick of common white chalkboard chalk (made of limestone) into a fine powder. Dampen a clean white wash rag and dip it into the chalk powder. Rub it on the marble with smooth, overlapping back and forth strokes. Allow to dry for a moment, then rinse with fresh water on a damp rag and dry thoroughly.

Lastly, after your floor is professionally cleaned you may want to consider sealing the floor so that its beauty lasts for a long time.

Dear Reena,

Do you have suggestions to remove stains of black shoe polish off clothing? Nick

Dear Nick,

Apply glycerin to the area and leave for one hour. Wash clothing with heavy-duty laundry detergent. Do not toss clothing into washing machine until stain is gone. You can also blot the stain with one cup warm water, one teaspoon dish soap and one tablespoon household ammonia. Next, blot the stain with water and a clean cloth. Extra tip: white shoe polish will not smear if hairspray is applied to the shoe after it has dried. Also, white shoe polish will have a more even appearance if shoes are wiped with rubbing alcohol before polishing.

himself, he said, 'I'm going back home. My father's servants have enough to eat, and I am dying alone. I'll arise and go to my father, and say unto him, Father I have sinned against heaven, please take me in.'

His father saw him and rejoiced inside. Called his servants to prepare a feast. Bring out the new wine. Let us sing, let us be merry; he's now safe and sound. My son was dead and is alive again, was lost and is found." (From More Like You, released July 11, 2016, Robert Croft and Joyce Croft)

Ed, my old neighbour, complained to me when I played this song for him. He liked how Jerry Paladino sang the song but wanted the rest of the story with the older brother's reaction to the party celebrating the return of his younger brother.

Ed said that he would have behaved like the older brother. He makes the story

comfortable for Ed. Should the father have welcomed his wayward son back with open arms? Did the returning son deserve a second chance? Do people ever really change? Will the younger brother stay home or take off again and again hurt his father with another leaving?

The dictionary defines a prodigal as a son or daughter who leaves their parents to do things they disapprove of but then feels sorry and returns home. The pattern of a prodigal is rebellion, ruin, repentance, reconciliation, and last of all, restoration.

In Luke 15:11-32 we see the rebellion first. The younger son was rebellious, ready to break the rule of getting his share of the estate when his father had died. He demanded his part of his father's inheritance while his father was still alive, as if his father was dead to him.

When he got his share







# RCMP Report

Saskatchewan RCMP – Your Provincial Police Service - Weekly Report from May 23 to 29

## Investigative Recap

May 25: Prince Albert RCMP received several reports of a firearm discharge at a mobile home court just south of Prince Albert during the early evening. Investigation determined vehicles drove past a residence and an occupant or occupants discharged a firearm. A bullet went through the residence's wall. No one was injured. Officers continue to investigate.

May 26: At approximately 9:30 a.m., officers from Saskatchewan RCMP's Roving Traffic Unit stopped a vehicle on Hwy. 7 near Kindersley. During a subsequent search, officers located and seized 36 grams of cocaine, 19 grams of ketamine, 13 grams of MDMA, three ounces of psilocybin, 50 tabs of LSD, 250 millilitres of GHB and 16 grams of methamphetamine.

Neil Perry and Haseeb Rizvi, both from Saskatoon, have both been charged with seven counts of possession of a controlled substance for the purpose of trafficking, Section 5(2), Controlled Drugs and Substances Act. They will make their first court appearances on July 19 in Kindersley Provincial Court at 10 a.m.

May 26: At approximately 6:05 p.m., Prince Albert RCMP received a report of a robbery at a business just south of Prince Albert. Investigation determined a male armed with a knife approached two individuals and stole a sum of cash, then drove away. The individuals did not report any injuries. Officers located the vehicle near Red Wing a short time after and arrested two occupants. Franklin Mercredi from Prince Albert was arrested and charged with: one count, robbery with weapon, Section 344, Criminal Code; one count, wear disguise with intent to commit offence, Section 351(2), Criminal Code; one count, possession of weapon contrary to order and fail to surrender authorization, Section 117.01(3), Criminal Code; and two counts, fail to comply with probation order, Section 733.1(1), Criminal Code. April Clarke of Prince Albert was arrested and charged with: one count, robbery with weapon, Section 344, Criminal Code.

May 29: At approximately 7:45 p.m., Prince Albert RCMP received a report of a fire on Muskoday First Nation. Initial investigation indicates it may be suspicious in nature. Officers, with the assistance of fire examiners from the Saskatchewan Public Safety Agency, continue to investigate.

Greenwater RCMP seek public assistance locating a stolen vehicle. On May 21, 2022, Greenwater RCMP received a report that a truck was stolen from a rural land location near Kelvington between May 20 and 21. The vehicle, a red 1995 Dodge Ram 2500 with Saskatchewan licence plate 714LYB, was seen driving south of Kelvington a short time later. When a traffic stop was attempted by police, the vehicle fled. It has not been located; however, it has been reportedly seen in Kuroki and Star City. Unity RCMP investigating thefts of GPS and auto-steer equipment from tractors. On May 18, Unity RCMP received two reports of theft from motor vehicles – tractors that were temporarily parked in fields adjacent to Hwy. 14 in the RM of Buffalo. The tractors were broken into and the GPS and auto-steer mechanisms were reported stolen. As seeding is in full swing across the province, the RCMP is encouraging the public to report if they are a victim of similar crimes. Reporting crimes allows RCMP detachments to identify and monitor crime thefts and trends occurring in their area.

Thefts of campers reported to Saskatchewan RCMP. In Saskatchewan RCMP jurisdiction between January and May 25, 2022 eight campers were reported stolen to police. The campers were reported stolen from across the province. In May, two fifth wheel camper thefts were reported stolen to Watrous RCMP. This theft investigation is ongoing. Given the springtime weather, many people will be getting their campers out of storage. If your camper, utility trailer, flat deck trailer, snowmobile or ATV trailer is stolen, report it to police. Reporting crimes allows RCMP detachments to identify and monitor crime thefts and trends occurring in their area.

Take the keys or potentially lose the vehicle. With spring seeding underway, the Saskatchewan RCMP is reminding farmers about the potential for vehicle theft. Even on a rural road far from town, the potential still exists for a vehicle to be stolen. If you leave a personal vehicle (pick-up, SUV, car, etc.) on an approach or in a field while you're on the tractor, make sure you lock your doors and remove all keys. While it might be handy to leave a set "just in case" someone you know needs to move the vehicle, it also can be handy for others passing by. Remember: thieves know where to look for "hidden" keys. The same principle applies to your tractor and other machinery – never leave keys nearby if you are not physically with the vehicle. Last year in Saskatchewan, at least 29 percent of stolen vehicles had keys inside. You can help prevent theft by taking all keys with you.

Report tips and information: If you have information about any of the above crimes or other criminal activity, please report it to your nearest RCMP Detachment or police service, call 310-RCMP in non-emergencies, 911 in emergencies. five-year average of 93 percent. Producers in the southeast and east central regions have reported that many low laying areas will go unseeded this year due to standing water.

Ninety-seven percent of the crop is seeded in the southwest, 95 percent in the west-central, 93 percent in the northwest, 64 percent in the southeast, 60 percent in the northeast and 50 percent in the east-central region.

Provincially, 96 percent of lentils and chickpeas, 93 percent of field peas, 91 percent of durum, 79 percent of

# Local athlete competes at East-West Bowl

After a tremendous season with the University of Manitoba Bisons where he started in four of six regular season games and was named a Canada West All-Star, it should come as no surprise that Ryder Klisowsky was named to this year's East-West Bowl.

An opportunity to showcase the top prospects within amateur football, the Watrous product and offensive lineman was selected to compete with Team West during the May 7 event at McMaster University in Hamilton, Ont.

A chance for student-athletes to vie for coveted spots on the CFL Scouting Bureau Top 20 Prospects List, in addition to the East-West Bowl game itself, there was a week-long slate of festivities including a players combine that put both rosters of players to the test in front of CFL scouts.

Utilizing a great campus and excellent facilities, Klisowsky said the week was one he will not soon forget. "It means the world to me that all my hard work was recognized and I was selected to and compete with other top talent in the country."

With 3:33 left in the fourth, Team West's McMaster Marauders quarterback Andreas Dueck spotted Waterloo Warriors receiver James Basalyga for a touchdown before adding a two point convert to eventually give them an 11-8 victory.

In the tight contest, Team West leaned on the experience of former University of Saskatchewan Huskie head coach and Canadian Football Hall of Fame inductee Brian Towriss who was at the helm. Bringing tremendous knowledge of the game to his players, Ryder noted it was great to be able to learn from Towriss. "It was super cool to



have Brian Towriss and all of his experience to be on our sideline and help coach us! It was also nice to get the win because we all went out there to play hard and win!"

Looking back on his experience and having the opportunity to play alongside and against other top talent from across the country, Klisowsky said, "It was definitely a unique experience with lots of knowledgeable coaches that were eager to help share their knowledge to help fine tune the skill that we have. I met a lot of great guys out at East-West from all over the country and this was definitely an experience I will remember for a lifetime!"

Returning from Ontario and shifting his focus toward the upcoming season, Klisowsky is optimistic the Bisons will be able to build off last year, one in which the club reached the Hardy Cup. "I'm super pumped for the upcoming season with the Bisons because we laid a great groundwork last year with our team and we're only getting better and this next season is going to be our best season yet!"

## Saskatchewan is at the forefront of sustainable energy trends.

This year, the province is partnering with the Saskatchewan Research Council and the private sector to research the development of a hydrogen hub using CCUS.

Interest in extracting lithium from subsurface brine water continues to grow, and inroads are being made by companies into geothermal energy.

The future is bright for Saskatchewan as industry, supported by the provincial government, continues to make strategic investments into sustainable energy technologies.

were small, ranging from three mm to 12 mm.

Cropland topsoil moisture is rated as 16 percent surplus, 56 percent adequate, 19 percent short and nine percent very short. Hay and pasture land topsoil moisture is rated as seven percent surplus, 60 percent adequate, 19 percent short and 14 percent very short. Western regions are least favourable for moisture while more favourable conditions are reported in the east.

Crop conditions range from good to fair across the province. Emergence has been reported to be slow in areas of the southwest and west-central where moisture is lacking. In the southeast and east-central; however, emergence has been slow due to cool weather and an overabundance of moisture. Most crop damage was from flooding, drought, flea beetles and gophers.

Now that seeding has wrapped up for many producers, they are busying spraying in-crop herbicides, assessing germination and emergence, scouting for early season pests and moving cattle to pasture.



or they can continue along to the beach," said Ediger who shared he is also planning to create a structure at that location with a bit of nostalgia. "There used to be a building called The Arcade Dance Pavilion at the beach and I am planning to make a smaller replica of it."

Octagonal in design and used in the earlier 1900s, The Arcade Dance Pavilion featured an area for dancing and was 90 to 100 feet across with an elevated orchestra platform in the centre. Over the years it was later used for a roller skating rink and as a theatre before it was torn down in 1939-'40.

"I think having the replica of The Arcade will be a neat tribute to the history of the resort community and bring back some memories for people."

Watrous Town Councillor Jean Margetts is part of a committee working with Ediger on the trail. Joined by other representatives from Watrous and Manitou Beach, Margetts is excited about the progress on the trail and said a few people have been asking how they can donate towards it. "Ron has shared with us he will be covering the cost of the project but if people do want to donate funds, they could be used for solar lighting and beautification along the trail. All donations can be given to either the Town of Watrous or the Resort Village of Manitou Beach and a tax receipt can be issued."

There are also very limited spots for benches along the trail and while two have already been spoken for, if there is interest in sponsoring a memorial bench, Margetts said inquiries can be sent to the Resort Village of Manitou Beach. "They are looking after that and will pass along

any requests to Ron."


Looking forward to seeing the project completed in a few short months, Ediger said, "Melron Services Ltd. is celebrating its 25th anniversary this year so it is my hope to be able to have a big celebration to commemorate the anniversary and cut the ribbon for the trail so that people can enjoy safely walking from one community to the other. Twenty-five years ago I came here with a single backhoe and this community and the area has been so good to us. I thought, why not give back? I am always thinking about what I can do and I just thought I would like to do some good things here and leave a bit of a legacy to the communities."

Delighted to see the progress on the trail after work started this past year, Watrous Rotarian Al Mosewich who was one of those integral in seeing the two phases of the local Rotary Trails created said once the new trail is completed it will be a tremendous benefit to residents and visitors. "It is quite a huge project and not everyone has the ability to do something like this. Ron is in the unique position of having the equipment, staffing, material and financial resources to do this. He saw the vision that the Rotary Club had and is the type of guy who can get it done."

Citing how Ron and his late wife Melissa were big supporters of community through numerous contributions over the years, Mosewich said the trail will remain along that same theme of community, bringing both Watrous and Manitou Beach together. "It is very exciting and I know that a lot of people are looking forward to seeing it built and used for many years to come."
