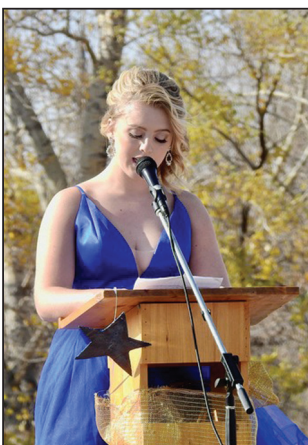

Sask. Party forms fourth straight majority government

While the official results will not be known until Nov. 7, the Saskatchewan Party received more than enough votes to win a fourth straight majority government, something not seen since the Tommy Douglas era. As voters from across the province cast their ballots, locally the Saskatchewan Party's Donna Harpauer was re-elected in the Humboldt-Watrous constituency while Dana Skoropad won his seat in the Arm River constituency for the Saskatchewan Party.

With the COVID-19 pandemic creating challenges, voters had the option to submit their vote by mail and a total of 61,255 total mail ballots were issued in the province. Since it will take some time for the mailed ballots to reach their destination, according to Elections Saskatchewan that means a first preliminary count of the votes took place on election night (Oct. 26). From that count, 385,461 votes were tallied. A second preliminary count occurred Oct. 28 with mailed ballots that were received pushing that count to 425,670 votes and a final count of the remaining ballots that were mailed in will take place Nov. 7.

Because of the delay and with a few close races, that meant the outcome of who won in those close races was different than what it reflected Oct. 26. On election night after the ballots were tallied, according to Elections Saskatchewan, the Saskatchewan Party found itself with 50 seats (242,638 votes and 62.95 percent of the vote) followed by the New Democratic Party with 11 seats (112,263 votes and 29.12 percent of the vote).

If those results were to have held up through to the final count then the Saskatchewan Party would have gained two seats while the NDP would have dropped a pair of seats. Other results from the first preliminary count showed the Buffalo Party of Saskatchewan garnering 11,055 votes or 2.87 percent of the total vote; the Green Party of Saskatchewan had 9,108 votes and 2.36 percent of the overall vote; the Progressive Conservative Party of Sas-

katchewan had 7,987 votes and 2.07 percent of the overall vote; Independents received 954 votes and 0.25 percent of the overall vote; and the Saskatchewan Liberals had 338 votes or 0.09 percent of the overall vote.

Those numbers did change after the second preliminary vote though as the NDP gained two seats back to reflect the Saskatchewan Party holding 48 seats while the NDP had 13.

Locally, after the second preliminary count, for the Humboldt-Watrous constituency: Donna Harpauer with the Saskatchewan Party received 5,564 votes; Wendy Sekulich with the NDP had 1,121 votes; Constance Maffenbeir with the Buffalo Party of Saskatchewan had 525 votes; Rose Buscholl with the PC Party of Saskatchewan had 236 votes; and Jim Ternier with the Green Party had 175 votes. There were a total of 676 mail ballots issued with 440 of those counted.

For the Arm River constituency after the second preliminary count: Dana Skoropad with the Saskatchewan Party received 6,480 votes; Cam Goff with the NDP received 1,299 votes; Steve Forbes of the PC Party of Saskatchewan had 430; and Tiffany Giesbrecht of the Green Party had 192. There were a total of 584 mail ballots issued with 425 of those counted.

First elected to the Legislature representing the former Watrous constituency in 1999, Harpauer was once again re-elected in the Humboldt-Watrous constituency. Heading into the Oct. 26 election, Harpauer was the province's Finance Minister and with members of her family joining her to watch the results come in, she was thrilled with the outcome.

"It is always an honour to have the confidence of the people of the Humboldt-Watrous constituency. Now I have to take on that responsibility to deliver on not only what we promised in the platform but to do what I feel is best and what is needed for those that are in the Humboldt-Watrous constituency.

“We said that the ballot question was who do people believe and trust to manage an economic recovery because it is critical for the future of the province. We are hearing that the people are putting their trust in us so that is a task that we must take on very seriously and we will. We need to recover and we believe we can and we believe that we can grow going forward and balance our budget in a few years.”

With the pandemic posing some challenges during the campaign, Harpauer said it was more unique than in years past. In addition, this year Premier Scott Moe asked Harpauer to be the co-chair of the provincial campaign. “My role in this campaign was a little more divided. I had less time in the constituency itself and spent more time than I ever had before in Regina with debates and some of the larger provin-

cial platforms. It was different for me; however, the people within the province were definitely there for me.”

Elected as part of the Saskatchewan Party’s first majority government and being part of the party for its four majority government victories, Harpauer noted the importance of the substantial victories. “I think it is a huge measure that we can now say that perhaps we will be the natural governing party within Saskatchewan. Considering when the Saskatchewan Party was formed, I think there was a lot of doubt. It was not a party that had any federal connections whatsoever. There was a lot of naysayers saying that it wouldn’t work and we have proven them wrong.”

As for Harpauer’s thoughts on Premier Scott Moe’s first election victory as premier, Harpauer has been a supporter since day one when he decided to run for the job after Brad Wall stepped away from politics.

“I have had faith in him and I still do. I think Scott is very strong but he is also very diverse. Scott can relate to the urban and rural, to First Nations and non-First Nations. He is that guy that is just relatable, easy to talk to and easy to approach. I think that is what Saskatchewan is looking for.”

With a victory in her constituency and previously holding the role of finance minister leading up

to the election, Harpauer admitted that navigating through a pandemic will be daunting. However, with the goal of balancing a budget by 2024 without raising any taxes and making major cuts, she said, “It is definitely doable. Our recovery is going to be getting our business community back to where it was and then to grow going forward. We have proven that growth in our past and we will prove it once again. The Saskatchewan people are up to that task.”

Reflecting back on her time as MLA for the local area, Harpauer said, “This constituency has been awesome and it is always very humbling to know that I have their support as strong as what I do. I just hope that I measure up to what they expect and I will work very hard to do so.”

While Harpauer was first elected to the Legislature in 1999, Arm River’s Dana Skoropad will be headed to Regina for the first time. Skoropad was nominated as the Saskatchewan Party candidate for the 2020 election after longtime MLA Greg Brkich decided to step away from the political ring.

After seeing the results come in during election night, Skoropad was thrilled with the outcome. “It has been a lot of time and a lot of hard work from a lot of people since the nomination process even began edging toward two years ago. All of that work all culminated into one

night and watching the results come in, it was exciting, it was nerve-racking, it was exhilarating, it was humbling, every emotion you could throw together. But in the end, I can’t just express how honoured I am that it worked out.”

Seeing the Saskatchewan Party form another majority government, Skoropad said he was pleased to see people of Saskatchewan give a strong mandate to the government.

“I think it speaks volumes to the quality of candidates that are in each constituency and the work that has been done beforehand by the candidates in the previous term and the leadership of Scott Moe. We will absolutely do our utmost to live up to that trust that has been given to us at this time.”

While the pandemic posed some challenges for Skoropad, like it did for others, the newly elected Arm River candidate said despite it all, once he got the green light and was able to practice social distancing and mask up, he hit the ground running.

“I was on the road and on doorsteps six days a week and I don’t think it is necessarily because that is what campaigning is, I think that is what the job that I was always looking to do as MLA. You have to meet people, you have got to talk and hear people and I think that is important. This campaign was really rewarding and I was welcomed into the lives of many people

right across the constituency . . . (and) people took the time to share their stories with me.”

Now that he will be representing the constituency, Skoropad said it will be a learning experience. “It is exciting and it is an exciting new chapter in my life. I know that at the end of the day I am doing this because I want to make a difference and I want to serve people.”

Reaching out to The Watrous Manitou, NDP candidate Cam Goff wanted to extend his congratulations to Dana Skoropad of the Saskatchewan Party on his victory in the constituency of Arm River. “I trust that he will serve his constituents with honesty and diligence during his time as our member of the Legislative Assembly. I also offer my appreciation to Steve Forbes of the Progressive Conservative Party and Tiffany Giesbrecht of the Green Party for putting their names forward in this

election. Without choice, there can be no democracy, and your contributions help ensure a healthy and diverse political system. Finally, I want to thank the people who supported me during my campaign. To all of you who donated your time, money, and effort, as well as voted for me, please accept my sincere gratitude. This was truly a remarkable experience.”

With each candidate wrapping up their campaigns as election day arrived, Skoropad took the opportunity to extend his appreciation to former MLA Greg Brkich for the work he did within the constituency and to the candidates who ran against him noting each ran respectful campaigns.

“I also want to thank all of the people of Arm River that supported me in this. That is not lost on me at all. I will certainly give my best, all of my hands, heart and mind and everything I’ve got.”

Confirmed COVID-19 case in Horizon School Division

As cases of COVID-19 rise in Saskatchewan and guidelines and strict protocols continue to be implemented, a number of school divisions throughout the province have also seen confirmed cases of COVID-19 in their schools. That now includes Horizon School Division as the division was made aware of a COVID-19 diagnosis Oct. 23 in an individual at Viscount Central School.

The school division stated families in Viscount Central School and others with a connection to the individual were notified as the school division worked closely with Public Health to assist in the contact tracing process.

Horizon School Division Director of Education and CEO Kevin Garinger said in a statement that further details cannot be provided to maintain the privacy of the individuals involved. “We all have a shared responsibility to limit the spread of COVID-19. We thank Horizon’s staff, students, and families for all their efforts to help mitigate the risks in this pandemic. We continue to require students and staff to stay home if they are experiencing symptoms associated with COVID-19. Horizon’s detailed Re-Entering Horizon Plan can be found on horizonsd.ca, along with our new Administrative Procedure regarding Illness in Care, which details the process to be followed when a child experiences symptoms or illness while at school.”

As the division was made aware of a diagnosis in an individual at Viscount Central School, Winston High School families were also notified during the evening of Oct. 23. In a message to those families of the Watrous high school, Garinger informed them a case of COVID-19 had been diagnosed in an individual with a connection to the school.

“We are working closely with Public Health staff to ensure necessary measures are in place to protect all students.”

Garinger noted that Public Health would be contacting parents and guardians of students and any staff, visitors,

and volunteers who may have been in close contact with the case and provide direction. “If you do not hear from them, your child has not been exposed because of the measures that are in place. We remind everyone entering schools to monitor for any signs or symptoms of COVID-19.”

The Horizon School Division’s Director of Education said they would continue to provide additional information to parents and guardians as it becomes available.

While the division was unable to comment on whether there was a connection between the case reported in an individual at Viscount Central School and Winston High School, out of an abundance of care and caution and in consideration of the health and safety of its students, staff and volunteers, Horizon School Division made the decision to pause all extracurricular activities from Oct. 26 to 30.

In a letter issued by Garinger, he stated the pause included all practices and games scheduled during that time. “We will be taking this time to review our current Return to Sport Protocol in light of the first COVID-19 case in one of our schools and the increasing COVID-19 cases across the province. As we conduct our review, we will continue to monitor the active cases. A decision on the continuation of Horizon School Division’s return to sport, or further modifications to our safety guidelines for sport will be shared early next week. Thank you all for your continued diligence to keep our students, staff and communities safe.”

With a rise in COVID-19 cases across the province, as of Oct. 29, there were 82 new cases of COVID-19 to report

in Saskatchewan, bringing the total to 2,990 cases. The new cases were located in the North West (6), North Central (11), North East (3), Saskatoon (37), Central East (7), Regina (13), South West (1), South Central (2) and South East (2) zones. As of Oct. 29, within the local Central East 1 subzone, which is part of the larger Central East zone, there were no new cases and six active cases.

Public health investigations were underway to determine the source of transmission for all new cases. Of the 2,990 reported cases, 707 are considered active. A total of 2,258 people have recovered.

Twenty people are in hospital. Fourteen people are receiving inpatient care; four in the North Central zone, one in the North East zone, six in the Saskatoon zone and three in the Regina zone. Six people are in intensive care; one in the North Central zone, four in Saskatoon and one in Regina.

Dear Philip,

We live in a country where thankfully many people have access to clean water and soap and research shows (and I mean a lot of research) that bar soap and water are an effective solution in removing dirt, grime and germs. This is because soap is a surfactant - a solution that lifts crud, bonds with it, and allows it to be rinsed away with water. Some say that soap dates to 2800 BC and has been used ever since. It is safe to re-use soap repeatedly, in fact many people (including me) wash with a bar of soap until only crumbly little pieces remain. At that time, the little pieces are often added to water in a soap dispenser and used as liquid soap.

Just as a side note, in 1847 Ignaz Semmelweis discovered the incidence of childbed fever could be cut drastically when interns wash their hands before delivering a baby and after performing autopsies. This was a dramatic discovery and a solid testament regarding the importance of hand washing throughout day-to-day life.

I told Ed, my old neighbour in Saskatchewan, that our pastor had a great sermon on anger. Anger and I are too often friends. Ed commented that it would have been better if our pastor had spoken on stupidity, which causes most irritation. "Why should we try to control our anger when there is no limit on the stupid things people do to offend us?" Ed asked me.

I became aware that Ed was bubbling over in frustration about the cost of a

provincial election to taxpayers. I did not know the mention of a sermon on anger would get Ed's blood boiling. It is the seemingly innocent thing that can make myself or others blow up in anger like stepping on a land mine. When our emotions get triggered, it is hard to keep control. Becoming angry is like drinking poison and thinking it will teach the other person a lesson. Feeling happy or loved is positive, while feeling anger, resentment or hatred towards another is dangerous.

Anger is one letter short of danger. How difficult it is to be angry and yet not sin. There needs to be a time limit on our fury. Comedian Phyllis Diller twisted, "Never go to bed mad - to stay up and fight." Anger does tend to lead to fighting with thoughts and words, which may become physical violence and abuse or murder. Anger, once allowed to

rule a person, is difficult to dispose of successfully. It tends to come back and repeat on a person like heartburn.

Anger brings the worst out in us. It is like acid that eats away at the mind and heart of an individual. Anger often becomes resentment, which grows into bitterness, and bitterness is a hidden tumour people carry inside them. Anger can allow the devil to lead us into evil. God's word warns, "Be angry but do not sin." (Ephesians 26) Jesus got angry at the temple at people selling oxen, sheep and pigeons. He also got outraged at the money changers there. He was upset that they were making the temple a house of trade. He acted in his anger once but then he let his anger go. He did not return there to keep operating in anger towards those who bought and sold in the temple. Behind Jesus' outward anger

was his inward rejection of what was happening in his Father's house. He saw not a house of prayer but a place of business or trade.

God calls us to speak the truth with each other. We are to do it in love, which can reflect our honest anger. What we say in anger must be limited to a specific situation and time. Pizza Phylo Squares

Ingredients:

- 7 sheets phyllo pastry
- 1/2 cup melted butter
- 1/2 cup parmesan cheese
- 1 1/2 cups grated mozzarella cheese
- 1 red onion, very thinly sliced
- 1 tsp. oregano
- salt and pepper sprinkle
- thinly sliced tomatoes

Directions:

Preheat oven to 375°F. Thaw phyllo, place first sheet on parchment lined baking sheet, brush with butter and sprinkle with 1 tbsp. Parmesan cheese. Repeat until you have used up all the remaining six sheets of phyllo pastry. Press firmly on each layer so they stick together. Sprinkle with mozzarella cheese and onion slices. Arrange thinly sliced tomatoes on top. Season with oregano, salt and pepper. Bake 20-25 minutes until golden, and cut into squares to serve.

Watrous Curling Rink ready to rock

With the ice cleaned, rocks sanitized, decals installed and brooms dusted off, the Watrous Curling Rink is welcoming curlers for another year. While this season is different than many due to the COVID-19 pandemic, those who enjoy participating in the sport are eager to play.

Acting president and current vice-president of the Watrous Curling Club, Tyler Mclean said on behalf of the members, they are looking forward to the upcoming season although Mclean added he is cautious things could change throughout the season due to growing COVID-19 numbers in the province.

Despite the fear of potentially having to suspend action at the rink as the year rolls along, right now it is all systems go. With the ice installed, Mclean said league play slides into a number of different time slots.

“We are having seniors on Monday afternoons, mixed league on Wednesday evenings, stick league on Thursday afternoons, slacker’s league (which is a fun league) on Thursday evenings and we will have a new league called the family fun night that will run the first four weeks on Sunday evenings.”

Mclean said league play officially starts Nov. 2 with the seniors getting the first shot on fresh ice. “Our plant was fired up Oct. 20 and rink technician Jamie Regier and numerous volunteers have been working hard to have the ice ready for league play.”

In addition to league, Mclean said the curling club is looking forward to hosting a few spiels later this year. “We will be hosting a SCT Men’s Spiel during the Nov. 27 weekend and then another SCT spiel in mid-January.”

Along with looking for new board members to fill some vacated positions, as for what people can expect when attending the Watrous Curling Rink due to the COVID-19 pandemic, Mclean said, “Masks are strongly recommended in high traffic areas in the rink (like the lobby, upstairs lounge, etc.). We will be monitoring the situation for the first few weeks and if people do not respect the rule, we will make masks mandatory in those areas. There will be no shaking hands and during games, one sweeper is allowed at a time. Hand sanitizer must be within close proximity at all times. The change rooms will be closed and curlers must come clothed in curling attire and change their shoes in the lobby area. One team will be responsible for marking score and the rocks will be wiped down after every draw. The kitchen and bar area will be closed for the first month until we see how things play out. At this time, we ask that spectators stay home until we get a handle on everything happening.”

While Mclean understands the inconvenience it may cause for some, he wants the rink to be a safe and welcoming environment for everyone. “We have appreciated everyone’s help over the years and the many volunteer hours that have gone into each season. This year being what it is, we will need all the support that we can get to make it through the year. We have never

faced anything like this as a club in the past and fear for what lies ahead.”

As for the ice itself, Jamie Regier enters another year as the curling rink’s ice technician. Looking to have the ice in pristine shape before the season starts, Regier said a lot goes into creating the ice including having the plant reach a steady temperature of 20° F. From there a number of floods are put on before the ice is scraped to remove any bumps.

Adding white powder to the water, the mixture is applied on the frozen surface and soon the white ice forms and is then sealed. From there, houses, hoglines, hacks and decals are placed on the ice and watered. With 13 sprayer mists covering the lines, once that is done the ice is checked to make sure everything is sealed. Another four floods are applied ranging from 300 to 500 gallons of water per flood before another scrape.

“Then we double pebble, scrape and double pebble,” said Regier. “We have four scraping patterns and we do each one three times followed by a pebble. In total 48 scrapes are done.”

From there, Regier said the rocks are textured which cleans the running bands. Once that is completed and a few other general maintenance items are taken care of, then the sheets are ready to go. “It takes about nine days to make ice and I look forward to doing it each year. This is my 10th season of being able to provide great ice for Watrous and Curl Sask events that are held in town.”

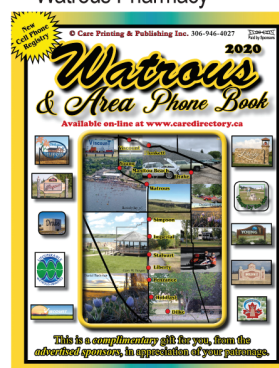

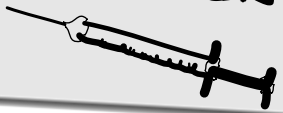
