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Watrous shines for TeleMiracle 45

Despite doing things a little differently when it came to raising funds for this year's TeleMiracle, Watrous and the surrounding area once again showed what a community effort is all about.

With people across the province finding unique ways to garner funds for TeleMiracle 45 due to the COVID-19 pandemic, locally, Watrous Kin members and residents also did the same. Presenting the local total during a live virtual presentation Sunday afternoon, Feb. 28, on be-

half of the community, Kin members Jillian and Jarvis Engele announced Watrous had raised \$21,000!


An excited Jillian said, "We were extremely happy with the community support surrounding TeleMiracle this year! I think our community understands that the need is still very much there for this very important cause, despite the year we've had. We had many people contact us to make personal donations even up until our presentation was aired!"

As part of that tremendous local total, nearly \$14,500 of it came from an

online auction, something held for the first time. Items were donated by local businesses, organizations and residents including some delicious baking and people stepped up in a big way to show their support by purchasing the items up for bid.

"I was personally blown away with the success of our online Facebook auction. It was our first time trying something like this and it was extremely successful! We had so many

Family and friends honour Melissa Ediger during TeleMiracle 45

Having a tremendous impact within the communities she resided in over the years through volunteering, donating funds to worthy causes and being an active Kinette, after Melissa Ediger passed away in 2020, her family felt it would only be fitting that memorial donations in her honour be directed to TeleMiracle.

As this year's TeleMiracle 45 approached, the memorial donations from family and friends of Melissa were tallied and with the help of Melissa's husband Ron, the group were able to give \$10,000 to TeleMiracle in her name.

Making the special presentation virtually during the final morning of TeleMiracle 45 on Feb. 28 were Melissa's husband, Ron Ediger and daughters, Avril Reifferscheid and Shelley Turner.

Honouring the life and legacy of her mom and speaking on behalf of family and friends, Avril said, "Melissa was an active community member and volunteer when we were growing up in Nokomis. More

recently, she and Ron have been benefactors of local community organizations in Watrous. As a Kinette, she held all the executive positions at the club level, served as Zone Co-ordinator, was the recipient of the Elspeth Rogers award, and was ultimately rewarded Kin's highest honour - a life membership in Nokomis Kin Club. She and dad worked at many TeleMiracles, starting at the first one in 1977. For this reason, we thought it fitting that memorial donations in her name be directed to TeleMiracle."

Shelley went on to express thanks on behalf of the family for the generous memorial donations, and to Ron for topping it up, saying, "We are so thankful for the generosity of Melissa's friends and family."

Along with the funds that were raised in memory of Melissa, Ron followed Avril in noting how important TeleMiracle is to people across the province. With that in mind, and wanting to help honour and remember his late wife, Ediger graciously topped up the funds raised to make it \$10,000.

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Curb the local spread of COVID-19

After an increase of COVID-19 in Watrous, the determination of many residents wanting to slow the spread of the virus was on display this past week as they tried to do their part to ensure the safety and well-being of not only themselves, but of each other.

Whether it meant self-isolating or monitoring for symptoms, getting tested at a COVID-19 drive-thru testing site, teachers selflessly going above and beyond at schools, businesses temporarily closing or remaining open while ensuring safety; many have been doing what they can to keep the virus from spreading.

After Saskatchewan Health Authority (SHA) noted Feb. 22 that there was increased COVID-19

in Watrous, a drive-thru COVID-19 testing site was held at the curling rink the following day. During the Feb. 23 drive-thru, 359 swabs were taken and a second drive-thru testing site was brought in Mar. 2. At the second drive-thru at the curling rink Mar. 2, SHA confirmed a total of 226 swabs were taken. SHA also noted that at this time, there are no plans to hold future mobile testing drive-thru sites in Watrous.

With 359 swabs and 226 swabs taken over the two drive-thru testing sites in Watrous, in the Mar. 1 edition of The Watrous Manitou, Medical Health Officer Dr. Jasmine Hasselback noted how pleased officials were with just how many people have taken the situation in Watrous seriously.

"That is really, really

amazing. That level of engagement from the community is phenomenal and applauded across the province. I am really glad to see that many people who saw the value of knowing the status in such a tumultuous time."

With confirmed cases of COVID-19 in the community, as residents began to self-isolate and monitor for symptoms in mid- to late-February, entering the final week of the month a few additional outbreaks were declared by SHA: Feb. 25 at the Co-op Food Store, Feb. 26 at The Basement Spin Studio, and Feb. 28 for Quality Plus Construction and associated contractors at a specified worksite.

Along with the businesses, the provincial government also noted on its website that at Watrous Elementary School, five positive student cases were confirmed as of Feb. 26 and at Winston High School, there were seven positive student cases confirmed as of Feb. 27.

A couple days later on Mar. 3, Horizon School Division was made aware of a COVID-19 diagnosis at Imperial School and another at Watrous Elementary School Mar. 4. Families at both schools were informed and Horizon was working closely with public health to assist in the contact tracing

process. At that time both schools remained open to students and staff.

Further details cannot be provided, to maintain the privacy of the individuals involved.

In his Mar. 1 message on Horizon School Division's website, Director of Education Kevin C. Garinger said, "So much has (been) going on both over the break and in the first week back, including a significant COVID-19 outbreak in the community of Watrous that impacted our schools and resulted in students needing to learn from home and staff, students, and family members having to self-isolate. I value the relationships we have with our health partners and sometimes matters like these get a little complex as we try to deal with them. As you likely know, Horizon has five health regions (four provincial and one federal) that we deal with when it comes to the pandemic. This situation extended into both Saskatoon Health and Regina Qu'Appelle Health.

I am grateful there is significant communication between both health organizations as it makes sorting out how to address this matter much more fluid. Most students and all classrooms in both schools are back this week from learning from home, and we continue to express to our families the safe way we operate our schools. The work of our staff, families, and of course, our students. I want to thank both school principals and their staffs for their undeniable efforts in continuing to support learning in a very trying time."

With the recent positive cases at the Watrous and Imperial schools along with others in Horizon, Garinger noted there is a plan being looked at to use the rapid test in schools within the school

division and he stated: "More will be shared in the near future but we have been told that it will be administered by our health professionals.

Horizon knows first-hand the importance of this test as it has been used in circumstances where an immediate response to a potential case is necessary. Rapid testing has helped us make critical decisions with our health partners based on immediate and accurate information related to virus transmission and I am certainly glad it will be even more accessible in our school communities."

While SHA does not specifically share the overall total confirmed cases in Watrous due to privacy reasons, it does provide numbers related to the Central East 1 zone, a zone that includes places like Watrous, Simpson, Manitou Beach, Drake, Etters Beach, Holdfast, Imperial, Jansen, Lanigan, LeRoy, Humboldt, Nokomis, Young, and Zelma.

Starting on Feb. 21, there were officially just 11 active cases within the zone but fast forward to the last day of February, there were officially 47 active cases in Central East 1. On the day of the second drive-thru that took place in Watrous on Mar. 2, there were 50 active cases with two new ones within the zone. The following day, that number dropped slightly with 44 active cases and one new case and fell further Mar. 3 with 35 active cases and one new case.

With the increased COVID-19 activity in Watrous, restrictions remained in place last week at Manitou Lodge. For family presence/visitation, SHA indicated they would be limited to compassionate reasons only.

As restrictions remained in place at Mani-

tou Lodge last week, the provincial government announced Mar. 2 that 100 percent of long-term care homes across Saskatchewan have now received their first doses of the COVID-19 vaccine with 91 percent of residents choosing to receive the vaccine. The government noted that 53 percent of facilities have received both their first and second dose. Nine percent of long-term care home residents were not immunized due to a variety of circumstances, such as the availability of residents at the time of vaccination, refusal to take the vaccine or a change in health status.

Ninety percent of personal care homes (PCHs) have now received their first doses. Forty-three percent have received both their first and second doses.

With regards to public vaccinations, the provincial government indicated it would be accelerating the COVID-19 vaccination in Saskatchewan with people ages 60 to 64 among those to receive AstraZeneca and all adults in Saskatchewan to have access to a first dose by June.

With expected deliveries of AstraZeneca in March, the provincial government said Saskatchewan residents ages 60 to 64 and phase one priority health care workers will be offered the first 15,500 doses. Making vaccines available to the 60 to 64 age sequence group is being done as an exception to phase one criteria to align with the National Advisory Committee's recommendation that AstraZeneca supply be targeted to those under 65.

Administration of the AstraZeneca doses will begin Mar. 22, distributed

Local meat plant receives federal funding

In an effort to keep workers safe at meat plants throughout the Prairies, the federal government announced \$7.8 million in funding, with a portion of that going to Drake Meat Processors Inc.

The one-time federal investment to help companies implement changes to safeguard the health and safety of workers and their families comes due to the impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic. Through that funding, Drake Meat Processors Inc. will receive \$49,500 and joins two others from Saskatchewan and a total of 24 meat processing companies from across the Prairies to receive the funding.

The Honourable Marie-Claude Bibeau, Minister of Agriculture and Agri-Food said, "The COVID-19 pandemic has brought on many challenges for the food processing industry, in particular for meat processing plants of all sizes. The hard-working women and men in this industry continue to step up to ensure Canadians have

high-quality food on their plates. Through the Emergency Processing Fund, we are giving businesses the support they need to keep their employees safe and our food systems running strong."

The funding for the 24 companies including Drake Meat Processors Inc. is aimed at helping the businesses keep employees safe and the regional food supply chain running strong.

The federal government stated recipients are able to use the funding to make adjustments to enable social distancing, purchase reusable personal protective equipment (PPE), install protective barriers, improve sanitation and develop training for employees. These changes are also helping the food plants avoid production bottlenecks and safely keep up with Canadian consumer demand.

The Honourable Jim Carr, Special Representative for the Prairies said, "Our Prairie meat businesses have shown incredible resilience throughout this time of crisis. The investments announced are helping many lo-

cal businesses adapt their operations to help protect the health and safety of their employees which will allow them to continue supplying good food for Canadians."

In addition to Drake Meat Processors Inc., Pineview All Natural Meats Inc. (\$40,000) and Prairie Pride Natural Foods Ltd. (\$14,175) were the other Saskatchewan projects noted as part of the March announcement.

In addition to the Saskatchewan, Alberta and Manitoba projects, the federal government noted Olymel, a Canadian meat packing and processing company headquartered in Quebec, is also receiving up to \$1.6 million through the Emergency Processing Fund, with a portion of the funding being used to support improved safety measures at its facilities in Alberta and Saskatchewan.



Message from Donna Harpauer, MLA for Humboldt-Watrous Constituency:

The strength and resilience of Saskatchewan has been on display like never before in the past year. Just as we have all been helping our neighbours by supporting local businesses, the Government of Saskatchewan has also been supporting those businesses and protecting the jobs that they have created through a number of programs. If you are one such employer, I would encourage you to apply for one or more of these support programs as many of the application deadlines are approaching soon.

[The Saskatchewan Small Business Emergency Payment \(SSBEP\)](#) has now been extended for February and March 2021. Eligible businesses, like retail stores or restaurants, who have been ordered to temporarily close or scale-back operations through a public health order, could receive up to \$5,000 per month that can be used for any purpose. The application deadline is April 30, 2021. For more information, businesses can call 1-800-667-6102, email: ssbep@gov.sk.ca, or visit www.saskatchewan.ca/small-business-emergency-payment.

[The Strong Recovery Adaptation Rebate \(SRAR\)](#) reimburses eligible small businesses for investments made to adapt their business to operate during the COVID-19 pandemic. Financial assistance includes a payment of up to \$5,000 for 50 per cent of total eligible business-adaptation investments made by the applicant prior to February 28, 2021. Eligible expenditures include establishing physical barriers or reconfiguring space to operate safely, providing services through digital tools, and shifting to delivery or curbside services, including third party delivery fees. The application deadline for the SRAR is March 31, 2021. [The Re-Open Saskatchewan Training Subsidy \(RSTS\)](#) is also available until March 31, 2021. The RSTS reimburses eligible private-sector employers 100 per cent of employee training costs up to a maximum of \$10,000 per business. Multiple charges laid after chase

Just after midnight on Feb. 27, RCMP Warman officers attempted to stop a vehicle in Warman. The driver failed to stop and drove off at high speed. Police discontinued the pursuit for public safety. The vehicle travelled into the rural area in an attempt to evade police. RCMP Warman members obtained the assistance of the Saskatoon Police Air One airplane. The suspects were observed going into a residence in the RM of Corman Park. The driver and two passengers were located. The driver was arrested and charged with flight from a police officer, impaired operation of a conveyance and impaired operation of a conveyance over 80 mg%. One passenger was also issued a ticket for open liquor in a vehicle. Corman Park police service also assisted.

Break and enter in Warman

In the early morning hours of Feb. 28, Warman RCMP were called to a home in the 100 block of Meadowlark park in Warman for a complaint of three men breaking into a residence.

Suspects brandished a firearm and a number of items were taken from the residence. The occupants inside were not injured. Investigation is ongoing.

RCMP respond to collision east of Asquith

On Feb. 28, RCMP Warman members responded to a call of a head on collision on Hwy. 14 approximately 16 kilometers east of Asquith. Two people were seriously injured in the collision. One was taken by STARS helicopter to the Royal University Hospital in Saskatoon. The highway was closed for approximately two hours. Road conditions were not believed to be a contributing factor.

Wollaston Lake RCMP seize large quantity of alcohol from bootleggers

On Friday, Feb. 26, RCMP members were alerted to a vehicle carrying a large quantity of beverage alcohol passing through the Moose Island checkpoint and

heading toward Wollaston Lake, Sask.

The vehicle was located and stopped by RCMP. Alcohol was seen by police in plain sight in the vehicle.

A search of the vehicle resulted in police locating and seizing thirty-six 26 oz. bottles of whiskey, one 66 oz. bottle of vodka and three coolers.

Two of three occupants of the vehicle have been charged with Bootlegging under Sec. 138(1) of the Alcohol and Gaming Regulation Act.

Thanks to the co-operation from the community, the removal of this amount of alcohol resulted in reduced calls for service for alcohol-related incidents and approximately 50 percent fewer people arrested and held for alcohol-related incidents.

Chief Coroner raises public safety concern

The Saskatchewan Coroners Service is urging increased awareness of the danger of illicit street drugs following four suspected drug-related deaths in Regina since Feb. 14.

Preliminary toxicology in these deaths indicates high levels of Xylazine in combination with fentanyl, acetyl fentanyl and methamphetamine.

"This is a fatal combination," Chief Coroner Clive Weighill said. "Anyone who uses street drugs like these is at a much higher risk of overdose, especially when they are combining drugs like these together."

Xylazine is typically used by veterinarians to sedate large animals. Its effects include central nervous system depression, blurred vision, disorientation, dizziness and drowsiness. When Xylazine and opioids are combined risks include respiratory depression causing slowed breathing and dangerously lowered blood pressure and heart rate.

Saskatchewan residents who are at risk of an opioid overdose or who might witness an opioid overdose - such as friends and family of people who use opioids - can receive a free take home Naloxone kit alongside training on how to use it. Visit www.saskatchewan.ca/opioids or call HealthLine 811 to find a Take Home Naloxone Program near you.

In an overdose situation, naloxone would not be effective against Xylazine, which is not an opioid, but it may reverse the effects of opioid(s) that are present along with Xylazine.

Naloxone typically reverses the effects of an opioid overdose temporarily, restoring breathing in a few minutes. Naloxone treatment does not replace the need to seek immediate medical attention. Call 911 immediately if you suspect an overdose.

Funding for licensed child care centres and homes

On Mar. 4, the government announced the allocation of nearly \$18.9 million from the Federal Safe Restart Agreement for licensed Saskatchewan child care centres and homes to help offset additional expenses incurred during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Education Minister Dustin Duncan said, "This investment will give certainty to those who work in the sector and provide them with the support and resources they need to continue safely

caring for children."

The intent of the funding is to target support to those facilities who have been financially impacted by COVID-19 as well as to help facilities remain open, take additional safety precautions and support child care needs for those parents or caregivers returning to work.

Two grants will be provided: a one-time COVID Supplement Grant of \$600 per space to all licensed child care centres and homes totalling nearly \$10.6 million, and a one-time Deficit

Support Grant will be provided to those facilities that experienced deficits based on the financial information submitted to the ministry in February for a total of more than \$8.3 million. Facilities eligible for the Deficit Support Grant will receive detailed payment information from their Early Learning and Child Care Consultant.

Since March, the Government of Saskatchewan has continued to provide centres with their operating grants. While some of the centres closed due to the pandemic, their operating grants continued to be provided by the Ministry of Education.

In December 2020, the Government of Saskatchewan provided a one-time

\$100/space grant (\$1.764 million) for personal protective equipment and cleaning supplies using the federal Safe Restart funding.

For centres that were designated to provide child care to those working or returning to work under the Re-Open Saskatchewan Plan, additional grants were provided.

Eligible Early Childhood Educators also had their salaries topped up by \$400 per month for each four-week period, up to 16 weeks, from Mar. 15 to July 4, 2020.

The Government of Saskatchewan will continue to work with the Federal Government to ensure child care facilities and staff are supported during this challenging time.

to six major hubs throughout the province.

The provincial government said all doses are expected to be fully administered within one week on a by-appointment basis. Health care workers will receive notification of their eligibility directly from the Saskatchewan Health Authority. Members of the public who are eligible will be able to book by phone.

The phone-in booking system is undergoing final testing in preparation of being launched this week.

Second doses for Pfizer, Moderna and AstraZeneca at four months: The National Advisory Committee on Immunization (NACI) has updated their recommendation on the interval between the first and second doses of authorized COVID-19 vaccines in the context of limited vaccine supply. Based on the evidence by NACI and its expertise in vaccine science, they are recommending that jurisdictions should maximize the number of people benefiting from the first dose of a COVID-19 vaccine by extending the interval between the first and second dose up to four months, in the context of limited COVID-19 vaccine supply.

"Implementing the new NACI guidelines in Saskatchewan means that all Saskatchewan residents should have access to their first dose of the COVID-19 vaccine by the end of June," Health Minister Paul Mer-

riman said. "This will speed up both our administration of vaccines, and our return to normal."

The province of Saskatchewan implemented this recommendation Mar. 5. Beginning Mar. 5, all vaccines administered will be a first dose, with second doses administered at an interval of four months, in alignment with the NACI recommendations. Residents will be contacted when they are eligible to book their second dose appointment, based on completing the vaccination sequencing and supply.

Note that this delayed second dose strategy does not apply to long-term care and personal care residents and staff who have yet to receive their full two-dose series and any existing second-dose appointments. Existing, scheduled appointments for second doses will be completed as scheduled.

Based on current allocations of COVID-19 vaccines from the federal government and the updated four month interval recommendation from NACI, it is anticipated that every adult in Saskatchewan will be able to access their first dose by the end of June.

Meanwhile, as residents of Watrous look forward to pushing ahead while curbing the spread of the virus, Watrous Towing planned on putting on a fireworks show Mar. 6 at Manitou Beach. On a Facebook post, the

company said it wanted to brighten everyone's spirits during a tough time for the community. People were encouraged to stay in their cars and/or social distance.

Meanwhile, a province-wide virtual vigil is being planned to mark one year since COVID-19 was first confirmed in Saskatchewan and declared a global outbreak. Rev. Marie-Louise Ternier from All Saints Anglican Parish and Our Redeemer's Lutheran Church in Watrous is part of the provincial planning committee. She said the virtual vigil marking one year will be held in the evening Mar. 11. "People can register for the Zoom event or watch it live on YouTube. We ask that they bring a candle and together, we will shine our light in the darkness."

As part of the evening entitled, 'Together in Remembrance, Together in Hope,' special guests Thomas Yu, Peach Akintade and Jim Hopson will be making appearances virtually. "As a committee, we want this event to be for people who may have lost someone close to them due to COVID-19 or for people who are grieving the loss of their freedom and mobility to come together virtually. We have designed it for people and groups of various ethnic backgrounds and beliefs to join in solidarity. People can register for the free event by visiting www.covidvigil.ca."

Deadline approaching to remove ice fishing shacks

With ice fishing season winding down, anglers are reminded that all ice fishing shelters south of Hwy 16 must be removed by Mar. 15.

Shelters in areas north of Hwy 16 must be removed by Mar. 31.

Every year, ice fishing

shelters are abandoned on the ice. When the ice melts, these can pose a danger to boaters, water-skiers and others enjoying our lakes. Pieces of abandoned shelters can also wash up on shore, causing environmental hazards.

Structures must be moved to a location where they can be loaded and

transported to the owner's residence or property. Litter must also be removed when ice shelters are removed from the ice.

If shelters are not removed, owners may be prosecuted and the structure and contents may be moved off the ice and confiscated.

Anyone travelling on the

ice should take extreme caution. Slush indicates that ice is eroding from above and below at an advanced rate. Changing temperatures can cause thermal cracks and pressure ridges, which are indicators of unsafe conditions.

Ice fishing shelters must have the owner's complete name, address and phone

number on the outside in legible letters that are at least 2.5 cm high.

There's an old political saying that if left-wingers didn't have double standards they would have no standards at all. This maxim has proven especially true in the current debate in Parliament over Bill C-7, an act to expand access to medical assistance in dying (MAID).

The very use of the term MAID sugar-coats what it is – state-approved suicide. Already in Canada assisted suicide is permitted on compassionate grounds for people enduring terminal illness. But Bill C-7 goes much further and permits assisted suicide for anyone experiencing "intolerable suffering", even if it is not terminal. In addition, the Liberals are also looking to amend the bill to allow people suffering from mental illness to access assisted suicide.

Just two months ago, people from all backgrounds and political stripes marked "Bell Let's Talk Day," an annual event in which Canadians discuss the issues and seek to remove the stigma surrounding mental health. Among the issues spotlighted on those and other occasions is the epidemic of suicide in Saskatchewan, especially among our northern and Indigenous populations.

In one breath, my colleagues on the left say that not enough is being done to prevent suicide. In the next breath, when Bill C-7 is discussed, they say that suicide is a human right. Trudeau-appointed Senator Paula Scully stated, "If we cannot be sovereign over our own lives and our own souls, then we are enslaved indeed."

It's hard to understand the mental and moral knots that advocates of Bill C-7 twist themselves into when they say that suicide should both be prevented and enabled at the same time.

Conservatives in the Senate are leading the charge to have the bill amended to exclude mental illness from the list of conditions that can access assisted suicide. Chief among the Conservative opponents is Senator Denise Batters, for whom this is a very personal and painful issue. Her husband, former MP Dave Batters, committed suicide after a long struggle with mental illness.

"The consequences of passing [the amended bill] will be dire. This will undermine suicide prevention efforts and treatment for mental illness. It places Canadians with mental illness at risk for premature death when they might otherwise have recovered successfully. Experts have repeatedly told us – mental illness is not irremediable, it is difficult to predict, and there is no consensus in the medical community on this issue," Batters said.

Like many of my Conservative colleagues, I am adding my voice in opposition to this bill in Parliament. But we can't stop the bill on our own. We need support from the public. If you feel, as I do, that the government of Canada should be helping to prevent, not enable, suicide, then please consider writing to the federal Minister of Justice David Lametti to let him know your thoughts and comments: David.Lametti@parl.gc.ca.

Please advise how we can get oil stains off a cement driveway. Elaine

Dear Elaine,

The fresher the oil stain, the easier it is to remove. For new oil stains, cover the area with cheap kitty litter or diatomaceous earth. Leave for three hours or more and sweep. For older stains begin by purchasing degreaser; cover the area with degreaser and scrub with a brush, making sure that the entire grease stain is covered. Another option is to pour hot water onto stones and scrub

with dish soap such as Simple Green. Leave for 10 minutes and do not allow dish soap to sit on paving stones for an extended period. Scrub with a stiff brush and rinse. Caution: Do not use muriatic acid on paving stones, it is too strong and may damage stones.


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“Look What's Cooking by Laura Novecosky”

Cheesy Vegetable Soup

Ingredients:

- 2 cups water
- 2 cups diced, peeled potatoes
- 1/2 cup finely diced carrots
- 1/2 cup finely chopped celery
- 1/3 cup finely chopped onion
- 1 tsp. salt
- 1/2 tsp. pepper
- 1 cup cubed fully cooked ham
- 1/4 cup butter
- 1/4 cup flour
- 2 cups milk
- 2 cups shredded cheddar cheese

Directions:


In saucepan combine water, veggies, salt and pepper. Bring to boil, reduce heat to simmer and cook until the veggies are tender. Add the ham. In another small saucepan, melt the butter and add flour, stirring until smooth. Gradually add milk, cooking and stirring until thickened. It needs to bubble for about two minutes so it thickens. Stir in the cheese until melted then add to the vegetable mixture, stirring until it is smooth. If you choose, you can use cooked hamburger, sausage or any other cooked meat. We like this soup to use leftover cooked ham.


This week's Artist in the Area is Leslie Stadnichuk who spends her time between the farm at Guernsey and in Saskatoon:


peak, while they seem to be reaching for the heavens.

Avian news – a chicken bush has been identified on the north shore of the lake and a chicken who goes sledging with her toddler friend has made the provincial news. That chicken is not a local but she is a beautiful orange hued colour and plays nicely. Closer to home the male evening grosbeaks have been making a splash of colour at my deck feeders and likely other feeders around the village. They do not eat cilantro! Deer continue to roam and a moose has been seen on the lake.

Local news – northern lights have been providing entertainment.

Weather report – was warmer, then it got colder and cold again which meant it was a great time for watching the Tournament of Hearts, quilting, painting, reading or doing anything creative. Hardy souls will have been out and about.

Old news – this was all culled from The Watrous Manitou in 1950.

This was the era when women wore real fur coats and there is an ad from Arthur Rose Company in Saskatoon indicating that furs could be taken to Spector's store in Watrous and the furs then stored in Saskatoon. Why is this of local interest? Simply that both Jewish families had property here and spent summer months enjoying the

lake and amenities of the village.

The Whitmore Hotel was busy. Mr. and Mrs. Wally Owens were looking after the Whitmore Café and Mrs. R. Inkster of Allan was running the Crum Grocery Store. At the Provincial Park the Walkers were in charge.

There was a small but interesting article “Save Manitou Lake” and John Diefenbaker (P.C. Lake Centre) talked about the lake properties and its significance to First Nation and settlers. He asked Resources Minister Winters to save the lake as it was drying up. The response was to the effect that no help had been requested from the province and if a request was made it would be given consideration.

An advert in June posted by S. Russ of Edmonton caught my eye – he was selling his amusement park opposite Danceland. Included in the deal was the 24 horse merry-go-round, kiddie's rides with eight auto cars and two buildings. One sounded quite spiffy and housed the ice cream freezer and sound system. The other was just a mention. There was a potato chip booth in connection with the merry-go-round operated by Mr. and Mrs. G. Waxteen. A furnished cottage located one block from the park was also included in the deal. I have no idea of the asking price or if the property sold that year, but I do wonder how many remember that particular property and share their story?

Lukiwski seeking funding for local Legions

Tom Lukiwski, Member of Parliament for Moose Jaw-Lake Centre-Lanigan announced Mar. 4 that Royal Canadian Legion Branch No. 59 has finally received emergency COVID relief funding under the federal Veterans Organizations Emergency Support Fund.

lessly with elected representatives to press the federal government to recognize and support the work of Legions.”

Lukiwski said that the work of seeking support for Legions was not over.

“While I welcome this disbursement of funding, more needs to be done to support our Legions and communities that depend on them and I will be continuing to work with local Legions and the Government of Canada in 2021 in pursuit of the federal supports our veterans and communities require.”



The Rev. Fr. P.R. (Reg) Thompson-Gillard passed away peacefully at Casselholme Home for The Aged on Sunday, February 28, 2021 in his 91st year.

Philip Reginald Thompson-Gillard was born at Watrous, Sask. on the 19th September, 1930. The only son of the late Mr. and Mrs. P.T. Gillard and grandson of the late

Mr. and Mrs. Charles Gillard and the late Mr. and Mrs. Walter Thompson Sr. and the twin brother of Mrs. P. Rita B. Patry, M.M.M., C.D. and Bar of North Bay, Ont. Reg received his public school education at Glenridge, a little country school in rural Saskatchewan and his high school in the town of Watrous graduating in 1950. He grew up on the family farm at Amazon, Sask. Reg was baptized into the Christian faith in Holy Trinity Anglican Church at Simpson, Sask. on September 27th, 1931 and was confirmed in the faith in All Saints' Church, at Watrous on April 22nd, 1945 by the late Rt. Rev. W.T.T. Hallam, Anglican Bishop of the Saskatoon. With the completion of his high school education, Reg entered the University of Saskatchewan and Emmanuel College at Saskatoon, in preparation for the ministry of the Priesthood to the Anglican Church in the fall of 1950. Ascension Day, May 27th, 1954 Reg was made a deacon in Rugby Chapel on the University Campus and a year later, May 1st, 1955 on St. Philip and St. James Day, was ordained to the priesthood in the Anglican Church at St. John's Cathedral, Saskatoon by the Rev. S.C. Steer. During the summer months when he was an undergraduate in college, Reg served three student missions at Keatley in 1951, 1952 and at Perdue in 1953. He covered the missions on foot and bicycle. Reg served in many parishes over the past years. His first parish was the Meridian Parish, Macklin, Sask. where he was the incumbent from 1954 to 1958 in the Diocese of Saskatoon and Provost, Alta. which was in the Diocese of Edmonton. In January 1965 Reg entered into the Chaplaincy Services of the Canadian Armed Forces which took him to many postings across Canada. He served as a Padre at C.F.B. Currie Barracks, Calgary; C.F.B. Petawawa, Ont.; C.F.B. Esquimalt, B.C. at Work Point Barracks, Victoria with his last posting to C.F.B. Borden, Ont. From Borden, Ont. Reg returned to civilian life, becoming a rector of the parish of Wawota, Sask. in southeast Saskatchewan, serving several rural parishes in the Anglican Diocese of Qu'Appelle, namely the Parishes of Assiniboia, the Greater Parish of Oxbow with nine congregations and the Parish of Rosetown, Kyle-Tuberose. Reg had had a long and varied ministry serving most of that ministry in the rural areas of southern Saskatchewan amongst the farming communities that he loved so much. In the various communities where Reg served he had many interests amongst them the Masonic Lodge, all the bodies of the Scottish.....He was an active member of Rotary International in the Assiniboia Rotary Club, serving as Chaplain and Director, a member of the Monarchist League of Canada, and the Saskatchewan Humane Society and Wildlife. In nearly all the parishes was a member of the Royal Canadian Legion serving as the local Padre. He enjoyed playing a little golf in the summer and curling down at the local rink in the winter when time permitted. He was a bachelor.

Reg is survived by his twin sister and only sister, Mrs. P. Rita Patry, M.M.M., C.D. and Bar of North Bay, Ont., eight cousins and several second and third cousins in various parts of the country.

Cremation has taken place and burial will take place in the spring at Watrous Cemetery, Watrous, Sask.

As for the remainder of donations that the Watrous Kin passed along to TeleMiracle, here is a breakdown: personal donations (\$2,793.39), online website (\$700), online Facebook auction (\$14,442),

Helping Hands (\$386.56), Watrous Elementary School - Subway lunch and candy bag sale (\$678.05), and Watrous Kinsmen Club (\$2,000).

Jillian said, "This is around average for what we have donated in the past, with the exception of the 40th TeleMiracle when we were able to raise an outstanding amount after our first Mock Wedding. Hopefully we will be able to get back to large gather-

ings in the future to help us with our fundraising efforts for causes like this one!"

By reaching over \$20,000 during a year in which the province is navigating through a pandemic, Engele said it once again showed how special the community and surrounding area is. "We are so lucky to be apart of a community who is always willing to support our efforts again and again. A

huge thank you to everyone who made our TeleMiracle donation happen this year! Every dollar counts and we appreciate your participation in our fundraising efforts."

As for TeleMiracle itself, the 45th edition wrapped up in Saskatoon raising a total of \$5,630,215. With this year's incredible generosity added, the total raised by TeleMiracle since 1977 is now over \$145 million.

This year's final tote board total also included the proceeds of TeleMiracle's first-ever online 50/50 raffle, which generated total ticket sales of \$726,120 with the winner taking home half of the jackpot total.

"The generosity of Saskatchewan people is amazing and it showed again this year in their support of TeleMiracle," said TeleMiracle 45 Chair Brian Angstadt. "Once again, TeleMiracle brought our province together and the impact of these donations will be felt across Saskatchewan during these times when residents need it the most."

The broadcast which took place Feb. 27 and 28 featured no live audience with most live appear-

ances by remote video. National Cast hosts were live in-studio, with physical distancing in-place. Content for the show was pre-recorded over many months leading up to the telethon. These changes to TeleMiracle were made with COVID safety in mind and were approved by provincial health authorities.

"Our show producers did a great job throughout the entire year of planning, working closely with the health authorities and making sure everyone involved with this year's production followed all the COVID safety guidelines and protocols," said Angstadt. "We did our best to follow, keep up with and exceed all the COVID safety protocols and guidelines at all times."

Like in previous years, performers who were part of TeleMiracle 45 not only showcased their talents but also raised money for the telethon - which was once again matched by Nutrien, who presented their donation of \$100,000 live by remote video just before the end of the broadcast.

All TeleMiracle proceeds stay in Saskatchewan and are granted

through the Kinsmen Foundation for specialized medical and mobility equipment, and assistance with medical travel. The Foundation receives over 1,000 applications for assistance from Saskatchewan residents each year.

Watching this year's show from her home, Jillian said it was neat to see how other Kin and organizers were able to adapt to the current times and pull off TeleMiracle 45 while following the proper restrictions and guidelines. "With that being said, I can't wait until we can all go back and volunteer in person."

And while TeleMiracle has ended for another year and planning begins for the 46th edition in 2022, Jillian noted local Kin continue to remain busy fundraising for the community. The Kinettes Leisure of the Month raffle kicks off Apr. 1 and a few tickets remain available for that. The Kinsmen are holding a When Will It Sink Lotto with up to 500 tickets (guesses) for how long an old car remains on the ice before falling through in a slough. The winner of that will receive \$2,500 in gift cards to spend at local businesses.
