Government of Sask. to exit liquor retailing including Watrous location

Thirty-four Saskatchewan Liquor and Gaming Authority (SLGA) stores along with the one in Watrous are being decommissioned in 2023 as the Government of Saskatchewan completes a transition of liquor retailing to the private sector.

According to the provincial government, all stores will cease operations no later than Mar. 31, 2023 while the actual dates will vary depending on factors like lease dates and time required to decommission locations. Following that, an auction process will take place for the retail permits associated with each store to give interested individuals and

businesses the ability to follow and participate in the bid process. Owning 19 properties of the 34 locations announced, SLGA will also be making the vacant buildings available for sale in a separate process as the empty physical buildings do not include a liquor permit.

For affected staff at the locations including the one in Watrous, SLGA indicated it will work with the Saskatchewan Government and General Employees' Union (SGEU) to negotiate a workforce adjustment plan.

Minister Responsible for SLGA Lori Carr said, "With year over year declines in net revenue at SLGA retail, our government has made the

decision to get out of the business of selling liquor. We believe now is the time to complete the transition to the private sector to free up financial resources for other priorities and to mitigate future losses."

The provincial government shared in 2018-'19, profits were \$9.4 million and in 2021-'22, profits declined to \$3.2 million. SLGA Retail's projected net income for 2022-'23 is \$395,000. According to the government, in order to maintain profitability, many of the current stores needed to either be relocated or physically adapted to better meet customer needs.

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Community support tremendous toward Watrous and District Food Bank

As the final month and a half of 2022 arrives, there was a sense of overwhelming gratitude from members of the Watrous and District Food Bank after seeing so much generosity from the area. Holding their annual general meeting Nov. 7, the Board representing the non-profit organization were pleased with the continued support the local food bank has received.

Speaking on behalf of the Board, Chair of the Watrous and District Food Bank, Darren Holland said, "We are so fortunate to have amazing support from the community of Watrous and local area. While we saw the cost of food increase, once again our income outweighed our expenses which allowed us to operate with a surplus."

This year, the local food bank reported an income of \$32,579.71 with almost \$18,000 of that coming from personal donations (for the period of July 2021 to June 2022). The Food Banks of Saskatchewan contributed \$4,592.34, local businesses provided just over \$5,200, local churches/similar groups gave \$550 in support, the Watrous Rotary, Legion and social clubs donated \$1,364.18, and there was just over \$2,950 in corporate donations. Comparatively, in 2021 the food bank received \$39,334.48 of income.

As for expenses, there was a slight increase going from \$29,529.89 in 2021 to \$29,652.32 in 2022. The largest portion of expenses were attributed to food and goods for hampers with \$24,624.09 in 2022 compared to \$26,781.95 spent in 2021. Some added expenses like a new door, fridge and snow removal contributed to higher expenses for building supplies in 2022. "Those were necessary items that we needed to take care of but it never fails that when we need a hand, our community is so generous in supporting us," shared Holland. "We are so grateful to Adam Stenerson at Wheatland Dental in Watrous for donating the use of his building. That allows us to have lower overhead and keeps our expenses down immensely. Our goal is to help as many people as we can and that ensures we can do that."

From monetary donations and volunteers help-

ing out to schools and other organizations lending a hand, Holland said it truly is a community effort in seeing the local food bank remain viable. "Because of all the support we receive year in and year out, we are well-positioned to help people out now and in the years ahead."

Serving clients in the Watrous, Manitou Beach, Young, Simpson, Imperial, Nokomis, Viscount and Liberty areas every second and fourth Wednesday of each month, according to the numbers released during the Watrous and District Food Bank's annual general meeting Nov. 7, on average, the local food bank distributes about 66 hampers per month while in December 2021, 89 special Christmas hampers were prepared for those who applied. About half of those homes included children (164 adults and 86 children).

The hampers that are prepared during the year consist of some or all of: non-perishables like canned or dry soup, canned vegetables and fruit, canned fish or meat sauce, pasta or rice, cereal, juice, and crackers or cookies; and perishables like milk, bread, margarine, frozen meat, eggs, and fresh vegetables and fruit.

The special Christmas hampers which will be distributed Dec. 17 this year will see recipients get either a turkey or ham, one dozen buns, a jug of milk, one dozen eggs, five pounds of Christmas oranges, 10 pounds of potatoes, carrots and onions, stuffing, Kraft Dinner, pasta or rice, Sidekicks or potato, a box of crackers, a breakfast item, cans of soup, canned meats, meals in a can, canned fruit and vegetables, pasta sauce, juice, cranberries, a cake mix, one tub of margarine, peanut butter and a box of chocolates. For hampers distributed to families with children, toys will be included in those as well.

"We are hoping to help as many people and families this Christmas who would like a hamper. If someone you know can benefit from a hamper, we encourage you to let them know and they can call the food bank at 306-946-3785 to place their order. The deadline for that is Dec. 7."

Helping prepare and distribute hampers at the lo-

cal food bank including those at Christmas are 21 volunteers. Holland said the food bank greatly appreciates their help and welcomes others who may want to lend a hand at the food bank's location at 107 3rd Ave. E.

"We are sincerely grateful for everyone who has been so gracious and willing to lend a hand not only during the year but in December during our Christmas hamper packing as well. I also really appreciate those on the local food bank board for the work they do. Those people include treasurer Amanda Dezotell, secretary Glenda Cox McArthur, and members Judy Dunne, Erin Wolff, Amanda McArthur, Mary Kratchmer and Colleen Hunt."

For people who would like to contribute to the hampers this year, Holland noted they can e-Transfer monetary donations to watrousfoodbank@gmail.com and leave a mailing address in the e-Transfer message space so they can receive a tax donation receipt. They can also drop off food donations at the Saskatoon Watrous Co-op Food Store location, purchase toys at The Bargain Shop or sponsor a family this Christmas for \$150.

Trying the sponsor a family initiative a few years ago, Holland said it has been well received. "Because of the donations we get for the sponsor a family hampers during Christmas, upwards of 35 to 40 families have benefitted from those funds each year. People are so gracious and supportive donating money or their time to help and we are just so appreciative of that."

Dear Reena,
 We irrigate our lawn with river water and some of the water hits our house and garden shed. It is starting to leave a stubborn stain. Is there a cleaning solution available that would work to get rid of it? I need to clean parging and vinyl siding on the house and the shed is painted wood. Any help would be appreciated.

Dear Chris,

Get rid of stubborn water stains on vinyl and wood with one of the following solutions. Either combine 50/50 vinegar and water or 50/50 bleach and water. If possible, use a pressure washer to clean the area. For difficult stains, scrub with a non-scratching abrasive cloth.

Dear Reena,

How do you clean a natural gas black stove top?

Dear Margaret,

Hey, that was my mother's name! I also own a natural gas black stove. In order to clean the surface as easily and effectively as possible, combine an abrasive product with a smooth product. Pour white vinegar onto the surface and sprinkle it with baking soda. Allow the surface to bubble and leave for 10 minutes. Use a non-scratching scrubby pad to scrub the area. Another option is to use dish soap and baking soda, the solution will not bubble, but this is still very effective.

I often take dishes to potluck dinners or take meals to people struggling with difficult times. I am looking for a way that I can write my name on the glass without it coming off in the dishwasher. Do you think that if I write my name on the dish with a Sharpie and bake it, the marker will become permanent? Stella

The term, 'pecking order,' comes from studying a pattern of social organization within a poultry flock in 1921. It became accepted as an accurate observation of chickens by those raising them.

Every member of the flock is on a hierarchy ladder. There is a line of dominance with one bird at the top, a rooster or a hen if the flock is without a rooster. Next are the dominant birds of the flock, the older, stronger birds.

Chickens peck each other to maintain social standing within a flock. Each bird pecks another lower in the scale without fear of retaliation and submits to the pecking by one of higher rank.

The pecking order starts when chicks are around six weeks of age. Chicks will begin rushing

at each other, bumping chests and flaring feathers. At this early age, chicks are into intimidating their mates. By the time they leave the brooder, they will have established a pecking order among themselves.

Often, the pecking order works and there is harmony within the flock. There is a danger; however, if any birds are added to an existing flock. The older birds will be very suspicious of new members and can become very violent toward them.

The pecking order can have a dark and deadly side because as chickens peck and intimidate each other; things can get out

of hand. The farmer needs to make sure the birds do not get a taste of blood. If the pecking leads to an open wound, the wounded bird may become attacked by the other hens as they become cannibalistic. The taste of blood can result in many needless deaths.

Harmony and peace are fragile in the hen house and in our lives. The desire and need to be the person in charge can lead to absolute havoc. People want a line of dominance. Knowing who is in control and who holds power is desirable. We find a pecking order in families, schools, businesses, sports teams, churches, all levels

of government, etc. It can mean harmony and much needless strife.

In the Bible, we are told in Mark 10:30-45 that two disciples, James and John, wanted to be next to Jesus in his authority as the leader in Jerusalem. They thought Jesus would become a king in Jerusalem, not crucified there. So, they wanted to be one on his right and one on his left when he came into power there. Jesus said that his Father, not himself, assigned the places on his right and left.

“RCMP Report”

RCMP busy during winter storm

Winter hit much of Saskatchewan with a wallop during the first weekend of November. Heavy snow and high winds made travel on many roads treacherous, resulting in delays, road closures – and many weather-related calls for service for the Saskatchewan RCMP.

From Oct. 31 to Nov. 6, Saskatchewan RCMP received 298 reports of motor vehicle collisions, with 60 percent of them received from Friday to Sunday: Oct. 31: 24; Nov. 1: 23; Nov. 2: 42; Nov. 3: 30; Nov. 4: 50; Nov. 5: 61; and Nov. 6: 68.

RCMP locate missing man

Around 3 p.m. Nov. 8, 2022, Saskatoon RCMP received a report of a missing person. Sixty-year-old Jack Crouch from Kenaston and a second adult male were travelling in the general area of Hwy. 15 between Watrous and Kenaston. When their vehicle became stuck in the snow, the second adult male walked some distance seeking assistance.

Search efforts were then made to locate Jack as RCMP were asking people with yards or acreages in the area of Hwy. 15 between Watrous and Kenaston to check outbuildings for signs of Jack.

At approximately 1:38 p.m., Nov. 9, a Civil Air Search and Rescue Association (CASARA) plane assisted the Saskatoon RCMP with the efforts to locate Jack Crouch. At approximately 1:58 p.m., the plane located a red vehicle that looked abandoned and what appeared to be an individual approximately one km east of the vehicle,

on a non-maintained roadway in the Kenaston District.

Officers were able to travel to the location and identified the male as being Jack Crouch. He was located deceased with no physical signs of trauma.

His next of kin have been notified and the RCMP's thoughts are with his family and friends during this difficult time.

The vehicle was also located and searched by officers. Investigation has determined there are no indications of criminality that took place.

Saskatoon RCMP, Saskatchewan RCMP Traffic Services, Saskatchewan RCMP Police Dog Services, a Saskatoon Police Service aircraft, CASARA and neighbouring RCMP Detachments all assisted with the search.

RCMP continue to investigate homicide in Melville

Saskatchewan RCMP Major Crimes, with support from RCMP Detachments and specialized units, continues to investigate the homicide of an adult male that occurred at a business on 3rd Ave. W. in Melville on the morning of Wednesday, Nov. 2, 2022.

The identity of the deceased has been confirmed through autopsy performed by the Saskatchewan Coroners Service. Twenty-six-year-old Tristan William Hughes-Nyszczuk from Sherwood Park, Alta., was located deceased at the business by police who were responding to reports of gun shots at that location. Another adult male, whose name will not be released, was located at the scene with life-threatening injuries and was taken to hospital for treatment. RCMP will not be providing updates on his condition as this is considered private health information.

At 10:35 a.m. on Wednesday, the Saskatchewan RCMP issued an emergency alert advising the public to be vigilant as the vehicle identified as being involved in the homicide was located abandoned and burned on Hwy. 10 near Duff. At that point in the investigation, police had no information about where the suspect(s) might be, whether they had access to a vehicle, or if they would

seek a ride from the many motorists who travel along that highway.

As the investigation progressed throughout the day, it was determined this was a targeted attack. As such, the alert was cancelled at 1:33 p.m., as investigators had no evidence to suggest a heightened risk to the general public's safety. At that time, police asked the public to remain cautious and to report any suspicious activity – including the thefts of vehicles – to police.

The suspect(s) involved in this incident have not been located and no arrests have been made. Police do not have further information regarding the suspect(s) – including physical descriptions, images or identities.

Anyone with information regarding the homicide of Tristan William Hughes-Nyszczuk, or the events leading up to his death, is asked to contact their local police immediately. Information can also be submitted anonymously to Crime Stoppers at 1-800-222-TIPS (8477) or online at www.saskcrimestoppers.com. Saskatchewan Crime Stoppers will pay up to \$2,000 for information that leads to an arrest or charge of person(s) responsible for this offence or any other serious crime.

Woman threatens people with machete

At approximately 3:30 a.m., Oct. 29 Nipawin RCMP received a report of a female threatening people with a machete near a residence on 3rd Street North in Nipawin. Investigation determined the female held the machete to one victim's throat while making threats. No physical injuries were reported to police. Upon arrival, police located the female on the street and she was arrested without incident. Twenty-five-year-old Tylene Stewart of Nipawin is charged with: one count, assault, Section 266, Criminal Code; two counts, assault with a weapon, Section 267(a), Criminal Code; one count uttering threats, Section 264.1(1)(a), Criminal Code; one count, possession of a weapon for a dangerous purpose, Section 88(2), Criminal Code; one count, mischief, Section 430(4), Criminal Code. She is scheduled to appear in Nipawin Provincial Court on Nov. 23.

Now in 2022, the local store is not only celebrating its 40th anniversary but the MCC Thrift network is marking 50 years of existence.

Marking the milestone of turning 40 in November

and with an upcoming gala fundraiser for the Lanigan Community Gift & Thrift Store, current manager Heidi Martens Weber graciously took some time out of her busy schedule to share a bit about this year and some of the excitement that 2022 has brought.

How has the year gone for the Lanigan Community Gift & Thrift Store as you look to return to a bit of a more normal?

Unlike some businesses, the years of the pandemic have made our thrift shop busier than ever. Last year we saw record sales which allowed us to pay off our building mortgage, as well as send over \$100,000 to MCC for international programming. Donations continue to pour into our

backdoor. We have noticed that unlike before the pandemic, when there were busy seasons (like spring cleaning) and quiet seasons for donations, it is now constantly busy. Volunteer numbers have remained steady, but with the increase in sales and donations we could certainly use more help.

How important do you feel it is to support the Lanigan Community Gift & Thrift Store?

I think our MCC thrift shop plays an interesting role in the community. Judging by the amount and quality of donations there is clearly wealth in our local community, but our shop is in a unique place to also help provide lower cost household items

to those who need it. We are happy that we can offer affordable shopping options while raising funds for the international work that MCC does. The amount of people in this world affected by warfare and climate disasters continues to increase, with record numbers of displaced people, so the money we raise is more important than ever. Every \$3 T-shirt or \$0.50 mug sold helps make an impact in this world.

Where does the money go to?

All of the money raised at our thrift shop goes to Mennonite Central Committee, specifically





Winterhawks open season at home

towards international programming. Now that our mortgage is paid off, we are able to contribute to MCC even more.

How great has the support been over the years?

The support of our shop has been incredible! On Nov. 18th we will be celebrating 40 years since the Community Gift & Thrift opened our doors!

We have customers that drive in from far and wide to shop here and we also have volunteers from many communities that contribute hundreds of hours to make the shop the amazing place that it is.

With the shop turning 40, how unique is that?

Celebrating 40 years feels incredible! We are excited to celebrate the history of this shop's 40 years and the greater MCC Thrift network's 50 years

of existence.

Has there been a lot of changes over the years?

Since the Community Gift & Thrift first opened its doors there have been many changes. We have changed buildings four times and have had three different managers. At one point the furniture and clothing were housed in two different shops and now we are back to one big location. In the past we have sold fair trade handcrafted items (which morphed into the "Ten Thousand Villages" shops), we have sold fabric and moccasins and now focus solely on the donated "thrift" items.

BRYSON, James “Murray”

June 10, 1925 - Oct. 29, 2022

James “Murray” Bryson was born on June 10, 1925, on a neighbour's homestead 8 1/2 miles south of Young, Sask. He was the 10th and second youngest child of David and Beatrice (Easton) Bryson. When he was seven years old, during the “Dirty Thirties”, the family homesteaded east of Endeavour for 10 years. There Murray grew up roaming the forest and meadows with his siblings, hunting partridges and small game for the table, cutting wood, looking after livestock, learning to box, and swimming and skating at noon at Beaver Bank School. As a young man, Murray returned to the prairies to farm, spending many hours in the saddle herding and rounding up cattle. Murray also cut cordwood in the Forest Reserve, worked in the Sutherland Railyard, and mined in the coal mines near Estevan. He was the fire tower operator in the Forest Reserve near Endeavour when he met Vivian Evenson. Murray and Vivian were married on his birthday in 1950 and began life on the farm in the Lyndhurst district south of Young. They farmed together – grain and cattle – for 25 years, providing wonderful growing-up years for their four children. When the last child had left the nest in 1975, they rented the farm to Cecil and moved to be near the “bush country” they loved, opening up and operating a Sears Catalogue Store in Preeceville. It was here that Murray's relationship with Jesus blossomed. After seeing his family, one by one, invite Jesus into their lives, seeing the difference it made, and reading God's Word for himself, Murray came to accept Jesus for who He is, Saviour and Lord, and wanted to help others believe in Him too. In 1981, following six wonderful years in Preeceville, Murray and Vivian chose to return to the prairies, with their Watrous home and yard being the happy gathering hub for their children and grandchildren. During the busy farming seasons, Murray continued to farm with Cecil. In 1989, Murray's beloved wife Vivian passed to her heavenly home. After six years of navigating life on his own, the Lord blessed him by bringing Margaret Schroeder into his life. They were married in 1995. Starting out in Watrous, then alternating time between Watrous and Herbert, they finally settled permanently in Herbert in 2009. Murray was a hard-working, active man who would run across the yard rather than walk. He loved spending time with the families, helping out on the farms, camping with the motorhome, downhill and cross-country skiing, snowmobiling, boating, and fishing. He enjoyed helping others. After his retirement, he spent hours doing yardwork - helping out wherever he saw a need. He put his inventive carpenter skills to use at the New Horizons seniors' drop-in center, remodelling the interior, etc. Murray loved music and enjoyed trying out different instruments – guitar, harmonica, violin, banjo. He was a voracious reader right up until about two weeks before

his passing. He remained very active, pushing himself physically through his arthritis and multiple joint replacements until chronic renal failure necessitated his move to Prairie Wind Estate (assisted living) in 2018. His children were privileged to be able to take turns visiting with their Dad in the ensuing years in the apartment they began renting at that time. In December 2021, Murray entered long-term care at Herbert and District Integrated Facility. On Saturday, October 29, 2022, at 97 years old, in Cypress Regional Hospital, with family, Murray went to sleep and woke up in the presence of Jesus.

Look What's Cooking by Laura Novecosky

Fabulous Banana Cake

Ingredients:

1 1/2 cups mashed bananas (about 3 large)
3 cups flour
1 tsp. baking powder
1 tsp. baking soda
1/2 tsp. cinnamon
1/2 tsp. salt
3/4 cup butter at room temperature
1 cup sugar
1/2 cup brown sugar
3 large eggs at room temperature
2 tsp. vanilla extract
1 1/2 cups buttermilk at room temperature

Directions:

If you do not have buttermilk, have 1 1/2 cups milk at room temperature, adding 1 tbsp. white vinegar and stirring. Let sit for five minutes.

Grease a 9x13 pan. Preheat oven to 350°F. Mash the bananas (I use my hand mixer). In a bowl mix the flour, baking powder, baking soda, cinnamon and salt together with a spoon. Set aside. Using your mixer beat the butter on high until smooth and creamy. Add both sugars and beat on high for about two minutes until well creamed. Add the eggs and vanilla, beating again and scraping down the sides of the bowl to incorporate all ingredients. Beat in the mashed bananas. Turn the

mixer to low speed, then add the dry ingredients alternating with the buttermilk; I usually take about 1/3 at a time. Do not overmix. The batter will be slightly thick. Spread the batter in the greased or pan sprayed 9x13 pan, bake for about 40 to 42 minutes. Test with a toothpick inserted in centre of cake to make sure it is done. Place cooled cake on a wire rack to cool.

Frosting:

1 block cream cheese, softened to room temperature
1/2 cup butter, softened to room temperature
3 cups icing sugar
1 tsp. vanilla
1/8 tsp. salt

Beat the cream cheese and butter together until well combined. Add the icing sugar, vanilla and salt. Beat on low about 30 seconds, then on high for two minutes. Spread on cooled cake. Notes . . . these can be made into cupcakes, fill the liners half way and bake about 20 to 22 minutes. Makes about two dozen. You can use a bundt pan too, but bake 55 to 60 minutes. Frosted cake stores for about two days in fridge or you can freeze the frosted cake for about three months. Defrost in the fridge, bring to room temperature for an hour before serving.

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

With approximately 600 liquor retailers operating in Saskatchewan, all the communities where SLGA stores are closing have at least one other liquor retailer currently operating (where customers can purchase alcohol for take home consumption).

Stores that were announced as part of the closures are expected to continue to operate as usual, although there may be some changes to operations in the new year as they wind down (ex. not replenishing slower moving products, hours of operation). SLGA Retail noted it will immediately cease selling gift cards and accepting special orders. Existing gift cards will be valid until the final store closes next spring. Customers looking to place special orders can do so

with other liquor retailers.

The announcement of the closures in 2023 will not impact SLGA's Distribution Centre. SLGA stated it will continue to operate as the wholesaler of beverage alcohol for the province as well as the regulator of liquor, gaming and cannabis.

Along with the Watrous location, other SLGA stores that will cease operations no later than Mar. 31, 2023 are located in: Assiniboia, Biggar, Buffalo Narrows, Carlyle, Creighton, Esterhazy, Estevan, Fort Qu'Appelle, Humboldt, La Loche, La Ronge, Meadow Lake, Melfort, Moose Jaw, Moosomin, Nipawin, North Battleford, Prince Albert (two), Regina (six), Saskatoon (five), Swift Current, Weyburn, and Yorkton.
