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U17A Cubs have tremendous season

What a season for the U17A Lumsden Cubs fastpitch team! With nine returning players the expectations were high for the season and the girls did not disappoint! The girls played 58 games and finished with a record of 35-19-4. The team consisted of 11 players from across zone 5 including Watrous, Nokomis, Liberty, Grand Coulee, Craven, Davidson, Bethune and Lumsden.

The girls won the season opener Regina Early Bird tournament to get off to a roaring start. Following that, they played in the President's Tournament in Saskatoon which had teams from across Western Canada. With only one team from the pool advancing, they came up just short of making the playoffs with

a 9-8 loss to Kaizen from Alberta (eventual Alberta Provincial champions). Tournaments in Melfort and Moose Jaw in late June were also successful with the girls losing out in the semifinal and final respectively.

The girls were successful in defending last year's title (going back to back) by winning the Regina League Championship in early July. In a replication of last year's final, the girls faced the Moose Jaw Ice and were again able to squeeze out an exciting win with a score of 6-5.

In preparation for provincials the team travelled to Estevan in July to participate in the inaugural Energy City Showcase tournament. Games were followed by College Coaches from Canada and the US to provide some exposure for future college team

possibilities. The girls went undefeated in this format and went into provincials full of confidence. With big wins against the Regina Royals, Saskatoon Hustlers, Saskatoon Lazers, and Melfort Spirit the girls finished first in their pool and played their season rival Moose Jaw Ice in the 1 vs 1 page playoff. Another close game with a 4-3 win put the girls in the final.

Moose Jaw was able to claw their way back to the

final where they handed the team their first loss of the tournament 9-5 in the gold medal match. With their second place finish in provincials, the Cubs earned the title of SK2 for the National Championship in Montreal, Que.

Nationals was a new experience for all of the players and they started a little nervous. They lost their opener 8-1 vs BC3 Fusion 05 and experienced a tough 5-4 loss vs MB3

Westman Magic. The girls got off to a good start vs Ontario 1 but a late high scoring inning cost them a 10-3 loss. After finally settling in, the team earned a nail biter win 5-4 vs BC6 from Cloverdale, who finished first in our pool followed by another 5-4 win vs AB2 from Sherwood Park. The girls' pool was very even with three teams finishing 3-2 and three at 2-3. Math was not their friend this time and they were slotted in the Relegation Playoffs. They played an amazing quarter final vs Quebec 1 winning 9-1 but came up short in the semi losing 6-4 to the SK3 Saskatoon Raiders ending their Cinderella season.

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Tolmie visits local communities as part of summer tour

Wanting to connect with people, hear their concerns and make good on a promise, Member of Parliament for Moose Jaw-Lake Centre-Lanigan Fraser Tolmie hit the road within the riding as part of a communities tour.

On a beautiful Thursday and with the sun shining, Tolmie visited a handful of places including Watrous and later Drake, where he enjoyed a community barbecue. Taking time out of his schedule to share about the summer and representing the area in Ottawa, Tolmie said, "I made a promise when I was campaigning last year that we would get out to communities and meet people of the riding. It has been awesome to visit with people, they give so much back to you. I am really proud to be a Member of Parliament of this riding and the communities within it."

Coming up with a plan earlier in the year to travel through the riding, Tolmie sent out letters to local councils letting them know he would be available. "They are always competing for federal dollars and being a former mayor of Moose Jaw, I know what that is like. Putting on the new hat as the MP, I want to be able to help communities when they are looking for infrastructure dollars. This area is the heart of Saskatchewan and communities like the ones I represent really contribute. We have to think about the next generation and some of the things that can be provided through federal and provincial dollars in combination with municipalities."

Seeking to find out what municipalities want and need to help their community thrive and grow, Tolmie

said his job is getting that information from them and advocating on their behalf in Ottawa. As for lobbying for those residing within the riding, Tolmie feels the present federal government "is not paying attention to what is going on in Western Canada. We feel alienated and there has been challenges like when the government wanted to put warning labels on ground beef. We have stood up and made our voices known. I am glad they have reversed that decision but they are attacking agriculture like fertilizers and pesticides and things that are required."

Tolmie explained when it comes to agriculture, the federal government appears to be trying to align with other practices on a global scale. "They fail to recognize that local farmers are implementing best practices and they already know the land. The soil is different from what it is in Germany, Holland or France so to try and create this global reduction really negates and overlooks what is going on here locally. We have to fight harder and will continue to fight."

Along with advocating for those within the Moose Jaw-Lake Centre-Lanigan riding, Tolmie has also been busy campaigning for Pierre Poilievre in his leadership bid for the Conservative Party. With the party electing a new leader Sept. 10, earlier this year Tolmie announced he was behind Poilievre and was in Swift Current, Prince Albert, Regina, Moose Jaw and in Ontario for events as well. "I know Pierre very well and wanted to support someone who already knew the team and has his finger on the pulse. Whatever the outcome is we are going to have a new leader in the fall and going in a direction to fight to become the

party that represents Canadians in the next election."

Until that next election is held, as the official federal opposition, Tolmie said he will continue to represent those within his riding, fighting for their needs.

"Part and parcel of not only meeting with municipalities, RMs and town councils to hear their concerns is meeting with people. I was recently in the UK as my family's roots are Scottish. I loved being there but my heart was yearning to get back to Canada. When I got back, as I was driving to Watrous and Drake, I felt optimism and hope. I really believe that is what we need as a country to be able to represent the world right now after what we have been through. Really, my job and what I do comes down to the people and we have to think about the next generation and instill some strong values so that they can carry the torch."

19 minutes after the first report. Police were already on their way to the scene. RCMP officers arrived at the first scene on James Smith Cree Nation at 6:18 a.m.

At 6:20 a.m., one of the two police officers left the first scene, to go to another scene on James Smith Cree Nation. He advised he arrived at the second scene 12 minutes after departing the first.

At 6:35 a.m., because of the significant risk to public safety identified, the Saskatchewan RCMP prepared to issue an emergency alert. It was drafted, reviewed, verified and issued at 7:12 a.m.

At 7:57 a.m., an updated alert was sent with the names, descriptions, and pictures of two suspects, Damien and Myles Sanderson.

At 8:20 a.m., the Dangerous Persons Alert was extended to the entire province of Saskatchewan, as the investigation confirmed the two suspects – Damien Sanderson and Myles Sanderson – were travelling in a vehicle.

At 9:45 a.m., a fourth Dangerous Persons Alert

was sent to the entire province, indicating multiple victims in multiple locations were located, including one victim outside of the James Smith Cree Nation in the community of Weldon, Saskatchewan, and that some victims were believed to be attacked randomly. A description of the suspect vehicle and the correct picture to identify Myles Sanderson were included.

At 11:25 a.m., requests were sent to Manitoba RCMP and Alberta RCMP to extend the Dangerous Persons Alert to the residents of their provinces.

At 12:07 p.m., a fifth alert update was sent advising the residents of Saskatchewan the suspect vehicle had been seen by a driver on Arcola Avenue in Regina and asked the public in Regina to consider sheltering in place.

At that point RCMP located 10 individuals who had passed away and were investigating 13 locations in the communities of the James Smith Cree Nation and Weldon in

Saskatchewan.

Several additional victims were injured, 15 of which were transported to various hospitals.

On Sept. 5, after 11:30 a.m., a deceased male was located on the James Smith Cree Nation. At 1:17 p.m., it was confirmed by Saskatchewan RCMP Forensic Investigation Section the deceased was wanted Damien Sanderson.

His body was located outdoors, in a heavily grassed area in proximity to a house being investigated. RCMP confirmed he had visible

injuries, not believed to be self-inflicted at this point. The exact cause of death will be determined in conjunction with the Saskatchewan Coroner's Office with a date and time to be determined.

On Sept. 6, the Saskatchewan Health Authority (SHA) confirmed it had admitted 17 individuals presenting with injuries related to Sunday's events to hospitals within the province.

As of 1 p.m. on Tuesday,

Watrous RCMP received a report that sometime between Aug. 21 and 26 a bike was stolen from 8th Ave. W. in Watrous.

Second suspect apprehended after stabbings in James Smith Cree Nation and Weldon: a timeline of events

On Sept. 4, the first report was received by the Saskatchewan RCMP's Divisional Operational Communications Centre (DOCC) at 5:40 a.m. of a stabbing on James Smith Cree Nation. Two RCMP officers on duty that morning were at Melfort RCMP Detachment, which is approximately 45 kilometres from James Smith Cree Nation.

They were dispatched by DOCC at 5:43 a.m. The second call came in to DOCC at 5:59 a.m., it was a report of two injured people at a residence on James Smith Cree Nation,

Macaroni Salad Dressing

Ingredients:

Cooked macaroni
Green onions
Chopped tomato
Green peppers
1/2 cup sugar
1/2 cup oil
1/3 cup ketchup
1/4 cup vinegar
salt and pepper to taste

Directions:

Cook macaroni according to instructions on package. Rotini and other macaroni like shells tend to hold more of the dressing. Add whatever chopped vegetables you like. Mix the dressing ingredients and pour over salad. Stir gently and refrigerate before serving.

Other veggies that do well in this salad are finely chopped celery, chopped parsley, shredded carrots. Salad can be topped with Parmesan cheese before serving.

our local hardware store, where we bought the flooring, recommended a hardwood floor cleaner that left a huge streaky mess when I used it to mop the floor. I tried several other products including clear water, vinegar and water solution, etc. At my age, 71, it is tough to get down on my hands and knees to wipe one square foot at a time with the warm water and/or vinegar and water solution and then having to dry it immediately to eliminate the water marks and streaks. Do you have any suggestions? Mel

Dear Mel,

Purchase a good quality microfibre mop that includes both a wet and dry Velcro pad. The dry attachment is used to pick up daily dust. If you use a mop such as this, you can wash the floor with the wet mop, vinegar and water. After you have washed the floor once, go over the entire surface again with the wet mop, but do not add any water or vinegar to the mop. This extra step polishes and slightly dries the floor, thereby removing watermarks. Vacuuming on a regular basis is also helpful in keeping your floors looking great.

Now I hope you can use your wisdom to come up with a substitute for a daily shower cleaner which is another of my favourite things to use, but I would prefer to make my own. Can you help? What is the secret to grilling perfect steak done 'medium'? Auntie Barb

Dear Auntie Barb,

In a large container, combine half a teaspoon salt, one teaspoon pepper, two chopped garlic cloves, two tablespoons soy sauce, one teaspoon Worcestershire and one tablespoon olive oil, press onto meat. Close container and refrigerate for a few hours. Preheat the grill to medium/high temperature. Lay each steak on the grill for about seven to 10 minutes. Turn the steaks and continue to grill for five to seven minutes for medium (140° F). The total grill time depends on the heat of the flame and the thickness of the beef. For medium steak, the meat should feel like the top of your ring finger.

Ed, my old neighbour in Saskatchewan, has told me often that there is no point in disagreeing with him because only one of us can be correct, and he was convinced that it was him, not me. We all

believe that we know best regarding differences of opinions with others.

I observe that people today are obsessed with creating divisions, squabbles, arguments, dissensions, strife, rancor, antagonism, and hostility. Am I the only one to feel that folks are not happy unless they make sure everyone knows where they stand and are against those who do not see it their way? In the words of Ed, inflation has gone crazy, people are cranky and complaining about others and everything, and they cannot agree on anything. It is the new normal.

It is common in the Old and the New Testaments of the Bible to find people divided. The people of the Bible were often cranky, complaining and struggling over who was right and wrong. People always rebel against the idea that you can have two rights. There is a need in people to be right and for others to be wrong. Instinctively people feel that there must be divisions between right and wrong and who is good and evil? Who can you trust and who is not trustworthy? Is there a God or is there not a God overall?

Jesus, as the rabbi from

Nazareth, caused people to decide if He was a prophet, the Messiah, or a fraud. In Luke 12: 49-53, Jesus speaks of his approaching baptism of fire. Sept. 6, there were 10 patients in hospital. Three patients were in critical condition, seven in stable condition and, since Sunday, seven individuals had been discharged.

On Wednesday, Sept. 7, 2022, 2:07 p.m., Wakaw RCMP received a 911 report of a break-and-enter in progress in the Wakaw detachment area. Further information provided stated Myles Sanderson was standing outside of a residence, northeast of Wakaw, and was armed with a knife. Sanderson stole a white Chevrolet Avalanche truck and fled the property. The homeowner was not injured.

The Saskatchewan RCMP Operational Communications Centre continued to receive additional reports of Myles travelling in a vehicle.

All available police resources in that region immediately responded to the report, including a neighbouring RCMP detachment and an SPS and RCMP Aircraft.

At 2:49 p.m., an emergency alert was issued to help ensure the safety of residents in the Wakaw region and travellers on the highway.

Between 2:49 and 3:35 p.m., the Saskatchewan RCMP Operational Communications Centre received more than 20

calls from the public with potential sightings of the white Chevrolet Avalanche.

The unit was seen by a Rosthern RCMP officer driving in an unmarked vehicle, travelling west along Hwy. 1 toward Rosthern at a speed recorded at 150 km/h. Police confirmed the licence plate matched the initial report.

At approximately 3:30 p.m., the suspect vehicle was seen travelling south on Hwy. 11, south of Rosthern. To ensure the safety of drivers on the highway, the vehicle was directed off the road into a nearby ditch.

Police officers surrounded the vehicle and through verbal identification, confirmed the identity of the driver to be Myles Sanderson. He was arrested by police and taken into custody. A knife was located inside the vehicle.

The emergency alert was cancelled at 3:50 p.m. once the identity was confirmed and taken into police custody.

Shortly after his arrest, Myles went into medical distress. Nearby EMS were called by police to attend the scene and was transported to a hospital in Saskatoon. He was pronounced deceased at the hospital.

The Saskatchewan RCMP has requested the

Saskatoon Police Service and the Saskatchewan Incident Response Team conduct the independent, external investigation into the circumstances surrounding the incident. The Saskatchewan RCMP has requested the Ministry of Justice appoint an independent investigation observer in accordance with Section 91.1 of the Saskatchewan Police Act.

The magnitude of this investigation is immense. Over nearly four days, more than 160 Saskatchewan, Manitoba, Alberta and Ontario RCMP and municipal partner agency employees – both police officers and civilians – have been working nonstop on this investigation.

RCMP officers worked on: locating Myles Sanderson; following up on tips from the public; using every technological, human and investigational tactic and resource available to RCMP; having experts

continuing to conduct forensic investigations of 13 main crime scenes, as well as other associated crime scenes, such as vehicles; conducted over 150 interviews with witnesses and victims, with more anticipated to take place in the coming days; 400 investigative tasks have also been completed, with many more anticipated to take place in coming days; informing the public of updates to the investigation

and issuing 11 emergency alerts to notify the public of critical and unfolding public safety information; providing support services to work with families and victims, taking a trauma-informed approach to ensure survivors are cared for; meeting with local community members; since Sunday, the Saskatchewan RCMP's Divisional Emergency Operations Center (DEOC) has been active. The DEOC has been staffed 24 hours a day with a combination of police officer and civilian employees; and autopsies of the victims who passed away are to be completed by the Saskatchewan Coroner's Service. Autopsy details will not be released as it is part of the ongoing investigation.

The Saskatchewan Coroner's Service, in conjunction with the Saskatchewan RCMP and in collaboration with the families of the victims who passed away, released the names of the people who died as a result of the Sept. 4, 2022, stabbings on James Smith Cree Nation and in Weldon, Saskatchewan. "Our hearts continue to go out to all the families and loved ones impacted by this immense tragedy."

Victims Services continues to work closely with Saskatchewan RCMP Major Crimes and communicate with the families of the deceased

and injured victims. The deceased victims from James Smith Cree Nation are identified as: 23-year-old Thomas Burns, 46-year-old Carol Burns, 28-year-old Gregory Burns, 61-year-old Lydia Gloria Burns, 48-year-old Bonnie Burns, 66-year-old Earl Burns, 49-year-old Lana Head, 54-year-old Christian Head, and 49-year-old Robert Sanderson. The deceased victim from Weldon was 78-year-old Wesley Petterson.

The identities of injured persons will not be released. The Saskatchewan Coroner's Service can confirm one young teen was injured and the remaining injured are all adults. Injured victims encompass both males and females.

Saskatchewan RCMP continues to investigate this tragedy and a police presence will continue in the James Smith Cree Nation and Weldon communities for the next while.

The Saskatchewan RCMP would like to thank the public for their diligence in providing pertinent information and offer its deepest condolences to families and all those affected by these events. "Our thoughts are with you, and I hope that now you will be able to start healing. Thank you for your cooperation during this very difficult time."

Following the tragedy, a GoFundMe page was created by Rob Clarke, a former Member of Parliament and RCMP member. After surpassing a goal of \$100,000, in which the funds will be used for funeral costs to hospital and family expenses to long-term rehab and counselling, Clarke shared that with the funding objective being met quickly, that no more funds be directed to the account.

"The administration will be setting up a trust fund in the very near future and I will update accordingly, if anyone would still like to contribute. Once again I would like to thank everyone for their acts of kindness. I will be working with the administration to ensure that funds are handled in a transparent manner and are used for the communities needs."

In a media release, James Smith Cree Nations urged the public not to contribute to any new GoFundMe pages. "The

leadership of James Smith Cree Nation is grateful to all the donors who have contributed funds to support its affected members . . . any other crowdfunding campaigns have not been endorsed by James Smith Cree Nation nor JSCN-EOC."

In the near future, JSCN-EOC noted it would be releasing details on a new trust fund.

Local athletes compete at Canada 55+ Games

With 26 categories ranging from bowling to cycling, swimming to track and field, golf to curling and even card games, a local contingent recently headed west to Kamloops to compete in the Canada 55+ Games.

Due to the pandemic postponing the 2020 Games, in 2019, a Watrous senior men's curling team of Jim Holm, Fran Danelis, Ivan Sookaroff and Darrell Eaket qualified for the Games. With the 2020 Games rescheduled to Aug. 23 to 26, 2022 and some of the members who qualified for curling in 2019 passing away or unable to attend, the curling team which entered the 65+ division in Kamloops was Fran Danelis (Watrous), Herb Kornelsen (Watrous), Ray Dagg (Tisdale) and Darrell Eaket (Manitou Beach).

In golf, several local players made the cut as Lloyd Gullacher (Watrous), Garth MacLellan (Liberty), Robert McLane (Imperial) and Glenn Crawford (Simpson) qualified for Kamloops earlier this summer at the Saskatchewan 55+ Games in Prince Albert.

The first time the Games have been held in B.C. since they began in 1996, joining the curling competitors in Kamloops, Herb's wife Ruth shared participants and non-participants were able to enjoy the opening ceremonies Aug. 23 where they were led in by a bagpiper. Entering province by province and led with a provincial flag, Kornelsen said Kamloops gave each a warm welcome.

With curling sliding through the duration of the Games, the local rink with Eaket as skip, Dagg as third, Kornelsen as second and Danelis as lead were eager to get rolling. Following a practice on Aug. 22, the team played its first game on Tuesday against Kamloops. While the rink lost a close 7-6 draw they rebounded Wednesday against Manitoba with a big win. With a 1-1 record, Saskatchewan entered Thursday's game against Ontario with that draw going an extra end. In the added frame, Ontario would just sneak by, winning by one. "Though they didn't make the playoffs, the guys played well and greatly enjoyed the competition and the camaraderie that followed the games," said Kornelsen.

Playoffs were held Friday with Kamloops winning gold and Ontario claiming silver, two teams that Saskatchewan played against during the Games.

At the golf course and despite a week of 30°C temperatures and even a day hitting 41°C, local golfers took aim at competing against others from across the country. After placing second in Prince Albert,

Lloyd Gullacher entered the 55+ Callaway Division in Kamloops. Teeing off at Bighorn Golf and Country Club, after rounds of 93 and 93, Gullacher came away with a silver medal.

According to results from the Games website, at the Rivershore Golf Links in the male 75+ division, Garth MacLellan shot a round of 105 Aug. 25 and then in round two Aug. 26, carded a 90 for fifth place. Robert McLane had an opening round of 110 followed by a 108 placing him seventh.

In the male 85+ division, Glenn Crawford shot an opening round of 110 but was unable to finish round two

The MC's comment was 'or supper as you call it in Saskatchewan.' Also, the location of the 2024 games was revealed – Trois Rivieres, Quebec."

Local area athletes compete at Canada Summer Games

As the second week of the 2022 Canada Summer Games arrived, two athletes from the local area set their sights on finding success. Representing Team Sask. at the national event in Niagara, Ont. Elstow's Payne Wylie and Viscount's Connor Tetzlaff competed in athletics. For Wylie, he entered the hurdles and a pair of relays while Tetzlaff competed in

the medal heat Aug. 19. In the final, Wylie ran 15:40 during his leg but Saskatchewan did not finish and the team placed seventh.

In the 4x400 m relay, the 22-year-old and Team Sask. had a time of 3:22.99 in heat two Aug. 17. Qualifying for the medal round Aug. 20, Saskatchewan had a time of 3:17.52 and finished fifth overall.

Meanwhile, Tetzlaff competed in the high jump and in group one's qualification round Aug.

17, he had a jump of 1.83 m. Overall and after the final standings, the 21-year-old finished 11th and was the only representative from Saskatchewan competing in this event.

Following the Aug. 6 to 21 Games, the event wrapped up with the closing ceremony at Queen Victoria Park in Niagara Falls, Ont. Since Aug. 6, over 5,000 participants, 4,000 volunteers and countless visitors enjoyed 18 sports and over 250 events, including a pair of

festivals in Niagara Place and the 13 For 13 Cultural Festival. Team Sask. sent a contingent of 377 athletes and 86 coaches, managers, and support staff to the Games and came away with three gold, 13 silver and 16 bronze medals for a

total of 32 medals. Overall, Saskatchewan was seventh in the medal standings with Ontario in first at 198.

The next Canada Games will take place in Prince Edward Island which will be the 2023 Canada Winter Games.

SaskWater's District Operations will be treating the water in the Saskatoon Southeast Water Supply System (SSEWS) canal to control the growth of weeds and algae during the 2022 irrigation season.

These treatments will take place approximately every two weeks until September 23rd, 2022.

The chemical used in these treatments is called Magnacide "H". It is a registered aquatic herbicide that has been approved by the Water Security Agency for use in the SSEWS canal system.

It will remain active in the water for approximately 24 hours after each treatment and will diminish to non-detectable levels prior to treated water entering the reservoirs. Treated water may also be harmful to the skin, causing irritation to exposed areas.

This water treatment helps to prevent irrigation intakes from clogging and ensures adequate flows are maintained in this multi-use system.

Dosages will be maintained at a level where the water can safely be used for irrigation with no damage to field crops.

Please ensure that people are reminded that swimming, canoeing and fishing in the canal at any time is STRICTLY PROHIBITED.

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Weather allowing producers to make harvest progress

Despite weather delays during seeding in the spring, with the recent hot and dry weather, Crops Extension Specialist Michael Brown with the Regional Services Branch, Ministry of Agriculture said harvest operations within the local area are looking pretty good.

According to the Ministry of Agriculture's weekly Crop Report for Aug. 23 to 28, harvest progress was at 23 percent, up from 16 percent a week prior. The following week for the period of Aug. 30 to Sept. 5, that number jumped to 42 percent courtesy of the weather conditions. That mark pushed overall operations just ahead of the five-year average of 40 percent. An additional 20 percent of the crop was ready to swath or straight-cut while crops that were not ready for harvest quickly ripened after a stretch of warm and dry days.


The southwest region continued to lead harvest operations with 83 percent of the crop combined. That region was followed by west-central with 61 percent of their crop harvested. The southeast was next at 33 percent with the northwest at 28 percent, the east-central 27 percent and the northeast 21 percent.

With the hot and dry weather, Brown expected those percentages to continue to rise. "For the most part it is still pretty dry out there. Humboldt area did receive a heavy shot of rain at the end of August but it only delayed field operations for a few days. Producers have been able to get going in their fields and they put the "labour" into labour day long weekend this year. Lots of work being done with swathing, combining, moving equipment, trucking, and desiccating all well underway."

The latest weekly Crop Report indicated winter cereals were very close to being completed with 96 percent of winter wheat and 84 percent of fall rye harvested. Ninety-one percent of lentils and field peas, 70 percent of durum, 52 percent of barley, 40 percent of spring wheat and 22 percent of the canola crop has now been combined.

According to the Ministry of Agriculture, the current estimated averages of crop yields have come in at 43 bushels per acre for hard red spring wheat, 30 bushels per acre for durum, 34 bushels per acre for canola, 34 bushels per acre for field peas and 1,174 pounds per acre for lentils. The report indicated crop yields in the southwest and west-central regions have been greatly affected by the extremely hot and dry conditions experienced during critical growing stages this season. Because of that, yields were significantly lower in those areas compared to provincial averages.

Closer to home, as more crops are taken off fields,

Brown figured harvest appears to be going much better in 2022 as opposed to 2021. While there were more heavy, localized storms compared to the more preferred widespread soaker rains during the growing season, he said, "Areas to the east were able to catch more of those rains this year but areas to the south and west weren't as lucky and will probably see average to below average yields. It is still very dry out in the area south of Hwy. 16 between Hanley and Watrous."

Taking a tour of the Bradwell National Wildlife Area, Brown indicated sloughs that relied on overland water were completely dry and the ones that had groundwater discharge were still low. With the dry conditions, according to the Ministry of Agriculture, cropland topsoil moisture was rated as one percent surplus, 42 percent adequate, 34 percent short and 23 percent very short. Hay and pasture land topsoil moisture is rated as one percent surplus, 35 percent adequate, 39 percent short and 25 percent very short.

Brown cautioned dry conditions remain the biggest concern for producers and with the recent hot temperatures there is a risk of field fires. "We have seen a few already this year. Have a fire extinguisher on board the equipment in the field and have a set of discs and a water tank nearby in case anything does happen. It's better to have it and not need it than need it and not have it."

As for recent crop damage in fields, according to the weekly Crop Report, the majority was attributed to wind and grasshoppers. Strong winds blew swaths around fields and will result in yield loss and a difficult harvest for affected producers. Strong winds are likely to shell out very ripe crops leading to crop yield reductions as well. Grasshoppers will continue to be a significant problem until conditions are less favourable for them. Producers have noticed a slight increase of ergot fungus in their cereal fields this year; likely due to the increase in precipitation received during the crop flowering stage.



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


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


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

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Seven ways to help a farmer who lives with anxiety

All of us worry and get scared from time to time. Farming can be a very rewarding yet worrisome occupation because of its intense busy seasons and many stressors outside of our control, like the weather and markets. But for those living with anxiety or diagnosed with an anxiety disorder, farming can be especially challenging due to having intense, frequent, and persistent worry and fear about everyday situations. Often, anxiety disorders involve repeated episodes of sudden feelings of intense anxiety and fear or terror that reach a peak within minutes (panic attacks).

These feelings of anxiety and panic interfere with daily activities, are difficult to control, are out of proportion to the actual danger and can last a long time. Research from the University of Guelph, undertaken by Dr. Andrea Jones-Bitton, found that almost 60% of the 1100 farmers were classified with varying levels of anxiety.

It's not always easy to know how to support a friend or family member who has an anxiety disorder, especially if you're worried that what you say or do might inadvertently make their anxiety worse.

2. Listen to and validate

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Fear not: If someone has shared their struggles with you, it's likely because they trust you. And that means that just offering to sit with them and listen can be healing for your friend and loved one. The support of family and friends is especially meaningful given that, due to the stigma, many anxiety-prone people may not talk about their condition, which can make them feel isolated and increase their anxiety over the long term. Anxiety is a real illness, and like many illnesses, it can be treated. If we send signals that anxiety isn't real or what they are feeling shouldn't be taken seriously, we run the risk of further stigmatizing the person and that can lead to avoiding seeking care.

If a farmer or someone you care about has an anxiety disorder, here are some of the best ways you can support them:

1. Learn more about anxiety: Education is key if we want to support our family, friends, neighbours and reduce the stigma about mental health. It can be extremely helpful to learn as much as possible about how to help someone with anxiety disorder. You can start by teaching yourself about what causes anxiety, common signs and symptoms of anxiety, and effective management techniques.

2. Listen to and validate

How can I help support you?

I've noticed you've been anxious recently, and I'm worried about you.

Do you want to go for a walk or drive and talk about it?

3. Let them know you are there for them: You can do this by letting them know it's okay to not be okay and it's okay to feel however they feel. It's important to make sure you're able to listen and validate them and their feelings if someone with anxiety is seeking reassurance from you.

4. Ask and listen to how they want to be supported: When you ask the person how you can support them, listen carefully to their preferences. After all, you want to know how to help people with anxiety and support them. They may want help breaking down a task they are anxious about, they may want you to distract them from their anxious thoughts or they may just want someone to talk to. By taking the time to listen and understand their needs, you can give them emotional support that will really make a difference. Here are some statements you can share that shows support:

5. Learn about effective and healthy coping tools and strategies:

Another way to support is to learn about effective coping tools so that you can encourage them to use the tools when they are anxious. For instance, you can learn how to support a friend or loved one when they are having a panic attack or teach them "grounding" exercises that help redirect their focus away from what is making them anxious. One grounding exercise is to focus on their immediate physical environment and then name:

- Five things they see
- Four things they can feel (like "feet on the floor," "chair on my

back," "wind in my face")

• Three things they can hear

• Two things they can smell

• One good thing they can say about themselves

6. Keep lines of communication open:

When it comes to helping someone with anxiety, it is important to keep an open line of communication with them. If you are able to, see the person regularly as this will help with managing anxiety. Spend one-on-one time with them so that they have opportunities to talk about anything they feel anxious about. You can also keep in touch over the phone, video or calling them regularly or sending a text every few

days just to see how their week is going.

7. Look after yourself:

When you offer to help with anxiety, it is understandable for you to feel frustrated, scared or tired from time to time. It is likely that their anxieties are having an effect on you too. Make sure that you're dealing with these emotions and maintaining your wellbeing. Talk to other friends or family members about how you are feeling, think about accessing therapeutic support, take really good care of your physical and mental health, and book in time every week to do activities that you enjoy. By keeping yourself well, you will be in a much better position to help the person with anxiety.

And always remember, you're doing your best and so is the person living with anxiety.



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
