

## Stormy situation

► After a peaceful Sunday morning, Nov. 14 (pictured top and top right), Environment and Climate Change Canada issued a winter storm warning as high winds, rain, blowing snow and treacherous road conditions arrived early in the week and lasted until later Wednesday. Roads were closed and travel not recommended throughout parts of the province during the storm (image right). According to Environment and Climate Change Canada, the powerful low pressure system from Alberta brought heavy snow, severe wind gusts, blowing snow, and blizzard conditions to much of Saskatchewan Nov. 15 to 17. Blizzard conditions were observed longest in Regina where nearly 12 hours of visibility less than 400 metres in blowing snow was measured. Poor visibility contributed to poor travel conditions across much of southern Saskatchewan on Nov. 16. Many of the highways surrounding Regina and Moose Jaw were closed at some point due to the conditions. Measuring snow proved challenging for weather volunteers due to strong winds and the resulting snow drifts; as such all snowfall amounts are estimated. According

to estimates from Environment and Climate Change Canada, Clavet received 11 cm, Saskatoon had 10 cm, Pelican Narrows had 28 cm, Regina had eight cm and Strasbourg had eight cm. As far as peak wind gusts, Swift Current registered 113 km/h., Estevan registered 106 km/h., Moose Jaw hit 98 km/h., Regina reached 91 km/h., the Last Mountain area hit 76 km/h., and Saskatoon registered 69 km/h. On the highways, Saskatchewan RCMP's Divisional Operational Communication Centre dispatched officers to 79 motor vehicle collisions during a nine hour period. Officers also responded to 28 reports of traffic hazards including vehicles that were stuck or abandoned.

# Local duo find success on the turf this season

For a pair of Winston Wildcat senior football team graduates, success has been following them throughout their young careers. After graduating in separate years from Winston High School in Watrous, offensive lineman Ryder Klisowsky and linebacker Brady Fossen have been helping their respective teams march deep into the post-season this year.

Suiting up for the Saskatoon Hilltops where he won numerous national championships, after his final year with the team, the now 24-year-old Klisowsky captured the attention of the University of Manitoba Bisons. With the pandemic halting the previous season, one in which Ryder would have

played in, Klisowsky was finally able to compete in his rookie campaign this year. Hoping to carry over the success he had with the Hilltops to the Bisons, in his first full season with Manitoba, Klisowsky has been a tremendous part of the club's winning ways.

Ranked seventh nationally as part of a 4-2 regular season record, for their efforts, six members of the Bisons including Klisowsky were selected for the 2021 Canada West Football All-Star Team.

Named a conference All-Star in his first season with Manitoba, the Watrous native stood out on a Bisons' line made up entirely of first years. Starting in four of six regular season games and one pre-season game, Klisowsky assisted a Bison offence that averaged 159.3 rushing yards per game

(fourth in Canada West).

That effort spilled over into the Hardy Cup semifinal at IG Field in Winnipeg Nov. 13 as the Bisons hosted their first home playoff game in eight years. After a 45 minute delay due to the weather, the Bisons took on the Alberta Golden Bears in the snow and with a solid ground game that saw the team rush for 264 yards, the U of M came away with a 43-17 victory.

With the win, Ryder was scheduled to return to Saskatchewan with the Bisons as they faced the University of Saskatchewan Huskies for the Hardy Cup. The number four ranked Huskies team beat the Bisons earlier this year but all bets were off during the Nov. 20 contest in Saskatoon.

The winner of that game was slated to move on as Canada West's top football team for 2021, advancing to compete in the national semifinal, the Uteck Bowl against the best team from Quebec.

Like Klisowsky, Brady Fossen has also been a key contributor to his team's success this season. The Watrous native entered year five with the Hilltops after his team was also

forced the halt last year due to the pandemic. Looking forward to competing for another national championship, Fossen went to work and following week four of the regular season, the Canadian Junior Football League announced Fossen was named as one of the Football Canada Players of the Week.

Recognized in the Prairie Conference for defensive player of the game, according to the CJFL they stated: "In a defensive battle on Saturday night Brady Fossen stood out for the defending champs. He collected five solo tackles, had an assist, a sack and forced a fumble."

Hoping to build off that momentum, Fossen would unfortunately get injured but would remain an integral part of the team, both on and off the field. Finishing the regular season in second at 6-2 and trailing only the Regina Thunder (8-0), the Hilltops met the Edmonton Huskies in the PFC semifinal Nov. 7. In a tough contest, Edmonton would lead 24-14 at halftime before Saskatoon grabbed 10 points in the third to tie things up. In the fourth quarter, the Hilltops edged the Huskies to take a 33-31 win. In the victory Fossen

had three tackles, three assisted tackles, and a special teams tackle.

Sporting a wrapped right hand and advancing to the PFC final against undefeated Regina, Fossen and the Hilltops looked to take down the club. Playing in Regina, Saskatoon was able to score late in the fourth quarter and pushed ahead for an eventual 29-9

victory. The win gave the Hilltops a seventh straight PFC championship and the opportunity to compete in the national semifinal Nov. 20. The winner of that game advances to the national championship Dec. 4.

Since 2014, the Hilltops have won the national title six consecutive times and the team will look for a seventh straight.

Authority (SHA) staff who were redeployed to address the COVID-19 case surge have returned to their home positions. One hundred and twenty-nine of the 374 services slowed since Sept. 1, 2021 have been fully resumed and 51 services have been partially resumed.

It remains the SHA's target to have 75 percent of eligible, redeployed staff returned to their home positions by Nov. 19. A progress report on these targets and the associated service resumptions by Saskatchewan Health Authority service area is now available.

# “RCMP Report”

## Suspects use vehicle to break into gas bar

Wadena RCMP are asking for assistance to identify two unknown suspects that drove a white Ford F250 through the front entrance of the Wadena Co-op Gas Bar on Nov. 11, 2021, at approximately 3:45 a.m. The suspects were seen on security footage trying to steal/damage the ATM inside (pictured).

They were also caught on camera at the Co-op gas station in Colonay a few hours later.

The Ford F250 had a marking of “Rosedale” on the side of the truck.

cases reported Tuesday, Nov. 16, the provincial COVID-19 dashboard will note that 69 previously reported cases have been removed. These had been reported as confirmed cases in error.

On Nov. 15, it was determined that a number of positive PanBio (Antigen) test results downloaded into the provincial COVID database were automatically reported as ‘confirmed positive’. Upon further investigation, the majority of these cases had a PCR result that was negative. The date of collection for these specimens range from June 27 to Oct. 12, 2021.

## Public Health Orders Will Be Enforced

The week of Nov. 8, Saskatchewan Health Authority public health inspectors issued a number of fines:

Two corporate fines of \$14,000 were issued to A&W and Bluez on Second, both in Unity, for failure to screen for proof of vaccination or negative test. An individual ticket of \$2,800 was also issued at that time for failure to mask.

Three individuals at the Oasis Roadhouse in Pangman were fined \$2,800 each for failure to mask.

A corporate fine of \$14,000 was issued to Chicken Chef in Esterhazy for failure to screen for proof of vaccination or negative test.

Two corporate fines of \$14,000 were issued in North Battleford to two separate Tim Hortons locations for failure to screen for proof of vaccination or negative test.

A ticket of \$2,800 for failure to mask was issued to an

## Highway closed during collision

On Wednesday, Nov. 17 as a blizzard rolled through parts of Saskatchewan White Butte RCMP were on scene of a collision and traffic backup in the eastbound lanes of Hwy. 1 approximately 10 kilometres east of Pense. Both lanes of travel were blocked leaving a long, multi-kilometre backup of vehicles at a stand still.

Hwy. 1 between Regina and Moose Jaw was closed due to the road and weather conditions. “Firstly, no one has reported any injuries to our officers as a result of the road closure and traffic backup on Hwy. 1 between Regina and Moose Jaw (Nov. 17),” shared S/Sgt. Jason Sauve, White Butte RCMP Detachment Commander. “We want to thank our partners for their shared response during a very snowy and windy day on the open prairies. Officers on scene experienced reduced visibility and a patient queue of motorists who are

now on their way to their individual destinations.”

RCMP officers left the scene Wednesday afternoon as traffic slowly began moving as the roadway was plowed. While specific details were not available about the initial collision that occurred; it was the aftermath of four vehicles being stuck and snow piling up around them which resulted in the backup.

At one point there was a five kilometre line of vehicles in both eastbound lanes at a stand still. In total, multiple police units and detachments responded including White Butte RCMP, Moose Jaw RCMP, Moose Jaw and White Butte Combined Traffic Services Saskatchewan.

A number of vehicles were still in the ditch and/or on the shoulder of Hwy. 1 Wednesday afternoon and were to be removed in the coming days by their owners. Officers marked several of them with police tape to show they had been checked for any vehicle occupants.

## RCMP assist with calls during blizzard

As the provincial police force, Saskatchewan RCMP responded to a high volume of weather-related calls during Nov. 16 and 17. Wintry weather including heavy snow, freezing rain and high winds created dangerous road conditions in much of the province.

Between just after midnight Nov. 16 to 9 a.m. Nov. 17, Saskatchewan RCMP’s Divisional Operational Communication Centre dispatched Saskatchewan RCMP officers to 79 motor vehicle collisions. Officers also responded to 28 reports of traffic hazards, including vehicles that were stuck or abandoned.

Officers may have also responded to weather-related calls for service that were reported directly to their detachments or were discovered during regular patrols and are not reflected here.



## Solutions and Substitutions



### Tips from Reena Nerbas

Dear Reena,  
How would you clean tough limescale off a toilet? I tried many methods. Thanks, Napolean

Dear Napolean,

To remove stains in a toilet, purchase a pumice stone and lubricate it with either cheap shampoo or dish soap. Wet the stone and gently wipe the toilet rim to remove marks, being careful not to scratch the porcelain.

Dear Reena,

Any ideas for ways to reuse muslin rice bags instead of throwing them out? Thanks, Arlin

Dear Arlin,

Some of the following suggestions require the skill of sewing: use as is or transform rice bags into a small shopping bag, wallet, bathtub toy holder, picnic utensil carrier or makeup bag. Use two bags to make a large bag. You can also put one rice bag around each of your planters to prevent spillage.

Dear Reena,

Is there a way to repair deep cuts in leather furniture? Also, is there a product that can be used to spruce up the dye colour on leather furniture? I have seen advertisements about people who will come in and repair and re-dye, but I imagine it will be costly and we would prefer to do it ourselves, if possible. Thanks, Mandy

Dear Reena,

To repair tears in leather furniture purchase leather glue and a subpatch. Push the subpatch through the tear. Close the cut with leather glue, works amazingly well! You can purchase a leather repair kit; follow the instructions included with the kit. My father-in-law used to use a product on his horse saddles called Urad to shine leather (search for Urad online). Saddle soap, leather condition-

er and mink oil are also good alternatives. If you have a limited budget, rub the inside of a banana peel onto the leather to help make it shine.

### Feedback from contributors

Re: preventing natural peanut butter from separating

The best way to mix up the natural peanut butter so the oil is evenly distributed is to pour and scrape all the contents of the jar into a bowl, mix it with a big spoon until it is uniform in texture and spoon it back into the jar. Then refrigerate it. It will not separate when it is cold. The person who takes on this job gets to lick the spoon and the bowl! Jill

Re: checking for ripe pineapples







## Look What's Cooking by Laura Novecosky

### Stuffed Buns

#### Directions:

Prepared bun dough: if you are not a bread or bun maker, then go to the frozen section at the grocery store and buy a bag of frozen unbaked bun dough. Let thaw according to package instructions.

Meanwhile, scramble fry one pound of ground beef, adding about 1/3 cup finely chopped onion, one to two finely chopped garlic cloves and about a half cup well drained sauerkraut. Cook well and let cool enough to handle. I will sometimes sprinkle in a little shredded cheese, about 1/3 to 1/2 cup.

Cut dough or spread the frozen bun dough into a flat circle with your hands. Place about one to two tbsp. of the filling and firmly pinch the dough shut, making the buns into a round shape. Place on parchment lined cookie sheets with the pinched side down. Let rise about 40 to 45 minutes, then bake at 350°F for about 23 to 25 minutes.

These are great warmed up for lunches but also are good served cold. I wrap mine individually so they can be put in lunches.

# Winterhawks drop puck on new season

Looking forward to hitting the ice to open the 2021-22 season after the pandemic forced the Long Lake Hockey League to halt play in 2020, the Watrous Winterhawks hosted the Lanigan Pirates Nov. 13.

With a number of new faces including some members from the LeRoy Braves, who are not icing a team this year, Watrous welcomed the Pirates who have some new faces of their own.

As Watrous netminder Owen Hicks and Lanigan goaltender Mack Shields settled into their respective creases, the puck dropped on the new campaign and teams went to work. Just over six minutes into the first period, it would be the home team that tallied first with all three assistant captains registering a point. With 13:52 remaining in period one, Carson James and Chad Murton collected helpers on a Michael Korol marker to give Watrous a 1-0 advantage.

Looking to keep the lead, Winterhawk goalie Owen Hicks was kept busy keeping the puck out of the net as the Pirates tried to tie things up. Then with 5:33 remaining, Lanigan was able to solve Hicks as Stuart Symenuk scored from Dayden Dvernichuk. With the game tied at one, Lanigan continued to press and just over one minute later, the Pirates went up 2-1 with a Trey Daelick goal, his first of the evening.

Watrous would be assessed a crosschecking penalty late in the stanza and on the penalty kill would surrender a goal off the stick of Dexter Bricker who collected a power play goal giving the

visiting team a 3-1 lead with 1:16 to go. That was it for scoring during the opening period as Lanigan carried a two goal advantage into the second.

In period two, the Pirates were able to go up 4-1 with Daelick's second goal of the game, this time from Bricker and Rylan Brookbank. The fourth goal for the Pirates came just over five minutes after the second started and Lanigan would add one more before the period came to a conclusion. With 1:51 showing on the clock, Colby Harmsworth put the visitors ahead 5-1 as netminder Mack Shields collected the lone assist on the tally. Watrous responded just over a minute later as Taron Topham beat Shields with Clay Frey collecting the assist to get the Winterhawks to within three.

With time ticking off the clock, the buzzer sounded and the home team found itself behind 5-2 through two periods of play. In the third, both netminders were solid and there were no goals scored until late in the frame. With 35 seconds remaining, Lanigan was able to connect with the man advantage as Symenuk and Bricker assisted on assistant captain Elliot Peterson's goal to make it 6-2 Pirates.

That score would hold up the rest of the way and Watrous dropped to 0-1 on the year while Lanigan collected the road victory.

particularly hard," Minister Responsible for Saskatchewan Liquor and Gaming Authority Jim Reiter said. "These regulatory changes will provide additional service options for liquor-permitted restaurants and retailers to consider."

The province's 900 liquor-permitted restaurants will be able to provide delivery of food/

alcohol orders without obtaining a separate home delivery permit. This includes beer, wine, mixed cocktails and growlers, providing a range of options for restaurants to best serve their customer preferences. While restaurants will be able to sell alcohol with food orders for takeout/delivery, they will not be authorized to operate as full scale liquor retailers - they cannot establish retail displays or have in-location shopping for takeout alcohol.

In addition, the province's approximately 620 Retail Store Permittees will have the ability to provide home delivery of alcohol without having to apply and pay for a separate home delivery permit.

"Customers have new expectations about access and convenience when it comes to the way alcohol is sold in the province," Reiter said. "We will continue to look for ways to modernize liquor regulations while also balancing social responsibility and acknowledging the roles of the province's different liquor permittees."

## Gebhard suits up for second season in Sweden



