Emergency services to resume and acute beds to open in Watrous

Following just over a year of temporary disruption, starting Sept. 24, emergency services will fully resume and inpatient beds will open at Watrous District Health Complex.

With the recent hiring of more registered nurses, Director of Primary Health Care Integrated Rural Health for Watrous and Lanigan Holly Srochenski said the emergency department will once again be open 24 hours a day, seven days a week along with the facility's inpatient beds. "After being a year on service disruption, to finally be able to get to this point is super exciting for everyone."

On Sept. 12, 2022 a temporary disruption to emergency services was implemented at Watrous District Health Complex. That meant emergency services were only available from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m. throughout the week. In addition, inpatient services were also not available.

Srochenski said through a lot of work and creating a partnership between the Ministry of Health, their Health Human Resource Action Plan along with the human resources team and local leadership in Watrous, the contingent was successful in recruiting three full-time RNs to the community. "We had two RNs return to us and we were able to hire two casual staff. With that RN recruitment, we are at a point now where we have stable staffing to be able to reopen those services."

Watrous Mayor John Gunderson said the Town of Watrous is extremely pleased with SHA's announcement that emergency services at the Watrous District Health Complex will be fully restored and acute care beds will be reopened. "After just over a year of disruption in services, the community of Watrous and surrounding area will have access to services that we had become accustomed to prior to last year's partial closure. We worked closely with the SHA over the past year to make this happen and we thank them for their cooperation. I know I have said it before but a huge thank you goes out to the staff of the Watrous hospital that worked tirelessly to keep the hospital open during the disruption of services. It is people like the staff that make Watrous a great place to live."

While the hospital will see its services fully resume Sept. 24, Srochenski noted recruitment will continue. "We still have three more positions in Watrous that we will continue to recruit until filled."

Along with SHA, Gunderson added the Town of Watrous will do what it can to achieve a full complement of RNs for the hospital.

Town of Watrous Councillor Taylor Engele who is on the community's health services advisory committee

said, "We are very pleased to be able to share the news of the Watrous hospital restoring its full services on Sept. 24. In meeting with SHA, they stressed that although we are able to resume full services, they are still actively recruiting for multiple positions in Watrous. We want to encourage anyone who is interested to apply for these positions. We want to thank the SHA for meeting and working with us throughout this process so that we could get back to offering full services in Watrous. We understand these services are critical to our community and we are excited to have them offered again."

Before the resumption of full emergency services and the opening of inpatient beds arrives, Srochenski explained a couple of the newer RNs are doing some education over the next few weeks. "That gives them an opportunity to get that education and operationally, we just need a couple of weeks to have all of our inventory in stock and our acute rooms up to standard. Not that we didn't do maintenance when we were closed but we really just want to ensure that we are offering a really safe environment for the staff and our patients when they come in. It just gives us a bit of a buffer."

Sharing how valuable the community partnership is between SHA and the Town of Watrous, Srochenski said that was a big driver in seeing the RNs come to town. "I really can't say enough how important the community partnerships were with SHA in making this happen.

We are just at a really good point right now and we are hoping to carry those relationships forward."

Another community that has been experiencing emergency service and acute care service disruptions is Lanigan. While services partially resumed at the Lanigan hospital May 9, 2022, there has been no change since then.

"Unfortunately Lanigan remains at status quo. We have not been as successful as we have been for Watrous. Lanigan will remain at its current level of service for the unforeseeable future. We are still having a bit of staff turnover and have not been able to recruit the RNs we need to open services further."

Currently emergency services are available between 8 a.m. and 7 p.m. Monday through Friday in Lanigan while Lab and X-ray services are offered from 8:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. Monday to Friday. Srochenski said, "Efforts are being made to start services but we just don't have the human resources. SHA as always is still committed to reopening Lanigan when it is safe and reliable."

While both Watrous and Lanigan each have a full complement of physicians, with Watrous set to resume its services later this month, Srochenski said people needing care in Lanigan after hours will be able to utilize the hospital in Watrous, Humboldt or other nearby facilities. "People can access services wherever they choose to. If people need service they can access it in Watrous if they like."

“RCMP Report”

RCMP respond to robbery

At approximately 1:50 a.m. Aug. 29, Maidstone RCMP received a report of a robbery. Investigation determined the victim was driving on Hwy. 16 near Bresaylor. The victim approached a parked vehicle with its hazard lights on and a female flagged them down. The victim stopped their vehicle, and a male came from the ditch and pointed a firearm at them. The victim was able to escape and call police, and did not report any physical injuries to police.

Officers immediately responded. With the assistance of Saskatchewan RCMP Police Dog Services, a male and a female were arrested after a short search of the area. A small amount of methamphetamine was located during their arrest.

Twenty-four-year-old Crystal Semaganis and 30-year-old Durrell Bearsears, both from Little Pine First Nation, are charged with: one count, robbery, Section 344, Criminal Code; one count, pointing a firearm, Section 87(2), Criminal Code; and one

count, possession of methamphetamine, Section 4(1), Controlled Drugs and Substances Act.

Bearsears is also charged with one count, possession of a weapon for a dangerous purpose, Section 88(2), Criminal Code.

RCMP receive report of missing man

At approximately 4 p.m. Aug. 29 Creighton RCMP received a report of a missing elderly male who had been picking berries on trails along Hwy. 106. Creighton RCMP officers arrived on scene when a distant yelling was heard and began searching the wooded area on foot. An unmanned aircraft was launched in efforts to assist officers and was able to successfully locate the individual – hovering above until the officers on the ground could make contact. Flin Flon RCMP officers attended with ATVs, bringing the individual back to safety at approximately 8 p.m. The male was evaluated by EMS on scene but was not taken to hospital. Creighton RCMP wants to thank those individuals with the Ministry of Highways and Saskatchewan Highway Patrol who assisted in ensuring the male was located and confirmed safe.

Inspection results in seizure of \$1.1 million in illicit tobacco

Members of the Saskatchewan Highway Patrol (SHP) recently seized approximately 1.9 million unstamped cigarettes worth approximately \$1.1 million on the illicit market.

"Thanks to this observant officer in the Saskatchewan Highway Patrol, we were able to prevent organized crime from using Saskatchewan's

roadways to profit from illegal activity," Corrections, Policing and Public Safety Minister Paul Merriman said. "This is just one example of the excellent work the Saskatchewan Highway Patrol and Provincial Protective Services do every day to ensure public safety in our province."

On the evening of Aug. 31, 2023, an officer with the SHP within the Ministry of Corrections, Policing and Public Safety's Provincial Protective Services (PPS) Branch stopped a commercial vehicle on Hwy. 1 east of Indian Head for an inspection.

During the course of the inspection the officer conducted a search of the trailer, which revealed six pallets of unstamped cigarettes.

As a result, the driver of the truck was taken into custody by the SHP, and the cigarettes were seized, along with a power unit and a semi-trailer. The Indian Head RCMP have taken carriage of the file in consultation with the SHP and the Saskatchewan Ministry of Finance.

"The Saskatchewan Highway Patrol is steadfast in its commitment to keeping the roadways in Saskatchewan safe," Inspector Alex Heron of the Saskatchewan Highway Patrol said. "I am extremely proud of the work all our officers do on a daily basis to prevent our roads from being used for criminal activity that will negatively impact Saskatchewan communities."

As a result of the investigation, RCMP have charged the driver with several counts under the Criminal Code (Excise Act) and The Tobacco Tax Act.

Supporting local helps local as CFIB releases new data

For every dollar spent at a small business, 66 cents on average stays local, according to new data from the Canadian Federation of Independent Business (CFIB). Conversely, only 11 cents of every dollar spent stays in the community when consumers shop at a large multinational business.

An Angus Reid Group public opinion poll conducted on behalf of CFIB reveals that Canadians greatly overestimate how much of each dollar they spend at multinational companies is reinvested locally, while underestimating small businesses' contributions.

When asked to guess how much money stays local when shopping at a large retailer with a physical location, such as Walmart, on average

Canadians said 37 cents. Respondents also thought that 38 cents on average stays in the community when buying from a small business.

"Canadians assume the local contributions by large retailers and small businesses are on par, but the difference is significant. The importance of what shopping local means to our communities can't be stressed enough," said Brianna Solberg, CFIB provincial affairs director.

"Small businesses support a whole local ecosystem. They source their goods and services from other local businesses in a way the retail giants just don't. This is why governments at all levels need to focus on policies that support local businesses, from the federal government extending the repayment deadline for the

Canada Emergency Business Account loan, to the Saskatchewan government reducing the small business tax rate."

"Every time Canadians choose to shop at a small business, they ensure the viability of their communities. This is why at CFIB, we encourage all Canadians to celebrate #SmallBusinessEveryDay and take part in our

annual Big Thank You Contest this October," said Taylor Matchett, Senior Research Analyst at CFIB. "Shopping at a small business enables it to give back, whether it's by hiring apprentices, sponsoring local hockey teams or donating to food banks. Two-thirds of your dollar helps keep our economy thriving and your community vibrant."





Dear Merve,

Clogged rain gutters prevent water from dripping away from the foundation of your home. They should be cleaned twice each year. When soil around homes becomes wet, serious challenges can result.

The easiest tools for cleaning rain gutters are scaffolding and work gloves. If scaffolding is unavailable, a sturdy ladder will do the trick.

After leaves and debris are scooped away using work gloves, slimy brown goo remains. While this may not obstruct water, it will smell. Wash gutters using a garden hose or pressure washer.

An alternative is to find a local tradesman who has the equipment and the expertise to do the job quickly and efficiently. It should not take long and should not be very expensive. It is cheaper to get the gutters cleaned than to pay for the repairs caused from clogged gutters.

Crop Report

■ media release

Producers have crossed the halfway point of harvest at 51 percent complete, according to the Ministry of Agriculture's weekly Crop Report for Aug. 29 to Sept. 4. This is up from 33 percent last week, ahead of the five-year average of 34 percent and the 10-year average of 33 percent.


The southwest continues to lead harvest progress at 81 percent complete. This includes an estimated three percent of all crops being used as a feed source. Harvest in the west central region is also rapidly advancing with 60 percent of the crop in the bin. The southeast is close to the halfway point at 49 percent complete. The northwest has made significant progress and is now 21 percent complete.

Harvest progress was made in all crops. Harvesting of fall cereals are now completed, with lentils 91 percent and peas 92 percent complete. Significant progress was also made in all spring cereals, with durum leading at 73 percent harvested. This is followed by barley at 68 percent, spring wheat at 50 percent

and oats at 36 percent. Seventy percent of triticale has been harvested, with 61 percent of the crop being used for feed. Mustard continues to lead the progress in oilseeds, with 68 percent of the crop in the bin, followed by canola at 23 percent, flax at 14 percent, and soybeans at 31 percent. Canaryseed and chickpeas are near the halfway mark, with 45 percent and 51 percent harvested respectively.

The diverse growing conditions across the province this year are apparent as producers are seeing varying yields for all crop types.

The drought conditions experienced in the southwest have led to yield averages well below the provincial averages. Meanwhile, the moisture received in the northeast has led to above average yields. Hard Red Spring Wheat is provincially estimated at 42 bu/ac, durum yields are estimated at 23 bu/ac, and barley is estimated at 53 bu/ac. Canola is estimated to yield 31 bu/ac, while mustard is estimated at 599 lbs/ac. Lentils are estimated to yield 1,058 lbs/ac, chickpeas at 1,071 lbs/ac, and peas at 30 bu/ac.



Along with kids headed back to classes, SGI reminds motorists to be aware when driving in school zones. With September's Traffic Safety Spotlight on school zones, there can be a lot going on with students walking to and from schools, getting off the bus, being dropped off by a parent, playing in the school yard and crossing at the crosswalk.

School zone speed limits and hours differ in each municipality, so drivers are encouraged to familiarize themselves with the rules in their community and obey the posted signs.

SGI said speeding in school zones will land drivers a failing grade – and a hefty fine. For example, getting caught driving 20 km/h over the posted limit results in a \$310 ticket (and the cost of that ticket increases the faster you go). Drivers will also receive three demerit points under the Safe Driver Recognition program.

SGI noted when school buses are stopped with amber lights flashing, drivers should slow down and ensure kids are not about to pop out from the bus before passing. Avoid U-turns in school zones; some municipalities have by-laws that prohibit them.

Where's Walter? Saskatchewan: A New History

At the May 2016 unveiling of the restored dome atop the Saskatchewan Legislative building, Premier Brad Wall paid tribute to the province's first premier, Walter Scott.

It was at Scott's insistence, Wall observed, "that Saskatchewan should

have a legislature that represented the character and ambitions of its people." And the dome was a physical expression of the "optimism, hope and high expectations that animated Saskatchewan in the early days."

These heady words could easily be

dismissed as political hyperbole. But Premier Scott spoke about the Legislative building in similarly glowing terms. Nor was Wall exaggerating when he suggested that Scott was the driving force behind the structure.

From his first days as premier in 1905, Scott wanted a Legislative building that matched the needs of the not-too-distant future when Saskatchewan's population was expected to top several million.

In June 1906, cabinet approved the purchase of a 168-acre parcel of land, known as the Old Sinton property, south of the Wascana Creek reservoir. It was also decided, on the advice of a landscape architect, that the structure would face north and the surrounding grounds be developed into a public park.

The building design was determined by an architectural competition—won by Edward and W.S. Maxwell of Montreal in December 1907. But the proposed structure still reflected Scott's vision and influence.

The specifications called for a 125-seat legislative chamber—at a time when there were only twenty-five members—and provision for enlargement by the adding of two wings if necessary in the future. There was also to be a central dome, so that the building would serve as a kind of landmark, capable of being seen for miles in any direction.

The projected price tag was 1.75 million dollars, twice the original estimate.

In July 1908, P. Lyall and Sons of Montreal began driving the first of over 3,000 piles for the massive edifice; almost 1,800 would be needed to support the central dome. By the following spring, crews had completed the skeletal framework and were ready to start on the red brick exterior.

But on Premier Scott's intervention, it was decided to switch to Tyndall stone—a design change that resulted in additional cost and delay, but one that ultimately enhanced the graceful appearance of the structure.

A further slowdown was experienced in the late summer of 1909 when the local men working on the project left for harvest. Construction had reached the point, however, where Scott could

confidently proceed with the ceremonial laying of the cornerstone on Monday, October 4, 1909.

That event attracted an estimated 6,000 people who watched as Governor General Earl Grey took an engraved silver trowel with a special buffalo horn handle and smoothed the mortar before the block was carefully lowered into place. Not even a sudden, brief downpour, sweeping across the lake, could dampen Premier Scott's enthusiasm. "Saskatchewan demands a building of no mean dimensions," he triumphantly declared to the thunderous roar of the crowd.

Almost exactly four years later, on October 12, 1912, another governor general, Prince Arthur (the Duke of Connaught), the third and favourite son of Queen Victoria, officially opened the building.

The ceremony was held in the early evening so that the majestic dome, awash in brilliant light, stood out as a beacon against the night sky.

Premier Scott, though, was nowhere to be seen. Instead, it fell to acting premier Jim Calder to formally welcome the royal party and host the evening's festivities.


So, where was the man responsible for the grand structure rising from the prairie south of Wascana Creek?

The premier was touring Europe, trying to find a cure for the depression that would haunt him to his final days. The onset of the illness may have started during the winter of 1906-07, when he suffered a bout of pneumonia and thereafter began to flee the province every fall in search of rest in a warmer setting. It might also have been aggravated by the dark secret that he carried with him—that he had been born out of wedlock.

Whatever the cause, Scott was not a well man and was away from the province for at least half his tenure as premier.

That he somehow managed to oversee the completion of the Legislature Building was a testimony to the strength of his faith in Saskatchewan's destiny.


September brings a change to the Young Wheatland Library hours. The new schedule can be found on the Wheatland Regional Library's website or by contacting the library.

Construction underway on new school in Lanigan

As staff and students returned for another school year in Lanigan, construction continued nearby on a brand new state-of-the-art Pre-K to Gr. 12 building. With the current elementary and high schools in the community aging, a decision was made to create a new facility where all students will be able to learn under one roof.

Originally announced in July 2020 as part of the Government of Saskatchewan's \$7.5 billion two-year capital plan to stimulate the province's economic growth, following a number of delays due to rising costs and the pandemic, construction on the approximately 400 student \$26 million school moved one step closer with a June 19 sod turning ceremony.

Since that memorable June occasion which included staff and students from both schools, Horizon School Division CEO Kevin Garinger shared how the progress of the new facility has gone over the summer months. "We received formal approval from the Ministry to start our work, so construction has begun. Crews have been clearing the site and doing the necessary groundwork. They are also digging the piles to support the weight of the school. At this point, nearly half the piles have been dug."

On-site to see the work next to the current schools, Garinger explained construction will continue right through fall and winter. "There will be significant work happening during the fall and winter. Once the piles are done, they will begin the other aspects of the construction project, eventually getting to the steelwork that will support and form the structure of the school. Soon after that, they will be able to begin their work inside, which will make the project really exciting."

Once the majority of the new building is up and close to being ready to go, the decommissioning and demolition of the current schools would occur nearly simultaneously to create parking lot space.

With an estimated date of completion for the Pre-K to Gr. 12 school slated for 2025, once finished by Quorex Construction, the new school will feature a modern

and spacious design, with an estimated area of 4,829 square metres to accommodate students and staff. As part of that, the facility will house state-of-the-art labs for Industrial Arts, Science, Home Economics and the Arts, as well as a large main gymnasium and a smaller secondary gym. Garinger stated the new school will also prioritize accessibility and will strongly emphasize mental wellness, with welcoming counselling spaces available to students and staff.

"It is exciting to see the work happening. We are on our way and looking forward to when the school is ready for our students, staff, and families. It will probably be into 2025 before kids will begin at the school."

With the provincial government investing millions of dollars into the new school and Horizon's Board of Education contributing up to \$500,000 for the mini gym as part of the project, Garinger recognizes with higher costs overall, the approved budget for \$19.8 million is not going to fund the entire project. "Once we know the actual costs, the government has committed to support the project in its entirety, outside of the \$500,000 board contribution. However, we are expected to find as many efficiencies as possible in order to drive the costs down. We are going to continue this project right through to completion, and the fact that the government is aware of the higher costs is important. We are certainly grateful to our government for this exciting new build."

Garinger also shared how grateful Horizon is to the community during the process of seeing a new school built. "We have had outstanding support from the Town of Lanigan, the mayor and council, and the town administration. They have been tremendous supports through all of this and were instrumental in ensuring we had the land we needed to build the new school and the roadways for bussing our students. They supported our needs, and we are very grateful to them. Everyone is working together, and when that happens, great things can happen, and this is certainly a great thing that is happening."

Looking forward to when the first day of classes will be held at the new facility in Lanigan, Garinger also shared that Watrous has been listed by the board as a place they would like to see another new school

built. "We have Watrous down as one of our priorities for a capital project, and we are hoping that, at some point, we can receive approval for a new build in the community. In the meantime, we are grateful we have the two schools in the community, and we will maintain them as effectively as possible in order to keep them vibrant until a new school is announced. That may be years from now, but we are certainly optimistic."

While there is no timeline as to when that could be, as the 2023-24 school arrives, on behalf of the board, Garinger hoped staff and students from the division had a relaxing and recharging summer holiday.
