Watrous and District Fire Department adds new unit to fleet

With a need to upgrade its current fleet and aiming to safely tackle grass and brush fires within the local area, the Watrous and District Fire Department recently received a brand new unit.

A very pleased Watrous and District Fire Department Chief Jory Vanthuyne said the new brush five wildland operations vehicle is not only state-of-the-art but it replaces the department's 1978 Dodge 'Engine 2' which has served the area for over 40 years.

"It has been in the works for a few years and we really got started fundraising

wise with the frozen tongue challenge."

During that challenge in 2019 to see who could raise the most money with the loser having to stick their tongue to a frozen pole, Deputy Fire Chief Andrew Matheson raised \$9,110.71 while Jeff Siegfried of Watrous Mainline Motors raised a total of \$8,668.90.

With an overall price tag of just over \$303,000 the local department used those funds from the challenge to get things started for the truck. Vanthuyne said with the way the department is structured, the local Rural Fire Association which includes surrounding Rural Municipalities and Manitou Beach also came

on board to cover the rest of the amount through their fire levies.

"We are really thrilled that the Rural Fire Association was willing to help purchase this unit for us which will be used for grass and brush fires. Out of all the calls we respond to, at least 80 percent of them are for grass or brush fires so this new vehicle will be valuable to have, especially because we do a lot of driving throughout our area."

Looking at a few different options, one from the United States and another from Manitoba, the Watrous and District Fire Department chose the unit from Manitoba.

Human remains located within RM of Morris

■ RCMP release

Around 3:20 p.m. Feb. 28, Watrous RCMP responded to a call of a human skull located in a field in the RM of Morris by people looking for shed antlers. RCMP Major Crimes Unit South (MCUS) assumed the lead in the investigation with the assistance of the detachment, Saskatoon RCMP Forensic Identification Section, RCMP Police Dog Services, the Saskatchewan Coroners Service and a forensic anthropologist.

An autopsy took place Mar. 3 in Saskatoon. During the autopsy it was determined the individual was likely female and between 25 to 35 years of age. The remains do not appear to be historical in nature. At this time,

it has not been confirmed whether this individual's death is considered suspicious.

Collaborations will continue between RCMP MCUS and Saskatchewan police services and potentially neighbouring provinces to further efforts in identifying the deceased. In addition, further investigative efforts around DNA comparison and consultation with the National DNA Data Bank have been undertaken.

"These two companies were the only ones on the market offering a specific body design that includes a roll cage behind the cab. Having that roll cage was a driving force in choosing this option. It is completely compliant with OH&S regulations for driving and having firefighters in the back. They are strapped and harnessed in so in the event if it ever did roll, that roll cage is engineered and designed to withstand the entire weight of the truck."

But it is not just the roll cage that caught the eye of the local fire department. After the unit was delivered Mar. 11, Vanthuyne and Matheson were able to get a real good look at it. Vanthuyne said the new brush five wildland operations vehicle created by Acres and Sea Hawk also contains a three inch lift kit and 41 inch military spec tires. "It is designed to go

through a lot of terrain and should handle anything we can throw at it."

In addition there are turrets that swing out in front of the catwalk and firefighters can stand in the doorway and essentially fight the fire as they go. The truck is also equipped with two bumper sweeps on the front and can be turned on from inside the cab. If the fire is big or the department is short on members responding to a call, Vanthuyne said they can turn on the pump outside and then inside the cab they can drive along while the bumper sweeps spray water out the front. There is also fire communications installed in the unit so members can wear wireless headsets that loop into the radio system. The truck is also equipped with a trailer hitch and wiring harness to pull a flat deck trailer and side-by-side unit and

carries a water capacity of 400 gallons.

"It will be a game changer for us as far as its ability, the places we can go and the functionality it has. We are planning to have this unit for the next 30 years and I know our members will be excited to be able to use it when the need arises."

With the brand new vehicle in the Watrous and District Fire Department's possession, Vanthuyne said the turn around time to receive it was rather quick. Because Acres and Sea Hawk already had the cab and chassis on site, once a decision was finalized to go ahead with the Manitoba unit, it did not take long. "It is a really, really good quality build and Canadian made. When we did our final

COVID-19 immunizations expanded in Sask.

After an overwhelming response from seniors booking COVID-19 immunizations in Saskatchewan, many people within the province and local area have been able to receive their first vaccination or will soon be receiving it.

Launching its new booking system, the province first offered vaccine appointments for residents 85 years and older Mar. 11. One day later the system was expanded to include those 80 years of age and older and then on Mar. 13 it included those 76 and older.

As more and more people booked their vaccine, the provincial

government expanded its system to include people 72 years of age and older Mar. 14 and in Regina, a drive-thru AstraZeneca vaccine clinic opened Mar. 15 to those 64 years old. The drive-thru clinic was later expanded for residents 60 to 64 years old and at one point Mar. 16, there was a six hour wait in line to receive the immunization.

The Saskatchewan Health Authority (SHA) also provided bookings for individuals 70 years of age and older Mar. 15 in all parts of the province and residents 50 years of age and older in the Northern Administrative District. On Mar. 15, a total of 15,374 appointments had been booked using the new appointment systems: 11,838 online and 3,536 by telephone.

Because of the successful start to the

SHA vaccine booking system, Saskatchewan will be moving into Phase Two (under age 70) sooner than expected. SHA said those residents over the age of 70 who have not yet made their vaccination appointment are still encouraged to book. "Once eligible, you are always eligible, but we want to ensure those at highest risk get their vaccination while they are prioritized in Phase One."

With an additional 4,096 doses of COVID-19 vaccine being administered in Saskatchewan as of Mar. 17, that brought the total number to 112,764. In the local Central East zone, as of Mar. 17, a total of 6,504 first doses had been given while 2,806 second doses had been administered.

A day prior on Mar. 16, the provincial government noted 50 percent of

Saskatchewan residents age 80 and older had received their first dose of the COVID-19 vaccine. That was compared to 37 percent one week prior (Mar. 9), before the online and telephone booking systems were launched.

As for where clinics will be held locally and when, SHA provided the following statement: All residents of Saskatchewan age 70 and older are able to book appointments through the Patient Booking System, including both online and telephone options. When booking they will have options for clinics and get information on the specific locations.

SHA said, "Given the demand for clinics through both online booking and the phone lines, most appointments available are being booked into first week of April. April allocations of vaccine have not yet been finalized; new clinics will be added as vaccine allocations are confirmed. Changes have been very quickly made to eligible age groups to date; however, this is anticipated to slow down in the days ahead, given the high population of people who fall into the upcoming age categories."

In recent weeks active COVID-19 cases have come down considerably within the local Central East 1 mini zone (going from 50 cases Mar. 2 to just eight Mar. 17) and provincially as there were a total of 29,296 recoveries and 1,264 active cases as of Mar. 17, the lowest number of active cases since Nov. 9. The seven-day average of daily new cases was 135 (11.0 new cases per 100,000).

However, there has been concern by SHA when it comes to variants of concern. As of Mar. 17 there were 135 confirmed variants of concern cases in Saskatchewan: 129 B1.1.7 (UK) and six B1.351 (SA). The Regina zone accounts for 121 (or 90 percent) of the confirmed VOC cases reported in Saskatchewan.

In addition to the confirmed cases, there are currently 313 presumptive VOC cases reported in the Far North East (1), Saskatoon (6), Central East (5), Regina (264), South Central (23) and South East (14) zones.

With an elevated risk of COVID-19 in Regina due to community transmission of variants of concern, the provincial government recommended that Regina and area residents

- particularly those over age 50 - should not consider increasing their household bubbles to include two to three households up to 10 people.

The provincial government noted while worship services throughout the province were able to expand to 30 percent of capacity or 150 people, whichever is the lesser number starting Mar. 19, places of worship in Regina and adjacent communities will remain at the current capacity level which is a maximum of 30 individuals, with required physical distancing and masking guidelines. This will remain in effect until Apr. 5 and will be evaluated at that time. The adjacent communities include: Belle Plaine, Pense, Grand Coulee, Lumsden Beach, Regina Beach, Craven, Lumsden, Edenwold, Pilot Butte, White City, Balgonie, Kronau, Davin, Gray and Riceton.

Public health said all residents of Regina, those who work in Regina and area and those who are planning travel to the region, are asked to abide by all best personal protective measures at this time to avoid further restrictions.

How to book your COVID-19 vaccine appointment when the timing is right

1. Check Your Eligibility

Saskatchewan's COVID-19 Vaccine Distribution Plan is built on the foundation of age as the main risk factor. Vaccine rollout is starting with the oldest first, working down by age.

Only those eligible will be able to receive an appointment; if you are not yet eligible to receive a vaccine, you will be asked to visit again once you become eligible.



“RCMP Report”

Charges laid for fraud in Wadena

On Nov. 5, 2019, the Wadena RCMP Detachment received a complaint from a business, indicating they suspected an ex-employee had defrauded the company over a four-year period. The investigation was conducted by the Wadena RCMP who were assisted by the Yorkton RCMP General Investigation Section.

As a result of the investigation, Kevin Taylor from Wadena has been charged with: Fraud over \$5,000 – Sec. 380(1)(a) C.C. and Theft over \$5,000 – Sec. 334(a) C.C.

Taylor will make his first court appearance May 20 in Wynyard.

Fatal single vehicle roll-over near Paynton

Around 5 a.m. Mar. 14 Maidstone RCMP responded to a call of a single vehicle collision on Hwy. 16 near Paynton. There were

three occupants in the vehicle, one of which was a 32-year-old male of Craven who passed away. The remaining occupants were an adult male and an adult female and they were transported to hospital. An RCMP Collision Reconstruction Analyst from Rosetown continues to investigate with Maidstone RCMP.

La Ronge RCMP execute search warrant

As a result of an ongoing investigation, the La Ronge Detachment General Investigation Section executed a Controlled Drug and Substances Act search warrant on Mar. 12 at a residence on Studer Street in the La Ronge district and arrested one person.

During the search, officers seized quantities of suspected methamphetamine, hydromorphone, drug paraphernalia, and Canadian currency.

Erica McKenzie of La

Ronge has been charged with: one count, possession of methamphetamine for the purpose of trafficking, Controlled Drug and Substances Act Section 5 (2); one count, possession of hydromorphone for the purpose of trafficking, Controlled Drug and Substances Act Section 5 (2); one count, possession of property obtained by crime less than \$5,000 Criminal Code, Section 354(1)(a); two counts, fail to comply with release order condition, Criminal Code, Section 145 (5) (a).

McKenzie made an initial court appearance on Mar. 15 and will reappear in the La Ronge Provincial Court Mar. 22.

Fifteen-year-old located on an island

Shortly before noon Mar. 16 searchers located missing 15-year-old Jaxon MacDonald of Regina who passed away on an island on Madge Lake (Madge Lake is located within Duck Mountain Provincial Park). RCMP will not be releasing any further details at this time as the investigation is ongoing.

RCMP stated, “Our thoughts are with his family during this difficult time. The Saskatchewan RCMP would like to thank the public for sharing the information on our social

media pages, reporting tips and also to cottage owners in their area for their assistance. Thank you to news agencies for their continued coverage.”

Armed robbery in St. Walburg

The Turtleford RCMP is seeking information from the public that may help solve an armed robbery that occurred Mar. 15 at approximately 11 p.m. in the community of St. Walburg.

Two males entered a business located on 1st Ave. in St. Walburg and were dressed in dark clothing. One of the males was possibly wearing a red face mask. It was reported to police, that during the incident, one of the males pointed a handgun and demanded money and a cellphone.

Both suspects left with an undetermined amount of cash in a black F-150 with Alberta plates which was parked in front of the business. The model year of the vehicle is believed to be between 2012 and 2016, with a FX4 logo on the back of the box and a trifold tonneau cover. The vehicle headed north on a grid road.

Waldheim pair face charges

On Monday, Mar. 15, the Saskatchewan RCMP Traffic Services conducted a traffic stop near Maidstone during which it was determined the driver and passenger were in possession of illegal tobacco. The vehicle was searched and the following drugs were seized: Methamphetamine, Cocaine, Fentanyl as well as an amount of cash.

As a result of the traffic stop, the Saskatchewan RCMP Federal Serious and Organized Crime North (FSOC-N) executed a search warrant on an associated residence in Waldheim. A search of the residence resulted in the seizure of the following drugs and items: Methamphetamine, Cocaine, Fentanyl, Prescription Pills, a modified shotgun, two conducted energy devices and over \$30,000 cash.

Further charges are pending shortly as the investigation is ongoing.

Both Beamish and

Bendall are scheduled to appear next in court on Mar. 22, 2021 in

Lloydminster.

seized is indeed significant and could have caused a lot of harm to individuals within our communities.”

The Saskatchewan RCMP Traffic Services and FSOC-N also worked with the Rosthern RCMP, and as a result of the investigation, 48-year-old Jenna Beamish and 28-year-old Dylan Bendall from Waldheim have each been charged with the following offences: three counts, Possession for the purpose of trafficking, Section 5(2) Controlled Drug and Substances Act; one count, Possession of Property obtained by crime less than \$5,000 Section 351(1)(a) Criminal Code; and one count, Possession of Unstamped Tobacco Products, Section 32(1) Customs Excise Act.

Further charges are pending shortly as the investigation is ongoing.

Both Beamish and Bendall are scheduled to appear next in court on Mar. 22, 2021 in Lloydminster.

The Saskatchewan RCMP Federal Serious and Organized Crime Unit works in conjunction with domestic and international partners to disrupt, dismantle and support the prosecution of serious and organized crime groups and their members.

Knoblauch fills in as head coach for New York Rangers

What started out as a routine day of practice in Hartford turned into a St. Patrick's Day that Imperial's Kris Knoblauch will never forget. The head coach of the American Hockey League's Hartford Wolf Pack not only ended up filling in as the head coach of the National Hockey League's New York Rangers but the team blanked the Philadelphia Flyers 9-0 in the process.

Speaking to reporters after the historic victory against a team he was once an assistant coach for, Knoblauch explained he was running practice in Hartford for the Rangers affiliate team in the morning Mar. 17 when he was notified he might be heading to New York.

Due to the NHL COVID-19 protocol and additional health and safety guidelines, the Rangers coaching staff had to be pulled for the game and because of that, Knoblauch, Wolf Pack associate head coach Gord Murphy and Rangers associate general manager

Chris Drury got the nod with Knoblauch serving as the acting head coach.

Sharing about what the day was like the acting head coach said, "It has been busy. I had been practicing with my team on the ice at 10:30 and I got pulled off at 11:30. I got the message saying, 'Call Dru (Chris Drury), it is ASAP.' Usually when I hear that, it is not good. It usually is taking players away from our team. But I got the call to be just on stand by 'you might be coaching tonight, we'll let you know.' That was 11:30 and I think it was confirmed at 1 p.m. that I was going to coach."

Knoblauch rushed home to pack his things and headed to New York. "Initially it was going to be one game, but then they're like, 'Well, you might be going on the road trip,' so then you pack an extra. So really, you didn't have much time to think about it."

Arriving at the rink in New York, Knoblauch said he was in constant conversation with current Rangers head coach David Quinn in preparation for

the game.

"Quinnie had the pregame all set out for us. He had a game plan and had the video all set up. Before the game started, Murph and myself showed up to the game and went through the video with the pregame scout and with Quinnie. We went over talking points, key things and matchups and all that stuff. Really I was just following up the game plan that he set forward. We didn't really have much time to prepare much or do anything rather than just implement what they had planned."

Despite not having a lot of time to prepare, Knoblauch and the Rangers not only came out flying against Philadelphia but made some history in the process. With the team scoring nine goals through two periods, according to NHL Public Relations, the team became the eighth club in the last 25 years to score at least nine markers through the first 40 minutes. It was also just the second time in the team's history that they accumulated nine goals in the first two periods with


the last occurrence back in 1983.

New York forward Mika Zibanejad also had a memorable evening as he tied an NHL record by tallying six points (a natural hat trick and three assists) during a seven goal second period. The only other player to ever register six points in a period of an NHL game was Bryan Trottier who did it back in 1978 against the Rangers.

Taking a 9-0 victory as acting head coach, Knoblauch was asked how the experience was. "Everything was laid out for us by the coaching staff and then when the

game started there are some nerves. There was definitely some excitement, but then you kind of get into game mode or coach mode and you call that first line or that first change. It's certainly a night that I'll never forget."

Following the game, according to the New York Post, Knoblauch along with Murphy were informed they would remain behind the bench for at least the next two games as the Rangers headed to Washington.

water and two tablespoons (30 ml) lemon juice. Heat the contents in a double boiler until 150°F (66°C) as this reduces the risk of food poisoning. Stir constantly. Remove from heat and cool to room temperature. Add two teaspoons (10 ml) dry mustard, half a teaspoon (two ml) salt, half a teaspoon (two ml) pepper. Add any of the following: fresh garlic, Dijon mustard or curry powder. Mix. Very slowly add one cup (250 ml) extra virgin olive oil. Add more oil as needed until you reach the proper consistency. Note: this is not a low-fat product, so use sparingly if cutting calories. However, this recipe does call for heart healthy oil. Store homemade mayonnaise sealed in the refrigerator for up to three days. If homemade mayonnaise does not bond, add one-quarter teaspoon commercial mayonnaise.

Warning: pregnant women are advised not to eat homemade mayonnaise due to the raw eggs in the recipe.

Dear Reena,

My white sheets are yellowing. I imagine it is from body oils that I cannot get out. I have tried baking soda and a few other things but nothing is working. I just want nice white sheets again. Can you suggest anything? Thank you, Pam

Dear Pam,

My favourite solution for brightening sheets is to soak them in washing soda and very hot water for 10 minutes or if you have a very large pot, boil them in

the solution. Washing soda may be purchased online and at many grocery stores in the laundry section. Fabric safe bleach is another option. Hang them outside to dry or lay them on the grass. Worst case scenario, re-dye the sheets using white Rit dye. Use according to the directions on the box. To prevent sheets from yellowing in the future, add a half cup vinegar to every wash.

Wonderful cheesy advice

Tip for storing cheese. I like to buy 350 to 400 g slabs of old or mild, especially when the cheese is on sale. I cut the slab into eight pieces and tightly wrap each piece with plastic wrap. The cheese keeps well and does not get moldy because I only open one piece at a time. Pauline

Tips for the kitchen

Here is a timesaving tip for bacon. After bringing bacon home from the store, broil or fry it as usual. Make sure that the bacon is not overcooked. Freeze or refrigerate. When ready to use, pull it out and quickly reheat.

Store unwashed zucchini inside a plastic bag, poking a few holes into the bag first. Store inside the crisper or slice and blanch zucchini for two minutes. Put into freezer bags or plastic containers and into the freezer. To thaw, remove zucchini from freezer, drain and use.

Keep basil perky for at least one week by treating it like freshly cut flowers. Trim the ends. In a glass or vase of water, stand basil and cover with a loose piece of plastic wrap. Leave on your countertop.

The words sinner and saint are loaded terms. They mean different things to different people. They are like the word church, which can also mean various things. The word church might be thought of as a specific building where people go to worship God. It might mean a particular denomination like Lutheran or Roman Catholic. Church might mean a specific or local congregation. To some, church means something to avoid or reject.

I understand saint to

mean a singular believer in Christ and the communion of saints to be the plural number of those who believe in Christ. To many, the word saint means holiness or righteousness. Christians understand their holiness comes from Christ. Believers in Christ recognize they are sinners who have been cleansed by the shed blood of Christ and with His innocent suffering and death. In Christ, we have redemption, the forgiveness of sins by God's grace. (Ephesians 1:7)

Ed, my old neighbour in Saskatchewan, has a different understanding of the word saint. To him, a saint is an annoying self-righteous person convinced of their moral superiority and who shows a mean-hearted rejection of others which are obvious sinners in their eyes.

I told Ed that Jesus warned of self-righteous saints through one of his stories. It is found in Luke 18:10-14: "Two men went up

to the temple to pray, one a Pharisee and the other a tax collector. The Pharisee stood up and prayed about Himself: 'God, I thank you that I am not like other men – robbers, evildoers, adulterers – or even like this tax collector. I fast twice a week and give a 10th of all I get. But the tax collector stood at a distance. He would not even look up to heaven but beat his breast and said, 'God, have mercy on me, a sinner.'

I tell you that this man, rather than the other, went home justified before God. For everyone who exalts himself will be humbled, and he who humbles himself will be exalted."

In the season of Lent, we seek to recognize that we can get carried away with our righteousness and look down on others. The world at any given time is never short on folks who see themselves as better than others. When we compare ourselves to others, we will readily see

meeting with them confirming the options we needed - that was in mid- to late-January - they had already started building the truck because they knew we wanted it so they just added the options after and were able to get it to us before grass fire season."

The new grass and brush fire truck joins the department's side-by-side, a rescue unit which also doubles as a command unit, and two pumper (Engine 3 - the yellow pumper and Engine 4 - the red pumper).

Vanthuyne said there are plans to add to the fleet but understands that could take some time. "Ideally we would be looking at adding a tanker down the road and we are also talking about getting a utility truck to pull the trailer with the side-by-side, which would also be efficient and save on time once we arrive to a fire."

Over the coming weeks, Vanthuyne said the local firefighters will be spending their practice nights learning about the functions on the truck and planning how to safely use it within the community and surrounding areas.

With around 10 members as part of the volunteer department, for those who may be interested in joining, Vanthuyne noted there is always a need for more members. "With a small town, there are those with shift work, some maybe on holidays or at work and you can't expect people to be around 24/7 when calls come in. Those who would be interested in joining would need a valid class 5 driver's licence. We just ask volunteers wanting to join to be willing to learn, be willing to help and be willing to attend practices. Being on the fire department is something I personally have enjoyed and it has always been something that has interested me."

After traditionally holding practices every second Monday, the department now alternates between Mondays and Wednesdays. "Sometimes there were things going on during those Mondays so it was tough for everyone to be there. What we do now is we maintain the two week rotation but we hold one on a Monday then go with a Wednesday two weeks later and switch it up. It opens up another day hopefully for people to come if they can't make it on one of those days."

Vanthuyne said they also offer a junior firefighter program which essentially is for someone 16 to 18 years old. "They can apply and we go through parental consent

As spring approaches and the brush and grass fire season also arrives with it, Vanthuyne said, "We really appreciate the support we have received from the town, Manitou Beach and RM's in the past and being able to add the new brush unit will definitely be a tremendous help moving forward. If we are able to add a few volunteers as well for our department that would also go a long way in helping to make it a safe season ahead."
