“RCMP Report”

Break and enters

In the past two months Craik RCMP have received several complaints of break and enters in and around the RM of Sarnia. These break and enters occurred

in the evenings and over night hours at both rural and village locations. In these break and enters, several firearms have been stolen. Police continue to investigate these offences

and are seeking the public's assistance to help solve these crimes.

RCMP respond to water-related deaths at Humboldt Lake

On Nov. 4, 2023, at approximately 2:20 p.m., Humboldt and Lanigan RCMP attended a residence on Humboldt (Stoney) Lake (just south of Humboldt, Sask.) to assist Humboldt Fire Department and local EMS who were responding to a report that numerous people had fallen through the ice, into the lake.

Witnesses reported there were five individuals in the water. Officers and emergency personnel on scene observed three people in the open water where the ice was breached. The three were eventually recovered by firefighters. One adult female and one female child were taken to nearby hospital for assessment and one female child passed away at the scene.

The two other individuals, both adult males, did not resurface.

As a result,

Saskatchewan RCMP Underwater Recovery Team (URT) attended to conduct searches of the water. On Nov. 5 shortly after 5 p.m., URT members recovered both men who had passed away.

The Saskatchewan Coroners Service has taken carriage of the investigation.

As this is considered a sudden death investigation and there is no element of criminality, RCMP will not be releasing any further details.

RCMP respond to rolled coach bus

On Nov. 8, 2023 just after 7 a.m., Indian Head RCMP received a report of a rolled coach bus on Hwy. 1, east of Wolseley.

Thirteen individuals were treated in hospital for injuries described as non-life-threatening.

On Wednesday morning, Hwy. 1 was closed from Wolseley east to the Manitoba border due to poor road conditions.

Indian Head RCMP continues to investigate.


Growing up on a farm near Watrous, a farm he still operates with his family, Derek is looking forward to carrying on the tradition that Model Meats has become known for. “I

Cisterns

God speaks of the issues of spiritual cisterns through the prophet Jeremiah. (2:13) He says first that the people have forsaken their God, who is the spring of living water, and second, dug their own cisterns which are broken and cannot hold water. When we reject God we look for a source of life to sustain and nourish us, water is a great image of that need, we are dependant on water for life and for living. We need that same input in our spiritual lives in order to thrive and even survive. God describes Himself as a spring of living water, fresh, flowing, always available.

We like to camp in the Cypress Hills and usually take a tour around the park boundary, up high in the hills there are springs that ranchers have built troughs up too. The cattle range far and wide, but they come to the springs for their water. The God who cares for us wants to provide for us, we can come to Him for our needs of nourishment. Jesus stood up on the last day the festival (John 7) and said; “if anyone is thirsty let them come to me and drink. Whoever believes in me, streams of living water will flow from within them.”

God promises not only to be our source, but that we in turn, walking in faith, will become a conduit of that living water. The image of this living water carries into heaven, from under the throne of God comes a river that flows through the city. (Rev 22) The river of life, clear as crystal.

Feeling parched? Does your soul feel withered? Turn to the one who is the spring of living water and drink deeply, be restored, renewed and revitalized. Lord, I would live in you and for you, I choose your water.

Here in the prairies it has always been a challenge to source good water; finding springs, good wells, building and maintaining infrastructure for treatment and distribution. Fresh water is always best, isn't it?

Many older homes had cisterns built into the basement to capture rain water. I use a 1,000 litre tote to collect water for my garden. It sits outside and begins to turn green when the days are long and hot and the water sits stagnant. Stored water stales quickly and contaminants can cause all kinds of nasty things to grow. Given our freeze-thaw cycle and soils our

cisterns can crack and leak. What you thought you had is no longer there.

God speaks of the issues of spiritual cisterns through the prophet Jeremiah. (2:13) He says first that the people have forsaken their God, who is the spring of living water, and second, dug their own cisterns which are broken and cannot hold water. When we reject God we look for a source of life to sustain and nourish us, water is a great image of that need, we are dependant on water for life and for living. We need that same input in our spiritual lives in order to thrive and even survive. God describes Himself as a spring of living water, fresh, flowing, always available.

We like to camp in the Cypress Hills and usually take a tour around the park boundary, up high in the hills there are springs that ranchers have built troughs up too. The family histories recorded in the local history book, Prairie Reflections are a great resource for those doing genealogy work on their family. The committee worked hard to include as many stories as possible. However, some were missed. Often the reason for that was that the remaining family members of early residents had moved away. Thankfully some of those are being recovered.

One such story is that of Henry Igel. He moved his family from Minnesota to Humboldt, and then in 1908 moved to Watrous. As he was a butcher, he built a building on Main Street to start a meat market, and the family lived above it. The building is located between Pepper Tree Restaurant and Inksters. It still houses the meat cooler in the back. Henry's family history was sent to us by Stephen Igel, grandson to Henry. According to the history, Henry was a flamboyant character, and would drive a herd of cattle down Main Street (to be slaughtered) while riding in a fancy carriage. He once wrote a cheque on the

corner of a newspaper, and the local bank honoured it. The family held mass in their upstairs living quarters until a Catholic Church was built. One son, helped with deliveries to the hotel and restaurants,

and the two daughters, Bea and Lenore, worked at the theatre. That was the era of silent movies!

Grandson Steve Igel came to Watrous in 1962 and again in 1982 with various family members. He

took many photos which he generously has shared with the Heritage Centre. The building stills stands today and has been home to various businesses, which can be found in Prairie Reflections.

Meatloaf and Potato Casserole

Ingredients:

- 4 cups raw potatoes, sliced thin
- 1 tsp. salt
- 1 tsp. dried parsley
- 3/4 cup light cream or evaporated milk
- 1/4 tsp. pepper
- 1/4 cup ketchup
- 1 tbsp. finely chopped onion
- 1 tsp. salt
- 1/4 tsp. pepper
- 1 pound hamburger meat
- 1/2 cup cracker crumbs
- 1/4 cup chopped onion

Directions:

The meatloaf bakes over the potatoes in this dish. Arrange potatoes and the 1 tbsp. chopped onion on bottom of greased casserole. Sprinkle first amount of salt, pepper, and parsley over potatoes. Mix the remaining ingredients together and spread evenly over the potatoes. Optional is to add 1/4 cup ketchup over the meat layer. Bake at 350°F for about an hour or until potatoes are tender.
