Imperial Arena project virtually complete

Through substantial donations and federal and provincial funding along with countless hours of volunteering from residents of the community, Imperial's arena has been transformed into a multi-use facility that can now be used during the entire year.

Town of Imperial Administrator Joslin Freeman who has been a big supporter of the project graciously spent a bit of time sharing about how the major renovation has gone and the importance of it.

After starting renovations at the arena in Imperial, how has the progress been since early summer?

The rink has progressed along as well as it could. On Oct. 6, 2022 the concrete was poured and there was a small ceremony to install a 'lucky' Town of Imperial pin at centre ice. As of Nov. 18 the ice is in and lines are painted. There are a few small things that we are still waiting for. There is some netting required and a few small pieces of custom glass but once the netting is up the ice will be available for use.

What types of things were conducted at the arena as part of the project?

The entire inside of the arena was gutted. We had a longtime hockey fan pass away last year and there were donations made in his honour to the arena. That money was used to install new tin on all the walls in memory of Gary Mooney. Walls and beams were painted a bright white.

As far as the ice surface itself, a new concrete slab was poured in the entire





RCMP reminding people to lock their vehicles

Winter hasn't even officially started yet (despite the recent frigid temperatures), and Saskatchewan RCMP detachments are already getting reports of vehicles being stolen while they're running with the keys inside.

One individual in Southern Saskatchewan not only had their running vehicle stolen last week – they also lost their cell phone and other personal items left in it.

If you need to warm up your vehicle during cold weather, consider installing and using a remote vehicle starter, locking the running vehicle with a spare set of keys or using a wheel lock device. Last – if it's at all possible, don't leave your vehicle out of your sight while it's running.

at around 4 a.m. and was showing signs of medical distress due to the extreme cold. He was transported to hospital for treatment. He was later charged for resisting arrest and breach of his probation order, and was released for court at a later date.

“Our primary concern in any situation is the well-being of everyone involved. This man felt it necessary to run from the responding officers, but once they realized that he wasn't safely equipped to be outdoors in that weather, their focus shifted from locating him for arrest to ensuring his safety. This includes seeking medical assistance for him once he was located,” said Humboldt RCMP Sgt. Rielly Knock. “Having

nearby Police Dog Services available to help is of great assistance in all sorts of situations.”

“The detachment members recognized this man's life could be in danger and began an intense search for him. RCMP Police Dog Services are here to help out – anywhere in the province – in situations like this,” said Sgt. David McClarty of Saskatchewan RCMP Police Dog Services. “I'm happy that Nazz and his handler, who are new to Police Dog Services and are based out of Melfort, were able to help locate this male safely.”



Creamy Scalloped Potatoes

Ingredients:

1/3 cup finely chopped onion
5 tbsp. butter
5 tbsp. flour
1 tsp. salt
1/2 tsp. pepper
5 cups milk
6 to 7 cups thinly sliced potatoes
1/2 cup finely chopped cooked bacon

Directions:

In large saucepan sauté onion in butter until tender but not browned. Stir in flour, salt and pepper until well blended. Gradually add milk, bring to a boil, cook about two minutes until sauce is thickened. Add the cooked bacon. Place half of the potatoes in a three quart baking dish, pour half the sauce over, then potatoes and remaining sauce. Bake uncovered for 60 to 70 minutes. You can sprinkle cheese over the top for the remaining 15 minutes of the baking time. Poke with a fork to ensure potatoes are tender, the time to bake will depend on how thinly you sliced the potatoes.

Dirty secrets about germs and bacteria! Part one of three

True or false

1. The number one way that germs get passed is through improper hygiene.

Answer: Sick of hearing it, but it is true. Wash your hands thoroughly before cooking, after touching raw meat, fish, or chicken and especially after visiting the bathroom. Most food borne illnesses are related to improper hand washing after going to the bathroom. If hand washing facilities are not available, wetting napkins or sanitizers will reduce the germs on your hands but will not eliminate them.

2. Best way to prevent food poisoning is to eat many, many unwashed apples.

Answer: False. Raw meat and poultry, eggs, fish and unwashed fruit and vegetables can all carry germs. Thoroughly cooking food and performing scrupulous kitchen

Dear Heather:

clean-up are the primary ways to prevent food poisoning.

3. Toilet seats contain more germs than anywhere else in the home.

Answer: False. According to studies done by the University of Arizona, the following objects are the biggest collectors and spreaders of germs: telephones (especially cellphones), desktop surfaces, keyboards, mouse, photocopiers and toilet seats in that order. Cellphones are worse than desk phones because they are often kept in pockets where it is nice and warm, which is just what germs need to breed fast. Since germs are passed from our hands as we touch things and since we continually touch the phone, cellphone, keyboard, mouse and tops of our desks, we continually move the germs from one place to another.

Did you know? According to recent studies, cell phones have 400 times more germs than toilets?

4. Germs are found mainly in the homes of people who never clean.

Answer: False. Germs are found all over the world, in all kinds of places. There are four major types of germs: bacteria, viruses, fungi, and protozoa. They can invade plants, animals and people and sometimes they make us sick.

5. Cutting boards need to be kept clean.

Answer: Please tell me that you said true. We may not need to go overboard on cleaning the entire house but cutting boards if not sanitized properly may pose a problem. Cutting boards can harbour harmful bacteria in cracks and knife grooves, particularly after cutting meat or poultry. A good procedure for disinfecting both wood and plastic cutting boards, as well as other surfaces and utensils, is to spray them first with a mist of vinegar, then with a mist of hydrogen peroxide. This combo kills bacteria on meat without hurting the food.

Canucks take aim at new season

Looking to build off of last year when the team advanced to the Long Lake Hockey League final while also capturing a provincial championship, the Drake Canucks began the 2022-23 campaign at home against the Davidson Cyclones.

With a similar lineup to that of last season, the Canucks tallied first as Maguire Blair assisted on a Daigon Elmy marker to make it 1-0 with 5:53 left in period one. Down by one, Davidson responded with 54 seconds remaining as Isaac Jackson tied the contest heading into period two.

In the second, it was the visitors who found the score

Health Human Resources Action Plan making progress

The Ministry of Health, Saskatchewan Health Authority (SHA) and partners continue to advance key initiatives under the four pillars of Saskatchewan's Health Human Resources Action Plan. As part of active recruitment efforts, a delegation is heading to Manila, Philippines on a five-day mission to actively promote Saskatchewan's health care employment opportunities.

Minister Merriman will lead the delegation and will be joined by government officials and representatives from the Saskatchewan Health Authority, Saskatchewan's two universities and

Saskatchewan Polytechnic.

"I am honoured to lead Saskatchewan's delegation on this important mission that builds on our province's strong and meaningful relationship with the Philippines," Minister of Health Paul Merriman said. "I look forward to connecting with leadership within the Philippine government and discussing how we can work together in health care and other areas. I'm also looking forward to meeting members of Saskatchewan's future health care workforce as our government works to strengthen health services across the province."

The minister will participate in targeted meetings with key officials

from a number of partner agencies to reinforce the province's important relationship with the Philippines and explore innovative opportunities to strengthen the partnership. The mission will also advance long-term collaboration and exchanges between Saskatchewan and Philippine post-secondary institutions on curriculum, alignment of nurse training programs and the development of pathways to fast-track Filipino health sciences graduates into the Saskatchewan labour market.

Saskatchewan's Health Human Resources (HHR) Action Plan continues to make progress in a number of important areas under the four pillars to recruit, train, incentivize and retain more health care workers in the province.

• The delegation will host a series of information sessions for hundreds of Filipino health care workers interested in moving to Saskatchewan. Sessions will assist potential recruits with the licensing and regulatory process, immigration process, relocation supports and other information.

• The SHA will conduct in-person interviews with the goal of extending conditional job offers to qualified candidates.

• An interactive web page <https://www.saskatchewan.ca/HHR-Philippines> dedicated to the mission has generated a high level of interest

among a Philippine health care workers audience. About 3,000 applications have been received for information sessions and over 1,600 registrations have been confirmed to attend the information sessions.

• Four Ukrainian newcomers have been hired into the health care workforce.

• Twenty offers have been extended by the SHA to candidates from the Philippines for Continuing Care Assistant positions and two for Medical Lab Assistant positions.

• Seventy Registered Nurse (RN) candidates from the Philippines have begun the process to join Saskatchewan's workforce. An additional 40 Filipino applicants are working through the process with the assistance of Saskatchewan experts and officials.

• A Navigator has been hired to assist internationally educated

area with a new poly fusion cooling system. New dasher boards were installed and the town reused the existing glass that was removed in March to keep costs down.

The players' boxes and penalty boxes are all new and much larger. A wheelchair accessible ramp was installed to access the ice surface area and viewing area.

What is left to be done at the arena and when do you hope everything will be wrapped up?

As with any renovation project it's the little things left and with the way the supply issue is in the world right now we are at hurry up and wait. But we think we will be able to open the arena once the netting is installed which was scheduled to be either last week or this coming week. **Were you able to access grants and funding for the project and how much was the overall cost?**

This project was made possible through an Investing in Canada's Infrastructure Program. It was an \$877,285 project with the town funding 26.67 percent. That comes with a project cost of \$233,971. This

project now turns what was once just a hockey rink into a multi-use facility. It can be used year round now instead of only five months out of the year when the ice was in.

How important is the facility to the community?

Any rink is the hub of a small town, it is where people come to gather to watch some hockey but also to catch up. It is where seniors will pop down to watch some curling and have coffee with someone they haven't seen in a while. It is where the grandparents come to cheer on their grandkids. It is also the place where the kids gather to skate, play shinny and build long-term friendships and it is a place for the love of the game.

How integral have the volunteers been with the project?

Volunteers are the MOST VALUABLE asset a community can have. There has been hours and hours and hours of volunteer time put in for this project and we cannot thank those people enough. From young kids to seniors, they have all played a vital role in making this project

happen. Brysand who is the contractor on the project said they have never seen a project of this size with so many volunteers to make it happen. Great job Imperial be proud! Again, thank you. **Is there anything else you would like to add?**

Bring on the mochas and let the games

begin! Also like to remind everyone of the annual rec hockey tournament that will be making a return on Jan. 13 and 14. It is the largest fundraiser our arena sees in a year so please come down and let the good times roll. Also keep watch for a grand opening in the spring to kick off the multi-use facility!

Federal government approves Sask. output-based performance standards program

The provincial government received confirmation that a provincial plan has been approved to replace the federally imposed carbon tax on industrial emitters in the province, effective Jan. 1, 2023. The Saskatchewan Output-Based Performance Standards (OBPS) Program meets the requirements for the 2023-2030 federal carbon pricing benchmark, including the addition of the electricity generation and natural gas transmission pipeline sectors.

All industrial carbon taxes will now stay in Saskatchewan, saving Saskatchewan industry (and the jobs and families these industries support) an estimated \$3.7 billion in federal carbon taxes between now and 2030 compared to federal carbon pricing.

"Now more than ever, the world needs food and energy security – and that means the world needs Saskatchewan and our clean and sustainable, food, fuel and fertilizer," Environment Minister Dana Skoropad said. "This is not the time for federal climate policies that risk undermining our economic growth and prosperity. Our plan will allow industries to grow and operate sustainably while maintaining our economic competitiveness as a province."

With industrial carbon pricing under provincial control, the number of facilities in Saskatchewan's OBPS Program is expected to double by 2030. Regulated emitters will receive credit for every tonne of carbon emissions under their permitted amount, creating incentives to reduce emissions.

"We're very pleased to hear the announcement and appreciate the Saskatchewan Ministry of Environment and Climate Change Canada for all of the efforts taken to date," Director of Regulatory Affairs and Sustainability for Mosaic Jessica Theriault said. "This decision will not only contribute to ensuring that our Mosaic sites in Saskatchewan remain competitive around the world, but further supports our ESG commitments and continued role in helping to feed the world."

The Saskatchewan OBPS Program will also include credit for carbon capture, utilization and storage (CCUS), which supports Saskatchewan's CCUS strategy. Regulated emitters will have the option to pay into the Saskatchewan Technology Fund, which will create incentives for industry to develop and implement technologies that contribute to meaningful reductions in greenhouse gas emissions intensity.

Leonard Mattson, aged 75 years, passed away at St. Paul's Hospital, Saskatoon, Sask. on Sunday, November 13, 2022.

Leonard Roy Mattson was born Feb. 2 1947 to Irene McInnis in Fort William, Ont. Together they moved to Makaw, Sask. when he was four months old and lived with his grandparents. Later his mom Irene met and married Ward Mattson. They moved to Viscount where Leonard stayed and attended school before moving to Meacham to stay with his Aunt and Uncle Jeannie and Leonce Derosiers. Through his lifetime he worked and ran heavy equipment for various companies. For many years he was foreman and superintendent for oil leases in Alberta and laying fibre optics throughout Saskatchewan. Wanting to be closer to his family, he then became foreman and grader operator for RM of McCraney until his retirement. He met and married Veronica Pongracz and had been together for 52 years. First living in Jansen, then Drake and then moving to the farm at Plunkett where they raised their two boys Jason and Jarvis. While in Plunkett he belonged to the Plunkett Drama Club, started a Beaver and Cubs group and coached hockey in Viscount. He would also rent the hall in Plunkett and put on dances for all the kids. He played Santa for many years and loved listening to all the kid's wishes. In 1989, their little family moved to Manitou Beach where they lived for a short year and then moved to Watrous where he resided until his passing. Nothing meant more to him than his family. He would spend hours pulling the grandchildren around behind the boat on the lake and in winter pulling them on the sled. He would pick them up after school to go for a treat, and after a few years patiently teaching them to drive so they could take him for treats. \$50,000 over three years for a return-of-service agreement in Meadow Lake, Wilkie, Kamsack and Weyburn. This is part of the Rural and Remote Recruitment Incentive that aims to attract new employees to targeted positions in rural and remote areas.

- The Ministry of Health has approved 111 Clinical Placement Bursaries for students in an eligible health discipline between April and November 2022.

- The SHA engages regularly with nursing students by providing updates, creating connections, hosting in-person engagement events and more recently the new Grad Nurse Expression of Interest initiative.

Retain

- Progress has been made in implementing new full-time positions and expanding part-time positions to full-time positions in nine high-priority classifications in rural and remote locations experiencing service disruptions.

- Sixty-six positions have been staffed.
- Sixty-four positions are in the hiring process.
- Watrous, Kipling and Big River have been added to the list of eligible locations. There are now a total of 50 rural and remote locations targeted for additional staffing.
- The peer-to-peer clinical support program and staff retention programs are currently being developed.
- Delegates and physician recruiters attended the

national Family Medicine and Psychiatry recruitment fairs in Ontario in November.

"We're working aggressively to address the pressing need for more health care staff, especially in high demand occupations and rural and remote areas," Minister of Rural and Remote Health Everett Hindley said. "We're spreading the word far and wide that opportunities are available at every stage, from recent graduates to experienced professionals from here and abroad. Saskatchewan is a great place to build your career and enjoy a high quality of life."

An advertising and marketing campaign to promote available opportunities and attract health care workers started in September, and will continue into the winter with testimonials of several health care professionals who have built a successful career in Saskatchewan. A commercial aired during the Grey Cup reached a large national audience.

Details on health care opportunities, how to access them and more information on the province's Health Human Resources Action Plan are available at saskatchewan.ca/HHR. The website has had over 100,000 views since it was launched in September.

Saskatchewan's HHR Action Plan announced in September will invest over \$60 million and add more than 1,000 health professionals into the health system over the next few years.
