Local woman keeping close eye on situation in Ukraine

The images are heartbreaking and the devastation unfathomable as Ukraine and its people continue to endure significant attacks and loss. With tensions escalating, Russian military forces invaded Ukraine during the early hours of Feb. 24 and since that time, the world has been watching the uncertainty and horror unfold.

In Saskatchewan, where more than 13 percent of the province's residents trace all or part of their ancestry to Ukraine (according to the last census), many like Liudmyla Voitsikhova, her husband and their two daughters, Alina and Katya, who moved to Canada in 2013 still have family in Ukraine.

While more than three million refugees have already fled Ukraine since the invasion (according to the UN International Organization for Migration), millions remain including Liudmyla and her husband's families.

"All of our family lives in Ukraine," she shared. "I have family who live in Western Ukraine in the Ternopil region. My husband's family lives in the Vinnitsa region, it's the centre region of Ukraine. For the last few days people living there have been under constant stress and in unbelievable danger."

Living in Drake and cutting hair in Watrous, a few days before sharing her family's situation, Liudmyla said an airport about 30 kilometres away from her husband's family home was bombed. "Every morning we start our day by calling our family there. It's so scary and hard for everyone who has family in Ukraine."

While the situation in the Ternopil region where Liudmyla's family lives is not as severe as in the Vinnitsa region where her husband's family is or even in the Kiev and Eastern regions, Voitsikhova said it is still extremely hard to see the devastation and destruction.

"It has been heartbreaking to watch how our country is being destroyed, how the Russian army killed our people, and worst of all, kids being killed because one crazy tyrant wants to show the world his power, and wants to take Ukrainians' freedom."

According to The Kyiv Independent, as of Mar. 14, the UN stated civilian casualties had reached 1,761 while 97 Ukrainian children had been killed and over 100 injured since Russia launched its invasion. "Nobody thought the Russians would invade Ukraine, kill Ukrainian people

Despite a winter storm delaying their journey to provincials, once the Winston Wildcats mixed high school curling team arrived in Swift Current, the rink was not only ready to roll but took aim at securing a spot in the final.

Sweeping through pre-districts, districts and gaining momentum in regional play to advance to provincials, the team representing Watrous planned on leaving for Swift Current Mar. 10 but the weather forced the team to head out early Friday morning instead.

Due to the elements creating hazardous travel, Saskatchewan High Schools Athletic Association pushed all of Friday's draws back,


changing them to six ends as opposed to eight. Despite the adjustments and having to get up early Mar. 11, the Watrous rink led by skip Erika Oakes (Gr. 10), third Kade Thomas (Gr. 11), second Annaka

Miettinen (Gr. 12), lead Nick Lawrence (Gr. 11) and coached by Rene Miettinen and Dawn Lee got off to a solid start.

In the first game, the blue and gold beat Leoville 5-4 and followed that up

with another victory, this time over Canora 7-2. With a record of 2-0, Watrous met Avonlea in a 5 p.m. draw but came up on the

and destroy cities. The morning of Feb. 24 changed the lives of Ukrainian people."

According to the Armed Forces of Ukraine, since the invasion, it is estimated that as of Mar. 18 at least 14,200 Russian troops had been killed while 93 planes, 112 helicopters, 450 tanks, 205 artillery pieces, 1,448 armoured personnel carriers, 72 MLRS, three boats, 879 vehicles, 60 fuel tanks, 12 UAV, and 43 anti-aircraft warfare had been lost.

As of Mar. 14, The Kyiv Independent noted Russian troops had seized only one Ukrainian regional capital - Kherson - but were trying to enter Kyiv, Chernihiv, Sumy, Kharkiv, Mykolaiv and Mariupol as other cities were being destroyed.

"Ukrainian people are a great and strong nation, they don't want war, but everyone is doing their part to help the Ukrainian army," said Voitsikhova speaking of the resilience of those in the country. "This war will end in two ways: number one, Ukraine will overcome

Russia. Number two, Russia will lose."

Like so many in Ukraine and around the globe, Liudmyla is not giving up hope that Ukraine will withstand the invasion and prevail. "It has been great to see people all over the world helping and supporting the country where I was born and raised in. I'm so thankful for everyone who called or messaged me asking about my family."

After moving with her husband and their two daughters to Saskatchewan nearly 10 years ago from Terebovia, Voitsikhova remains very grateful to live where she does but knows that so many are in desperate need of aid back in her home country. "People have helped by sending donations to Ukrainian people and the army. One of my Ukrainian friends is Hanna Chernykh whose family lives in one of the most destroyed cities in Ukraine, Sumy. She has helped organize donations. She and many other Ukrainian women in Saskatoon are collecting money by donations, and by making and selling cabbage rolls. They send money to Ukrainian volunteers in Eastern

Ukraine who use the money donated to buy food and medicine for those in need, especially the people who are in bomb shelters. If anyone would like to make a donation to support people in need you can make an e-transfer. If you have any questions contact Hanna by email: nickolanna7984@gmail.com or text me at 1-306-360-7227. I am so grateful to everyone who has donated money to those back in Ukraine, it has meant so much to me and my family."

As the invasion entered yet another week, Russian warships began shelling the Ukrainian coast in Odesa while a curfew was extended in Kyiv. On Mar. 15, in a show of solidarity, the Prime Ministers of Poland, Czech Republic and Slovenia arrived in Kyiv to meet with Ukraine President Volodymyr Zelenskyy. Resilient and refusing to give in, Liudmyla said Ukrainian people will continue to fight and continue to do what they can to keep their country, something she is proud of. "I think it doesn't matter how long and how far you live from your home country, a piece of your heart will always stay with your family and friends."

losing end 8-2. Despite the tough loss, the Wildcats ended the day first in the pool, putting them into the Saturday's playoff.

Meeting Lampman in the 10 a.m. semifinal draw Saturday, Watrous won 6-3 to advance to the provincial final. The Wildcats faced a familiar opponent from Canora who beat Tisdale in their game 7-3. In a hard

fought provincial final, coach Dawn Lee explained one end did not go quite as planned for Watrous which meant fighting to get back into the game. Trying to catch up, the Wildcats were not quite able to make up the difference and took home silver as Canora won 7-3. In the bronze medal game, Tisdale defeated Lampman 7-5.

Capturing a silver medal at provincials and reflecting back on the season, on behalf of Miettinen, Lee said both coaches were very proud of the team and all they accomplished. "They had lost only one game on the way to provincials, but that didn't change their attitudes, they just took it one game at time. They

were so excited to be at provincials but I don't think they really thought they could get to that gold medal game."

With a lot of supporters cheering them on from the curling rink and from back home, Lee said, "Our fans and supporters had all the faith in the world that they could get there and win! It's a tough game to watch

when you are behind the glass because there is no cheering that they can hear. But while they couldn't hear us cheering, this team was scrappy and they just kept playing their game and did it well."

Lee noted every time the rink of Oakes, Thomas, Miettinen, and Lawrence stepped on the ice, they became a team that worked together to get the job done. "They are a lot of fun at the rink and Rene and I enjoyed coaching them. They came to practice all year, doing the drills, playing little mini games and putting in the effort. They are good curlers and you can see it. We are so happy for what they have accomplished, they deserved it."

SGI customers to receive rebate

This spring, SGI customers will receive a \$100 rebate for each vehicle they had registered as of Mar. 9, 2022.

Everyone who registers a vehicle pays into the Auto Fund, Saskatchewan's self-sustaining, not-for-profit basic vehicle insurance program. The Auto Fund does not take or receive money from the Government of Saskatchewan. The Auto Fund has a Rate Stabilization Reserve (RSR) that acts as a "rainy day" fund to cushion customers from sudden increases in their vehicle insurance.

Rebates of \$100 will be provided to the owner of each

vehicle or motorcycle that was registered as of Mar. 9, 2022. All classes of vehicle (private, commercial, farm etc.) are eligible. Trailers and snowmobiles are not.

Initial estimates put the total cost of the rebates at approximately \$95 million. Rebates will be issued to the person or entity listed as the registered owner. Customers who had multiple vehicles or motorcycles registered as of Mar. 9, 2022, will receive rebates for all vehicles combined into one cheque.

Over the next number of weeks, SGI will prepare more than 700,000 rebate cheques. Customers are encouraged to ensure their mailing address is up to date with SGI before mailout occurs later this spring at a date to be determined.

and the following happened: my wife told me to put powder on it, but I did not listen. I washed it with water. It spread from two spots to one large spot. I then washed it with vinegar, but the stain remained, so I sprayed WD-40 and washed my pants with a regular load of clothes in the washing machine. The pants still have a stain. What do I do now? Please help, your guidance is much appreciated. Abbas,

Dear Abbas,

It sounds as though you have done a great job acting quickly to remove the stain. Cover the stain with glycerin and squeeze the juice of a lemon onto the stain. Wash as usual and air dry or dry the garment in the sun. Repeat this process until the stain is gone. Avoid dryer use as the heat of the dryer will set the stain.

Dear Reena,

Any advice on making flaky pie crusts? My track record tends to be creating hard crumbly disasters that make me feel like giving up on baking pies. Thanks, Meghan

Dear Meghan,

The secret to making fabulous pies is not to over knead. Handle or mix the dough as little as possible and make sure the dough is very cold. When rolling the dough you should still see flakes of butter. For an easy and delicious pie crust, check out the recipe on the back of the Crisco shortening box.

My compliments for your helpful and practical suggestions on various subjects, mainly household related stuff and cleaning. We were having dinner at a friend's place. I spilled a little bit of red curry stuff on my brand-new cotton khaki pants

Dear Reena,

I love to eat breaded meat. How can I prevent breading from sticking to the pan? All the best, Melanie Hi Melanie,

The key is to use two steep pans and a bowl. Fill the first pan with flour. Put beaten eggs into the bowl. The second pan should be filled with dry bread crumbs, seasoning and a teaspoon of lemon-pepper, salt and Parmesan cheese. The flavour is all on the outside and you want the taste to last for the entire chew. Put the meat into each bowl. Pat firmly. Flip each piece over and repeat. Put the meat uncovered in a single layer in the fridge for an hour or so. The egg seems to evaporate and you are left with a nice crust before you even cook it. Either pan fry in a mix of a little oil and butter or olive oil. Baking works well with stuffed chicken but tends to get a little gooey on the bottom.

Hacks for any time of the year

• I protect my TV remote control by wrapping it with plastic wrap. I then heat the plastic with a hair dryer so that the plastic clings to the remote control. This prevents the remote from getting dirty, as I just wipe it whenever it gets greasy or grimy. Submitted by: Landa

• If you separate bananas instead of leaving them on the stem they will ripen faster. Submitted by: Kristi

• I purchase chlorine tablets from my local pool supply store. They are very inexpensive and effective for cleaning my toilet bowls. I drop one into the tank of each of my toilets and replace them after two to three months. Marvin

My old neighbour Ed says that helpers show up at church for the promise of food. And also, that friends show up to help with a project because you are supplying the beer. Helping others is not without its own price to pay. Some say, "Don't be quick to volunteer, for it could turn out to be far more involved than it was supposed to be."

God called Moses in the Old Testament to lead His people out of slavery in Egypt. Moses was reluctant to lead God's people. He made excuses for why he was not suited to be God's leader. They became hardened in their unbelief in God. They remained skeptical of God and impatient with God and the leadership of Moses.

Moses remained faithful to God's household on earth. Moses realized that God

builds his people and is the builder of everything. Moses faithfully worked to build God's house facing much rebellion and testing from unbelievers. Many refused to believe; they were obstinate, they became more and more hardened in their unbelief.

God distinguishes between those who doubt Him and those who refuse to believe in Him. Doubt is honestly admitting being unable to believe presently, but doubt is still open to a change from uncertainty to belief at some future time. Therefore, no one can be forced into belief in God, and likewise, no one can be forced into unbelief.





U15 Hawks advance to Provincial C final

It was setting up to be a magical season for the U13 Hawks in 2020 as the team was on the verge of competing for a provincial title. Then the COVID-19 pandemic halted the season and the club's run came to an abrupt end. Fast forward to 2022 and the bulk of that team is now part of the U15 Hawks and like the team did in 2020, the group is taking aim at winning a provincial championship.

Watrous Hawks head coach from the 2020 and 2022 seasons, Patrick Bartko, said this year feels like a bit of a redemption season after seeing the 2020 provincial run cancelled due to the pandemic.

"We were one win away from winning the North title and hockey got shut down the week after we won the first game. You can imagine the disappointment that year," explained Bartko whose team is now the last one representing Watrous in provincial play this season. "You don't get a chance to compete for a provincial title very often so it was tough. For the players, a major difference between U13 and U15 is the fact that body contact is introduced to the game. We are a very young team and presently only have five second year players, one being a goalie. Last year these five players only played in four regular season games with body contact before covid shut competitive play down for a second year in a row. We finished the season with a 'practice only' format, therefore, all the U15s were basically starting this year from scratch with regards to contact. Body contact is an intimidating aspect of the game; however, after a couple of months, the players have matured into a very physical team."

Throughout the regular season Bartko shared the team continued to improve and after finishing fifth in league they defeated Muenster in the first round of playoffs. However, after facing a hard first place Strasbourg team in the next round, the Hawks were eliminated from league playoffs.

Entering provincial play, the Hawks took aim at making some noise and after receiving an opening round bye, met a tough Shaunavon club. In game one the pair tied 4-4 before coming back to Watrous. In game two, the Hawks had another back and forth contest with the Badgers and with some timely saves and big goals from both sides, teams tied at four once again. Forcing a tie-breaking mini game and with the return of its captain - who had been given a game misconduct halfway through the second game - for the extra 10 minute frame, the Hawks found momentum and were able to win 3-0 to advance to the South final against Carlyle.

With Carlyle fresh off wins over Cupar/Southeby in round one and Strasbourg/Raymore in round two (teams who finished at the top of the standings in the same league as the Hawks), Bartko was not sure what to expect from the opposition. "There is a lot of parity this year and it just depends on who shows up to play. Going against Carlyle we didn't know what to expect because they beat the top two teams from our league."

However that did not stop the U15 group from overcoming the odds as they started to catch fire. With Bartko joined by coaches Ryan Rheaume and Derek Morelli on the bench, they watched as Carlyle took an

early first period advantage. During the intermission though, the coaching staff made a few adjustments and the Hawks went on to win 8-3.

Then in game two on Mar. 13, Watrous headed to Carlyle and at the buzzer, celebrated by punching its ticket to the provincial final with a 6-4 win.

"All of our players have been very important to our success during this run and that includes our role players. When called upon to fill in they have done a great job. The team is having a great time and we are getting scoring from both lines, receiving great goaltending and it is coming together at the right time."

As the team rides a wave of momentum, Bartko also attributes some of that to the community as well. "It is exciting to hear they are behind the kids and you can feel the electricity in our building. I told our kids that they are inspiring a lot of young kids watching the games and they should keep playing the way they are. We also

have to recognize our team manager, Rhonda Kelly, and our covid rep, Jill Tarasoff, for all they do for us off the ice. As well, the players' parents for all their support this season. Jeff Siegfried and the Watrous Winterhawks have also been awesome in allowing us to use their dressing room during our home games and accommodating that for us. The kids are living and playing with a lot of pride in their hearts as they are representing their town."

With the win over Carlyle, the U15 Hawks now face Edam/Turtleford after they defeated Delisle to capture the North title. Game one of the Provincial C final was scheduled for Mar. 19 in Turtleford before moving to Watrous Mar. 26 at 7 p.m. With the series shifting to Watrous after game one, Bartko knows the town will be behind the team. "We have really appreciated the community for their support, the kids enjoy a packed rink and we have appreciated all of the kind words we have received so far."




