## Support Ukraine at Danceland raises over \$8,000

Since Feb. 24, the day Russia began its cruel invasion of Ukraine, hundreds of fundraisers have been held in dozens of communities in support of Ukraine and its people. Approximately 200 people gathered at the Support Ukraine event at Danceland, Manitou Beach on Apr. 22 that featured songs by Kateryna Grace from Saskatoon, a Ukrainian meal, silent auction, and sales of Ukrainian Daughters' cookbooks.

During the evening, Manitou Beach resident Sherwin Petersen provided information on a recent meeting held in Watrous where those in attendance were able to learn more through the Humboldt Regional Newcomer Centre to potentially assist displaced Ukrainian families. Local resident Nikki Banks also spoke and explained how she has been actively trying to bring a displaced family to the area and noted how the process has been going so far.

For supper, a first course of borscht, excellently prepared by Mariya Borysyak of Lanigan and friends, was accompanied by caraway bread donated by Lockwood Sourdough of Manitou Beach while the sausage was donated by Drake Meats and Model Meats in Watrous. With rising food costs, those contributions were especially generous and meaningful! TB's also prepared a wonderful meal which included their delicious homemade cabbage rolls.



# CN Rail Spur open house events held as BHP Jansen project moves forward

After receiving approval to move ahead with a multi-billion dollar Jansen Potash Project in 2021, members of BHP were



recently on hand at a pair of public open house events hosted by Canadian National (CN) in Jansen and Nokomis regarding a proposed Rail Spur.

With initial consultations held in late 2017 and feedback considered and incorporated into a revision of potential routes, following a regulatory submission regarding the proposed Jansen CN Rail Spur, the latest open houses Apr. 26 and 27 looked at the potential of a new rail access spur connecting the Jansen Potash Project to the CN rail line near Nokomis.

Running from near the Village of Jansen to near

the Town of Nokomis, the proposed line would allow BHP to utilize both CN and Canadian Pacific lines to ship its product around the world. According to BHP's 'Potash Pages Community Newsletter', once the Jansen mine is up and running, 4.35 Mtpa of potash will be shipped by rail to North America, and further abroad to international markets through the Westshore Terminals at Roberts Bank, B.C.

BHP indicated the Jansen project would include dual rail access consisting of both onsite rail and a Joint Access Spur (JAS) connecting to the CP Sutherland Division and to CN. Wanting to utilize a rail line with CN, the rail company is proposing to construct and operate the new 47 km long rail spur which would connect the JAS north of the Village of Jansen to the CN Watrous Subdivision, east of the Town of Nokomis.

In order to construct the proposed CN Rail Spur from near Jansen to near Nokomis, the open houses allowed for discussion with landowners, outlined solutions needed to meet safety requirements, helped the companies learn about stakeholder objectives, and illustrated what steps would achieve minimal interference with existing land uses, as well as solve for engineering and environmental

constraints. CN noted the route also needed to be set back from residential properties, away from environmentally sensitive areas, have minimal crossings with other roadways and avoid splitting land where possible.


All subject to regulatory approvals, if given the green light, proposed construction for the CN Rail Spur is scheduled to begin with rail earthworks in April 2023 and both track and signal work in August 2024.

The proposed CN Rail Spur is part of the work left to be done before BHP's Jansen Potash Project gets fully up and running.

At its mine site, BHP's final freeze plant compressor shutdown occurred Feb. 15, marking a major milestone for the shafts' completion.

By shutting down the freeze plant compressor, it signalled another step toward completing the project. With a large number of water-bearing formations and water zones throughout potash beds, over the past 10 years, BHP noted it froze the ground to -20°C to a depth of -700 m in an effort to prevent water inflow and greater ground stability during excavation. By freezing the area, the existing ground freeze wall at Jansen is 10 m wide around the shafts which were established by 40 pipes with the capacity

to freeze 30 hockey rinks.

Now that the plants are off, BHP indicated the complete thawing process of that area will take between three and four years.

After BHP's Jansen Potash Project was approved in August 2021, during the construction phase, it is expected to create around 3,500 jobs annually. Once in operation, it will support over 600 direct jobs at the mine site and at the corporate office and in Saskatoon.

The decision to move forward last year means BHP will invest a total of \$12 billion to complete its project with approximately \$5 billion already being spent to construct the mine. The Jansen Stage 1 project is also expected to produce approximately 4.35 million tonnes of potash per year once complete with the opportunity to expand in the future. Production is anticipated to begin in 2027.





**Hi Reena,**

I spilled nail polish on my couch. I read that I should not use polish remover with acetone in it, but I cannot find a polish remover without acetone. Do you have a different idea? Thank you, Joan

**Dear Joan,**

Rubbing alcohol, paint thinner and hairspray are effective solutions for removing nail polish or scrub the area with a Mr. Clean Magic Eraser. If you choose to clean the area with nail polish remover, you will observe better results with acetone-based remover (please test on an inconspicuous area first). If you prefer nail polish remover without acetone, check your local dollar store, it is commonly found there.

**Dear Reena,**

I spilled melted wax on a new polar fleece sweater. My wife was able to remove most of the wax using a hair dryer. Unfortunately, there are still some spots. Can you suggest a solution to remove the remainder of the wax? Thanks for any help you can give us. Bob

**Dear Bob,**

Drape a tea towel or paper towel over the area. Run a warm iron over the wax. You will notice the wax transferring onto the towel because the towel will look wet. Move the towel and iron the area until no more wetness appears.

## Solutions and Substitutions

### Tips that measure up

1. Anything can be used as a reference for measuring. For instance, dollar bills are roughly six inches long. Folded in half, they are roughly three inches long. Knowing the measurements of common household objects will come in handy.

2. Before purchasing wall coverings, measure all windows even if they appear to be the same size. The differences may surprise you.

3. Floor length draperies should be sized a half inch above the floor or just short of the carpet pile. Place a piece of cardboard on top of the carpet for an even measurement.

4. To measure for custom picture frames. Measure the exact width and height of the outside dimensions (including the mat) of your artwork to the nearest one-eighth inch. Use these dimensions for the size of your frame, acrylic and backing board. Note: frames custom-cut to a fraction of an inch are priced to the next whole inch.

5. When measuring carpeting or sheet vinyl, get the longest width and length along the floor. Do not multiply them together. Most carpet and vinyl rolls are 12 feet wide. If the room is less than 12 feet wide, order a roll of carpet as long as the room, being sure to get enough to go through the doorway. Call a professional installer or measuring agent if the room is more than 12 feet wide.

Edit note for cleaning stipple ceilings: if the ceiling has been painted, spray it with the following all-purpose cleaner recipe: two cups rubbing alcohol, half a cup household ammonia, one teaspoon Dawn dish soap and enough water to fill the bottle. Spray, wipe and rinse.

to him, "We have seen the Lord." (verse 25) Thomas refused to believe them.

"He said to them, unless I see the nail marks in his hands and put my finger where the nails were, and put my hand into his side, I will not believe it." (verse 25)

Thomas was a disciple certain that there was no way that he would change his mind about Jesus being alive from the dead. Thomas needed to see and touch Jesus himself before he would believe what he had heard. Like Thomas, we tend to trust what we have seen for ourselves more than what others tell us. However, what we see for ourselves is not a matter of trust but sight.

Thomas and the other disciples could see Jesus with their eyes and speak with him before and after he was alive again from the grave.

The disciples and more than 500 other people

saw Jesus alive after his resurrection from the dead. (1 Cor. 15:6) Thomas was also able to see Jesus with his eyes and touch the nail and sword scars on Jesus' body. His sight and touch of Jesus convinced Thomas that Jesus was alive from the grave.

Jesus told Thomas, "Because you have seen me, you have believed; blessed are those who have not seen and yet have believed." (John 20:29) Like Thomas, many are convinced they need to see Jesus to believe in Him. It is valid to want to see for yourself but seeing does not mean you will believe.

Many saw the miracles of Jesus and heard him preach and teach but did not believe in him. They scorned him to save himself on the cross. We are invited to trust what we hear about Jesus in the Bible. Do you trust the word of God?



### Strawberry Pie

#### Ingredients:

- 1 baked pie crust
- 4 cups fresh strawberries
- 1/2 to 1 cup white sugar
- 3 tbsp. cornstarch
- 3/4 cup water
- whipped topping or whipped cream to top pie

#### Directions:

Wash and cut large strawberries in half. Arrange 1/2 to 2/3 of the berries in the cooked pie shell, filling it 3/4 full. You will need more or less depending on the size of the berries. Mash remaining berries with a fork and combine with sugar in a saucepan. You will need less sugar for sweet homegrown berries and a bit more for the larger purchased berries. Bring to a boil, stirring often. Mix cornstarch and water together, gradually stirring into the boiling strawberries. Reduce heat and simmer until thickened stirring constantly. Pour mixture over berries in pie shell, gently moving the layers of berries so this mixture gets to all layers of berries. Chill for several hours before serving. Top with whipped topping or whipped cream.



## Once again, Lake Break at Manitou Beach

The second annual "Lake Break" contest has declared its spring-savvy winners: Ross Murray and Jack Campeau, both of Manitou Beach.

Here is how it works. In early to mid-February (when the very idea of no ice on Little Manitou Lake seems unlikely), some residents of Manitou Beach put five bucks each into a kitty and choose a day in the distant spring when the ice on the lake will "break". Now, the definition of "break" is that there be an open channel, south-north across the lake. Several days later, as those who live here know, the ice suddenly "sinks" and the lake is ready for another season of open water.

The prize this year was \$155 split between the two winners who chose Apr. 28.

The history of "lake break" dates since 2003 (compiled by Lorraine Unger, Manitou Beach) shows mid to late April as the most common breakup points. However, in 2013 (May 8) and in 2014 (May 12) were the days when the ice yielded finally.

It is with great sadness that the family of Melville, (Mel), Ryan announces his passing at the age of 106 years in Kamloops, B.C. on April 17, 2022.

Mel was born in Ardoch, Sask. to John and Beatrice Ryan, the second of five children, on September 26, 1915.

During the depression, the family lost their home in Ardoch and moved to Canwood where they started a new homestead. In 1929, Mel and a friend joined many other young men who were 'riding the rods' looking for work in other areas: Saskatchewan, Manitoba and Alberta, when he eventually found a home in Colonsay, Sask. working at the Simmon's farm. When war was declared, Mel joined the Saskatoon Light Infantry on February 2, 1940 and went overseas in August 1940, he later transferred to the Lake Superior Regiment. Mel has seven great-grandchildren (Kyra, Dennis, Liam, Tessa, McKenna, Braydon, and Orlando).

Mel and Wilma started their married life in Saskatoon and Mel worked at CNR Express. In December 1957, they traded their home in Saskatoon for the down payment on the Colonsay Hotel. Mel was a long-standing member of the Royal Canadian Legion where he held various executive positions. 
Mel had many meaningful sayings, but the one that may have kept him going to 106 years of age could have been; "It's a good life, if you don't weaken!"
