





New walking trail ready as date for ribbon cutting set

With some beautiful fall weather, work on the new walking trail joining Watrous and Manitou Beach not only progressed but the project is now essentially completed.

Planning to have a ribbon cutting and soft opening of the trail Oct. 21, local resident Ron Ediger who took care of the project along with his company Melron Services Ltd. is looking forward to seeing it utilized. "The walking trail is totally complete and sand sealed and we were fortunate to get it all wrapped up. Everything is done except for some signage but that will be installed prior to the soft opening."

Meeting with the Town of Watrous and Resort Village of Manitou Beach, Ediger said dignitaries will be on hand at the start of the new trail near the Watrous Rotary gazebo, landfill road and Watrous Cemetery at 2 p.m. Oct. 21 to cut the ribbon.

"After the ribbon cutting people are welcome to do a test walk. Along with the dignitaries, we will have a couple people from Watrous and a couple from Manitou Beach present at the ceremony because they are continuous walkers and always using it. Having three families donate benches in memory of loved ones along the trail has also been really tremendous and appreciated and we would sure like everyone from the communities to come and check it out if they can."

Excited to reach a conclusion on the substantial project, Ediger feels the walking trail will be uplifting for both Watrous and Manitou Beach. "This goes to show that we can put the town and village together, and joining with the Rotary Walking Trail, we can bring the two communities together as one."

Along with seeing both places bridged together, the completion of the trail also marks the 25th anniversary of Melron Services Ltd. "Twenty-five years ago I came here with a single backhoe and this community and the area has been so good to us. I always like to give back to the communities who have supported me for those 25 years and the people around here for miles have been good to me. I also want to thank everyone, especially my staff, who have helped me to be able to do this. I have had a

lot of support that way as well."

After a soggy start to spring delaying progress on the walking trail, nicer weather in the summer and fall allowed staff at Melron Services Ltd. to get everything wrapped up in October.

Seeing a need to create a trail that essentially joins Watrous and Manitou Beach, Ediger wanted to help make it happen after the Watrous Rotary along with generous sponsors and volunteers created a pair of trails for residents and visitors to use near Watrous. The new trail, which Ediger has covered the entire cost of, spans approximately three kilometres between the two communities.

Extending northeast from the first trail originally completed by the Wa-

trous Rotary, the third trail continues past a gazebo toward the Watrous Cemetery. Walkers can veer off the gravel road as the new trail will take them along a corner of the cemetery to the main gates. From there walkers can cross Hwy. 365 to the other side of the trail. Once across, the trail runs alongside Hwy. 365 toward Manitou Beach. Reaching the turnoff to Murray Disc Golf, Ediger extended a portion of that gravel road which wraps around a slough and into a field. "We have received permission from the owners to use part of their land which was really generous so we have the trail running right next to the slough and then toward the farmyard."

At the farmyard, a path has been cut near the hedges adjacent to the highway and a six foot barrier in-

stalled on the other side to allow privacy from the yard site. The trail then continues alongside the highway running between a pasture and signs at the entrance to the Resort Village of Manitou Beach. Creating walking space near another home, the trail goes through a treed area before reaching the Manitou and District Regional Park Campground. With room around some hedges, the trail leads walkers by the entrance of the park and then out in front of The Drive-In at Manitou Beach where a path is currently

being used. Redoing that path, Ediger explained the trail will come to a conclusion at Lakeview Avenue, near the Resort Village of Manitou Beach's office and Manitou Mini Golf.

"Having the trail end there provides people an opportunity to take in the nearby attractions or they can continue along to the beach," said Ediger.

Following the soft opening and ribbon cutting of the new walking trail, Ediger said once spring arrives, there will be an official opening with other dignitaries in attendance.





Mackenzie arrested in Halifax on Canada-wide warrant

On Sept. 28, 2022, at approximately 2 p.m. (AST), officers of the RCMP/Halifax Regional Police Integrated Criminal Investigation Division arrested 36-year-old Jeremy MacKenzie at a home in Cole Harbour, N.S.

As a result of this investigation, Jeremy Mackenzie was in police custody and was scheduled to appear in court in Saskatchewan Oct. 3, 2022.

The Saskatchewan RCMP Provost unit assisted in the transport of Mackenzie pursuant to Sec. 503(3)(b) of the Criminal Code, from Halifax, N.S., to Saskatoon, Sask. within the six-day remand time. The Saskatchewan RCMP Provost unit's involvement in this transport follows routine protocol for partner police agencies requiring assistance.

The Saskatchewan RCMP would like to thank partner police agencies including the RCMP/Halifax Regional Police Integrated Criminal Investigation Division for their assistance with this investigation.

Look What's Cooking by Laura Novecosky

Apple Crisp

Ingredients:

4 to 5 apples
4 tbsp. brown sugar
1 tbsp. molasses
2 tbsp. water
1 tsp. cinnamon
2 tsp. vanilla

Directions:

Wash, core, slice and peel apples (I do not peel apples from local trees as I find the skins are tender). Mix the other ingredients together and toss with apples in casserole dish or deep cake pan. Make the following topping and pat over the apples.

3/4 cup whole wheat flour (white is okay too)

2/3 cup brown sugar

1/2 cup chopped walnuts

1/2 cup oatmeal (instant is okay but regular oatmeal is better)

5 to 6 tbsp. softened butter

Mix topping ingredients together, blending with a fork. Pat gently over the apples. Bake at 375°F for 35 to 40 minutes.

taste. Bold, strong flavours include aged cheddars, Gruyère, spiced cheeses and blue cheeses. Milder flavours include Colby, mozzarella, young Brie, fresh goat cheese and Havarti.

• Certain cheese freezes well such as Camembert, Brie and goat cheese. Simply place them in a sealable bag or a good quality plastic container to freeze. Defrost them in the fridge; they will still taste great for at least two months. Drier cheeses such as cheddar or Parmesan do not freeze as well, some of the flavour and texture is compromised.

• Use dental floss to slice super soft cheeses. Lay the floss under the cheese, pull it up and cross both ends to slice off pieces without squishing the block.

• When making homemade pizza keep your crust crispy by sprinkling it with cheese before adding sauce.

• Colour cream cheese with liquid food colouring when using the cheese to fill rolled sandwiches. Use a variety of colours for every layer; slice it as you would a jelly roll.

• Cream cheese will last longer if you store it upside down to create a secondary seal.

• After slicing a block of cheese, rub the cut end with a layer of butter to prevent it from becoming hard.

• I love making grilled cheese sandwiches, but I do not like to use my oven and I do not own a toaster oven. What I do instead is lay my toaster on its side and then put the toast with the cheese layers in the slots. I have perfectly grilled cheese every time. I also lay a cutting board under the toaster so that my counter is not full of crumbs. Do not add too much cheese or the cheese

will spill over the edges. Submitted by: Beth

• Most cheese experts agree that storing cheese in plastic wrap is not recommended. Results show that it loses some of its flavour and takes on the flavour of the plastic wrap.

• It is not necessary to store all cheese in the fridge. Hard cheeses can be stored in a cool room with a constant temperature of 8 to 15°C, while soft and blue cheeses should be refrigerated at a temperature of 5 to 8°C. About an hour before serving, take the cheese out of the fridge or cool room and let it reach room temperature.

• I do not own a stove because I live in residence at university. I make grilled cheese sandwiches by wrapping them with foil and pressing them with a warm fabric iron. Submitted by: Davis

• Whenever we cook Kraft Dinner, we always have leftovers. I do not want to throw them out, but it never tastes as good after being reheated. I have discovered how to keep the leftovers tasting great. For two cups of leftovers, I add one-quarter cup of shredded cheese and one egg. Scoop the mixture into a muffin pan sprayed with non-stick spray and sprinkle with bread crumbs. When I want to eat the leftovers I bake them in the oven at 425°F for eight to 10 minutes.

• Give grilled cheese sandwiches a unique flavour by smearing the inside with mayonnaise instead of butter.

• Standing in a hot kitchen grating cheese for hours has forced me to come up with an easier way to do my job. Instead of standing a grater up, I lay it on its side and use it to grate cheese. The position is easier on my arms and the result is less messy. Submitted by: Mimi

Neighbourly advice according to Ed

On a treadmill, we exercise by walking or running on a machine. We cover a distance while staying in one place. Sin is like being on a treadmill that starts us walking or running at

a low and manageable level. Sin is exhilarating enough to get us stuck going around and around in what keeps us from getting off the treadmill. Sin gets us dizzy, exhausted, and out of breath, but it will not slow down and let us get off the machine. Sin makes us reckless and unable to stop what we are doing. We need God to help us use the stop button on our sinful workout routines.

The Christian life is admitting we need God because sin comes naturally to us and we do not know our sinfulness except by God's word,

which shows what sin is in our lives. Like sheep, we get lost and hurt without the protection of a shepherd. Shepherds take care of their flock of sheep. Each sheep in a flock needs to be accounted for to know if one is lost. Shepherds led their flock to a sheep pen or fold for the night. There they could be protected from the attack of natural animal predators and human thieves. They could sleep and rest safely with their shepherd keeping watch over them.

The Pharisees and the law teachers criticized Jesus for welcoming tax collectors and sinners

who gathered to him to hear him speak. They also carped about Jesus eating with sinners. So, Jesus told his critics to consider how there is great joy and rejoicing when what is lost is found, notably a sinner who repents.

Jesus asked his critics to think about being a shepherd who finds a lost sheep and returns it to his flock. It is a great reason for the shepherd to be pleased and eager to share his joy with his friends and neighbours. The shepherd had 99 sheep safe out of his flock of 100 and he did not need to rejoice about

their safety. However, he needed to rejoice that the one lost sheep was found and brought again to the flock's safety. Likewise, Jesus states that heaven has great joy over a sinner who repents more than the 99 who do not need to repent.

Jesus also tells his detractors that if a woman has 10 silver coins and loses one, she will set to work to find the lost coin. She searches carefully and when she finds the lost coin she is relieved and thrilled. The woman will call her friends and neighbours to rejoice with her because she has

found her lost coin. She is not joyous about her nine coins that are not lost but about the lost one being found.

Jesus said, "In the same way, I tell you, there is rejoicing in the presence of the angels of God over one sinner who repents." (Luke 15:10). The Pharisees and teachers of the law could not understand that Jesus did not come to call the righteous, but sinners to repentance. God loves sinners. He and heaven rejoice when a sinner repents. He is mighty to rescue the lost and quiet them with his loving safety. (Zephaniah 3:17)

On a beautiful Thursday evening, the Winston Wildcats hosted the Hanley Sabres as part of an under the lights game. With the blue and gold coming off recent wins over Davidson, Assiniboia and Caronport, the team turned its focus toward Hanley Sept. 29.

With a fairly young roster for 2022, the Wildcats went to work in the opening half, but partway through the second quarter, found themselves down 16-8. Despite being down, the home team replied with a major late in the frame before the Sabres were able to add to its lead with 1:45 to go. Down 24-14 and with time running out in the first half, Watrous pushed the ball down field and adding a touchdown, trailed by just two after two.

After a punt by the Wildcats late in the quarter, Hanley began at its own 20-yard-line with 1:02 to play. Aided by a penalty, the Sabres moved the chains but after an incomplete pass on second down and another toss going incomplete on third down,

the Wildcats would regain possession with 39 seconds left. In victory formation, Watrous quarterback Kade Thomas would run the clock out and the blue and gold would take a 38-32 victory under the lights.

With fans filling the bleachers and sidelines opposite of the two teams, head coach of the Winston Wildcats Barry Croshaw

said the whole night was a great experience. "There was such tremendous support from our community in terms of not only all the people that came to watch but also the awesome financial support we got from all of our sponsors as well as the parents that helped get the lights into and out of the city."

As far as the game itself, Croshaw felt the team played its best of the year against a very good Hanley crew. "We moved the ball very well on offence and our defence played well and

with the exception of a few long plays, really were solid. I think if we keep making improvements weekly it will bode well for us in the upcoming month."

Following a scheduled

exhibition game in Rosetown Oct. 7, Croshaw said league playoffs begin at home this weekend but as of early last week, was not sure if it will be a Friday or Saturday game.



WHEN AND HOW TO USE A FIRE Extinguisher

Most fires start small, but can triple in size in just 1 minute. Knowing how to operate the fire extinguisher and practicing ahead of time can help you act fast in case of a fire emergency.



1 – FIGHT OR FLEE

IF YOU HAVE ANY DOUBT, GET OUT!




IF YOU DISCOVER A FIRE SOUND THE ALARM IMMEDIATELY


- If the fire is contained to a single object, you may want to use a fire extinguisher.
- Alert your family members of the fire FIRST before using the fire extinguisher.
- Make sure your escape route is not blocked by the fire in case it grows too large.

2 – CALL THE FIRE DEPARTMENT

Call 911 rather than calling the fire department directly, they will be able to contact and send the correct emergency services.



3 – USING THE EXTINGUISHER



Remember to PASS

Pull the pin - Aim at the base of the fire - Squeeze the Lever - Sweep the nozzle from side to side.

Important Notes on Fire Extinguishers

- When you buy a fire extinguisher, look for one labeled A-B-C, this type can put out most fires that may happen in a home.
- Make sure you buy a fire extinguisher that you are able to hold and operate. Some can be quite large and heavy and may hinder your ability to put out the fire.
- Keep your fire extinguisher easily accessible.
- Read the directions and know how to operate the fire extinguisher. You won't have time to read the directions when a fire starts.

4 – AFTER THE FIRE

Once the fire has been fully extinguished, and your moment of triumph has passed, you may realize you're left with big mess. When cleaning, make sure you wear gloves and eye protection as the extinguishing agent can be mildly corrosive and may irritate or harm your skin. The best way to clean up the foam is with a vacuum. Use a damp cloth to clean any remaining foam or residue. You may need to use an air freshener or odour-eliminating products to get rid of the harsh smell of the extinguishing foam. **Don't forget to replace your fire extinguisher!**

The Battle With the Snow



One of the heaviest snowfalls in recent years had blanketed the prairies when the recently appointed full-time chairman of the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation, Mr. A. Davidson Dunton, of Montreal, arrived to begin a tour through the principal centres of this region. Travelling from Saskatoon to Watrous (62½ miles on the main line of the CNR) Mr. Dunton came "the long way around," journeying to Colonsay and Renown, then completing the trip in Dr. Stipe's snowmobile, piloted by Pete Pawluk. Even the snowmobile did not quite make it. Here it is, at a point about six miles out of Watrous, firmly ensconced in the ditch.
