ALC beds temporarily closed at Lanigan; Watrous sees access to resources as COVID cases increase

As more and more daily active COVID-19 cases appear within the local region and throughout the province, Saskatchewan Health Authority (SHA) has been moving forward with its Health System Readiness plan. As part of that plan, a temporary closure of Alternate Level of Care (ALC) beds has been issued at Lanigan Hospital while resources have been allocated to the hospital in Watrous.

SHA stated the temporary closure of ALC beds at Lanigan Hospital went into effect Nov. 30 and will remain until further notice. "Due to active COVID-19 activity in the area, staffing challenges in Lanigan, and required redeployment of health care providers to other health services to support care, ALC beds will be temporarily closed at the facility effective Nov. 30, 2020. ALC admissions have also been temporarily suspended. Lab and X-ray services are not affected. Patients affected by the closure will also be temporarily relocated to appropriate facilities in the area as beds become available."

SHA said in the event of an emergency, residents of Lanigan and the immediate area can call 9-1-1 or visit the emergency department in either Humboldt, Watrous, or Wynyard. Non-urgent health related questions can be directed to the provincial HealthLine by calling 8-1-1.

Back in April of this year, SHA shared its Integrated Rural Health plans and as part of those, Lanigan's hospital was one of 12 designated ALC sites. Working to convert the 12 sites, a temporary suspension of emergency services also took place. As conversions to the 12 ALC sites occurred earlier in 2020, the majority were later allowed to reopen their emergency services because of lower than anticipated COVID numbers; however, due to staffing challenges, SHA noted the emergency services in Lanigan remained closed.

Having those emergency services suspended in Lanigan for the majority of this year has caused frustration for many in the community and surrounding area. SHA Physician Executive Dr. Kevin Wasko understands the disappointment and noted before the recent surge in COVID cases, officials had been working with SHA and community leaders to find new and innovative ways to provide emergency care in Lanigan.

"A lot of that work was underway in the fall to try to create some processes that made use of virtual care and also had times where there would be in-person emergency assessments from a physician as well. Those had been progressing quite well but with changes that came with our surge of cases in the province with COVID we had halted that. But there is the intention that when our numbers start to settle down and we start to see that we are better able to manage the surge of cases then at some point in the new year we would resume those conversations."

Asked if Wasko could confirm whether or not emergency services would in fact resume in Lanigan, he stated,

"They will look different than what they had previously, but how exactly they look differently is yet to be determined. It is something that is in the works. The involvement of community leaders, patient and family partners, that's all been part of the work that has been underway."

In Watrous, emergency services remain open as that facility has been marked as a COVID-19 hospital through SHA's Integrated Rural Health plan. Meanwhile in Humboldt the hospital there also has emergency services open but is designated as a non-COVID hospital. Despite what each facility has been designated, VP of Integrated Rural Health, Karen Earnshaw said whether community or regional, all hospitals need to be COVID ready.

"What that means really is they need the ability to be ready to provide care to anyone who is needing that care. Since spring we have done training, we have done scaling up, we have ensured people have access to all the most appropriate personal protective equipment and whatever they may need to care for both COVID and non-COVID patients."

As for what changes are currently taking place at the hospital in Watrous, Earnshaw said things are continuing along other than they have increased access to both physicians and licensed staff. Being deemed a COVID hospital, Watrous would be accepting COVID-19 patients should enough of a surge require it. Earnshaw stated the move to have increased access to both physicians and licensed staff is to ensure that there is less of a chance of being short a provider and having disruptions.

By adding to the numbers in Watrous, Wasko added that is what the recent changes in Lanigan have provided. "Yes we have reduced some of the services temporarily in Lanigan but that means we have been able to enhance the pool of staff and physicians that can serve Watrous to ensure that that service is even more stable and reliable as we go into an uncertain time over the next few months."

With the ongoing surge in cases, SHA is moving ahead with its next phase of its surge plan, including required

Dog park being created at Manitou Beach

With a number of dog owners residing in Watrous and Manitou Beach and visitors bringing their companions with them to the resort village, a group of local residents are creating an off-leash dog park at Manitou Beach.

Looking to have the park open for dogs and their owners come spring, Manitou Beach resident Marcie Seymour who has spearheaded the project shared a bit about the process and how it has all come together.

How did the idea of an off-leash dog park come about?

Over the years there has been a lot of talk of a dog park in the Watrous area. The interest from dog owners in the area started the initial spark for the project. A lot of locals and tourists like to bring their dogs to the beach and exercise them

on the trails. But, dogs aren't allowed on MacLachlan Beach and there have been complaints over the last few years of dogs not being picked up after or running off-leash.

We figured the addition of a designated spot for dogs to get some exercise would be a great addition to the community and surrounding area.

When did the process begin and how did it come to fruition?

Although it has been a thought in my mind for over a year, this project really began in early September. I created a Facebook post asking if there was still interest in an off-leash dog park and if anyone was interested in being involved to contact me.

I took our proposal for the dog park to the council of Manitou Beach for approval and received the go ahead at council's next meeting.

The approved proposal included: use of village property east of the Community Hall and south of the lookout point on the walking trail at Manitou Beach; use of elk fencing donated to the village by BHP; a draft of the rules and guidelines; benefits to the community; and the expectations of the off-leash committee.

Tell me a bit about the dog park?

We haven't been out to measure exactly, but the perimeter of the fence is approximately 2,000 feet. We chose that specific location because it has a mix of rugged and level ground. The top area where the main entrance will be is fairly even and is best suited for small or elderly dogs. The rough terrain further down the valley provides a challenge for larger, more active dogs. There's plenty of natural trees and shrubs for the dogs to

explore as well.

We are planning on having two double-gated entry points. The main entrance will be on the west side of the park and another entrance will be placed on the east side. There will be a sign located at each entrance with our rules and regulations. There is no fee to use the park, we just ask that you follow the rules!

Were others involved with the park project and where are you at in terms of completing it?

There have been a ton of people involved and supporting this project, it's hard to name them all! First, I should mention the women on the committee: Marie Schmidt, Jessica Richardson,

►After securing a parcel of land at the Resort Village of Manitou Beach, geotechnical soil analysis work took place last week as part of the Oasis Village project. Small business emergency payment program renewed

The Government of Saskatchewan announced the Saskatchewan Small Business Emergency Payment (SSBEP) program is being renewed for the period of Dec. 1 to 31. Through this program, small businesses closed or significantly curtailed due to a public health order will be eligible for provincial support.

"Our government recognizes that small businesses are the heartbeat of Saskatchewan's economy," Premier Scott Moe said. "By renewing the Small Business Emergency Payment, we are ensuring small businesses remain strong and continue to provide thousands of jobs across Saskatchewan, even when they are impacted by public health orders necessary to reduce the spread of COVID-19."

"Our small business community continues to be impacted by the global COVID-19 pandemic," Trade and Export Development Minister Jeremy Harrison said. "As we focus on our economic recovery plan during this challenging period, renewing this program will help provide critical

assistance to our small businesses who have had to fully or partially close their doors to protect public health and reduce the spread of COVID-19."

The SSBEP program initially launched April 13, 2020 to provide support to small businesses that had to temporarily close or substantially curtail their operations as a result of COVID-19. The program was extended for May 2020 and provided 6,485

businesses more than \$32 million in support.

“RCMP Report”

Cannabis seizure on Hwy. 1 p.m., White Butte RCMP were contacted by the

On Wednesday, Nov. 25, shortly before 9:30 a.m., Saskatchewan Highway Patrol (SHP) after they

stopped a semi-truck for a commercial vehicle inspection on Hwy. 1 east between Pense and Grand Coulee.

During the inspection, approximately 223 lbs. of cannabis was discovered in the trailer of the commercial vehicle. The driver was arrested by the Saskatchewan Highway Patrol and White Butte RCMP.

As a result of this investigation, 51-year-old Cesk Kalaj of Milton, Ont., was charged with one count of Possessing Cannabis for the Purpose of Distributing under the Cannabis Act and one count of Possessing Unstamped Cannabis under the Excise Act.

Kalaj appeared in Regina Provincial Court on Nov. 26 and was released with conditions. Kalaj is scheduled to make his next court appearance on Feb. 17, 2021.

White Butte RCMP continue to investigate.

RCMP investigating break and enters

On Nov. 29 Humboldt RCMP were dispatched to multiple break and enters in the towns of Muenster and Lake Lenore.

Three buildings on Railway Street in Muenster had been broken into between the hours of 8

p.m. and 4 a.m. the next morning. There were also three attempted break and enters into three separate buildings in Lake Lenore during this same time period. Unknown suspect(s) forced entry into these businesses and stole items once inside.

RCMP believe all these incidents are related.

Humboldt and Langan RCMP along with Saskatoon Forensic Identification Section are investigating at this time.

RCMP partners with 211 Saskatchewan to provide additional support to victims

This past summer, the funding has been approved through the RCMP's Family Violence Initiative Fund to complete a division-wide, general duty business card reprint. The new business cards will have the RCMP contact information on the front, in English and French, and 211 Saskatchewan information on the back.

Victim assistance can be a frustrating process and victims are often required to call multiple service providers before getting the appropriate assistance. This can discourage victims from seeking assistance.

"Front line officers with the RCMP will use the business cards to inform clients of 211 Saskatchewan and provide them with an avenue of outreach when a social issue is beyond our scope of ability to help with," said Constable Joelle Nieman, Saskatchewan RCMP's Violence Relationship Coordinator.

This initiative was created to help victims of intimate partner violence and family violence who often struggle in silence. 211 Saskatchewan will be an avenue to help empower victims to reach out for help and feel confident knowing they can access the services they need, immediately and within

their own community. 211 Saskatchewan is grateful for our partnership with the RCMP. With 211 being available 24/7/365 through phone, text, web chat, or independent search online, help is available in the way that is most comfortable and convenient for the person seeking services," said Kristin Nelson, Director of 211 Saskatchewan. "Over the phone, services are available in over 175 languages, including 17 Indigenous languages. We are focused on connecting people to supports and services in their community. Through this partnership, we can help people meet their needs through the most appropriate and effective channel."

Saskatchewan RCMP participates in new initiatives to help victims and survivors of Intimate Partner Violence

The Saskatchewan RCMP was proud to take part in Saskatchewan Violence Prevention Week, which ran from Nov. 30 to Dec. 6, 2020. Saskatchewan Violence Prevention Week is an opportunity to gather people together to focus on the prevention of violence and bring discussions of Intimate Partner Violence (IPV) to the fore-

front.

Violence in Relationships investigations remain a high priority for the RCMP. Police officers respond and attend to these types of calls for service immediately. These types of investigations are very complex.

From January to September 2020, there have been 3,711 victims of Intimate Partner Violence reported to the Saskatchewan RCMP. So far, 2,529 of these files resulted in charges.

In October 2019, the Saskatchewan RCMP launched its first Violence in Relationships Course. This training gave officers an opportunity to listen, firsthand, to the experiences of survivors of Intimate Partner Violence. This helped our officers increase their understanding of the cycles of violence and how interactions with police impacts the situation.

"We do not measure success on Intimate Partner Violence files by laying charges or making arrests," said Cst. Nieman. "Success is measured by ensuring victims have support measures in place that meet their needs and ensuring they are safe."

Resources to assist victims and survivors of Intimate Partner Violence

Intimate Partner Violence

There are many resources that can assist victims and survivors with safety planning. Whether or not victims and survivors decide to report the violence to police, they can reach out to local victim services, shelters, cultural and community health centers, Indigenous friendship centers and other community centers for support.

If you think someone you know might be a victim or survivor, RCMP encourage you to reach out to that person and encourage them to seek support and identify their support network.

Fatal collision at Hwy. 16 and Hwy. 9 junction

On Nov. 30 at approximately 5 p.m., Yorkton RCMP responded to the report of a collision involving a car and a semi at the intersection of Hwy. 16 and Hwy. 9.

A car was travelling south on Hwy. 9 and collided with the rear trailer of a semi travelling west on Hwy. 16.

The driver of the car, a 43-year-old male from

Churchbridge, passed away while being transported to hospital by ground ambulance.

The passenger of the car, a 42-year-old female from Churchbridge was reported to have sustained critical injuries and was transported to hospital in Regina by ground ambulance.

The driver and lone occupant of the semi, a

67-year-old male, was reported to not have sustained any injuries.

An RCMP Traffic Reconstructionist, Yorkton RCMP Traffic Services, the Saskatchewan Ministry of Highways and Infrastructure and the Saskatchewan Coroner's Service all attended the scene.

The investigation is ongoing.





all over again. What is an easier way to remove bandages without the hurt? Celeste

Dear Celeste,

Step one: if the area is allowed to become wet, have him take a warm bath submersing the bandage. Step two: soak a cotton ball in olive oil and gently rub it over the bandage until it loosens. Step three: take a hair dryer and heat the area while gently removing the bandage.

Dear Reena,

I have a canvas strap that I use to carry my drum when marching in my band. The problem is the metal hooks that attach to the strap have caused rust stains on the strap that I would like to cover or remove. Help. Thanks, Ray

Dear Ray,

You can remove the rust stains by pouring three percent hydrogen peroxide and salt onto the stain. Set in a sunny spot for a few days and wash with dish soap and water. If the stain remains, pour a few additional drops of three percent hydrogen peroxide and a few drops of household ammonia onto the rust. Cover with plastic wrap. Remove after 24 hours and rinse with dish soap and water (test all products before using). Extra tip: In order to prevent the hooks from further damaging the strap, consider coating the hooks with clear nail polish.

Dear Reena,

I am hoping you can help me rescue a turtleneck T-shirt. I recently went for a massage at a new clinic. The masseuse used grape seed oil instead of lotion like the previous person had used. I did not like the 'aroma' or the feel of the oil. At home I immediately laundered the T-shirt

(and had a shower). Afterwards the T-neck still smelled and I realized that the oil was rancid. I now need advice on how to get the rancid smell out of the shirt.

The T-neck is white, 100 percent cotton of good quality (Eddie Bauer brand). The T-shirt was washed in warm water using liquid "free and gentle" detergent. It was dried (along with the rest of that load of laundry) in the dryer on delicate/low until approximately 80 percent dry, then hung to dry completely.

The odour has become so bad that it smells from several feet away and tends to turn my stomach. I suspect that the T-shirt is ruined but because it is a favourite, I want to try to rescue it. Thank you in advance for your advice. Joanne

Dear Joanne,


In order to better your chance of getting rid of the smell, wash the T-shirt in hot water instead of warm. Begin by soaking the shirt in a pot and one gallon water and either one-quarter cup Borax or white vinegar or washing soda or club soda. Boil for five minutes. Next launder with hot water. If the shirt still smells put it outside on a snowy day, the combination of sunshine and snow will help take away the rancid oil smell.

Handy Tip of the Week

• Spills are a part of everyday life. Here is an easy recipe for making wipes to store in your car for those unexpected moments. Cut one roll of paper towels in half to create usable squares. Place cut paper towels into a plastic container. In a bowl, combine half cup olive oil, three cups water and half cup baby shampoo. Pour over paper towels and close with a tightly fitting lid. Store in car, shake before using.

Cream Cheese Cranberry Muffins

Ingredients:

- 1 cup butter, softened
- 1 brick cream cheese, softened
- 1 1/2 cups sugar
- 1 1/2 tsp. vanilla
- 4 eggs
- 2 cups flour
- 1 1/2 tsp. baking powder
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 2 cups fresh or frozen cranberries
- 1/2 cup chopped pecans

Directions:

Mix butter, cream cheese, sugar and vanilla. Beat well. Add eggs, one at a time, mixing after each one. Combine flour, baking powder and salt, and stir into creamed mixture just until moistened. Fold in cranberries and pecans. Fill greased muffin tins (or paper lined) 3/4 full. Bake at 350°F for 20 to 22 minutes. Cool in pan for five minutes before removing to rack to finish cooling. Makes two dozen. We like these best if they are served warm.

Clothesline red bin program beneficial in a number of ways

Despite navigating through the COVID-19 pandemic and heading into the holiday season, the need for items like clothing, footwear and general household textiles remains. With that need across the province, locally people have been extending a helping hand by placing donations in the Clothesline red bins in Watrous which in turn has also helped a local organization.

Deborah Farago with Interlake Human Resources in Watrous said the red drop boxes which can be found near the Interlake office at 116 Main Street and at Watrous Home Hardware at 802 4th Ave. E. not only help people in need but they also assist Interlake as well.

With a goal to raise funds for diabetes research, education and advocacy, Farago said the Canadian Diabetes Association entered a partnership with Interlake to allow them to monitor and empty the bins as well as store the donations in a secure location until the diabetes truck arrives and picks the items up.

As the truck comes to Watrous each month, participants at Interlake assist the driver in loading the bags and boxes, providing employment to them throughout the year. Farago said the funds made

from helping load the trucks are then used to provide recreational programming to participants at Interlake that they may otherwise not be able to enjoy.

"All the participants pitch in and help load the donations onto the truck every month no matter the weather or time of year."

Appreciating the partnership between Interlake and the Canadian Diabetes Association, Farago said the opportunities that have been provided to the participants at Interlake along with Watrous Home Hardware's positive working relationship while housing a second red bin has been tremendous.

"We really appreciate all who have donated items to the two red bins or have brought items to Interlake. Your continued support in choosing to donate by using the bins directly contributes to programming for adults with cognitive disabilities from your very own community."

With a win-win partnership between the Canadian Diabetes Association and Watrous Interlake Human Resources, people using the bins can donate everything from clothing, accessories and bags, curtains, general household textiles like towels, blankets and sheets, shoes and boots and sleeping bags.

People planning to donate are encouraged to keep

items small enough for one person to pick up and carry; place any textiles in a standard 67 litre garbage bag; gather household items together and put them into boxes; make sure each item, bag or box does not exceed 20 pounds in weight; do not include organic or hazardous materials in your donation; and any large appliances or furniture are not accepted.

Also, the council of Manitou Beach has been involved and graciously

volunteered one of their staff members to help put the posts in the ground for us. Communities in Bloom also had a few volunteers come out and help us with the posts.

The park isn't quite complete yet but we expect it to be open to

public use in the spring!
How great will it be to have the off-leash dog park at the beach?

We've heard nothing but great things! Here are the benefits we included in our proposal that we submitted to the Resort Village of Manitou Beach

council:

- The off-leash park will create another opportunity for the community to gather and socialize in a public space;
- Safe place for owners and dogs to get exercise;
- Opportunity for citizens and visitors to socialize their dogs. Regular socialization usually results in healthier, less aggressive, and less destructive pets;
- Allow pets to meet in neutral territory;
- Promote responsible pet ownership and enforcement of pet-control laws;
- Create a safe place for elderly or disabled persons to exercise their pets;
- Potential of better compliance regarding leashing bylaws outside of the park;
- Create a more "livable" community for existing and potential community members with dogs; and
- Reduce presence of dogs in other parks and beaches.

Once it is officially open and people are able to use it, what are the regulations that

Manitou and on Dec. 18 we will display the photos on our new school sign."



service slow downs to support the redeployment of up to 600 full-time equivalent staff to support the pandemic response.

The move is being done with a goal to avoid a broad reduction of services across all areas in the health care system.

As part of the surge plan's first phase, SHA will be creating capacity for 64 COVID patients requiring ICU care by mid-December to try to keep pace with projected demand. This means creating capacity to meet demand that is equivalent to 28 percent more ICU beds than what currently exists in Saskatoon and Regina.

Other parts of phase one include strengthening SHA's supplemental labour pool to increase responsiveness to outbreaks and situations where large numbers of staff are required to isolate. SHA will also review surge plans every week to ensure each surge and any associated slow downs are as measured as possible to maintain an appropriate balance between urgent needs of the pandemic response and the need for Saskatchewan residents to have access to every day health services.

Over the coming days, SHA indicated services will be affected at different levels depending on local plans and needs. Services slowing down include some primary health care services, elective surgeries in urban centres, endoscopy/ cystoscopy procedures, Women and Children's Programming, diagnostics, therapies, ambulatory care, registration resources, environmental and food and nutrition services, rehab services and home care services.

SHA said, "It is critical to note that these services will still be available, just at reduced volumes or levels. The scale of service slow downs range by location and service type. In the vast majority of cases, these slow downs are simply reducing service volumes to enable redeployment of



staff. There are some limited exceptions where services will be temporarily paused. These are highly localized programs like dental programs, therapeutic and rehabilitation programs and active living programs. Notifications for local staff and key local stakeholders for these service pauses will occur in the coming days and will be communicated publicly once those have occurred.”

By implementing the service changes, SHA can then redeploy up to 600 FTE staff to strengthen testing, contact tracing and to identify the health care workers necessary to expand hospital and ICU capacity to help keep COVID and non-COVID patients alive and ensure the SHA can provide the care they need.

“While we acknowledge that service slow downs will temporarily reduce access for Saskatchewan residents to some of their everyday health services, the alternative is for our health system to be overwhelmed and to risk our ability to provide critical lifesaving services to both COVID and non-COVID patients.”

On Nov. 26, SHA released a Health Sys-

tem Readiness update and in it, stated the number of cases in the province had risen 363 percent in the last 30 days and continued to grow. The number of those hospitalized was also up, a total of 383 percent in the last 30 days and growing. The percentage of ICU capacity being used for COVID patients was 27 percent and growing, up from five percent one month prior.

With 76 COVID-19 cases in long-term care and 27 outbreaks in facilities serving seniors or vulnerable clients as of Nov. 25, SHA noted protecting the most vulnerable is a priority.

As of Dec. 3 there were 259 new cases of COVID-19 in Saskatchewan bringing the provincial total to date to 9,244 cases. The seven-day average of daily new cases was 269 (22.2 new cases per 100,000 population).

Of the 9,244 reported cases, 4,017 were considered active. A total of 5,173 people have recovered and 54 people have died.

One-hundred and twenty-eight people are in hospital with 104 receiving in-patient care and 24 in intensive care.

The eligibility period for this phase of the SSBEP will be from Dec. 1 to 31, 2020, and is estimated to cost \$8 million. Applications for the SSBEP will open on Dec. 7, 2020 and the application deadline for this eligibility period is Jan. 31, 2021.

Eligible applicants will receive a payment of 15 percent of their monthly sales revenue, to a maximum of \$5,000, based on the greater of November 2019, December 2019, or February 2020 sales revenue. For seasonal businesses, the funding support will be 15 percent of the average monthly sales revenue for full months that the business operated in 2019.

Eligible applicants must attest that they: are a small or medium business (0-499 employees); maintain a permanent establishment in Saskatchewan and allocate a portion of their income to Saskatchewan; were operating Oct. 31, 2020, or eligible to operate, in the case of seasonal business; are subject to a public health order that requires them to temporarily suspend or substantially curtail their operations during the eligibility period Dec. 1 to 31, 2020; have experienced a loss of sales revenue; and plan to reopen when the public health restrictions are lifted.

Further details and applications will be available at noon Dec. 7.
