Scare Away Hunger returns to support local food bank

What do Hook's pirate ship, a TIE Fighter, the Flintstones, a yellow brick road, Old MacDonald and Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs all have in common? They have been a part of Scare Away Hunger, an annual event which garners donations for the Watrous Food Bank.

Started nearly a decade ago at Watrous Home Hardware, in addition to the Home Hardware Charity Garden which provides fresh produce to the food bank annually, each year trick-or-treaters are encouraged to make their way to the store with a non-perishable food item. Once arriving, they can drop off

their donation for the local food bank, check out a new theme that has been created specifically for Scare Away Hunger and receive a treat bag on their way out.

"We decided to make a charity garden that some of our staff volunteer to maintain during the summer and is spearheaded by my uncle Rick," explained Watrous Home Hardware's Derek Bushman. "Then in fall, they harvest the fresh produce which is hundreds of pounds of items and donate it to the local food bank. As that grew, we thought about adding an opportunity during Halloween where people can bring in donations of their own for the food bank and we pass all of it along."

Creating a theme each year at the store, Bushman said a number of the employees have taken on the annual Scare Away Hunger initiative. "Our staff have been amazing at helping gear up for it each year. My Dad Ken has put in a lot of hours building different sets and my Mom gives him a hand to get them all ready. Holly Train has sewn a bunch of our costumes and helps paint some of the sets. Dawn May has also lent a hand painting and we have a bunch of staff who pack the treat bags. Having our team come together for this makes it memorable for the kids who stop by."

Derek, who has helped to come up with different ideas for the themes each

year said it truly is a group effort. "We have tried to make it fun for the kids and for kids of all ages really and it is great to see their faces light up when they come in."

Once after school does arrive on Oct. 31 so do the trick-or-treaters

► On Thursday, Oct. 12, 48 people attended an "Identity Theft and Fraud Prevention" presentation at the Watrous Senior Centre. With a lot of water, strategic pruning, and nice weather aided by a stroke of luck, a pair of pumpkins at Vic Bergen's farm near Drake have grown to gigantic proportions. Massive enough to make numerous pumpkin pies or create larger than life Jack-o'-lanterns, the Atlantic giant pumpkins have also caught the attention of onlookers.

Planting a pair of seeds in spring and only allowing one pumpkin to grow on each plant, by the time fall arrived, Bergen had himself two enormous pumpkins sitting in his garden. "They definitely take up a lot of space," he shared.

Giants compared to what you might typically find within the local area, Bergen put in a substantial amount of work each day. Hauling 12 to 15 five gallon pails of water to the pumpkin patch daily, the plants had plenty to drink. Following the steady stream of watering, pruning and nice weather throughout the summer

months, as fall arrived, the plump pumpkins were bursting at the seams.

Surprised at just how large they had grown and curious to know how much each weighed, Bergen along with his wife Chris entered the largest specimen at the 17th annual Pilger Pumpkin Festival. "We lifted it up with straps out of the patch from our garden then onto a pallet

on the truck. Once we got it on the back of the truck, driving on the highway, people seemed to notice it!"

Making the approximate 90 km journey north from Drake to Pilger, once the Bergens arrived for the Sept. 30 event, a crowd began to form as people spotted the behemoth pumpkin. "No one had ever seen one that big! When I got to the festival, they asked if I needed help lifting it off the truck. I asked if they had a forklift!"

Placing it on a weighing scale using a skid steer, Vic and Chris along with curious spectators waited to see the official result. Registering a whopping 901.5 pounds, the pumpkin not only tipped the scales but shattered the previous record at the annual festival. "The weight even surprised me!"

Pleased at the size of his prize winner, following

a fun day at the festival, the pumpkin was loaded back onto the truck and the Bergens returned home. Intrigued by what number his smaller pumpkin might fetch on the scale, Vic said, "We ended up weighing that one and it came in at 738 pounds. In the world of serious pumpkin growers, these two were just average. The big ones can get over 2,000 pounds."

When asked what Bergen plans on doing with them now that he knows how much they weigh, he said, "I don't have any current plans. Perhaps they could be used as a charity fundraiser but as of right now they are sitting at the end of our driveway. I don't think there is a secret or trick as to how I got them to grow so big. It was just lots of work each day watering, pruning and getting some good luck with the weather."

RCMP in Watrous seeking public's assistance

Watrous RCMP are requesting assistance to identify a female for fraudulently using another person's identity to obtain funding to purchase a camper trailer.

If you can identify the female, call 1-800-222-8477 to leave an anonymous tip. If your tip leads to an arrest or charge, you may be eligible for a reward of up to \$2,000.

Assault on police officers up 29 percent over five years

On Oct. 23, 2023 just before 7 p.m., an officer from Onion Lake RCMP observed several suspicious persons operating a side-by-side outside a business in Onion Lake.

The officer pulled up to them and activated their emergency lights. The side-by-side suddenly accelerated and rammed the officer's police vehicle. The officer



was not physically injured. The side-by-side fled and was later found damaged and abandoned less than a kilometre away.

Shortly after, officers located and arrested an adult male nearby.

Thirty-three-year-old Josh McLaren from Lloydminster is charged with: one count, assault on police officer with weapon, Section 270.01(2), Criminal Code; one count, flight from peace officer, Section 320.17, Criminal Code; one count, dangerous operation of a motor vehicle, Section 320.13(1), Criminal Code; one count, wear disguise with intent, Section 351(2), Criminal Code; one count, failure to stop after accident, Section 320.16(1), Criminal Code; and one count, operation while impaired, Section 320.14(1)(a), Criminal Code.

Onion Lake RCMP continues to investigate.

RCMP stated this incident is one of multiple recent assaults against Saskatchewan RCMP officers. They include:

On Oct. 6, 2023, Pierceland RCMP observed a stolen vehicle on Big Island Lake Cree Territory. They attempted a traffic stop. The vehicle fled and rammed a police vehicle while doing so. The officers were not injured. A 24-year-old male has been charged with assaulting a police officer with a weapon and other charges in relation to this incident.

On Sept. 30, 2023, La Ronge RCMP received a report of an unwanted individual at a residence in La Ronge. Officers located the individual, who resisted arrest, assaulted a police officer and attempted to unholster their conducted energy device. The officer reported non-life-threatening injuries. An adult male has been charged with two counts of assaulting a police officer with a weapon and other charges in relation to this

incident.

On Sept. 18, 2023, officers from Saskatchewan RCMP's Crime Reduction Team observed a stolen vehicle on Ahtahkakop Cree Nation. They attempted a traffic stop. The vehicle fled and rammed a police vehicle while doing so. A male has been charged and is on warrant in relation to this incident.

“Assaults on police officers have increased 29 percent in five years in Saskatchewan RCMP jurisdiction,” said A/Commr. Rhonda Blackmore, commanding officer of Saskatchewan RCMP. “I'm committed to transparency, and to painting an accurate picture of policing in Saskatchewan. The statistics show that our officers are at increasing risk of being assaulted while doing their job – keeping our communities safe. I'm proud of the dedication they have to community safety, even as risk to their personal safety increases.”

According to RCMP, yearly assaults against police officer statistics are as follows: 2018 – 362 incidents; 2019 – 390 incidents; 2020 – 435 incidents; 2021 – 414 incidents; 2022 – 471 incidents.

Of the 471 incidents that occurred last year, 289 occurred in Saskatchewan RCMP's North District, 118 in Central District and 64 in South District.

Of the 471 incidents that occurred last year, 377 were assaults on police officers, 83 were assaults on police officer causing bodily harm/assaults on police officer with a weapon, eight were disarming a police officer and three were aggravated assault on police officer.

From Jan. 1 to Sept. 30, 2023 (the most recent statistics available), there were 375 assaults against police officer incidents in Saskatchewan RCMP jurisdiction.

Throne Speech 2023 delivered in Saskatchewan

Lieutenant Governor Russ Mirasty delivered the 2023 Throne Speech Oct. 25 outlining the Saskatchewan government's agenda for the upcoming legislative session.

Premier Scott Moe said the Throne Speech outlines the government's plan to build and protect Saskatchewan.

“Together with Saskatchewan people, we will continue to build a strong province, a strong economy, strong communities and strong families,” Moe said. “And we will protect what we have built together from the risks of global uncertainty and from a federal government that seems intent on shutting down important parts of our economy.”

During the upcoming legislative session, the gov-

ernment will:

- Introduce a new Saskatchewan Employment Incentive program to bolster the income of low-income working families with dependent children;
- In order to promote new home construction and help with rising costs, new homeowners will qualify for a Provincial Sales Tax (PST) Rebate for New Home Construction, effective retroactive to Apr. 1 of this year;
- Introduce a Secondary Suite Program to increase rental availability;
- Introduce a new Investment Attraction Strategy;
- Introduce a new Saskatchewan Jobs Plan;
- Continue to increase Indigenous employment and participation in the economy through the Saskatchewan Indigenous Investment Finance Corporation;

- Lead a significant Saskatchewan presence at the COP28 Conference in the United Arab Emirates, where Saskatchewan companies and government officials will promote our province's sustainable products to the world;

- Protect Saskatchewan's economic autonomy by using The Saskatchewan First Act to refer the federal Clean Electricity Regulations, the Clean Fuel Standard and the oil and gas emissions cap to the Economic Impact Assessment Tribunal;
- Implement the new Action Plan for Mental Health and Addictions, which includes the creation of 500 new addictions treatment

spaces across the province;

- Implement the new Provincial Approach to Homelessness;
- Create 30 new Complex Needs Emergency Shelter spaces in Regina and Saskatoon;
- Continue to build a number of important hospital and health facility projects in Regina, Saskatoon, Prince Albert, Weyburn, La Ronge, Grenfell and other communities;
- Continue to implement the Health Human Resources Action Plan to recruit, train, incentivize and retain health care workers across the province;
- Expand the Nursing Loan Forgiveness Program to include Prince Albert,

The delight of fresh forgiveness

relational needs. We find this prayer in the gospels of Luke and Matthew.

Matthew's version is the one most of us are familiar with and recite together. Yet, depending on how you learned the prayer, you might know it as "forgive us our debts" or "forgive us our trespasses." Luke uses the general description, "forgive us our sins." The word translated as trespasses or debt refers to something that has gone wrong in our lives and we are not where we should be (a trespassing offence) and we are therefore in deficit in our relationship with God (debt).

The brutal reality is that due to our sinful nature, we are always in a deficit relationship with God. His standard is complete holiness and we cannot attain that standing by our efforts. Ultimately, it is more about our character marred by sin than our actions - although we are certainly accountable for them! Herein lies the "good news" that is the gospel. Just as we perish bodily if we have not our daily bread, we perish relationally if we have no forgiveness. God provides nurture for our bodies and for our souls.

In his later years John the apostle wrote to the church: "if we confess our sins, he is just and faithful to forgive our sins and cleanse us from all unrighteousness." (1 John 1:9). With the cleansing and purification of forgiveness comes restoration of relationship with God. The Apostle Paul describes it in this way: "behold if anyone is in Christ, they are a new creation." (2 Corinthians 5:17).

In daily forgiveness, God renews our character and builds into our lives the practical holiness that we need. It is as spiritually essential as our need to eat. Come to the table of forgiveness, God is waiting.

Chocolate Glaze for Cakes

- 1/2 cup corn or cane syrup
- 9 oz. chopped bittersweet chocolate



- **Emergency exits.** Identifying all emergency exits — doors or windows that lead directly outside — is an essential part of every evacuation plan.



Human Trafficking (Coerced Debts) Amendment Act to relieve human trafficking victims of negative credit factors incurred through coercion; and

• The Saskatchewan Remembrance Day Observance Act to protect individuals' right to wear a poppy in all Saskatchewan workplaces.

The Throne Speech concludes by saying Saskatchewan has built a strong foundation of a strong economy, strong communities and strong families.

"A strong and growing province means more homes, more businesses, more families, more opportunities, more careers and more futures have been built, right here in Saskatchewan," Moe said. "It means more hospitals, more schools and more highways have been built right here in Saskatchewan. And it means there is so much more to be built in the years ahead."

"My government, together with the people of our great province, will keep building Saskatchewan and we will protect all we have built."

Following the Throne Speech, Official Opposition Leader Carla Beck said, "This is a Sask. Party government that can't be trusted. Scott Moe ran on lower power bills, then increased them three times. I think governments should be measured on the results they deliver, not the promises they make. If Scott Moe was more focused on fixing issues than scoring cheap headlines, maybe

we'd be somewhere.

"There's an emergency in our emergency rooms and Moe still hasn't come forward with any game-changing solutions for health care," said Beck. "Moe says he's concerned about housing, yet his government sat on its hands as dozens of seniors were thrown out of their homes this last week. The rising cost of living and health care crisis are clearly not priorities for this government."

The NDP stated wait times for a bed at a long-term care centre in Regina average about 53 days, or two-and-a-half times the provincial average, and according to the NDP, often keep seniors waiting in hospitals for extended periods of time for long-term care options.

The Official Opposition also stated CIHI reports that Saskatchewan has the longest wait times for key surgeries. "The median wait time for knee replacements in Saskatchewan last year was 466 days. The national average was 198 days, and the next-worst province, Manitoba, was 336. The median wait time for hip replacements was 309 days, longer than every other province and nearly double the national average of 164 days."

The NDP concluded by stating the "Throne Speech also failed to show any plan to fix overcapacity pressures in urban emergency rooms and to stop rural emergency room closures, as has been seen in communities across rural Saskatchewan, most recently in Radville."

the store during a different occasion. Then there was a visit by modern Stone Age families consisting of the Flintstones and Rubbles. Even the Great Gazoo was found at Home Hardware.

"Each time we do this, Dad does the building and Mom helps him. They have put in a lot of hours and Dad has created everything from a red barn for Old MacDonald, a pirate ship to a styrofoam-based house that mimicked the home Fred and Wilma lived in. He also made their vehicle, which the grandkids still enjoy pushing around in the back shop."

Zooming from the Stone Age to far away galaxies, in 2022, Derek thought a Star Wars theme would be fun. "Last year we were trying to figure out something related to Star Wars and I came up with the TIE Fighter, figuring it might be one of the easier ones to construct."

With a circular cockpit big enough for someone to sit in, Derek shared getting all the angles was difficult. "Dad put in a lot of time with that."

Along with building massive wings on either side of the cockpit, instruments were installed inside and lights, buttons and music added. Then when it was finished and kids (and adults) hopped in, the door was closed and it made them feel like they were flying a real TIE Fighter.

"Dad was able to find some pretty neat panels that we ended up adding on the TIE Fighter and he used a door from a stainless steel fridge for the seat," explained Derek. "It looked really incredible when it was done."

Taking the TIE Fighter apart in the back shop in order to fit it through the front doors of the main building, once reassembled, Derek put up a backdrop resembling a Star Wars theme. He was also able to secure the services


