WHS teacher honoured with prestigious award

Recognized for his tremendous work as an educator through teaching, modelling the beliefs and ideals of the profession and contributing positively to publicly-funded public education, Winston High School vice-principal and teacher Doug Thomas was one of four teachers recently bestowed with an Excellence in Teaching award.

Honoured along with Cindy Plascko of St. Brieux School, Dana Knight of Humboldt Public School, and Dawn Goosen of Humboldt Collegiate Institute during Horizon School Division's annual opening day celebration in August, Thomas said the experience was humbling. "There are many that are equally deserving. I thank God that I have been able to do my best with the opportunities I have been given and that I have received so much support and encouragement along the way, both professionally and personally."

Chosen by a four person selection committee with each nomination accompanied by letters of support, when Thomas was notified he had received the Excellence in Teaching award, the vice-principal

explained it was a huge honour. "At the same time, though the moment was special, you keep moving forward to the next thing. In the midst of school start-up, the Wildcat football season, and managing the rest of life, I have not really taken the time to reflect. I just keep doing what I have most always done! I guess it must, to a certain extent, be working."

With a passion for teaching, enjoying connecting with those in the education sector and having the unique opportunity to make a positive impact on young people, Thomas shared, "I embrace the responsibility of the role, especially in a smaller community, where we rarely get to take the "teacher" hat off. I count that a privilege. I am okay with being called Mr. Thomas at the rink!"

Growing up in Kamsack, following a degree at the University of Saskatchewan, Thomas began his teaching career in Biggar. Nearly 10 years later, along with his family, Doug arrived in Watrous and has been teaching at the high school ever since.

"Winston High School is a special school in a wonderful community. During our 15 years, I have continually been in



awe of the support and encouragement we receive from the families and community. It is a pleasure to work with all the students and staff. I cannot imagine there are many schools in our province that can match the "vibe" of Winston."

Citing there has been many challenges but also many moments of great joy in seeing students meet a goal, looking back, Thomas indicated his teaching career has been a rewarding one. "Every once in a while, you get to stand alongside a young person who needs a boost or a little extra care and you know you are making a difference. What a special

feeling that is!"

It has been that dedication, effort and positive impact that has not been lost on his colleagues at Winston High School. Teaching and coaching alongside Thomas over the years, principal Terry

Preserving a landmark while honouring his heritage

Needing a little care and proud of his Norwegian heritage, when former resident Nils Selnes visited Watrous in 2022 and noticed a dilapidated Mandal sign, a marker acknowledging where the community once sat before it relocated and became known as Watrous, he felt the need to do something.

So in 2023, returning to Watrous to celebrate his mother-in-law Renie McKay's 101st birthday, seeing nothing had changed with the sign's condition, he took it upon himself to restore it. Talking with local resident Murray Westby, Selnes indicated he was willing


to provide the paint and labour to touch up the historic marker. With approval from the Town of Watrous, the now B.C. resident began working on the project to bring it back to life.

"Most of the work was scraping and getting rid of the rust," said Selnes who turns 81 in October. "I think it looks good now. I wanted a little blue on there as well because the flag of Norway is red, white and blue but blue didn't show up very good."


Using yellow instead of the blue, after applying one coat of paint in September with a second coat in October, the sign can now be easily viewed from nearby Hwy. 2. "I am proud of the history of Mandal and of my heritage and I wanted to do this."

The site where the Mandal sign sits just west of Watrous near Hwy. 2 signifies the beginnings of what is now Watrous. According to Prairie Reflections, the community's history book, on Nov. 11, 1903, B.B. Haaland, T.N. Bjorndahl, and T. Odne journeyed from Davidson by democrat to the Manitou Lake district looking for homesteads.

Finding land just south




Mr. Bjorndahl came out in 1905 to settle at a point not far from the present day Watrous, Sask. He and the settlers around him got together and agreed to call the place Mandal. Above is the Mandal post office, tar paper siding and all, as it looked in 1906.




Mr. Bjorndahl built a store at Mandal and it is seen in the above photo standing (right) beside the drug store and Dr. White's office. Presumably that is the good doctor standing in front of his office in the coonskin coat. Note fancy store front.

Then came the steel laying gangs working in summer and working in winter to push the railway through in a booming country. This photo shows the gang at work near Watrous. But something went wrong — the GTP railway decided to make Watrous a divisional point. Sooo----



With the help of about 12 horses, 10 men and a pair of mules, Mr. Bjorndahl loaded his store on wagons and moved it into Watrous, the new divisional point.

hometown in Norway.

Learning of the settlement after arriving to the area from Norway when he was 20 years old, Selnes felt the name was fitting. "Mandal is the most southern city in Norway. A lot of people from the Mandal area came to Watrous before the

railroad came."

With many early settlers calling Mandal home in the 1900s, the prairie place began to rapidly grow. T.N. Bjorndahl opened up a general store and blacksmith shop and the

“RCMP Report”

Humboldt/Lanigan/Watrous RCMP temporary amalgamation

Meetings have been held and conversations are ongoing with local leaders of Watrous, Humboldt, and surrounding areas regarding the temporary amalgamation of the Watrous and Humboldt detachments.

The RCMP's number one priority is the safety and security of the public and of its officers and when a policing need is identified, police work to address it. One example is staffing strategies, such as this collaboration between the Watrous and Humboldt detachments, which helps to ensure more officers are on duty at any given time to respond to calls for service.

RCMP do not provide specific resourcing numbers for officer safety reasons. At any given time, some of the officers can be unavailable – members can be on vacation, modified duties, parental leave, training or sick.

The Saskatchewan RCMP are committed to providing the most efficient and effective policing services possible.

Search warrant executed

Saskatchewan RCMP's Yorkton Saskatchewan Trafficking Response Team executed a search warrant in Springside Oct. 6 as part of an ongoing trafficking investigation.

Officers located and seized approximately 198 grams of suspected cocaine, approximately 240 grams of suspected methamphetamine, approximately 40 pharmaceutical-style pills, trafficking paraphernalia, brass knuckles and a stun gun.

An adult male was arrested at the scene. Forty-four-year-old James Lloyd from Yorkton is charged with three counts of possession for the purpose of trafficking, Section 5(2), Controlled Drugs and Substances Act and two counts of possession of a weapon for a dangerous purpose, Section 88(2), Criminal Code. Saskatchewan RCMP's Yorkton Municipal General Investigation Section and Yorkton detachment assisted in this investigation.

Collision near Darvin

At approximately 6:30 p.m. Oct. 7, White Butte RCMP received a report of a collision on Hwy. 48 near Darvin. Investigation determined a truck and a car collided. The drivers of both vehicles passed away at the scene.

The driver of the truck has been identified as a 47-year-old male from Arkansas, USA. The driver of the car has been identified as a 22-year-old female from Kipling, Sask.

Their families have been notified. The adult male passenger of the car was taken to hospital with injuries described as serious. Hwy. 48 was blocked during the initial investigation and response to this collision.

White Butte RCMP continues to investigate with the assistance of a Saskatchewan RCMP collision reconstructionist.

Traffic stop at Chamberlain

Craik RCMP set up a traffic check stop on Hwy. 11 at Chamberlain to promote road safety during the Thanksgiving long weekend. Officers stopped 1,350 vehicles during the check stop, which ran from noon to 4 p.m.

Officers completed 23 impaired driving tests; 14 of the drivers tested positive for cannabis use and were issued roadside suspensions. Two suspended drivers were stopped and ticketed after trying to avoid the check stop. Their vehicles were all towed.

Officers issued seven tickets for infractions like speeding and using a phone while driving, and gave out 21 warnings.

Craik RCMP thanks SGI for assisting with this road safety initiative.

Saskatchewan RCMP participated in Operation Impact from Oct. 6 to 9. This national public awareness campaign, held each Thanksgiving weekend, focuses on eliminating behaviours that put drivers, passengers and other road users at risk: impaired driving due to alcohol, drugs or fatigue, as well as aggressive driving, distracted driving, and driving without a seat belt.

Variations:

For coconut cream add 1/2 cup coconut and 1 tbsp. butter when you remove from the heat.

For chocolate cream pudding add 1/4 cup cocoa to the cornstarch mixture, blending it well.

I then put the puddings into individual serving containers with lids and let cool in the fridge with the lids on.

next spring, Dr. J.H. White opened a drug store. J.J. Abraham and J. Elsworth opened a real estate office while Ole N. Bjoernsdahl started a restaurant and butcher shop. Anton Burke opened a blacksmith shop and the North American Lumber Co. put in a lumberyard. A school board was also elected and the first school was held in a sod shack on the homestead of O. Forgaard. The first church services were organized by the Norwegian Lutherans and conducted at the farm home of Hans Johnson.

Then in the fall of 1906, engineers came through surveying for the Grand Trunk Pacific Railroad. The next year, the townsite was surveyed one mile east of the Village of Mandal. According to the local history book the new location would be more adaptable for railway yards. Following that decision, the Village of Mandal was then moved and the name of the community changed to Watrous by the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway Company. This kept the divisional point name in alphabetical order on the line. Watrous was named after Frank Watrous Morse, the general manager of the Grand Trunk Pacific.

Gone but not forgotten, decades later, Westby shared a reunion was held where it was decided a sign should be created to acknowledge the original settlement. Commissioning a marker, it was welded together, painted and then placed just west of Watrous where Mandal was situated.




And here it is as it looked in Watrous after the trek from Mandal. The store that came to town. Open for business with a hitching post right beside it.

Impressed to learn of the history when he first arrived to the area from Norway, Sernes felt like it was a second home. "I came to Viscount and we worked on a farm there milking cows. We met some people from Watrous when we were in Watrous and they invited us to move there. On July 1, 1964 I moved to Watrous and lived in the community for five years."

Starting a painting company with his partner, it was not long after when Sernes got married to Watrous girl Donna (nee McKay). The couple eventually moved to Regina for 10 years and then after visiting a neighbour in Kelowna, made the decision to move there. Now 40 years later, Sernes returns to Watrous from B.C. to visit family and reconnect.

"It impressed me when I first came here. It is like a little Norway and I enjoy coming back. I was honoured to be able to restore that sign and now when we come back every year, I will keep an eye on it."




