“RCMP Report”

Humboldt RCMP investigating after firearm pointed at vehicle

On Apr. 21, 2023 at approximately 8:20 p.m., Humboldt RCMP received a report a firearm was pointed at a group of individuals travelling in a vehicle.

Investigation determined three individuals were in a vehicle travelling on 9th Street in Humboldt. An SUV pulled in front of it, stopped and the occupants got out and approached the victims' vehicle.

The victims drove away. The SUV began to follow them as they travelled on Hwy. 5 towards Muenster. They turned around and passed the SUV, which had stopped. A male occupant of the SUV pointed a firearm at them. The victims continued driving to a safe location and informed police of the incident. No injuries were reported to police.

Humboldt RCMP have been investigating since and are now asking members of the public to report any information about this incident.

The vehicle is described as a black, full-size SUV, possibly a Cadillac Escalade or a GMC Yukon.

One suspect is described as a tall Caucasian male with a slim build, wearing all black. The second is described as a tall Caucasian male with a beard, with a slim build, wearing all black.

RCMP respond to hoax 911 call

On May 2, 2023 at approximately 3:10 p.m., the Indian Head RCMP detachment received one of the most urgent and serious reports a detachment can get: a homicide and an armed, active suspect. The caller, who seemed genuinely terrified, reported witnessing a shooting inside a residence in Montmartre. The caller claimed to be hiding inside a room from the killer.

Saskatchewan RCMP is prepared for these critical calls and an immense police response began immediately.

When Indian Head RCMP arrived, they were fully equipped with hard body armour and the resolve to enter a dangerous situation, only to soon realize the call was a hoax. The occupants of the residence reported having no knowledge of the call. Police made certain all occupants were safe and there was no active threat.

The true identity of the caller is unknown at this time. Indian Head RCMP have launched a public mischief investigation to determine the origin of the call.

By the time the hoax was realized, the following resources had been engaged: Indian Head RCMP used an Unmanned Aerial Vehicle (UAV) drone to obtain a closer view of the residence and the activities inside; Fort Qu'Appelle RCMP and the Saskatchewan Highway Patrol who helped to secure the residence to ensure the threat was contained and residents in the community were safe; Saskatchewan RCMP Police Dog Services; a Conservation Officer from the Provincial Protective Services Branch; a Saskatchewan RCMP Crisis Negotiator from Regina; Emergency Medical Services were on standby to stage in the event of any injuries; Saskatchewan RCMP's

Divisional Operational Communication Centre in Regina; SaskTel, who was working to help gather information to trace the origin of the call; and a request for assistance from Saskatchewan RCMP's Critical Incident Response Team, Regina Police Service, and the Saskatchewan Protection and Response Team in the event the incident escalated.

Over the time period of this response, from approximately 3 to 5 p.m., Saskatchewan RCMP received 53 calls for service unrelated to this incident requesting police assistance across the province.

As Saskatchewan's provincial police service, RCMP respond to all incidents of this magnitude in a similar manner. RCMP released this list of agencies and specialized units to help illustrate the scope of its operational response required for an unpredictable, potential life-and-death situation. This investigation took time from call-takers and officers who could have been helping someone in a real life-threatening situation.

RCMP cannot emphasize enough the importance of ensuring 911 calls are reserved for police-related matters and REAL life-threatening emergencies.

If you have a complaint, please report it to your local RCMP detachment or by calling 310-RCMP from anywhere in the province.

Victim of human trafficking located by Saskatchewan RCMP Roving Traffic Unit near Swift Current

On May 4, 2023 at approximately 2 p.m., officers from the Saskatchewan RCMP Roving Traffic Unit (RTU) stopped a vehicle for speeding on Hwy. 1, near Swift Current.

The car had an Ontario licence plate and was driven by a female under the age of 16, who was the lone occupant.

Investigation by police determined the female was reported as missing from Ontario and was a suspected victim of human trafficking. Officers requested assistance representatives from the Ministry of Social Services in Swift Current, who accompanied the female to the hospital to receive medical care. Transportation is being arranged to return the female to her home.

No charges are anticipated to be laid, as such, Saskatchewan RCMP will not be identifying any further details of the female to protect her privacy.

Saskatchewan RCMP worked in consultation with the Hamilton Police Service and the Swift Current RCMP Saskatchewan Trafficking Response Team (STRT) to gather and corroborate information on this investigation. The RCMP STRT supports the Saskatchewan RCMP's mandate of keeping communities safe and aims to stop or disrupt inter and intra-provincial criminal groups involved in the trafficking of controlled substances and firearms, as well as human trafficking.

Hamilton Police Service has taken carriage of the ongoing investigation due to the area of police jurisdiction.

The Saskatchewan RCMP takes a victim-centred, trauma-informed response to human trafficking.

It is important to remember, this crime has no borders,

Fantastic Steak Marinade

Ingredients:

1/3 cup oil
1/2 tsp. each salt and pepper
1/4 cup brown sugar
1/2 cup ketchup
2 tbsp. Worcestershire sauce
2 tbsp. soya sauce
2 tbsp. lemon juice OR about 2-3 ounces of wine

Directions:

Mix the sauce well together. Trim the steaks so there is not a lot of fat and check for gristle and remove if possible. Pour the sauce into a Ziploc bag, then place the steaks in the bag and squeeze the bag until the steaks are covered in the marinade. I like to marinate the steaks for about four hours prior to barbecuing them but one hour will do. The more tender steaks need less time. I place the baggie of steaks and marinade on a plate in the fridge to settle until I am ready to barbecue. Enjoy.

• For years we had a pile of discarded seed and husks under our bird feeder in the lawn. The birds would do a fair job of cleaning it up, but it was usually a mess. I cut a five foot by five foot piece of fibreglass window screen (sold by the metre at outdoor stores and hardware stores) and put it on the ground underneath the feeder. The grass can breathe and the birds can clean up much better, the husks that they leave are minimal and can be easily lifted to be put into the compost. Julie

• When I was newly married and preparing to decorate cakes, I often whipped whip cream too long and noticed that after a while it turned into a lumpy mess. Not knowing that I had made butter I threw out the mess and started again. After a few years I learned that over whipping, whip cream transforms itself into a delicious bowl of homemade butter. Now when I have guests over, I love to serve homemade butter. For anyone with the same desire to make butter from scratch. This is how. Purchase whip cream and add a pinch of salt so that it tastes less bland. Pour the cream into your food processor and let it run for a while until it thickens. of the people and the stories of those who built Watrous, and it includes Manitou Beach, Venn, Renown, Amazon and districts. Some recognition of the area's pre-history is also told through recollections of early settler encounters with those on Treaty 4 and 6 lands.

"We were anxious to record our history with stories and photographs . . . and gain a better understanding of our community today (excerpt from the Introduction of Prairie Reflections)." The Prairie Reflections Book committee consisted of Jean Sproule (editor), Muriel Treble, Florence Lamont, Vi Hedlin, Charlotte Airey, Lois Fedrau, Anne Squires, and Harry Smith (business research).

The book covers the time period from about 1903 to its publication date 1983. Forty years have now passed. Discussion among volunteers at the Watrous-Manitou Beach Heritage Centre has highlighted the need to continue to preserve our history as it happened, and happens, since then.

One area being pursued is to update the chapter on Watrous Businesses and Organizations. Volunteers have gleaned information from past issues of The Watrous Manitou, as well as from the memories of longtime residents and business owners. Family histories are also added or updated as people contact the Centre with information, or visit the Centre to explore their roots. Other aspects of the history of the area are also discovered through photos being dropped off or searches through archives.

From time to time, the Watrous-Manitou Beach Heritage Centre will share new and interesting stories in The Watrous Manitou.


Instead of being like the cows, Croshaw said, "Face your problems head on. Believe in yourself."

supported local leadership and the Saskatchewan Public Safety Agency (SPSA) as they worked to ensure residents were safe.

A wildfire near La Loche led to the evacuation of Clearwater River Dene Nation and the Northern Village of La Loche. La Loche RCMP, along with additional police officers from other communities from across Saskatchewan (Humboldt, Melfort, La Ronge, Pelican Narrows, Buffalo Narrows, and Turnor Lake) assisted by going door-to-door to ensure residents were aware of the evacuation order, maintaining traffic safety, and conducting proactive patrols in the communities. Police will continue to assist as needed, until evacuees safely return home.

There are other wildfires burning in the province, including one near Moosomin First Nation/Saulteaux First Nation and another north of Smeaton. Local RCMP detachments continue to monitor these fires, and will assist communities and the SPSA if required.

This past week was a timely reminder of how important it is to be prepared for an emergency.

With dry conditions and an earlier-than-usual wildfire season – plus the typical summer storms Saskatchewan will soon experience – now's the time to ensure you have an emergency kit prepared. This kit can help you stay healthy and safe during a prolonged power or water outage, and can be quickly grabbed if you have to evacuate your house or community.

RCMP respond to report of collision

At approximately 1:10 p.m. May 3, Craik RCMP received a report of a collision on Hwy. 11, approximately one kilometre south of Davidson. Initial investigation determined a pickup truck and a semi collided. The driver and sole occupant of the pickup was taken to hospital, where he passed away. He has been identified as an 86-year-old male from Davidson. His family has been notified. The driver and sole occupant of the semi was taken to hospital as a precaution. Traffic was restricted to one lane during the initial response. Craik RCMP continue to investigate with the assistance of a Saskatchewan RCMP Collision Reconstructionist.

which is why the Saskatchewan RCMP works interjurisdictionally to investigate these complex files and works closely with municipal police agencies and government partners across the country.

Saskatchewan RCMP reminds the public that anyone can be a target for human trafficking. Victims may be trafficked by someone they know: a former or current partner, family member, friend, or trustworthy person. The recruiting tactics can be subtle, often victims don't even know they're being trafficked.

Traffickers may approach potential victims by:

- pretending to be a potential love interest, friend or support person;
- connecting over social media or in person;
- offering gifts or money;
- introducing drugs or alcohol; and
- threatening potential victims' loved ones if they don't comply.

Additional information on recognizing human trafficking victims can be found online.

How to report human trafficking:

Traffickers maintain control over the victim by using different tactics such as violence, threats and manipulation so that the victim believes that they can't leave their situation.

If you or someone you know may be a victim of human trafficking, call the Hotline at 1-833-900-1010 or submit an anonymous tip online. The Canadian Human Trafficking Hotline is confidential and operates 24/7, 365 days a year. It offers services in more than 200 languages. It's accessible to deaf, hard-of-hearing and non-verbal people.

To report a crime, or for police assistance, contact your local RCMP detachment or the police service of jurisdiction in your area. If you wish to report a crime anonymously, you can also contact Crime Stoppers at 1-800-222-TIPS (8477). Call 911 if you suspect someone has been trafficked and is in immediate danger.

PUBLIC NOTICE

SaskWater's District Operations will be treating the water in the Saskatoon Southeast Water Supply System (SSEWS) canal to control the growth of weeds and algae during the 2023 irrigation season.

These treatments will take place approximately every two weeks from May to September, 2023.

The chemical used in these treatments is called Magnacide “H”. It is a registered aquatic herbicide that has been approved by the Water Security Agency for use in the SSEWS canal system.

It will remain active in the water for approximately 24 hours after each treatment and will diminish to non-detectable levels prior to treated water entering the reservoirs. Treated water may also be harmful to the skin, causing irritation to exposed areas.

This water treatment helps to prevent irrigation intakes from clogging and ensures adequate flows are maintained in this multi-use system.

Dosages will be maintained at a level where the water can safely be used for irrigation with no damage to field crops.

Please ensure that people are reminded that swimming, canoeing and fishing in the canal at any time is STRICTLY PROHIBITED.




