New walking trail to link Watrous and Manitou Beach

What started out as a dream of creating a walking trail connecting Watrous and Manitou Beach will now become a reality thanks to local resident Ron Ediger. After the Watrous Rotary along with generous sponsors and volunteers created a pair of trails for residents and visitors to use near Watrous, a third trail extending approximately three kilometres between Watrous and Manitou Beach will now be constructed.

Over the years owner of Melron Services Ltd. in Watrous Ron Ediger along with his late wife Melissa provided funds to a variety of local worthy causes. After seeing the need to create a trail bringing Watrous and Manitou Beach together, Ediger felt like he wanted to help.

"The Watrous Rotary have been a big supporter of our community and have contributed to a number of projects and worthy causes over the years," said Ediger who will be covering the cost of the new trail. "After the Rotary Club completed two trails and were one day hoping for a third, I wanted to help do my part as a resident of the community and decided to take on the project."

Watrous Rotarian Al Mosewich who was one of those integral in seeing the two phases of the local Rotary Trails created said Ron approached the club with a number of options to see the third trail built. "There were a number of negotiations undertaken with different levels of government and landowners and everyone is now on board and I am really excited to see it happening."

Hoping to start construction on the new trail as soon as possible, Ediger said the approval process took some time to complete. "The biggest hurdle was getting permission from the Ministry of Highways. If we didn't get that then I don't think this trail would have happened."

Once Ron was able to get the green light from the Ministry of Highways, he then approached the councils from both


Watrous and the Resort Village of Manitou Beach. Getting their blessing he then met with landowners and the Manitou and District Regional Park, places where the trail will run either through or adjacent to. "I was very fortunate to be able to get their approval and now we can make things happen."

The portion of the new trail will extend northeast from the first trail originally completed by the Watrous Rotary. Instead of crossing the road from the first trail to the second phase of the trail, walkers can continue past the gazebo toward the Watrous Cemetery. There they can veer off the gravel road as the new trail will take them along a corner of the cemetery to the main gates. From there proper signage will be put up which will allow walkers to cross Hwy. 365 to the other side of the road. Once across the road, stakes are currently set up marking off where the trail will run alongside Hwy. 365. Heading to Manitou Beach, walkers will eventually arrive at the turnoff to Murray Disc Golf. Navigating around a slough, the trail will continue alongside the highway reaching the Manitou and District Regional Park campground. Space near some hedges have allowed for room to put down a trail and it will lead walkers by the entrance of the park and then out in front of The Drive-In at Manitou Beach where a path is currently used. Building upon that current path, the trail will come to a finish at Lakeview Ave. near the Resort Village of Manitou Beach's office and the Manitou Mini Golf.

"Having the trail end there will allow people to take in the nearby attractions or they can continue along to the beach," said Ediger who added he may also construct a rest stop at that spot.

Once the trail is completed, Mosewich noted having the path stretching from Watrous to Manitou Beach will provide a

Local area not slated to receive additional CCAs

There was some good news for a number of long-term care facilities within Saskatchewan as the provincial government announced more continuing care assistants (CCAs) are being hired. Of those new hires, which marks the first year of a three-year commitment by the province to add 300 new CCAs across the health system, none were within the local area.

The provincial government noted in the 2021-22 provincial budget, a total of \$6 million in funding was allocated to hire an additional 108 full-time equivalent CCA positions (90 for long-term care facilities and 18 to support home care).

Reaching out to the Ministry of Health to see if any of those 108 additional full-time equivalent CCAs would be hired for facilities in Watrous, Imperial, Lanigan and Nokomis, the Ministry of Health stated, "The government's commitment to 300 additional CCAs is over a period of time. The long-term care homes in these communities did not receive additional continuing care assistants in this allocation; we will be working with the Saskatchewan Health Authority (SHA) to determine the allocation for future years."

While there will not be any additional hires locally, at least this time around, according to the Ministry of

Health the \$6 million investment from the provincial government will result in additional direct care support in 43 other long-term care homes. Additional home care staff will service 22 smaller cities, towns, northern communities and their surrounding rural areas.

"We are following through on our commitment to add more continuing care assistants in home care and long-term care facilities throughout the province," Mental Health and Addictions, Seniors and Rural and Remote Health Minister Everett Hindley said. "This is just one of the many investments our government is making to ensure that we are meeting the health care needs of Saskatchewan's older adult population."

"The SHA is pleased to see this initial investment

in improving the quality of care for residents, with the provision of additional continuing care aide positions to support direct care needs," SHA Executive Director of Continuing Care Andre Moss said.

To date, SHA and their long-term care affiliates and contracted operators have hired the equivalent of 85 full-time CCAs. Recruitment efforts are ongoing for five additional FTE positions in the long-term care sector. The SHA has also hired the equivalent of 10 full-time CCAs to work in home care, and is working toward recruiting an additional eight FTEs. These staff will support home care needs in rural and remote communities across the province. Since April, 95 of 108, or 88 percent, of the CCA positions committed to in the budget have been filled.

Public Health Act amendments address safety around hospitals

The Government

of Saskatchewan is introducing legislation that will protect the health workforce, patients and families by ensuring they have safe access to hospitals, and expand workforce flexibility to respond to the COVID-19 pandemic.

The Public Health (Safe Access to Hospitals) Amendment Act, 2021 was introduced Nov. 10 in the Saskatchewan legislature

to amend The Public Health Act, 1994.

These amendments provide the ability to create and enforce safe access zones around hospitals, so that patients and health care providers are protected from harassment. A 50-metre safe access zone would prevent sidewalk protests near hospitals that could potentially result in delays or harassment

for people going into the facilities.

"Patients and families deserve to be able to access health services safely and without facing interference or intimidation," Health Minister Paul Merriman said. "This provision will also support our hospitals and staff in providing health services with safety, dignity and privacy."

Lawful labour picketing will still be allowed within the safe access zones. The safe access zone provision in the legislation will expire two years after the legislation comes into force.


The legislation will also enable additional immunizers to support vaccination programs, including influenza vaccine, COVID-19 boosters and vaccines for children aged five to 11. This will improve the province's capacity to provide immunizations.

Local food bank very grateful for community support

Generosity, appreciation and continued support were once again key themes at the Watrous and District Food Bank. Doing their best to navigate the non-profit organization through the pandemic, board members of the Watrous and District Food Bank met as part of their annual general meeting Nov. 8 with a sense of tremendous gratitude.

That gratitude was extended to the community and local area as once again the food bank was able to purchase and distribute food items throughout the year to its clients. Chair of the Watrous and District Food Bank Darren Holland said, "We are so fortunate to have such tremendous support from the community and local area. While we saw the cost of food increase, our income outweighed our expenses allowing us to continue to operate with a surplus."

This year, the local food bank reported an income of \$39,334.48 with almost \$21,000 of that coming from personal donations (for the period of July 2020 to June 2021). The Food Banks of Saskatchewan contributed \$7,922.84, local businesses provided just over \$5,700, local churches/similar groups gave just over \$1,100 in support, the Watrous Rotary, Legion and social clubs donated \$1,740, and there was just over \$1,800 in corporate donations.

Comparatively, in 2020 the food bank had its best year financially with nearly \$50,000 of income. In 2019 it saw an income of \$32,224.74.

As for expenses, there was an increase going from \$23,655.28 in 2019 to \$24,024.20 in 2020 and \$29,529.89 in 2021. The largest portion of expenses were attributed to food and goods for hampers with \$26,781.95 spent in 2021 compared to \$20,870.41 in 2020.

"There has been such tremendous community support to allow us to remain in operation," said Holland. "From monetary donations and volunteers helping us out to the schools and other organizations lending a hand. Because of that and with our client numbers remaining relatively the same and even less as before, we are well-positioned to help in the years ahead."

Serving clients in the Watrous, Manitou Beach, Young, Simpson, Imperial, Nokomis, Viscount and Liberty areas every second and fourth Wednesday of each month, Holland said on average the food bank distributes about 50 hampers per month, down 10 from the previous year. Helping prepare and distribute those hampers are 18 volunteers who also purchase groceries, stock shelves and lend a hand where needed. Holland said the food bank greatly appreciates their help including assistance from Interlake Human Resources in Watrous who come on a regular basis to

pack dry hampers at the food bank's location at 107 3rd Ave. E.

With an invitation extended to anyone else who would like to volunteer, in addition to packing and distributing regular hampers, the annual Christmas hampers will soon be packed. Last year 89 special Christmas hampers were prepared for all who applied. Holland indicated about half of those homes included children (165 adults and 83 children).

"Those who want a Christmas hamper or know of someone in need of one this year can contact the food bank by Dec. 8. We want to help as many people as we can at Christmas with food and gifts."

For people who would like to contribute to the hampers this year, Holland noted they can e-Transfer monetary donations to watrousfoodbank@gmail.com and leave a mailing address in the e-Transfer message space so they can receive a tax donation receipt. They can also drop off food donations at the Saskatoon Watrous Co-op Food Store location, purchase toys at The Bargain Shop for the Integra Tire toy drive or sponsor a family this Christmas for \$135.

Starting the sponsor a family initiative a few years ago, Holland said last year a total of \$5,265 came from people wanting to sponsor a family. "Because of those donations for the sponsor a family hampers during Christmas, just over 39 families were able to benefit."

Packed inside this year's Christmas hampers, recipients will get either a turkey or ham, one dozen buns, a jug of milk, one dozen eggs, five pounds of Christmas oranges, 10 pounds of potatoes, carrots and onions, stuffing, Kraft Dinner, pasta or rice, Sidekicks or potato, a box of crackers, a breakfast item, cans of soup, canned meats, meals in a can, canned fruit and vegetables, pasta sauce, juice, cranberries, a cake mix, one tub of margarine, peanut butter and a box of chocolates. For hampers distributed to families with children, toys will be included in those as well.

In addition to the Christmas hampers, this year Holland said the local food bank has partnered up with the Lanigan Community Gift and Thrift Store.

"They will be supporting our Christmas hampers by donating clothing for families. We are sincerely grateful for them and their willingness to partner with us."

Holland also indicated that the local food bank will be accepting gently used clothing and winter gear from people. "For those wanting to donate items of clothing, they can contact the food bank to arrange for drop off."

As the food bank's annual general meeting wrapped up and with the holiday season approaching, reflecting back on this past year as a board, Holland, along with treasurer Amanda Dezotell, secretary Glenda Cox McArthur, and members Judy Dunne, Erin Wolff, Amanda McArthur, Mary Kratchmer and Colleen Hunt felt fortunate to live in the community they do. "People have been so gracious and supportive, and this year continuing to navigate through the pandemic, people have been so willing to help and we are just so appreciative of that."

Pedestrian struck by vehicle

On Nov. 7, 2021 at approximately 6:40 p.m., Loon Lake RCMP received a report that a pedestrian had been struck by a vehicle on Hwy. 699 on Makwa Sahgaiehcan First Nation.

The pedestrian, a 27-year-old male from Makwa Sahgaiehcan First Nation, passed away at the scene. His family has been notified.

Investigation has determined that a westbound vehicle struck the pedestrian, who was walking at the side of the road. The driver of the vehicle remained at the scene and called for emergency services.

Government introduces stiffer penalties for stunting, racing, and excessive speeding

Amendments to The Traffic Safety Act were introduced in the Saskatchewan Legislative Assembly to target drivers who speed, stunt or race.

The changes will allow police to immediately suspend driver's licences and impound vehicles if a driver is charged with stunting, racing, or excessive speeding.

“This is the first step in strengthening the penalties for stunting and racing in Saskatchewan; our government also intends to increase the fines for these offences once the amendment has passed,” Minister Responsible for SGI Don Morgan said. “As well, by better defining what constitutes racing and stunting, police can more easily enforce these offences, and put a stop to these dangerous behaviours.”

Other notable changes to The Traffic Safety Amendment Act, 2021, include:

- Clarifying rules around road and speed signs in municipalities.

Clarifying that suspended drivers can legally drive to take part in SGI-mandated driver evaluations under approved supervision.

The legislation will take effect after it is passed in the Legislative Assembly and proclaimed, which is expected to happen during the spring sitting.

Man arrested for six armed robberies

A 55-year-old man is facing 18 charges relating to six robberies following an investigation by the SPS General Investigations Section.

Between Oct. 17 and 26 police responded to six robberies in Saskatoon that involved a weapon, at gas station convenience stores in the 2700 block of Faithful Avenue (x2), the 400 block of Circle Drive East, the 1900 block of McKercher Drive, the 3300 block of 8th Street East, and the 3900 block of 8th Street East. In each of the robberies, the suspect brandished a knife, but no one was injured.

The accused was identified and arrested on Oct. 27. He is facing numerous charges including Armed Robbery (x6), Possession of a Dangerous Weapon (x6), and Possession of Stolen Property (x6).

SaskTel launches Partnership Program

SaskTel announced Sept. 13 the launch of its Rural Broadband Partnership Program, a new initiative that will see SaskTel partner with internet providers to bring advanced broadband connectivity to underserved farms, acreages, Indigenous communities and other hard to serve rural areas in Saskatchewan.

“Maximizing rural Saskatchewan's access to modern broadband internet is a key priority for our government,” said Don Morgan, Minister Responsible for SaskTel. “SaskTel's new partnership model will ensure that all Saskatchewan residents and businesses can participate and succeed in the modern world.”

“We are firmly committed to connecting the people of Saskatchewan, and even though we have invested hundreds of millions of dollars in our rural networks across the province, we understand that there are areas we can't reach alone,” said Doug Burnett, SaskTel President and CEO. “With the Rural Broadband Partnership Program, we'll be better able to bridge the

digital divide that exists in some areas of Saskatchewan and ensure that more rural families and businesses can take advantage of the latest digital tools and technologies to connect, learn, and pursue business opportunities.”

With the province's largest wireline and wireless networks, SaskTel currently delivers broadband speeds that meet or exceed the CRTC's 50/10 benchmark (50 Mbps download and 10 Mbps upload) to 85 percent of the population of the province. Through this partnership program, SaskTel will work with internet providers to expand their coverage areas with the specific aim to bring 50/10 unlimited broadband service, or better, to more Saskatchewan households.

SaskTel has received strong interest in the Rural Broadband Partnership Program from several local rural internet providers, with H and K Rural Networks Inc, Living Sky Internet, and Wood River Controls currently signed on. Additionally, as the first provider to partner with SaskTel, Wood River Controls has already utilized the program to bring broadband service to the Last Mountain Lake area, the Muscowpetung

First Nation and is also working on a project near Lake Diefenbaker.

The Saskatchewan Association of Rural Municipalities (SARM), which created a Broadband Action Committee with the clear goal of improving broadband service for all underserved Saskatchewan residents, has also supported the development and launch of SaskTel's partnership program.

“SARM aims to achieve parity for all Saskatchewan residents, regardless of your address, when it comes to the availability of this essential service that many rural areas are lacking,” said SARM President, Ray Orb. “COVID-19 identified the importance of immediate investment into broadband and enhanced collaboration between internet service providers. We are hopeful that this new program will be successful in both regards.”

Added Burnett, “We're pleased to work with other service providers who are interested in investing in Saskatchewan and understand the challenges that come with serving rural areas to create a more connected future for our province.”

safe way for pedestrians to go to and from the communities. “It is quite a huge project and not everyone has the ability to do something like this.

Ron is in the unique position of having the equipment, staffing, material and financial resources to do this. He saw the vision that the Rotary Club had

and is the type of guy who can get it done.”

With the ability to utilize his equipment and staff from Melron Services Ltd., Ediger said that will provide an opportunity for the trail to be completed in 2022. “About 24 years ago I came here with a single backhoe and this community and the area has been so good to us. I thought, why not give back? I am always thinking about what I can do and I just thought I would like to do some good things here and leave a bit of a legacy to the communities.”

Ediger explained the plan was to get going on the trail Nov. 8 but due to unforeseen circumstances the 2018 Watrous Citizen

of the Year said work will now start as soon as possible. “We want to start hauling material to some of the lower spots before spring and get those filled up. We are able to access materials nearby and will need to add some culverts but that will be done next year.”

Putting on a sand seal coat and capping the trail once its neared completion, Ediger noted the plan is to finish the project by the summer of 2022.

Citing how Ron and Melissa were big supporters of community through numerous contributions over the years, Mosewich said the trail will remain along that same theme of community, bringing both Watrous and

Manitou Beach together. Those comments were also echoed by the mayors of Watrous and Manitou Beach who were delighted to see the project go forward.

On behalf of the Town of Watrous, Mayor John Gunderson said having the trail completed will add a tremendous amount to the area. “A significant part of the local economies of Watrous and Manitou Beach is tourism. Therefore, it is extremely important that we continue to work together to make this an attractive area to visit and live. Through the generous contribution by Ron Ediger to expand the Rotary Walking Trail joining the two communities, this will serve to meet our

goals of this destination area. I am sure it will be enjoyed by both residents and visitors for many years to come.”

Resort Village of Manitou Beach Mayor Poppy Petersen was also thrilled about the news of the trail. “Our two communities both want to work with Ron to do everything we can to help this connecting trail happen. Manitou Beach is excited to see it happen! With each community having their own trail system, and Ron working so hard to join the two, it's on the way to becoming a complete package tourists and residents will be able to safely bike and walk between the two! Hooray for Mr. Ron Ediger, and the councils from Watrous and Manitou Beach for seeing this vision.”

Along with the two communities, Ediger also approached the RM of Morris. Reeve Bob Penrose said while the RM has no jurisdiction with regards to the project going ahead or not, he was pleased that Ediger took the time to seek permission with the RM. “He asked us and while we did not have any jurisdiction, we were certainly in favour of it. 

In Watson, Geri Lon Valdesimo of LeRoy was fifth with a 67 and Callie Chernishenko of Lanigan was sixth with a 76, making the cut. Delani Walter

of Lanigan was seventh carding 88.

Junior Districts

Advancing to district action Sept. 21 at McNab Park Golf Club in Watson, this year's winner on the male side was AJ Paulsen of Humboldt who carded an 88 while McCartney Johnson of Wadena was first on the female side with 108.

Locally on the male side, Dylan Froess of LeRoy placed fifth with a 94, Lukas Tuplin of LeRoy was ninth with a 105, Kayden Stroeder of Lanigan was 15th with a 112, Calder Jones of Lanigan and Jaxson Hendry of Nokomis each tied for 17th with 118.

On the female side, locally Taylor Potter of Watrous was second with a 114, Geri Lon Valdesimo of LeRoy and Olivia Tan of Watrous tied for fifth with 124, and Callie Chernishenko of Lanigan was 10th with 148.

Local golfers compete at provincials

Advancing through district play, local area golfers representing their schools headed to Valley Regional Park Golf Course at Rosthern earlier this fall to compete at this year's Saskatchewan High Schools Athletic Association (SHSAA) provincial golf championships. While in individual play, the local golfers were not quite able to medal but when it came to team results, Horizon's female contingent took home first place.

Teeing off on day one Sept. 24, according to SHSAA, individually on the male side, the leader was Myles Johnson of Martensville who shot a 73. Locally, Carson Anderson of Watrous shot a 106.

Dear Mark,

Using a hot hairdryer on the highest setting, move the dryer over the white mark to draw the moisture out. As you heat the area, rub the surface with a soft cloth. The sooner you tackle this challenge, the better.

You can purchase or sew clasp straps (also called sheet suspenders) that hold corners in place or consider purchasing drawstring fitted sheets. Not only will the sheets stay in place, but the linens appear less wrinkled, tighten the drawstring to secure sheets.

I just came home from the grocery store and I thought of you as I was shopping. I am having company and want to make a fruit platter. How can I tell when a pineapple is ripe? Pat

Hello Patricia,

Great question! Tug on one of the pineapple leaves. If the leaf is loose, the pineapple is ripe.

Dear Reena,

I was wondering if you might have a solution for cleaning felt pen marker off the wall? Ellie

Dear Ellie,

Permanent marker stains often need a little gentle persuasion in combination with an effective ink remov-

er. Try one of the following products and scrub with an abrasive cloth (not an S.O.S pad or steel wool): WD-40, paint thinner, acetone, Mr. Clean Magic Marker, rubbing alcohol or glycerin. If the paint remains, sand with fine sandpaper and touch up the area with paint.

his son Absalom's rebellion in his effort to rob David of his position as king.






Thankfully, "God so loved the world that He gave His one and only Son, that whoever believes in Him shall not perish but





With an increase in demand for their products and an opportunity to grow, despite navigating through a pandemic, it has been a busy year for Drake Meats. With their latest creation Jerky in a Box (a subscription-based product where consumers can have their favourite jerky shipped to them) garnering rave reviews, the company based out of Drake made the choice to expand its business north.

"We would not be able to fulfill our holiday orders without making this move. The new space has allowed us to continue growing our business."

Planning to utilize the space in Lanigan until the company outgrows it, Ediger added the recent addition of Jerky in a Box to Drake Meats has really taken off. "Just as it was in 1949, we're all about great products and great people. So when it came to getting our jerky into the hands of consumers, we decided to let our meat do all

But despite the widespread popularity of the company's products including Jerky in a Box, Ediger noted the past year and a half has contained a few obstacles.

"The pandemic has brought unique challenges to our business that no one could have foreseen a couple years ago, namely around increased costs and implementing procedures to keep people safe. Thankfully, we have a strong team of good people who have navigated these

challenges and helped our company adapt to the new 'normal'."

As part of that new normal and increase in demand, Ediger anticipates Drake Meats which currently employs over 100 people could grow its team by about 50 over the next five years. "We are getting positive feedback from customers across Western Canada about our products and it is extremely gratifying. We hope to continue serving more of our products to families across Canada in the coming years."


George was born in Imperial on May 18, 1946. He attended school in Simpson and married Bev on August 23, 1969. They had two boys,
