## Unique event

► Marking education week and welcoming students and staff from the elementary and high schools in Watrous, Watrous Manitou Beach Heritage Centre Events Coordinator Carol McIntosh said 214 students and 17 staff visited the local centre. As part of the week, Dan

McIntosh presented a hands-on collection of cameras from 1911 through to present day. ## In remembrance

► Following its first year in 2022, a project to honour local Veterans who fought during the wars returned to Watrous in 2023. After tremendous work and an overwhelming response by the public, crews from the Town of Watrous recently put up the Veteran banners along Main Street and nearby avenues. Watrous Recreation Director Chelsea Murfitt said there are 10 new Veteran banners this

year to bring the total to 32 banners highlighting 64 Veterans.

Murfitt indicated they have been placed two to a pole this year because Main Street currently does not have the new light posts. Because of that, some banners have also been placed down part of 2nd and 3rd avenues.

On display from Oct. 17 to mid-November, Murfitt said for those who would like to add a banner for next year, she will be accepting forms in the new year starting Jan. 8 until mid-February. "If anyone has questions or would like the forms now so that they can have them ready to go for January, please contact me at the town office."

Along with the banners, Murfitt said the Town of Watrous is also beginning another project where they are collecting information and stories about the Veterans who are on the banners. "If anyone would like to take part in this, please contact me. The hope would be to eventually turn all the stories into a book."

## Youth in the spotlight at unique trade and craft show

Providing an opportunity for youth to promote their ideas while learning a few business skills, a unique trade show is taking place in Watrous Friday, Oct. 27.

Held at the Watrous Anglican Church Hall from 4 to 8 p.m., 13 vendors of all ages have signed up for the Youth Entrepreneur Trade and Craft Show with the potential to include one or two more.

Organizer Cindy Mclean who brought the idea to the community said there will be a variety of talents on display. "Some of the items that our young entrepreneurs will be selling include repurposed crayons, sewing items like scrunchies and bags, baking, crocheting items, bracelets and jewelry, 3D printed items like keychains, small toys and containers, wheat bags and fabric baby books, cardboard props and pop culture art, bookmarks, slime, paintings and more!"

With a silver collection or any non-perishable food item accepted for admission (all being passed along to the Watrous and District Food Bank), Mclean shared the idea for the youth entrepreneur show came from a craft show in Saskatoon. "There was a youth and entrepreneur space at a spring craft


show at St. Martin's Church in Saskatoon. Brandy Emmerich at St. Martin's United Church featured a space for youth looking to share their ideas. They host a few markets a year and their Christmas market did not fit into our schedule but I thought why not try one here? She deserves the credit for originally creating this opportunity in Watrous."

Springboarding off the local flea market and a vendor space at the Manitou Beach Chainsaw Carving Festival where kids could take part and gain encouragement and visibility, Mclean feels the Oct. 27 event in Watrous can do the same.

"It gives them a chance to interact with the community in a new way. It also gives them a chance to develop some financial skills and learn a little about what the costs associated with business look like. I don't

think it's ever too early to start developing a child's financial literacy."

Encouraging the community to attend, Mclean added the goal is to see everyone have a memorable time with hopes the show will grow. "Maybe more youth in rural areas will be given a chance to develop their ideas and have a trade show of their own. I also want to extend my appreciation to The Watrous Manitou for partnering with us and providing advertising and exposure for the youth. I am also grateful to the local RBC Branch and Affinity Credit Union for providing our vendors with some take home materials. Having that added support allows us to provide a fun and unique opportunity for the youth and I am really looking forward to the trade show. I hope to see a lot of people come out and support them."

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# “RCMP Report”

## RCMP seeking information about death

On Oct. 16, 2023, at approximately 4 p.m., Cut Knife RCMP received a report of an individual who passed away located in a rural area on Poundmaker First Nation.

With the assistance of the Saskatchewan Coroners Service, Major Crimes has identified the individual as 31-year-old Lee Bearsears of Little Pine First Nation. His family have been notified.

Major Crimes continue to work diligently to determine the circumstances leading to Lee's death, which investigators have determined is suspicious in nature.

### Report of firearms discharged

On Oct. 12, 2023 at approximately 2:20 p.m., Waskesiu/Montreal Lake RCMP received a report of a firearms discharge outside of a residence on Montreal Lake Cree Nation.

Officers immediately responded and located an injured adult male, who was taken to hospital with injuries described as serious in nature. Investigation determined that there was an altercation between the victim and two other males. A firearm was discharged and the male was injured.

Officers immediately began searching for the suspects.

One was arrested at a residence on Montreal Lake Cree Nation later on Oct. 12. The other was arrested at a residence north of Montreal Lake on Oct. 13.

As a result of investigation, 27-year-old Deon Smith and 29-year-old Justice Bird, both from Montreal Lake Cree Nation are charged with: one count, aggravated assault, Section 268(2), Criminal Code; one count, assault with a weapon, Section 267(1), Criminal Code; and one count, discharge firearm with intent, Section 244, Criminal Code.

### Arrests made

On June 7, 2022, Waskesiu/Montreal Lake RCMP received a report of a sudden death on Montreal Lake Cree Nation. Thirty-three-year-old Chad Bird's death

was determined to be a homicide and Saskatchewan RCMP Major Crimes has been investigating since.

As a result of investigation, on Oct. 14, 2023, 37-year-old Julian Ganton from Prince Albert was arrested in Saskatoon with the assistance of Saskatchewan RCMP's Warrant Enforcement and Suppression Team and Saskatoon Police Service.

Ganton is charged with one count, being an accessory after the fact to murder, Section 240, Criminal Code and one count, driving while prohibited, Section 320.18(1), Criminal Code.

On Oct. 16, 2023, 26-year-old Tristen Naytowhow from Prince Albert was arrested in Prince Albert. He is charged with one count, second degree murder, Section 235(1), Criminal Code and one count, possession of a firearm while prohibited, Section 117.01(1), Criminal Code.

### Collision near Edenburg Road

On Oct. 15, 2023 at approximately 7:45 p.m., Saskatoon RCMP received a report of a collision on Hwy. 41, near the intersection with Edenburg Road.

Investigation determined an SUV and semi collided. The four occupants of the SUV passed away at the scene.

The semi driver did not report injuries to police.

Hwy. 41 was closed during initial investigation but since reopened. Saskatoon RCMP continue to investigate with the assistance of a Saskatchewan RCMP collision reconstructionist.



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## Solutions and Substitutions



### Tips from Reena Nerbas

#### Dear Reena,

How do you remove a yellow stain from a mat on a vinyl floor? Thank you! Julie

#### Dear Julie,

Unfortunately, the yellow stains may be permanent. With so many vinyl and linoleum products on the market, it seems that what works on one does not necessarily work for another. Many people find pouring three percent hydrogen peroxide onto the floor every day for three days is helpful. Other people had

great success by combining one-quarter cup OxiClean with one gallon hot water and pouring the solution onto the area. Another solution is bleach but most experience that this application removes the floor finish and shine. Lastly, mineral spirits is another treatment that people have told me worked for them (test everything on an inconspicuous area first).

#### Dear Reena,

Kindly inform me as to a safe and environmental friendly homemade cleaner for my stainless steel fridge door. There is a streak of something spilled down the front, which cannot be removed by soap and water, vinegar or lemon. Thank you very much, Barb

#### Dear Barbara,

For regular stainless steel cleaning a soft cloth dampened with water is all you need. Wipe the cloth in the direction of the grain. For stubborn stains, wipe the fridge with olive oil. Remove excess oil until it shines.

#### Dear Reena,

I would like to take plain pasta to a lunch party in a few weeks. What is the best way to transport the pasta so that it does not stick together before the party? Jeremy

#### Dear Jeremy,

After cooking the pasta, soak it in cold water. Drain the water and coat with a small amount of oil. Toss the noodles and place them into a casserole dish, sealable bag or slow cooker.

#### Dear Reena,

What are some easy ways to open a stuck jar lid? Thanks Karrie

#### Dear Karrie,

Here are a few tried and true methods for loosening a jar lid: using the handle of a butter knife, tap the edge of the lid several times firmly around the outside of the lid or run the lid under hot water, while wearing gloves grab the lid and turn. You can also push the tip of a spoon under the lip of the lid and push the spoon down. When you hear a pop the seal is broken, you are then able to turn the lid. Purchase a Boa Constrictor Strap Wrench from a Home Hardware store; makes the job simple.

#### Seriously smart solutions

It may be time to put the barbecue away, but it is never time to put condiments away.

• When condiments such as mustard and ketchup are almost empty I place them upside down in my fridge in an egg carton container. Begin by cutting the lid off the egg carton. Lay the carton in the fridge, possibly inside the door if it fits. Stand mustard upside down in the carton. Submitted By: Elma

Combine all of the ingredients and beat with mixer until firm. Frost your cake or cupcakes. This makes a nice light topping and is not too sweet.



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



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

About 122 delegates representing 43 arts councils in Saskatchewan met at the Regina Ramada Plaza Friday, Oct. 13 to Sunday, Oct. 15 for a weekend of arts discussion, exposure, selections and decision making. This year Watrous and Area Arts Council (WAAC) sent six delegates, of which two represented the visual component and four were from the performance side. Our delegates were Kelly Stein, Linda Kessler, Lynn Merrifield, Lety Schalm, Toni Ambrose and first timer Maria Vanderbilt.

By far the most exciting part of the weekend was previewing live performances in order to fill our season for the following year 2024-'25. Apparently, they received about 100 applicants for the Showcase and the committee narrowed them down to the 15 that we heard at Darke Hall throughout the weekend. Darke Hall has been newly renovated, a truly beautiful venue! Some of the performers make themselves available for school performances as well, so WAAC books one school show a year and the suitability determines whether it goes to the elementary or high school. OSAC's School Touring Program also offers a number of school specific shows available to schools for a reasonable fee and these have made their way to Watrous on occasion. Last year the school tours were seen by 19,329 students and teachers. The shows travelled to 54 schools in 43 Saskatchewan communities. This past spring, WAAC arranged for a dance troupe to perform Prisoner of Tehran for the

high school and there was an evening show for the public as well. This compelling performance was followed by a Q & A with some of the dancers. Over the years our students have had opportunity to enjoy the work of a variety of professional performing artists representing a variety of disciplines in collaboration with the staff liaison. Missoula Children's Theatre is another venture that WAAC has brought to our students and we hope to book another visit with them in the next year or two.

Friday afternoon, there was opportunity to attend an afternoon workshop on Bridging the Generational Divide. Following supper, city buses took delegates to Darke Hall for the first five performances of the weekend. Performers came from various places in Canada, but there were a surprising number that had Saskatchewan roots. There were two more five act sessions Saturday as well as a two hour table talk exchange of ideas and information among delegates. Topics included Ticketpro usage, grant programs and funding, rebuilding an arts council, OSAC touring schools project, The Red Chair Project in Rosthern, etc. Having six delegates there enabled us to touch on most of the topics offered. It is always beneficial to exchange ideas and experiences with other councils.

In between meetings, performances and dining, there was opportunity to view some of the visual exhibits available for touring. Each year The Gallery on 3rd has opportunity to book touring art shows that will then be on display for the public. Throughout most of the year the gallery is manned by volunteers so open hours are

limited. Our summer student enables the gallery to be available Tuesday to Saturday during the vacation months. Of course there is also opportunity to visit the Exhibitor Exchange and speak with the performers and agents themselves. On occasion we even had opportunity to share a meal with some of the performers.

The OSAC staff organized a fine weekend and the various events moved along smoothly. The weekend wrapped up Sunday morning, following the selection of the performances that each council wished to present for their season and within their budget. It is quite a process and this year's online endeavour seemed to work fairly efficiently. WAAC's 2024-'25 season will offer some more great Canadian talent right here on our local stages at a very affordable price.

The WAAC 2023-'24 season begins with Kinjo & Young. The remainder of our season will happen in the new year with Buzz Brass, Andrew Collins Trio and Jake Vaadeland and the Sturgeon River Boys. Most of our shows take place at the civic centre but the final concert will be at Danceland. We are very excited about this series and hope to see good turnouts for the four shows we are offering. Series booklets will still be available the night of our first show as well as tickets at the door.

## Harvest

We are "prairie people" living in Saskatoon, Canada. This is where vast fields of grain are grown, harvested, supplying the

world with food. That is the reason "harvest" means a great deal to many of us in this province. I have experienced the harvest of 44 years of my farming days. Some years a bountiful harvest and others very disappointing. As we farm-

ers were said to say this is "next year country."

I was old enough to remember the harvest with the threshing machine powered with a "Rumely" tractor. My Dad had a threshing machine, brand new, delivered on a railroad flat bed at Renown railway station Sept. 2, 1920 something. What excitement that must have been that harvest. It was very

popular threshing for the neighbours as their fields became ready to be harvested and entailed a number of hired men as the machine never sat idle, it had to keep busy morning until night.

I have also heard of my Mother speak of the role the farm wife had to fill while the harvest was being done on the farm. Up in the early morning

preparing breakfast, not just toast and coffee either, always leftover potatoes, bacon and eggs. A full course meal at noon, quite a contest would go on amongst the women as to which pie the men favoured. Pie was a must at every noon dinner. Supper was substantial, then a field lunch mid-afternoon. Every day planned ahead as well as tending to the children and doing the farm chores, one or two cows to milk and feed the pigs. Harvest was a very busy time of the year.

Harvest does not only mean grain harvest. I think of harvesting my large gardens grown on the farm and also my spacious garden in Watrous. Large bountiful gardens harvested and preserved meant how well that growing family survived the winter, until the next growing season.

When I think of "harvest" what comes to my mind is "the harvest moon." It is so full, so bright lighting up the whole area for miles

around us. A coyote howls back and forth to its friendly pack somewhere beyond. The crisp harvest air echoes that sound into the stillness of the night.

I experienced watching that harvest moon, many nights while waiting and watching my husband go up and down the field picking up the swaths of grain. Waiting to collect the next hopper full of those precious golden kernels of wheat or perhaps some other variety of grain. I enjoyed watching the moon, and how it seemed to change, the shape, the colour, a passing cloud, I could pretend I saw "the man in the moon." It seemed like I was not alone waiting in the truck for the combine to come. I always had that friendly harvest moon to accompany me.

"Harvest" time as a prairie person, as a farm person, born and raised under a vast prairie blue sky, with a harvest moon overhead can only think of a culmination of a busy year and dreams of a fruitful season ahead.

## Crop Report

**■ media release**

Harvest is virtually complete in Saskatchewan with 98 percent of the crop in the bin. That is according to the weekly Crop Report from the Ministry of Agriculture for Oct. 10 to 16. Producers were resilient this growing season. The warm, dry conditions led to an early harvest for many and there were some concerns related to water quality and feed access for livestock.

Once harvest began, producers in some areas were pleased to see yields better than expected. In many cases, harvest progressed smoothly with little interruption. Now that harvest is complete, producers are hoping for rain to replenish soil moisture for next year.

Crop yields varied throughout the province, depending heavily on the amount of moisture received. Yields in the southwest and west-central regions were below average due to sustained dry conditions. Some

reported yields were better than expected, but overall, the majority of crop yielded below the 10-year average. Winter wheat and hard-red spring wheat were the only crops above the 10-year averages. The largest impact on yields this year was drought, heat stress, gophers and grasshoppers.

Average yields in the province are being estimated for all crops. Hard-red spring wheat is estimated to yield 43 bushels per acre, durum 24 bushels per acre, oats 82 bushels per acre, barley 56 bushels per acre and fall rye 36 bushels per acre. Flax is estimated to yield 18 bushels per acre, canola 33 bushels per acre and soybeans 17 bushels per acre. Field peas are estimated to yield 31 bushels per acre. Mustard is estimated to yield 636 lbs. per acre, lentils 1,101 lbs. per acre, canary seed 982 lbs. per acre and chickpeas 858 lbs. per acre. All crops are estimated to be above the 10-year average for quality and to be in the top two categories for all crops.
